#### Dear editor,



The temperature barely hovers above  $0^{\circ}$  and a strong chill westerly wind blows into the station with the midnight train out of Kyiv, Ukraine.

Aboard are over 500 refugees fleeing the barbaric inhumane invasion of Russian forces that began February 24th. They are from all across Ukraine, Mariupol', Donetsk, Kharkiv, and a few lucky ones from Bucha and many other places too countless to name.

In a tent on the platform a small cadre of international Volunteers ready themselves for the nights . There



is Steve a Veteran and former Navy Seal from Pennsylvania, Bruno a student from Przemysl, Paddy a police officer from Boston, Eric a soldier from Taiwan and myself, Joshua a Chef, originally from Elmvale.

Together we prepare hot meals, sandwiches, hot coffee, tea and hot chocolate. Parsing out containers and filling them to the brim with the nights offerings.

This night we will be serving a traditional Ukrainian Goulash rich with vegetables and meat sided with a tabbouleh salad. For sandwiches we offer Ham and Cheese, Egg Salad, and Pizza Panini's. The dessert is banana bread, pound cake and pudding.

We are all volunteers from the World Central Kitchen, a NGO created in 2010 by Chef José Andres after a devasting earthquake hit Haiti. And just like in 2010, when news of the Russian invasion broke World Central Kitchen was mobilized within hours. Field Kitchens across Ukraine in Kyiv, Lviv, Kharkiv and one massive kitchen Przemysl, Poland were set up.

As this train and the others that follow, arrive and unload their passengers over the course of the night and day breaks myself and the other members of my WCK team are relieved by another team who will take another 10 hour shift for the trains that arrive during the day. Like a well oiled machine, more food,

#### Council Meeting Highlights: April 6, 2022 Next Council Meeting: April 20, 2022

#### **Community Improvement Plan Award**

The Township's Community Improvement Plan (CIP) supports eligible businesses through municipal funding opportunities. There are eight program areas, spanning from permit fee rebates and historic property improvements to new signage and façade improvements.

Council has awarded The Palace Tavern, located at 13 Queen Street West in Elmvale, with \$1,500 under the Signage Improvement Program.

The CIP program helps to enhance and promote Springwater businesses, while preserving local heritage. Funds are still available. Learn more about the program and the application process at springwater.ca/CIP

#### Agreement with Rad Adventures

Council authorized an agreement that will allow Rad Adventures to offer outdoor mountain biking programs from Tree Nursery Sports Park for the 2022 season.

# Support for York University School of Medicine Proposal

Council has authorized the Township to issue a letter of support for York University's proposal to the Province for a new School of Medicine in York Region. The new school would help to increase the number of primary care physicians in Ontario and address current shortages in Simcoe and Muskoka municipalities.

#### North Simcoe Rail Trail Surface Upgrades

The Township has received a Federal

Development Grant in the amount of \$750,000 to resurface up to 30 kms of track along the North Simcoe Rail Trail to increase its accessibility.

As per the grant criteria and with Council's authorization, the Township will provide the remaining funds required to complete the project, up to \$250,000. Staff are continuing to seek and apply for additional third-party funding to reduce the Township's 25% contribution.Committee must be in place before October 1 of an election year to hear applications for compliance audits of candidates' election campaign finances.

#### Simcoe County Leader in Waste Diversion

The County of Simcoe has retained its status as a provincial leader in waste diversion. In late 2021, provincial data from 2020 showed the County's residential waste diversion rates were the second in Ontario, with a 64% diversion rate. This is the County's highest diversion rate since recordings began in 2006. Though the 14-year streak continues, there is still more work that can be done to improve waste diversion locally. More than 50% of what we throw to the curb could be diverted within our existing programs, particularly organics. In an effort to make further improvements, we must provide education on diversion programs and promote the importance of separating materials.





# 2022 Tourism, Culture and Sport Enhancement Fund

In 2018-2019, staff undertook an analysis of the \$200,000 Arts, Culture and Heritage (Built, Natural and Environmental) Grant and the \$300,000 Simcoe County Tourism Development Fund (SCTDF). In November 2019 County Council approved blending of the two programs for greater efficiencies in both scope and impact. \$100,000 would be reallocated from the SCTDF to the \$200,000 Arts, Culture and Heritage (Built, Natural and Environmental) Grant for a new \$300,000 Simcoe County Tourism, Culture and Sport Grant Program. In 2022, the grant was renamed the 'Tourism, Culture and Sport Enhancement Fund'.

