A Message for Up Coming Election Candidates

As "silly season" approaches, (common term for pre election times), and new faces come knocking at our doors, it is time to reflect in the governance model that our municipalities and upper tier structures provide to us.

Lets face it, that there are many reasons that brave souls place their hats in the ring to represent their constituents, be it influence, injustice, ego, financial, or a slew of ideals or unjust decisions that have to be addressed. The bottom line is that they want to make a difference and they are willing to put their time and heart into addressing these issues. Personally, I feel this is a brave act on their part as the decisions that they will make, should they be elected, with be scrutinized and criticized by the very people who put them in office. Their actions, in council and out of council will be judged, quite often unfairly. Despite this, they will influence the future of our communities and the direction that we will move forward.

Upon being elected, the real work begins. There is the orientation, procedures, by-laws and inaugural meetings. Finally you are sitting in the elected chairs of council. While you look across at your audience, be it in person or on a projected screen please consider the following:

- In front of you are reports prepared by staff representing issues that you are expected to accept or deny. Please read them ahead of time and prepare questions that you may need clarification on. Remember that these people are in their position due to their education and experience and are knowledgeable. Use that knowledge when making decisions.
- Occasionally, the public will want to present issues or concerns that they require council to acknowledge and may propose council consider taking action. Many of these people do not have experience public speaking and are terrified to stand before you but have rustled up their courage to speak to the subject. Please be kind. We want your constituents to speak out on issues that affect your community. Be patient. Words are difficult when your knees are knocking with fear.
- Be ready for being a public figure, which can be very inconvenient at times. You may be approached at the most inopportune times and/or presented with issues that you may not agree with. Listen to the whole concern as there may be a side you are not aware of or considered.
- You are representing your seat in governance. Listen intently, respond accordingly and show respect to all who look to you for guidance. Council is not a time to sleep at the wheel, but rather a job that people have put their trust in you by voting you in to office.

These are just a few notes that I hope you will consider as you enter into the world of politics.



How to Vote

Voters in the Township of Springwater will be able to cast their vote in the municipal election from the comfort of their own home—or anywhere they can access the internet or telephone. Voting opens at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, October 14, 2022 and closes at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, October 24, 2022. Information on how to vote will be mailed to all eligible electors in early October. Voter Help Centres will be open throughout the voting period for those who do not have access to the internet, need to be added to the voters list or require help voting. Dates, times and locations of the Voter Help Centres will be noted on the Voter Information Letter and are available at springwater.ca/Election under "Information for Voters".

Are you on the Voters List?

If you are a resident, owner, tenant, or spouse of an owner or tenant of property in Springwater, a Canadian citizen and 18 years of age or older on election day (October 24), you can vote.

We all play a role in ensuring a fair electoral system. It is the responsibility of every elector to make sure their information is up-to-date and accurately reflected for electoral purposes. Check to ensure you are registered to vote by visiting springwater.ca/VoterLookup.

Registered Third Party Advertiser

A registered third party is any individual, corporation or trade union that advertises to support or oppose a candidate or a question on the ballot. Registered third parties must follow many similar rules to that of a candidate. If you are interested in becoming a third party advertiser, please visit **springwater.ca/Election** under "Third Party Advertiser" or contact the Clerk's Department.

Municipal Election

We are now under two months from the municipal election taking place on October 24, 2022. Residents will have several options for voting this year, including remote internet and telephone voting as well as in-person electronic voting at a Voter Help Centre. Information on Voter Help Centres will be mailed to all eligible electors in early October and available at springwater.ca/ Election.

Resident Survey: 4-Day Work Week and **Extended Hours**

Last April, Council approved a pilot project to implement a 4-day compressed work week at the Township for a five-month trial period. Under the project, Township staff were given the option to take advantage of a 4-day work week, reaching their same 35- or 40-hour time requirement. 



Ontario Making it Easier to Apply for and Renew Accessible Parking Permits

The Ontario government is making it easier, faster, and more convenient for people with accessibility needs to use Accessible Parking Permits. Now, Ontarians can apply for, renew, and replace lost or stolen Accessible Parking Permits online, from the comfort of home. Organizations and not-for-profits supporting disabled Ontarians will also be able to take advantage of this full suite of online services anytime, anywhere.

The province is committed to improving services to make life easier for all Ontarians, especially those with accessibility needs. Having the option to apply for and renew Accessible Parking Permits online will save people time and let them focus on what matters most in their life instead of filling out needleless paperwork.

With these new online services, residents can apply for new Accessible Parking Permits, renew Subject to Change permits, and replace lost or stolen permits. This builds on other online services already available, including applying for a traveller's permit or a motorcycle decal, requesting a change of address, and renewing a permanent permit. In addition to online options, Ontarians can also access services by mail or in person at a ServiceOntario location.

