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### MPP Can Help Stop the Washing of Gravel with World's Purest Water

Ontario Liberal candidates Aaron Cayden Hiltz (Simcoe North) and Jeff Lehman (Barrie-Springwater-Oro Medonte) attended the Elmvale Water Flow at corner of Flos Ten and Hwy 27. They are in support of local water conservation and protection. The Alliston aquifer supplies our two Ridings with some of the purest water on Earth, and protection of this vital resource is important. Concerns have been raised about development and resource extraction that may jeopardize this local resource, and Aaron and Jeff were rallying and meeting with concerned residents of both ridings to hear resident concerns and show their support for the conservation and protection of local water resources.

Ontario Liberal Candidate Jeff Lehman said, "Tiny Township has dealing with this issue and has passed a resolution in favour of an independent scientific study

before there are any more permits to take water and I think that is a very appropriate step. All we are asking for, I think, is for strong evidence based policies that respect the science. We have frankly seen in the past few years how much trouble Government gets into when they don't follow science.

I know this a very personal for you because you live here and get your water here. This is not just a landmark in Simcoe County, this Elmvale Water Flow and is our water. For many of you, this is the place you have chosen to live because of the quality of life it represents and the protection of resources like this one. The commitment I would make as an MPP is that I see the importance of that. We would be here to listen to you. I know Aaron (Cayden Hiltz, Simcoe North candidate), would be the same if we get this chance to represent you after June 2.

I want to thank you for advocating for what's important to you."

Ontario.ca website states, "A guide for completing a Permit to Take Water application form. Section 34 of the Ontario Water Resources Act (OWRA) requires anyone taking more than a total of 50,000 litres of water in a day, with some exceptions, to obtain a permit from a Director appointed by the Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks.". So is the MNR is responsible for this? The Ministry of Natural and Resources Forestry's vision is that Ontarians benefit from the health and wealth of the province's natural resources, today and in the future. The ministry's mission is to sustainably manage and promote the responsible use of our natural resources.

### Purpose of the Permit to Take Water (PTTW) Program

Water takings in Ontario are governed by the Ontario Water Resources Act (OWRA) and the Water Taking Regulation (O. Reg. 387/04) a regulation under the Act. Section 34 of the OWRA requires anyone taking more than a total of 50,000 litres of water in a day, with some exceptions, to obtain a Permit from a Director appointed by the Minister for the purposes of Section 34. Requirements of the permit system, including the factors a Director must consider in issuing a permit, notification and consultation, data collection and reporting, are contained in Section 34 of the OWRA and the amended Water Taking Regulation. The Regulation also addresses water takings in high use watersheds and the Great Lakes Basin.

The purpose of the Permit to Take Water (PTTW) program is to ensure the conservation, protection and wise use and management of the waters of the province. Permits are controlled, and not issued if the taking of more water in a given area would adversely affect existing users or the environment.

The requirements of the application form for a Permit to Take Water reflect the Ontario government's continuing efforts to safeguard the province's water supply. Detailed information is requested about individual water takings so that Ontario's water resources may be protected for all users.

"The Director cannot approve applications for new or expanded water takings of specific types in high-use watersheds. Please refer to the 'Create a Map' tool to verify your location with respect to high-use watersheds if you are applying for a new or expanded Permit to Take Water for:

- beverage manufacturing
- fruit or vegetable canning or pickling (but not washing)
- ready-mix concrete (not portable)
- aggregate processing (to form a slurry)
  - manufactured products, where water is incorporated into products (but not pulp and paper or ethanol"; source: Basics of applying for a Permit to Take Water (https://www.ontario.ca/page/guide-permit-take-water-application-form#section-3)





### Local artisan Jennifer St. John Founder of Social Enterprise Marnie & Michael

When Jennifer St. John, founder of Marnie & Michael, envisioned building her business, there was no way that she could have anticipated the hurdles she would face. In hindsight, the significance of creating a social enterprise focused on mental health had never been more important.

It was January 2020 and Jennifer had just secured a studio in Penetanguishene to craft her artisan purses, with the first round of renovations completed in March 2020. The purses and bags would be handsewn by local seamstresses and sold both online and in local shops. The online shop would be the bridge to providing mental health resources, including a blog that shares her own personal journey with the hopes of aiding others who faced similar experiences in their own families.

"The pandemic has changed everything with launching a business from production team hires to supply chain issues," said Jennifer St. John. "It has been a constant dance of trying to build and grow when it feels like the ground beneath you is uncertain and unstable."

The impacts of the pandemic were not only felt in the business, but within her household, with two children struggling to navigate in this unpredictable new world. "Each child had a different reaction to this new normal and adjusted on their own terms -or never adjusted at all," shared Jennifer. "My oldest is on the spectrum which added a few more obstacles, and the mental health of both my children were at a low point during the lockdowns."

Adapting was a necessity, there was no script or mentor that could instruct launching a business and supporting a family during a pandemic, and so Jennifer needed to carve out a new path. Along the way, she encountered several individuals within the community who provided both guidance and support.

"Ask for help-don't feel like you should have all the answers," Jennifer advised. For Jennifer, this has included connecting with the resources in her children's school Seven Oak Academy, Barrie, enrolling in the HBEC program to learn about launching a product-based business and joining The Social Focus, a course run by Barrie based female business owners.

# The Joyce Family Foundation Grants \$1.5M to Establish Endowment for Future Nurses at Georgian

The Joyce Family Foundation announced today that it is committing \$1.5 million to establish an endowment at Georgian College, which will fund a new bursary program for Honours Bachelor of Science – Nursing (BScN) students.

It is the largest gift in support of financial aid that the college has ever received, as well as the largest endowment.

Georgian and the Joyce Family Foundation are united in their shared values around improving access to education and strongly believe the power of education is transformational.