On April 12, 2022, Council approved the recommendations for disbursement of the 2022 Tourism, Culture and Sport Enhancement Fund. The County of Simcoe has approved 87 successful applications totalling \$471,396.93 through the 2022 Tourism, Culture and Sport Enhancement Fund to

County Homelessness Enumeration Preliminary Results. The enumeration results demonstrate the highest count of people experiencing homelessness to date. A total of 441 surveys were completed and 722 people experiencing homelessness were counted. Preliminary analysis indicates a number of factors contributing to the high count, including greater need in the community.

#### Municipal Comprehensive Review - Special Meeting of Council Working Session (Presentation by: Stefan Krzeczunowicz, Hemson Consulting; Sal Spitale, North South Environmental; Nick McDonald, Meridian Planning)

The MCR is a planning project required to be completed as directed by the Province, so that the County's Official Plan is brought into full conformity with the provincial growth plan (A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, 2020). The MCR project is being completed by all upper-tier and single-tier municipalities that are subject to the provincial growth plan.

On April 12, 2022 a Special Meeting of Council working session took place to provide Council and the public with an update on the tasks underway for this project and build upon the presentations and discussions that occurred during the previous December 9, 2021 Special Meeting of Council on the MCR. A particular focus of this working session was on the Land Needs Assessment work that has been completed to identify if and where more land may be needed in the County for future population and employment growth. Further partner consultation, engagement and education initiatives will follow over the coming months, including an Open House and Public Meeting.

# **2022 Tax Ratios and Tax Rates** (Presentation by: Peter Frise, Municipal Tax Consultants Inc.)

On April 12, 2022, Council approved that the 2022 tax ratios and rates be approved. For 2022, there will be no changes to the current policy for tax ratios, no change to the current policy for farmland awaiting development or commercial and industrial vacant / excess land.

While 2021 should have been the first year of a new reassessment cycle, with all destination values being updated to reflect January 1, 2020 market conditions, the Province put a pause on reassessment in the spring of 2020. This decision was made in response to the ongoing pandemic. This means that property taxes for 2022 will again rely on the full destination values based on the January 1, 2016 valuation date. A change Small Scale On-Farm Business Sub-Class (SSOFB) threshold to \$100,000. SSOFB provides a special property tax treatment for commercial and industrial operations on farm properties. These subclasses are optional for municipal property tax purposes and are intended to give municipalities a means of supporting small scale Agri-food enterprises. As part of the Province's 2021 Fall Economic Statement it was announced that this threshold would be increased to 100,000 for the purposes of education tax. The County chose to extend its program from the original 50,000 threshold. Bi-weekly Spring Leaf & Yard Collections begins April 11 (Zone 1) & April 18 (Zone 2). Determine your collection week by downloading the Simcoe County Collects App. Place materials out by 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection weeks. Collections will occur during the week, not necessarily on your regular collection day. Does not apply to residents of Barrie and Orillia. Download the Simcoe County Collects App or view your Waste Management Calendar for full details.

#### Georgian to Match County of Simcoe Bursaries for Postsecondary Students

Georgian College will be matching the County of Simcoe in offering bursaries to new students to assist in their postsecondary studies beginning in September.

The County recently announced up to 21 \$3,000 bursaries, through its Education Bursary Program, are available to County of Simcoe residents attending a postsecondary institution in Ontario. For those successful applicants who are registered to attend Georgian in September, the college will automatically offer a matching \$3,000 bursary.

"We're excited to partner with the County of Simcoe to offer local residents even more reason to choose Georgian for their postsecondary education," said Dr. MaryLynn West-Moynes, President and CEO, Georgian College. "We encourage future students to get to know Georgian and experience everything we have to offer. This matching bursary opportunity will give those selected by the County 3,000 more reasons to come to Georgian."

Georgian offers more than 130 career-focused programs at its seven campuses, is a recognized leader in co-operative education and has one of the highest graduate employment rates among Ontario colleges.

Eligible bursary applicants must follow the County of Simcoe's application process including:

• Be a resident of a participating Simcoe County municipality and a Canadian citizen or permanent resident

• Have graduated, or be eligible for graduation in the year of application, from a secondary school in Simcoe County

• Demonstrate interest in, and contribution to, their community through active participation in extracurricular activities at their school and/or in community organizations

• Submit a 500-word essay on a pre-determined topic, as well as an explanation as to why they should be awarded a bursary

Applicants must also provide a copy of their Grade 12 or first-year postsecondary transcript and proof of enrolment at an Ontario university or college in an undergraduate program as a full-time student.