An Accessible Parking Permit is available to an individual with a health condition that meets the eligible health requirements. Accessible Parking Permits can be issued to an individual or to a company vehicle used to transport persons with disabilities. There are approximately 770,000 Accessible Parking

Permits in use. Last year, ServiceOntario issued close to 255,000 permits.

Providing a full suite of online options to obtain an Accessible Parking Permit is a major step forward to making services more accessible to residents and organizations supporting those with disabilities. Previously, people applying for an Accessible Parking Permit needed to apply in-person or by mail, taking weeks and requiring needless and time-consuming travel. Organizations and not-for-profits supporting disabled Ontarians can now use the time and resources they would otherwise spend applying for or renewing permits to directly support their community members.

It's important for Ontarians to keep their Accessible Parking Permit and other government-issued documents up to date to avoid fines or penalties and ensure access to critical services. We've made it easier, faster, and more convenient to renew. Customers can go online to renew their licence plate, driver's licence, health card, Ontario Photo Card, and Accessible Parking Permit at Ontario.ca/Renew in minutes. For those who need to visit in person, ServiceOntario offers appointment bookings to make the visit fast and hassle-free at Ontario.ca/Appointment.

Digital reminders are available for renewal of licence plates, driver's licences, health cards and Ontario Photo Cards. Convenient digital reminders by email, text, or phone call are a simple and fast way to get notified 60 and 30 days ahead of expiry. Signing up is quick and easy online at Ontario.caReminders or call ServiceOntario at 1-800-387-3445 (TTY 1-800-268-7095).

GRILLED HALLOUMI KEBABS WITH HALLOUMI CHEESE (REGULAR AND **VEGAN)**

No BBQ or end of summer party is complete without a platter of grilled kebabs and these

vegetable and halloumi skewers are a crowd pleaser. Bursting with Mediterranean spices this vegetarian/ vegan recipe will impress even your meat loving guests.



INGREDIENTS (serves 8 people)

- 500 g halloumi cheese or 680 g (2 blocks) of extra firm tofu, cut into 1 1/2 inch (4 cm) cubes
- 25-30 cherry tomatoes
- 2-3 red or green peppers cut into squares
- 2 medium zucchinis cut into 2 cm (3/4 inch) rounds
- 1-2 medium onions, quartered
- 4 tablespoons (60 ml) extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tablespoons (30 ml) red wine vinegar
- 4 garlic cloves, minced or 1 teaspoon (5 ml) dried garlic powder
- 3 tablespoons (45 ml) dried oregano
- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) dried thyme
- sea salt and black pepper, to taste

Marinade for Vegan Halloumi made with Extra Firm Tofu

- 1 cup (250 ml) hot water
- 4 tablespoons (60 ml) light tasting olive oil
- 4 tablespoons (60 ml) nutritional yeast
- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) fresh lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) apple cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon (5 ml) salt

• 2 cloves crushed garlic or 1/2 teaspoon (2.5 ml) dried garlic powder

INSTRUCTIONS

Note: Use Metal or wooden skewers that have been soaked in water for at least 30 minutes.

Vegan Halloumi (i.e., Marinated Tofu) Preparation:

- 1. Rinse and cut the tofu into 1 1/2 inch (4 cm) cubes and place in a shallow dish.
- 2. Mix together all of the ingredients for the vegan halloumi marinade and pour over the tofu.
- 3. Marinade for at least 1 hour, but no more than 1 day or the tofu will fall apart.
- 4. Drain the marinade off the tofu and add to the vegetable skewers.

Vegetables and Greek Style Marinade **Preparation:**

1. Put the vegetables and halloumi cheese, if using, into a bowl and add the Greek Marinade ingredients (i.e., olive oil, vinegar, garlic, oregano, thyme, salt and pepper). Mix well and marinade for at least 1 hour, but no more than 1 day.

Assemble the Skewers and Grill:

- 1. Thread the vegetables and the halloumi cheese or tofu onto skewers.
- 2. BBQ the skewers on medium-high heat for 5-6 minutes, turning every minute or so to prevent burning. Alternatively, cook in oven at 400 F (200 C) for 15-20 minutes until tender.

Ask a Therapist: On Magnification and Minimization

Q: Sometimes I feel like I have overreactions (or underreactions) to things and I'm not sure how to help myself "right-size" my thinking and responses. Can you help?

A: Disproportionate reactions can come in many forms including magnification and minimization. Typically, when your reaction seems like it is not fitting - either too big or too small to suit the situation - it can make you feel stuck in a negative processing loop. Ideally, the goal is to right-size or respond in a way that is proportionate to the circumstance but there are lots of reasons why that may be difficult for you to do.