Dr. Sandy McDonald, a member of the Board of Trustees and a local cardiovascular surgeon was at Georgian's Barrie Campus to make the announcement.

"It brings the Board great pleasure to establish a bursary program for Georgian's nursing students, in support of those who are dedicating their career to caring for others," said Dr. McDonald.

Georgian will welcome the first cohort of students into the new four-year nursing degree program launching this September at both the Barrie and Owen Sound campuses.

Four bursaries, with a value of approximately \$4,500 each, will be awarded every year to new full-time students entering the first year of the BScN program, who have demonstrated financial need

and have overcome obstacles and adversity. One of the bursaries will be directed to a student who selfidentifies as a person with Indigenous ancestry.

Each bursary is renewable each year assuming students remain eligible. By year four, it's anticipated that the endowment will be distributing up to \$72,000 every year to support nursing students.

"We are very grateful to the Joyce Family Foundation for recognizing the importance of supporting those who choose to enter the nursing profession," said Dr. MaryLynn West-Moynes, President and CEO of Georgian College. "The need for nurses in our communities is acute and this very generous and transformational investment will go a long way to ensuring that financial need is not a barrier for any future nurses who study in our new degree program. It is critical to preparing the next generation of nurses for our region."

This donation, which is part of Georgian's Frontline Support: Health-Care Heroes Closer to Home campaign will help ensure that financial hardship does not prevent aspiring nurses from pursuing a nursing degree at the college.

### **Mayor Don's Update**



#### Official Plan Review Update

The Township continues to plan for the future through its Official Plan Review (OPR) process. At this time, WSP (the Township's OPR consultant) has shared final copies of the Phase II Background Studies (Population-Related Employment Market Study, Intensification Strategy, and Bayfield Street Corridor Study) along with a draft version of the new Official

Plan and associated mapping schedules. Township staff have provided initial comments on these preliminary materials and expect them to be available for public release and comment in June 2022.

In-line with Council's priority to adopt a new Official Plan within this current term, the following timeline has been proposed to complete the OPR process:

### **Changes to Regional Library Structure**

At its April 26th meeting, County Council voted to implement a new Information Library Service (ILS). The ILS will replace the Simcoe County Library Cooperative, which currently provides supplemental services to fourteen municipal public libraries across Simcoe County. The decision to move to a new ILS structure was based on recommendations contained in an external report and made following consultation with the local libraries. The recommendations were brought forward to County Council by the Regional Government Review (RGR) Task Force, which is charged with identifying service delivery efficiencies for the County and its member municipalities.

Under the ILS, taxpayers will see annual savings of \$295,000 moving forward. There will be no downloading to the local libraries, and benefits to the local library branches include:

- Upgraded, cloud-based e-services IT platform
- Upgraded library computers software to Microsoft365 (which will allow for greater IT support and security)
- Speed and direct control over technical challenges by library CEOs through immediate resolution with IT HelpDesk and vendor
- State-of-the-art government grade cyber security threat protection
- Single electronic library card, opening resources for all patrons regardless of municipality supported through reciprocal borrowing agreements
- Continued support with regional procurement efforts
- Elimination of over \$50,000 in licencing fees paid by municipal library branches to the County
- Existing collections of materials owned by the County of Simcoe will be donated to library branches for public access at no cost to the individual municipal branches; this includes multilingual collections

A meeting between the County, Library Co-operative Board and library CEOs to discuss issues and implementation is scheduled for May 17th starting at 9:00 am

### 2021 Budget - Unaudited Year End Results

On December 16, 2020, Township Council approved the 2021 Budget & Business Plan. The Plan included gross expenditures and revenues in the amount of \$44.6M. After accounting for all transactions, staff have reported a 2021 tax based operating surplus in the amount of \$1,192,203. The surplus is largely the result of operational savings due to the pandemic and salary/benefit savings/gapping. At its May 4, 2022 meeting, Council voted to allocate the 2021 tax based operating surplus as follows:

- \$36,003 to the Library Capital Discretionary Reserve Fund,
- \$107,074 to the Winter Maintenance Reserve;
- \$155,188 to the Technology Reserve; and
- \$893,938 to reduce the Township's unfunded capital.

#### 2nd Public Information Centre - County Transportation Strategy

Help guide transportation plans in Simcoe County for the next 30+ years. The County of Simcoe is currently developing an update to its Transportation Master Plan that will outline transportation infrastructure needs and priorities to 2051. As part of this process, they are seeking feedback from residents through a virtual Public Information Centre. The input received will help provide direction for the planning, coordination and implementation of:

- a multi-municipal road and transit network,
- active transportation amenities (including bike lanes and trail networks), and
- commuter facilities.

#### **Building Safety Month**

We rarely question our safety when we are in the buildings where we live, work, shop or play. This is because of the high standard in which buildings in Ontario are constructed. In Ontario, the minimum standard for new construction, additions and alteration to existing buildings is set out in the Building Code. Our Springwater Building Services Department enforces the Building Code locally by examining building plans and specifications, issuing permits and performing inspections through the various stages of construction. In May, we celebrate Building Safety Month to highlight the vital role our Building Officials play in ensuring the safety of buildings and their occupants. Follow along with the Township's social media updates this month to learn about building safety, and what goes into creating a safe and sustainable structure.

### **Construction Along Wilson Drive**

Please be advised that there will be three construction projects taking place at various points along Wilson Drive (County Rd 53) beginning this spring. Residents may experience temporary disruptions and delays while construction is active due to required lane closures. Every attempt will be made to minimize these disruptions, and access to roads and businesses will be maintained at all times.

Residents are advised to plan ahead and leave extra time for travel or take alternate routes where possible. For the safety of workers, everyone travelling through the work sites are advised to take extra care and adhere to the posted signage.

### Joshua Cabral - Elmvale on Front Lines of Ukraine Crisis

The drive to Kyiv was surreal experience.