This Education Bursary Program is consistent with the County's commitment to education, as well as encouraging community involvement and civic responsibility.

"The County's student bursary program supports students and families across the region in pursuing their education and skill development goals," said Warden George Cornell. "We are grateful to partner with

Georgian College, a provincial leader in higher education and training, to enhance these bursaries and provide additional assistance and resources to local students."

The Simcoe County Homelessness Enumeration was scheduled for November 17 - 23, 2021. However, due to a surge in COVID-19 cases and outbreaks at that time, the County of Simcoe was granted an extension to complete enumeration, with data to be submitted to the MMAH by February 15, 2022. # Plan sets out to achieve net-zero emission by 2050

The City of Barrie has established a plan with actions and strategies for improving energy efficiency and reducing community-wide Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions. On March 28, 2022, Barrie City Council approved the Community Energy & Greenhouse Gas Reduction Plan, entitled Inspiring Climate Action in Barrie. The plan establishes ambitious targets, including a commitment to achieve net-zero emission by 2050.

"This plan will help the community better understand current energy consumption, identify energy efficiency opportunities, and help meet the community's climate priorities," said Adam McMullin, Manager of Energy Management. "Together, we can collectively re-imagine the way we travel, work, and play to maximize the positive benefits to our environment, health, economy making Barrie a better place to live for everyone." Without further climate action, Barrie's community energy use is estimated to increase by 36% by 2050, and GHG emissions are expected to increase by 40% by 2050, compared to 2018 levels. Barrie aims to reduce overall GHG emissions 45% below 2018 levels by 2030 and to become net-zero by 2050. To achieve these targets, strategies and actions have been developed that are tailored to the Barrie community.

The plan was developed with extensive public and stakeholder engagement. A Stakeholder Advisory Group (SAG) was established, comprised of membership representing local conservation authorities, school boards, utility companies, Council, City staff, environmental organizations, local health care services, post-secondary institutions, and the construction & development industry. Staff also engaged the public through multiple surveys and virtual public information meetings.

#### **Spring Wildflowers**

Spring is the season of new life and change. There are many indicators when spring is upon us such as birds returning from migration, insects hatching, frogs singing, and a parade of spring ephemerals blooming.

Spring ephemerals are a group of short-lived, hardy wildflowers that are able to survive the weather extremes of spring. The first of the ephemerals each year is typically Skunk Cabbage (Symplocarpus foetidus). This incredible burgundy/green mottled wetland flower is able to increase the temperature of its tissues to melt through the snow, giving it an edge in the all-important pollination race. The first flowers that many of us will actually see are a small yellow flower called Coltsfoot (Tussilago farfara), which inhabits roadsides and trails across Simcoe County. As we move towards end of April; Hepaticas, Early Blue Cohosh (Caulophyllum giganteum), Bloodroot (Sanguinaria Canadensis), and Yellow Trout Lily (Erythronium americanum) begin flowering in local woodlots, giving them a smattering of whites, purples, and yellow (colours often associated with Easter). In wetlands such as the Wye Marsh, Marsh Marigold (Caltha palustris) should begin flowering within the next week, painting the area in bright yellow.

Looking forward to the remainder of May; Red & White Trilliums (Trillium erectum & grandiflorum), Dutchman's Breeches (Dicentra cucullaria), Jackin-the-Pulpit (Arisaema triphyllum), and Mayapple (Podophyllum peltatum) will blossom in an amazing array of shapes, adding to the colourful landscape. By the May 24 weekend, many of the trilliums will begin to fade, signaling the end of this beautiful seasonal transition.

April & May truly are a wonderful time of year to be out enjoying nature around Simcoe County. Thanks to our varied habitat, the Marsh is an excellent place to come for a stroll and view some of the many spring wildflowers that call Ontario home.



- 128 new beds at Victoria Village Manor
- 2 new and 62 upgraded beds at Grove Park
- 80 new and 112 upgraded beds at Schlegel Villages – Barrie
- 34 new beds at Simcoe Manor and Village -Beeton
- 36 new and 60 upgraded beds at Collingwood Nursing Home
- 64 new and 66 upgraded beds at IOOF Seniors Homes Inc. Barrie
- 34 new and 94 upgraded beds at Oak Terrace Redevelopment
- 47 new and 49 upgraded beds at Stayner Care Centre

"This redevelopment project could not be possible without the support of MPP Doug Downey and the

- Ontario plans to invest an additional \$3.7 billion, beginning in 2024-25, on top of the historic \$2.68 billion already invested, to support this new series of allocations for the development of 10,000 net new and more than 12,000 upgraded beds across the province. These historic investments would bring the total to \$6.4 billion since spring 2019.
- In response to the evolving Omicron situation, the Province has put additional measures in place to protect residents, staff and caregivers, including making fourth doses of the COVID-19 vaccine available to residents who received their third dose at least three months ago, and making third doses of the COVID-19.

#### Free Mental Health Program for Youth is Set for Simcoe/Muskoka Next Month

YMCA of Simcoe/Muskoka, Catholic Family Services of Simcoe County, and Waypoint Centre for Mental Health Care are partnering on 'Y Mind' - an innovative mental health program for youth experiencing anxiety and depression

A new early intervention mental health program aimed at decreasing the barriers youth face when trying to access mental health supports, is coming to Simcoe County next month. In partnership with Catholic Family Services of Simcoe County and Waypoint Centre for Mental Health Care, the YMCA will provide this seven-week program, for youth ages 18-30, which gives timely access to support networks, mental health services, and mental wellness programming in a non-stigmatizing community setting at no cost. No medical referral is required.

The goal of Y Mind, says YMCA of Simcoe/ Muskoka CEO Jill Tettmann, is to engage young people experiencing mild to moderate anxiety and depression with early intervention, to help them learn effective skills to improve their mental health.

"The pandemic has increased rates of anxiety and depression amongst our young people. Increasing accessibility to mental health support, through Y Mind, is vital to the wellbeing of our communities." says Tettmann.

"By providing this program at no cost and without requiring a diagnosis or medical referral, Y Mind will break down barriers to mental health support and Free Mental Health Program ... continued




help youth access the support they need in a timely way. I'm looking forward to seeing the many positive impacts this program will have on individual youth and families." says Janette McGee, General Manager of Youth Services at the YMCA of Simcoe/Muskoka. The program is designed to help close existing service gaps and help youth access the tools they need to thrive, including the mental health benefits of physical activity through a complimentary, twomonth YMCA Fitness Membership. It will be cofacilitated by two mental health practitioners that will lead closed groups of 10-12 participants over the course of seven weeks. The group sessions will teach participants how to improve their mental health using evidenced-based tools and strategies grounded in mindfulness and Acceptance & Commitment Therapy (ACT). 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

That didn't stop the efforts of some very special volunteers in the community as the annual Anten Mills CRA Easter Eggstravaganza



Egg Hunt went off without a hitch. There was a great turnout of families from the community who gathered in the park in anticipation of the hunt. The little ones filled their baskets with eggs while proud parents and



grandparents took photos. The middle aged group searched for their numbered egg out in the ballfield with their friends and the older kids learned some history and information about the community through the scavenger hunt. Everyone had the opportunity to get a photo with the Easter Bunny which was also a a fire which they left unattended and a substantially great hit. It was nice to see so many families out and large number of beverage containers and garbage hopefully as more events are scheduled throughout spread about. It is up to us to protect our forest and to



participate. A special thank you to those who stepped forward to assist with the event and it demonstrates that there are people willing to help when needed.

There are several dates of significance in May that should be acknowledged. The first is a centenary anniversary. What in this community is going to be 100 years that should be acknowledged you ask? On May 8, 1922 the first of over 1,344,600 trees were planted on the east side of what is now called Wilson Dr. in the Hendrie Forest tract. The original planting was scotch and red pine and as the years have gone on and through selective harvesting, many more hardwood trees are growing. On Horseshoe Valley Rd near Nursery Rd there is a cairn acknowledging that this was the first in Ontario reforestation project. Anten Mills was very much the home to an early logging industry as the train tracks and Hendrie rail station were hubs of activity. Both now long gone but acknowledged as the North Simcoe Railtrail and a history board is located where the station existed by the snowmobile club building. A provincial correctional facility known as Camp Hendrie was built in the forest and the buildings are still in existence along Horseshoe Valley Rd and the property has been repurposed. The Wagner family had a pulpwood business in the village that removed over 15,000 cords of wood from the forest. In 1982 on the 60th anniversary, Simcoe County was named the Canadian Forestry Capital of Canada and a celebration took place where the cairn is located. Regrettably some people do not acknowledge the importance of this wonderful property and the history that resulted from its creation. What was once deforested wasteland with blowing sand has become a jewel for our community. Over the Easter weekend there were individuals in the forest who had what is described as a large gathering. They started



illegal occuring in the forest, take a photo and send it to the OPP and County of Simcoe so that they can investigate and hold those responsible accountable.