"Look, T-72...maybe T-90" My driver, Fedir, points out the windshield to a burnt out hulk of a Russian Tank, as he pantomimes the sound of an explosion. "So many were destroyed that we cannot clean them all up. Maybe one day after all this is over, we will." He finishes shaking his head.

Fedir is 23 years old, originally from Ternopil, Ukraine. He was studying in California at UC Berkeley on a scholarship when the Russians invaded Ukraine. And he was a part of the first wave of Ukrainians to return to defend their homeland. Right now, he drives supplies to the cities and front lines to contribute to the Defense of Ukraine.

"I could have stayed in California, but I wouldn't have been a good Son if did." He laughs "I didn't even think about it, there wasn't really a question. I just found myself on a flight to Ukraine, I didn't even know how to fight, didn't know how I could help. But I had to do something."

It's a variation of a now familiar story heard from many Ukrainian and Non-Ukrainians who had come to Ukraine to Fight, Defend, and help in anyway they could.

Today, Fedir and I are delivering Body Armor and medical supplies to a Ukrainian Legion base in Kyiv. We have been on the road for about 10 hours now, stopping at various check points and towns to drop of extra supplies on our way into Kyiv.

Our route took us from Lviv through the remains of the Russian lines that just a week before had almost encircled Kyiv. The destroyed tanks are just one example of the devastation I'd seen on our trip. Others include blown up buildings, water filled artillery craters and most hauntingly, fire gutted civilian vehicles by the dozens.

At the final checkpoint, we hand over our paperwork and passports to the Ukrainian soldiers. They check them over and hand them back with nods of approvals and thanks for meals we dropped off to them (small still hot meals from my friends at WCK)

Within the hour we have arrived at the Ukrainian Base and are offloading our much needed cargo. By tomorrow the gear we delivered will be distributed to the Defenders of Ukraine.

### "Now we can relax, Kyiv is safe."

Fedir beams with pride and a big smile as we finally pull out of the base and back on the beautiful streets of Kyiv.

And with so many like Fedir, working tirelessly to help, it is easy to see how Ukraine, it's people and it's culture have endured throughout history.

### Did You Know?

Asparagus is packed with nutrients and is a very good source of insoluble fibre, folate and vitamins A, C, E and K. Asparagus also contains the soluble fiber inulin which promotes gut and heart health.

### **Spring Asparagus Soup**

With simple ingredients and no heavy cream this delicious asparagus soup is spring in a bowl. Served chilled or steaming, this soup is a lovely first course or make it a meal with the addition of rustic bread.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 2 bunches asparagus (800-1000 grams)
- 3 tablespoons (45 ml) olive oil
- 2 medium onions, thinly sliced
- 3 cloves garlic, peeled and minced
- 6-8 cups (1.5 -2 litres) boxed vegetable or mushroom broth
- 1/2 teaspoon (2.5 ml) ground black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon (1.25 ml) salt or to taste
- Optional Shaved or crumbled cheese (i.e., Parmesan, cheddar, gorgonzola, blue cheese) or nutritional yeast (vegan option), for topping
- Optional Handful fresh herbs (i.e., thyme, dill or basil) for garnish

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Heat olive oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add the onions and garlic and stir frequently until the onions are soft and translucent.
- 2. Bend asparagus stems until they break off. This

will remove the tough, fibrous parts.

- 3. Cut the tips off one bunch of asparagus and set aside. Chop up the remainder asparagus spears and add them to the large pot.
- 4. Add the broth, salt and pepper to the pot and bring to a boil. Turn the heat down to

low and cover. Simmer for about 20-25 minutes until the asparagus is very tender.

5. While the soup is simmering, add the asparagus tips to a small pot of boiling

water and cook until tender crisp. Drain the tips and put them into a bowl of very cold water (i.e., add an ice cube) to stop the cooking process. After 15 minutes drain the asparagus tips again and set

- 6. Puree the soup with an immersion blender or in a regular blender until very smooth.
- 7. Chill in the refrigerator or re-heat. Serve each bowl of soup with a few asparagus tips.

By the placement and use of these defibrillators, and the quick actions of bystanders, you will give the victim the best chance of survival.

The units are equipped with a GPS.

### Council Meeting Highlights: April 20, 2022 **Next Council Meeting: May 4, 2022 Littering By-law Approved**

Council voted to rescind the Waste Control Bylaw and adopt a new Littering By-law to regulate littering and dumping on privately owned and public properties in Springwater. To further address this issue, Council directed staff to report on the cost associated with placing no littering signs throughout the Township.

### **START Project Signage Request**

Council approved a request from Scale Nature Park to install five Saving Turtles At Risk Today (START) project signs along the North Simcoe Rail Trail. The proposed signage is intended to raise turtle awareness and increase community engagement on turtle conservation. Staff were directed to request additional sign locations and investigate the cost implications should the signage not be provided by the START project.

### Elmvale Village - Extension of Draft Plan

A one-year extension of draft plan approval was granted to the developer of the Elmvale Village Phase II Subdivision. The extension will allow the developer to continue working to address the remaining draft plan conditions and ultimately complete the registration of the subdivision. Wynstar **Developments Inc. Development Agreement** 

Council authorized a development agreement with Wynstar Developments Inc. for the creation of four new residential lots at 5 Glen Echo Drive in Midhurst that were conditionally approved by the Ontario Land Tribunal. The development agreement will be subject to the advice and review of the Township's solicitor, engineer, and staff prior to its final execution.

**Commitment to Maintain the Green Belt** 



As the result of a notice of motion by Councilor Anita Moore, Council reaffirmed its commitment to maintaining the Township's current Green Belt buffer, but may make considerations for:

1. Any major institutional development/applications to address a social need to the community.

**2.** Any major commercial development that would benefit the Township in the corridors of 90, 93, 26, 27 and Bayfield Street.

Springwater has maintained a 1km Green Belt buffer around its perimeter since before 1998. The purpose of the policy is to protect agricultural farmland by restricting new nonagricultural development, with exceptions for

minor site-specific infill applications.

### Policies/Guidelines for MZO Support Requests to Council

Staff were directed to prepare a report on potential Township policies and guidelines surrounding Ministerial Zoning Order (MZO) support requests made to Council. The policies and guidelines would include MZO request requirements, notification requirements, and public consultation requirements. Council also agreed to suspend any decisions on MZO support requests until a policy is adopted. In the interim, Council will be provided with education on various topics related to MZOs.



### Passport Canada services still experiencing delays

As countries around the world listen to public health officials and reopen their borders, Canadians are ready to travel for business, leisure, and to see loved ones again.

As our federal government continues to ease some travel restrictions, my office is receiving many calls and emails regarding passport applications.

Please note that Passport Canada is currently taking approximately two to three months to process new passport applications and passport renewals.

If you're planning to travel internationally and will require a new passport, please consider applying early to avoid delays. If you have questions regarding your application, please contact my office for assistance at 728-2596. Additional information is also available on my website: https://www.dougshipleymp.ca/passports.

Unfortunately, I have been contacted by many constituents who have had to cancel or reschedule travel plans due to delayed Passport Canada services.

The increase in demand for passport renewals should have been easy for the government to predict as more Canadians need to update their travel documents. Further, as this year is the ten-year anniversary of

implementing the ten-year passport, a predictable increase in demand was foreseeable.

As your Member of Parliament, I have signed a letter to the Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship (IRCC) detailing the issues Canadians are experiencing and asking that immediate action is taken to address these delays.

Finally, thank you to everyone who submitted nominations for my Volunteer Week awards. ### **City Opens Applications for Digital Waterfront Parking Permit**

Starting today, residents are encouraged to apply for their digital waterfront parking permit, which allows them to park for free at select waterfront locations in the city. The permit program will replace the hangtag waterfront parking pass system by making the pass available as a digital permit through the HotSpot app and website.

"Residents will enjoy the many benefits of a digital permit, like never having to worry about forgetting a hangtag pass again, or the ability to register all of their vehicles as there is no longer a limit to the number of permits per address," says Brent Forsyth, Director of Transit and Parking. "Each digital waterfront parking permit will be tied to a specific licence plate, so the City can verify if the vehicle has a permit through the plate number, eliminating the need for a physical hangtag on the vehicle. Once their permit is active, residents do not require anything to enjoy free

parking at the applicable waterfront areas."

Residents have almost two years to transition to the digital permit, with hangtag passes expiring December 31, 2023. For those unable to use HotSpot or prefer to apply in person, they can bring their documentation to Service Barrie (City Hall), where City staff will validate and set them up in HotSpot.

To apply for the digital permit, residents will need their vehicle ownership information and proof of residency documentation (i.e. driver's licence, utility bill, cell phone bill, lease agreement, etc.).

Residents and non-residents can follow the detailed instructions available at barrie.ca/WaterfrontParking to apply for their digital permit/s through the HotSpot app or website (htsp.ca).

Key facts about the digital waterfront parking permit program:

• Like the hangtag pass, the digital waterfront

parking permit is free for Barrie residents. For non-Barrie residents, costs will remain the same as the previous hangtag waterfront parking pass.

- For residents applying for the digital permit, HotSpot is free to use, and no payment information is required.
- Digital waterfront parking permits for residents are valid for two calendar years (for non-residents, one calendar year). Registered users will receive a reminder to renew ahead of their permit expiry.
- The digital permit program offers expanded customer service, with HotSpot's frontline support to assist with technical concerns.

### Ontario Supporting 13 Organizations in Barrie – Springwater – Oro-Medonte Through the COVID-19 Pandemic

Funding to help non-profits deliver vital services to create a stronger Ontario

- Support to adapt or re-imagine program delivery and services to meet the needs of communities, employees and volunteers, incorporate new health and safety processes, or purchase new technology and personal protective equipment.
- Renovations and facility updates to meet the changing needs of the communities they serve.

"Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, our government has committed to supporting those struggling the most," said Lisa MacLeod, Minister of Heritage, Sport, Tourism and Culture Industries. "That's why it's been a priority for us to fund successful programs like the Resilient Communities Fund, which helps non-profits adapt and grow – ensuring they can continue providing the best service possible to the people of Barrie and make a positive difference in the lives of individuals and families."

### Hiring 10,000 new educators to help get our students

Thursday, May 5, 2022 – This morning, the Ontario Liberals announced plans to cut class sizes province-wide, capping them at 20 students for every grade. Because capping class sizes will require more educators, the plan also includes hiring 10,000 teachers to ensure every student gets the focus and attention they deserve.

### **Ontario's Best Butter Tart Festival**



The award-winning Ontario's Best Butter Tart Festival, the original and largest butter tart festival in Canada, set to return to Midland on June 11

April 29, 2022 – It has been more than two years since butter tart lovers have converged on the Town of Midland to savour thousands of butter tarts and the town is looking forward to welcoming everyone back on June 11.

The first festival was held in June 2013, and 2022 would have been the festival's 10th anniversary had the COVID-19 pandemic not caused it to be cancelled in 2020 and 2021. Regardless of those cancellations, the Town marked the event with the sale of fundraising T-Shirts in support of the Georgian Bay General Hospital Foundation in 2020 and the creation of the Butter Tart Trail in 2021 in partnership with Cycle Simcoe.

"We are thrilled for the return of Ontario's Best Butter Tart Festival in Midland this June. Summers haven't felt the same these past two years not kicking them off with this sweet event," said Mayor Stewart Strathearn. "Welcome back to Midland! Some things have changed since the last festival. King Street has been redesigned to be more pedestrian-friendly and its flexible configuration now makes it even more suitable for hosting large events such as this. I hope all attendees enjoy our new downtown main street and the sweet and savoury treats the festival has to offer!"