The other date that you need to know and put a placeholder in your calendar now is May 27. You may have seen or heard that the Township of Springwater is engaging the entire community in discussions on what the new community hub at the corner of Bayfield St and Snow Valley Rd may look like and contain. We know already that a new fire and separate paramedic station will be built with the fire station construction starting within the year. A number of community members have already had an opportunity already to share their thoughts with the consultant. The Anten Mills CRA is pleased to partner with 880 cities, the consultant on the visioning work, to present a Family Movie Night on Friday May 27. There will be an opportunity to discuss and understand what the property could look like and offer thoughts, suggestions and opinions. This will be a total family experience and more details will be available in the next edition of this column as well as on the Anten Mills Community Facebook page. There will be a number of other opportunities over the month of May starting on May 1 so keep watch on the Springwater and Anten Mills Facebook pages and mark your calendar now, May 27 will be a fun night.

One activity that has been missed by many over this two year health crisis is progressive euchre that was being played on Thursday nights at the community centre. The CRA is working with the community volunteers who have looked after this evening and the township and hope to announce the resumption of this in the coming weeks. #### **Playground Installations Set** to Begin this Spring and More to Come!

April showers bring May flowers ... and in 2022, new playground installations in at least three Midland parks! Thanks to the resident feedback we received last year, playground equipment was chosen, and the vendors are scheduled to begin work this spring and summer to install new modern safe playground features in Pete Pettersen Park, Bayview Park and Little Lake Park.

As of now, weather permitting, the installation of the new playgrounds will begin on the following dates:

• Pete Pettersen Park – last week of May (dependent on the level of ground saturation);

• Bayview Park – July 4th; and

• Little Lake Park – July 18th.

There is a chance the installations will take place earlier for Bayview Park and Little Lake Park, however due to unpredictable supply chain delays, we're expecting it won't begin before the dates above.

In addition, we have also issued an RFP to identify vendors to install new playground equipment in Mac McAllen Park, Edgehill Park and Tiffin Park. The RFP closes soon and depending on supply and availability, there is the potential for installs to take place in one or

more of these parks in 2022 as well.

"In 2021, the Town of Midland Operations Department launched the Playground Replacements & Restorations project on Engaging Midland, seeking input from residents on the themes and features for playground replacement equipment in three Town parks," said Dylan Flannery, Director of Operations. "Thanks to the incredible feedback received, not only will we see new playground equipment installed in at least three parks this year, but the feedback aided us in issuing the RFP for the next three parks significantly earlier this year."

"While it was disappointing when the old unsafe equipment was removed, I want to thank our staff for the extra efforts to procure the project and communicate with our residents," said Deputy Mayor Mike Ross. "Thank you as well to my fellow councillors for supporting the fiscally responsible recommendation made during the budget to support more playground upgrades. Great teamwork! "



As Christians, are we the "real deal" to everyone we encounter, or are we putting on a false front by pretending that as Christians, we do not have any problems?

I am reminded of the "motley crew" that God has chosen to spread His message of hope and forgiveness. King David committed adultery with Bathsheba, tried to cover up her pregnancy, and when he failed, had her husband Uriah killed. King David's life was a roller coaster of emotional highs and lows, yet God used him.

# **Real Communication**

#### "When people talk listen completely. Most people never listen." ~ Ernest Hemingway

In my experience as a psychologist, what people want more than anything is to be heard and understood. It's not just about hearing the words but understanding the meaning and feeling behind them. One of the biggest impediments to good communication is not listening effectively. Just because you have heard the words another has spoken does not mean you understand their meaning, or their feelings. We can repeat their words, but that does not show them that we understand what is behind them.

Often in difficult discussions with partners, teens or in the workplace, each has their point of view and tries to impress that upon the other. While the other is speaking, the listener may be preparing their response and not listening.

If someone has told you that you just do not understand, then you are missing something. First, we must be clear about our intent: are we wanting to argue, to prove our point, or to truly understand where the other is coming from? If you truly want to understand, you can say, "Tell me what I am not their side of the argument.

Doing this is valuable for two reasons: first, it requires listening well enough to hear all of the information; second, it requires that you look at the situation from the perspective of the other.

If two people are having a disagreement, or are trying to communicate about something important, a profound deepening of understanding can occur if they take a few moments and each role-plays the position of the other.

This does not mean simply parroting what the other has said. It means truly stepping into the role of the other, and sincerely expressing their viewpoint. Ask if you have it right and allow the other to continue explaining until he or she agrees that you have expressed it accurately.