The award-winning festival is the original and largest butter tart festival in Canada and pre-pandemic was drawing 60,000 visitors for the one-day event.

"Ontarians love their butter tarts," said Karen Mealing, Manager of Culture and Community with the Town of Midland. "And whether you like your butter tarts plain or with raisins, with a runny or firm filling, or vegan, gluten-free or nut-free, everyone will be able to find a favourite at our festival."

This year's festival takes place from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and includes all of downtown Midland from Yonge St. to Bayshore Dr., and both David Onley and Harbourside Parks. Admission is free to all.

A highlight of the festival is the contest where both professional and amateur/home bakers vie for the title of Best Butter Tart in Ontario.

"The categories this year include traditional butter tarts which are plain, raisin, pecan or walnut butter tarts," said Mealing. "And the second category this year is Wild Style, which is a butter tart with a nontraditional ingredient or two."

While the judging takes place, festival visitors can sample the contest butter tarts. Judges cut off a small piece to taste and the rest of the butter tart is cut into smaller pieces to be circulated among the audience by festival volunteers.

There is no charge to watch the judging and those wishing to take home full, intact contest tarts can visit Scotiabank on the day of the festival and purchase a mixed package of 6 for \$10.

Festival attendees can also visit the many downtown merchants who expand their businesses onto sidewalks in front of their stores and the more than 200 vendors selling everything from butter tarts to clothing, jewellery, home décor, personal care products, and hand-crafted items. There will also be food trucks for those who aren't just making butter tarts their sole food source for the day.

There will be a variety of live music in Harbourside Park all day, including Francophone and Indigenous musicians.

While there are no COVID-19 public health mandates in place at the moment, festival organizers encourage visitors to wear a mask as the festival attracts a lot of people and they want everyone to have a safe and healthy experience.

Those interested in burning off a few calories can participate in the Butter Tart Trot, which is the yummiest race in Ontario and includes butter tarts en route. To register visit www.buttertartrot.ca. All proceeds from the Trot support youth programs.

McKay Road and Veterans Drive intersection will be closed starting May 24 until approximately November 2023. The road closure is necessary for the construction of new infrastructure to support growth and development in the southeast section of the Salem Secondary Plan Area.

McKay Road will be widened to 5-lanes and include an urban streetscape with curb and gutter, raised medians, concrete sidewalks, a raised cycle track, and stormwater management improvements. In addition, McKay Road and Veterans Drive intersection will be expanded and upgraded.

The road closure will include McKay Road from 1 km west of Veteran's Drive to just east of Hwy 400 and Veteran's Drive from Salem Road to the 9th Line of Innisfil. The intersection of McKay Road and Veteran's Drive will also be closed to all traffic. Local access to residents within the closure limits will be maintained for the duration of the project, however through traffic will not be permitted. Detours will be in place for the duration of construction.

### **Tiffin Centre for Conservation**



Located between Barrie and Angus, the Tiffin Centre for Conservation is a vital part of the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority. This 300 plus acre property is a four season destination for environmental recreation and education.

The Centre encompasses a number of distinct ecosystems within its grounds. Expect to encounter forests, wetlands, open meadows, ponds and ancient lake beds while trekking the 17 km. of looped trails. With such varied environments, come a variety of flora and fauna. Spring is an especially interesting time if you are by the wetlands or ponds as you will be greeted by a chorus of Spring Peepers. There is also a working sugar bush on site for all to enjoy. Autumn is especially beautiful for those seeking fall colour.

Education Programs are a big part of the Centre's efforts to foster an understanding and appreciation of the natural world and to gain knowledge of environmental issues. Pond Studies are especially popular. Programming takes place throughout the property and more specifically at the John L. Jose Learning Centre and outdoor classroom.

Camping is also possible for official organized groups such as Scouts, Guides, Cadets, religious groups and co-ordinated community groups. There is a minimum requirement of 20 persons and a maximum requirement of 100. Outdoor dry toilets are available as well as firepits.

Large open spaces are also accessible for group games and activities. It is important to note that no alcohol, tobacco or vaping products are permissible on site

Tiffin is a wonderful space to host events such as birthday parties, weddings, special occasions and corporate meetings and events. The Centre offers the option of an indoor or outdoor space and the grounds provide the perfect backdrop for spectacular photo opportunities.

Summer Camp at Tiffin runs from July 5th - September 3rd and is open for registration. Camp is suited for children ages 5-12 and operates daily from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. During their stay, children participate in such activities as hiking, geocaching, nature games, shelter building and wilderness survival.


Two upcoming special events include the Arbour Day Tree Sale and PA Day Camp. The tree sale takes




place on Saturday May 14 and runs from 8 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. Native trees will be available on a first come first serve basis. The camp takes place on Friday June 3, 2022 and begins at 7:30 a.m. and ends at 5:30 p.m. Many activities are adopted from the traditional summer camp itinerary.

Parking fees do apply. Day Passes as well as Annual Passes are both available and money raised goes toward the NVCA and volunteer groups that help restore and maintain the property. It is \$10 per vehicle for a day pass. Pay on-site via Mackay Meters or prepay at home.

This innovative seniors campus project will mirror the County's award winning Georgian Village Campus project, which was completed in 2013.

### STIs on the Rise in Simcoe Muskoka



Sex and sexuality are important aspects of health and the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU) reminds the public that it is essential to protect yourself against sexually transmitted

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

infections (STIs) and get tested if you are sexually active or think you may have one.

From 2019 to 2021, the health unit saw a significant increase in STIs in Simcoe Muskoka, including a four to five time increase in the annual number of reported cases of syphilis. Prior to 2019, the number of cases of syphilis in the region averaged less than 10 cases per year but rose to 50 cases in 2021. Meanwhile the number of cases of gonorrhea reported annually also grew from 120 in 2020 to 265 in 2021.

"The increasing cases of STIs is a disturbing trend that we are seeing not only locally, but across the province as well. It is important to keep in mind that access to health care during the pandemic has been limited and the number of cases may be higher than we realize," says SMDHU Associate Medical



Officer of Health Dr. Colin Lee. "Many STIs can go undiagnosed as people don't always show symptoms or people don't recognize that the symptom is due to an STI and the only way to know is to get tested."

The health unit strongly encourages anyone who is sexually active, had a new partner or multiple partners in the last two years, engaged in unprotected oral, vaginal or anal sex, or has symptoms of an STI to contact their health-care provider, a walk-in clinic or the Gilbert Centre InclusHIV Care clinic at 705-790-6748 to ask about STI testing.

Testing for STIs can include a urine test for chlamydia and gonorrhea and a blood test for syphilis, HIV, Hepatitis B and C, depending on risk factors. Most STIs can be treated with FREE medication that can be accessed through your health-care provider.

You can reduce the risk of getting an STI by making informed decisions BEFORE having sex, such as limiting your number of sexual partners, talking to your partner and asking them to be tested, using condoms and barriers, and being aware of how alcohol and other drugs can affect sexual decision making

There has been a lot of discussion regarding playoff formats in different sports. Some leagues seem to be messing around with things that may or may not even be broken. I have always been a believer that the top team after a season or a round robin tournament

The lower seeded teams are also forced to play more games before they get to the semifinals and the finals. The baseball wildcard system worked as well. However the higher ranked teams did not necessarily have much of an advantage over the wildcard team, other than home field advantage.

Thinking back, there have been lots of World Series winners who came out of the wildcard spot.

The bracket and division system to me in the NHL does not work. There are too many great teams meeting in the first round, and it just doesn't seem the same without a group of teams fighting for the 8th spot before the playoffs. I believe the Maple Leafs would have played the Pittsburgh Penguins under the old system, which is still a really rough match-up, but that is expected in the playoffs.

It is tough to say anything negative about the Blue Jays. Although their offence is lagging behind, they have a great record after an extremely tough schedule to start the season. Anything around a 500 record would have been acceptable, Now, they are ahead of the game heading into a lighter schedule (and they still have all their games to play against the Baltimore Orioles)

The MLB season is 162 games. For the Cincinnati Reds, this season might just feel like 1000 games. They are in pace for around 22 wins which is really embarrassing for the team and the league.

### **Develop Emotional Maturity By Recognizing Choices**

Everyone wants to live peacefully. The most important peace is inner peace because all else flows from that. Anything can happen outside of ourselves that can threaten our inner peace, but we cannot totally blame outside circumstances for a lack of peace within ourselves. Nor can we wait for everything in our lives to fall into place (the way we want) before we can experience happiness or calm.

Some approach life like a person in a cold house, who goes outside and yells at the winter, then comes back in and sits dejectedly, perhaps angrily, shivering and lamenting the unfairness of it all, rather than turning up the heat, building a fire, or moving to a warmer climate. They may tell everyone who comes to visit how terrible the coldness is, and how unfair life is. In fact, they may rarely speak of anything else.

Those who choose to share in the misery and reinforce this kind of thinking may feel that they are helping, but they are not. Yes they are supporting the person, but they are supporting them in staying stuck, helpless, and bitter. Some get so drawn in that they also go out and yell at the winter, and at anyone they feel may be responsible for the winter. The weatherman is on the hit list because he described the weather conditions accurately, and maybe even predicted winter. This is polarity thinking (good guy/ bad guy; right/wrong) and is at the source of a lot of human misery.

The pain that one feels when thinking this way is not caused by what's out there, it is caused by his/her own way of thinking. Developing emotional maturity means recognizing that we have choices in how we choose to think about things. The two-year-old can only think one way about his toy. "It's mine!" He

thinks this because the toy is in his hand, not because he has ownership. The five-year-old may recognize that you have to share, but still do it grudgingly. By ten, a child may willingly choose to share, because he is learning the give and take of life, and he wants to be fair. Then at fifteen, the child may give a possession to a friend out of love and caring. By eighteen, he might purchase toys to give to others he doesn't even know. At forty he might head up a campaign to raise funds for the homeless.

There is a hierarchy in thinking, not just about sharing, but about all human interactions, and the greater our access to the higher levels, the more mature we are. We also need to be able to recognize when we are functioning at the lower levels so that we do not live our lives in a constant tantrum state. Tantrums might work for a while, but sooner or later people resort to the common wisdom about these behaviors, which is to ignore, step over, and move

So if you feel you are caught in polarity thinking,

try to broaden your perspective, or ask a trusted friend to really help you to explore aspects of the situation you might be missing. If you can only see it one way, you haven't got all the learning that the situation has come to teach you. So, it, or another one like it, may come to you again.







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### THE OPP REPORT

#### OPP Officers Providing Speed Enforcement in Community Speeding and Traffic Complaint Areas for the Month of March

During the month of March 2022, uniform officers from the Southern Georgian Bay detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have responded to public complaints of motorists and commercial vehicles speeding and other related traffic violations on area roadways. Calls to the OPP Communications Centre and through the OPP Online Reporting have been recorded and acted upon as follows-

- Officers attended 53 complaint areas and issued 348 tickets and warned 206 drivers for their driving infractions.
- Officers conducted over 100 hours of R.I.D.E. check stops checking 2044 vehicles for signs of impairment along with trail side R.I.D.E. checks of 128 snowmobiles.
- 7 Charges of impaired driving were issued after investigation.
- 6 Drivers provided breath samples on a Roadside Screening Device (ASD) at those R.I.D.E. check stops.
- 2 Dangerous Driving Charges were issued after investigation.
- 1 Charges of flight from police were issued after investigation
- 3 Drivers were charged with driving while prohibited under the Criminal Code of Canada
- 3 Drivers lost their driving privileges and vehicles after they were stopped and charged for a stunt driving offence - exceeding the posted speeds limits as follows with the introduction of the Moving Ontario More Safety Act, also known as the MOMS Act to increase road safety.