This alone may not solve the problem, but at least each knows the other's point of view. There is mutual understanding. Next comes the part where you work as a team to decide how to deal with the differences. With couples, it is very important to resolve important issues, and if there is a stalemate it is wise to have a counselling session or two.

With children, often the parent overrules, in the best interest of the child.

Give the child comfort and compassion as it helps if they know you understand how they feel.

There is a very effective strategy you can begin to implement immediately that may surprise you in how well it works. Listen to what the person is telling you and get as much information about their position as you can. Ask questions if you need clarification. For a moment, imagine you are the other person.

Then the two of you can switch positions and express what you think the other has been trying to say. See if you can convincingly present their point of view, or

A similar situation exists in the workplace. Sometimes the boss or manager makes a unilateral decision. It is then for you to decide if you can live with that, or if it is time to move on.


This week's Flashback picture shows the late Mr. David Brown of Waverley holding a horse which he owned.

#### HURONIA WEST OPP SUCCESSFULLY ARREST MALE WITH FIREARM

Members of the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have arrested and charged a male who was in possession of a loaded firearm.

On Sunday, April 24, 2022, at approximately 8:00 a.m. members from the Huronia West OPP responded to a call for service involving a male outside with a firearm within the Town of Wasaga Beach.

Shortly after, the male was located by police in a vehicle where he then fled the area. Subsequently a pursuit was initiated where the vehicle was followed into a local parking lot. Further attempts to flee police resulted in the suspect vehicle becoming disabled in a ditch.

Multiple officers flooded the area and a high-risk takedown was conducted on the vehicle. After the suspect refused to obey commands, he was successfully controlled by the use of a Conducted Energy Weapon (CEW) and taken into police custody without further incident. A search of the vehicle resulted in locating a loaded firearm.

As a result, James HODGKINSON, 23-years-old, of Wiarton, has been charged criminally with the following:

- · Operation while impaired alcohol and drugs
- · Operation while impaired BAC 80 plus
- · Dangerous operation
- · Flight from peace officer
- · Careless storage of a firearm
- · Possession of a weapon for dangerous purpose
- · Carrying concealed weapon
- · Firearm Use while committing offence
- · Criminal Harassment
- · Failure to Comply with Undertaking

The accused was held for a bail hearing and remanded into custody.

This incident can be a reminder to the public on what police officers locally and beyond respond to without hesitation to ensure public safety is kept at the highest level possible.

#### **OPP** Assisted by Area Residents Calling In Two Suspect Vehicles for Impaired Driving Investigations on Area Roadways

After noticing suspicious driving activity recently, several community members made calls to the Ontario Provincial Police Communications Center that resulted in two local drivers being investigated for impaired driving offences.

# Impaired Charges Laid after Minor Collison in Tiny Township



#### **GBGH Reminding Community to** Avoid Visiting Emergency Room for Mild COVID-19 Symptoms

With the recent surge in COVID-19 cases in our region, Georgian Bay General Hospital (GBGH) is once again seeing an increase in Emergency department (ED) visits among COVID positive patients, particularly those with mild symptoms.

GBGH wants to remind the community to please avoid visiting the Emergency department if they are experiencing mild COVID-19 symptoms such as cough, sore throat, congestion, fatigue, and aches. If someone is experiencing severe symptoms, such as having trouble breathing, then it is appropriate to seek medical care.

"GBGH's Emergency department is always here for you if you're ill or injured," says Dr. Vikram Ralhan, chief of staff and Emergency physician, GBGH. "To ensure those who are sick or injured can be seen in a timely manner, we ask people to carefully consider if they need to visit the ED. If you think you have COVID-19 and are not experiencing symptoms, or have mild symptoms similar to a cold, please avoid coming to the ED. COVID-19 positive people visiting the hospital seeking treatment for mild symptoms puts other vulnerable patients at risk of exposure to the virus."

For mild symptoms, patients are advised to stay home, isolate and monitor their symptoms in case they worsen. Visiting the Emergency department with mild symptoms causes delays care for patients with more severe illness.

Additionally, GBGH is reminding the public the hospital and its Emergency department is not a COVID-19 testing site. Those who have mild or no symptoms should not attend the Emergency department for a test. If someone is symptomatic they should assume they are positive, regardless of a test result, and isolate from others.

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
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# Ontario Working for Workers by Investing over \$1.2m in Training for Good Jobs in Barrie – Springwater – Oro-Medonte