The first change is an increase in the previous sevenday vehicle impoundment period to 14 days.

The second change is the introduction of a lower speed threshold for street racing offenders on municipal roads. On roads with a posted speed limit of less than 80 km/h, drivers caught traveling 40 km/h over the speed limit face racing/stunt driving charges (the previous limit was 50 km/h over the speed limit). Educating the public about safe driving practices with our community safety partners is a priority, if you see a possible impaired driver or operator please "Make the Call" and dial 911 and help prevent a crash. If you are heading out on the town, please make a plan to get home safely.

### **OPP** Weekend Traffic Notes

As a result of this investigation and a further investigation of the involved vehicle Brendan Arthur HRYNCZAK 22 years of Midland has been charged with the following offences.

- Operation while impaired alcohol
- Operation while impaired blood alcohol concentration (80 plus)
- Failure to stop after accident
- Contrary to the Criminal Code of Canada and further
- Possession of a Schedule I Substance- Cocaine Contrary to the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act

The accused was released on a recognizance to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice on May 20, 2022.

On May 7, 2022 an OPP officer while conducting traffic related duties on Simcoe County Road 6 in the Village of Wyevale, Tiny Township summoned to Provincial Offences Court a 22 year old female of Tiny Township after stopping her vehicle for allegedly speeding along at 112km/hr in an 50 km/hr zone.

The individual has lost her driving privileges for 30 days and her vehicle was towed and impounded for 14 days as per the Ministry of Transportation (ADLS) guidelines

The Ministry of Transportation has also recently enacted further sanctions on stunt drivers.

OPP officers also conducted six Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere R.I.D.E. spot checks in random locations checking 103 drivers and vehicles in the interest of road safety.

### Reporting to Canadian Anti Fraud Centre and Police Pays Off in Crypto Fraud Investigation

On March 17th, 2022, the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre and Winnipeg Police Service (WPS) were able to recover a \$17 000 fraudulent Bitcoin transfer associated to a crypto investment scam. This recovery is an example of how important it is to report to both CAFC and local police.

#### **Warning Signs**

- Investment opportunities with higher than normal returns.
- Unsolicited telephone, email or social media investment offers.
- Displays of urgency so you don't miss out.
- An individual met on a dating or social media website who quickly attempts to convince you to invest into cryptocurrency.
- A friend tells you about a cryptocurrency investment opportunity via social media or email.

### **How to Protect Yourself**

- If you receive a suspicious message from a trusted friend, reach out to them through a different means of communication to confirm that it is them.
- Verify if the investment companies are registered with your Provincial Securities Agency or the National Registration Search Tool (www.aretheyregistered. ca).
- Prior to investing, ask for information on the investment. Research the team behind the offering and analyze the feasibility of the project.
- Be wary of individuals met on dating or social media who attempt to educate and convince you to invest into cryptocurrency.
- Beware of fraudsters asking you to open and fund new crypto accounts. They will direct you to send it to wallets they control.

Anyone who suspects they have been the victim of cybercrime or fraud should report it to their local police and to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre's online reporting system or by phone at 1-888-495-8501. If not a victim, you should still report the incident to the CAFC

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### **Garlic Mustard at Tiny Marsh**

From M-T-M Conservation Association
Volunteers are needed to pull Garlic Mustard at

Tiny Marsh in May and June.

Dates and times of the pulls are driven by volunteer availability. We used to have specific Garlic Mustard pull dates but we now have a system where people decide when they want to come, they let us know and we at M-T-M put groups together, directing volunteers to the appropriate site, making sure that at least one experienced puller is present and providing



Why get rid of Garlic Mustard? Don't be deceived by the pretty white flowers, this plant is a bully. It crowds out native species like trilliums and changes the chemistry of the soil to stop other species from germinating. This means a slow decline for a forested area as trees are no longer able to reseed themselves.

In 2017, we planted 1,500 native species in a badly infested field,

and these plants – Oswego Tea Beebalm, Common Milkweed, Cup Plant and more – are beginning to become established and take over from the Garlic Mustard. But they still need help. Pull sessions last up to three hours and working conditions, featuring an audience of appreciative birds, are very pleasant. Some volunteers come several times in the season, some come once, all are very welcome.



If you are able to help, email info@ mtmconservation.org. We meet in the parking lot of the Nature Centre on the Flos Tiny Townline. On pull days, there will be a sign to the area being worked on.

If you come, here's what you need: Bug protection,

hat, closed footwear, long pants,long-sleeved shirt. Gloves are an option. A small shovel or fork can be helpful, we have a few but bring your own if you have one. Also bring water for yourself.

### Native tree and shrub seedlings available at Arbour Day Tree Sale

The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority (NVCA) is hosting its 30th annual Arbour Day Tree Sale at the Tiffin Centre for Conservation on May 14, 2022 from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. or until sold out.

The trees are bare root stock, and are sold in bundles of 10 for \$30 per bundle. This year's sale features a variety native of trees and shrubs, including: White and red pine, Norway and white spruce, white cedar, European larch, silver maple, nannyberry, American highbush cranberry, sugar maple, red oak, black walnut and sycamore. Quantities are limited and available on a first come first serve basis.

"NVCA's Arbour Day Tree Sale is a 30-year tradition," said Rick Grillmayer, Manager of Forestry at NVCA. "It all started when we received requests from property owners who didn't have room to plant acres of trees. But the people who planted trees from our first sale already have a small forest!"

All proceeds from the event support NVCA's forestry program. This year, the forestry program will see more than 120,000 trees planted across the watershed. These future forests will help to moderate the effects of both drought and flooding, reduce soil erosion, provide habitat for wildlife and mitigate climate change. They are also an important economic resource.

"Every year, we have lineups before the doors open and we usually sell nearly half of our trees in the first hour," continued Grillmayer. "The popular species are normally sold out in the first wave, so I urge everyone to come early!"

### This year the World Migratory Bird Day, May 14, 2022 will focus on Light Pollution.

The theme will be Dim The Lights For Birds At Night.

Did you know most songbirds migrate at night?
Bright lights at night can easily draw birds off

their intended migration flyway.

They frequently fly into buildings and often die agonizing deaths from the impact.

Vibrant lighting can also become an arousing signal to begin migration way too early.

Lights can also lead migrating flocks far off the course of their intended destination.

In Canada, every year an astounding 22.4 million birds die needlessly by collisions with houses!

Another 2.5 million die from collisions with low rise and high rise buildings.

You can take simple steps to prevent bird collisions with your window panes.

- \* Turn off any lights inside when they are not in use -particularly in empty office buildings
- \* Close curtains and blinds.
- \* LEDs and compact fluorescent (CFLs) warm-coloured bulbs will help reduce collisions.

Studies have shown that blue and green lights attract more birds than red, orange and yellow.

- \* Dimmers, motion sensors, and timers can help to reduce average illumination level.

  \* Put bird decals on the outside surface of the
- window glass.

Always place decals about 1 hand's distance away from each other -1 to 2 bird decals on the window will not deter birds.

\* Put a film on the outside of your windows. Most window films allow light inside while still appearing opaque and reflective to birds.

\* Install exterior sun shades. They will block the reflection of sunlight and create shade over the windows, making it easier

- for birds to spot the glass.

  \* Place bird feeders and baths more than 10 metres (30 feet) away from windows.
- \* Hang wind chimes in front of the window.

Look for wind chimes that contain shiny objects. Since mid-rise and tall buildings cause the death of 2.5 million birds a year, FLAP – Fatal Light Awareness Program has been working in Canada since 1993 to raise awareness and worked tirelessly to convince governments to pass necessary legislation for new building codes that will reduce bird collisions.

Every little action you take to help decrease the alarming decline of birds will help all of us, as we are all connected.



### FLYING ON A WING....AND A PRAYER

I am lucky enough to have a brother that likes to fly. He bought a 1947 Aeronian Chief, single engine, twoseater that had been originally built in the U.S.A. but totally overhauled

in the late 'seventies here in Canada. The plane had floats, so he would land occasionally on Orr Lake and take me up for a spin. I cannot step up a ten-foot ladder without getting dizzy, but I can hop in a tiny plane and fly around at 3500 feet with nary a qualm!

I was sad to hear he had sold the beautiful piece of history last year. With a few lessons under my belt, it was always a hope that some day I would be able to fly it over our little lake. As he still likes to keep up his hours, I count myself blessed when he calls to say he will take me up in a Cessna rental over at Lake Simcoe Regional Airport. That hour I will be available for, no matter what might have been previously scheduled.

It was quite windy (50 mph+-) but the wind direction was to our advantage (no cross winds), and we buffeted our way up through a bit of turbulence to the more tranquil air currents at 3,000 feet. I always breathe deeper, viewing the great expanse of Simcoe County and all the lakes, farmland, and forests as far as the eye can see. Increasingly, the countryside is



being dotted with small subdivisions and you get a birds-eye view of the tracks and trails along the rivers and through the forests. It feels as if we are floating ever so slowly over the landscape. Time slows and memories flow...bringing me back to a memory from a trip back in 1986.

My sis-in-law (more like a sister lol) and I decided to spend Christmas in Venezuela. We flew into the airport at Margarita Island and took a small commuter flight to our destination, Cumana. A few days on the sunny beach and we felt renewed. On the second last day, I was walking the beach and contemplating the

return to Canada and lots and lots of snow, when I heard a huge 'THWACK!!.' Looking out towards the sea horizon, I could not believe my eyes when I realized a plane had crashed onto the ocean just miles out from where I stood! I looked around to see if anyone else was seeing this event, but it seemed I was the only witness at this end of the beachfront. I squinted hard and with the aid of my RX sunglasses, I could see two side doors pop open.

About thirty seconds later, a yellow slide practically flew out each door and several dinghies that seemed to inflate out of nowhere. I could barely make out ant-size people sliding down and collecting into the floating vessels bouncing on the waves. The plane, I could not identify, but it looked to be a DC-9 size which is often used for small commuter flights I believe. Perhaps this was a failed flight from Margarita Island? I can surely say it gave me pause about our planned return the next day to that same destination.

I stood frozen, watching, and wondering what I could do. No cell phones of course and they were so far out. Within about seven or eight minutes the plane pitched slowly forward and down into the depths of the ocean with lastly just the tail seen quietly slipping under. I had come out of my semi-shock and was running towards the hotel to notify staff or whomever might be able to contact the proper authorities. I estimated at least four or five lifeboats that could hold a dozen each. I prayed that they would all have made it out of the plane which could easily carry ninety souls. There were only the sounds of the waves lapping the shore and I could only imagine the terror these poor people had suffered on the fast-descending flight path to that huge thwack landing. I was never able to find out what had caused the near fatal crash on the ocean that day, but we did find out everyone survived. Thankyou God... Oh, and other than our final flight to Toronto being delayed (something about an airline gas credit card?), our trip back to snow-land was unimpeded.

Well, the Simcoe County tour had sadly, elapsed so we returned to the airport for a bit of a bouncy, buffeted landing onto terra firma! I so look forward to the next excursion and by then I will have a few more lessons under my belt and another story in the adventures of Mel.