One of the most common ways that people struggle with this distorted pattern of thinking is to magnify the negative and minimize the positive. We all know how easily we can hang on to criticisms or negative comments as compared to compliments or positive feedback. Unfortunately, there is a way that our brains tend to amplify the former and downplay the latter which creates an imbalanced emotional response. In this case, it is important to remind ourselves what is true and come back to a more accurate and reasonable interpretation of the events or comments of others.

The converse can also happen and it is equally problematic from a mental health standpoint because it is similarly unbalanced. In this case, painful experiences or hurts are dismissed, ignored, or reframed too quickly in order to amplify the positive and often to avoid feeling hard feelings. In some situations this might be referred to as toxic positivity because, in an effort to magnify the "good" in a situation, you are inadvertently dismissing the experience of feelings of grief or anger that are necessary to a healing pathway.

When people minimize their own sorrow or that of others it can send the message that they either shouldn't care or have distressing feelings or, if they do, they should repress them in order to move on. The problem with this approach is that it overlooks the important information that our deep feelings are giving us about our pathway to health in that situation. While working with hard feelings is, of course, hard, it is also necessary in our human experience and essential to our overall well being. If we dismiss or minimize negative feelings in an attempt to simply "get over it", we will find them coming up in other ways in our bodies and responses to others.

In general, it is important to consider what it means to "right-size" our responses and reactions so that they are handled appropriately and with compassion. One simple tip for how to gauge whether or not you are responding proportionately is to use a rating scale. If a situation calls for a level 2 response but you are reacting at a level 10, or, conversely, if a situation warrants a level 10 response and you are responding at a level 2, you likely have some work to do with your cognitive patterns and your emotional regulation.

If you are noticing that you have dismissed your pain or that you are reacting with increased anger to situations that don't warrant it (those two things may even be related), it might be time to seek the help of a therapist who can help you process your experiences and find tools that will lead to a more balanced way of engaging with your life.



Perry Ritchie for Mayor



After 12 years on council and 3 mayors, I have decided to run for the Mayor of Springwater Twp. As I reflect back on this last term of council it has been productive in getting things done despite the fact Covid- 19 shut almost everything down for the better part of 2 years.

I would love to start by going back to the All candidates meeting in 2018 even thou I was acclaimed to my third term; I spoke about the need for Senior housing much needed in our municipality. After the meeting was over, I was approached by then Sam and Wendy Langman. Sam agreed with me about the need for Seniors Housing. Sam soon gathered a team of locals with the same interest in mind. They held town hall meetings, and the interest grew and before long everyone was talking about it. In the new year of 2019 Sam and his team put a presentation on before council. I remember the council chamber was so full of people in support of this, staff had to open the glass doors to the council chamber, there was people all the way out to the Foyer where you come in. Sam was at his best and gave an excellent presentation asking council to support a MZO order, which stands for "Ministers Zoning Order". I supported this along with the rest of council. By having council's support of a MZO order, it allows the project to by-pass all the regulation and hurdles you would normally encounter with a project like this which could take years in the making. God Bless Sam Langman for taking the reins on this. This September 7/2022 at 10:00 am marks the "Grand Opening" of the Elmvale Active Seniors Residence. And I know Sam will be there watching over us.

Shortly after being sworn in 2018 for a third term, I was approached by someone from the Elmvale Food Bank inviting council to a tour of the Food Bank. There was the Mayor, myself and Councillor George Cabral and Ron Belcourt then Director of Parks, Rec and Facilities. We were given a tour of the Food Bank and the troubles they were having. We discussed different options and decided the best thing to do was to build a new building. In the new year of 2019 members of the Elmvale Food Bank came before council and put a presentation on asking for our support, they were putting money up front and they were asking council to put money up front as well as act as a back stop if for more funding if needed, Myself along with the rest of council supported the new build and on October 16/2022 we had the Grand Opening the address is # 62 Yonge Street North Elmvale and its named the Mike Stone building, I believe it was Mike Stone and Don Hockin who first started the Food Bank many years ago, One last thing the Food Bank delivered a cheque for the full outstanding amount on the day of the Grand opening.

Other projects I have supported council on is the Municipal Swaley Drain. This project started back in my second term of council and after 4 years of

negotiating with everyone involved our drainage engineer Ken Smart finally got the approval to clean the Swaley Drain. Four years of wrangling with government and 2 weeks to clean it out. This project has a big impact on the Farmers in the Minesing Area. The Train drain is another Municipal drain I supported in getting cleaned out and the Mc Elwain / Robertson drain has been given the green light to get cleaned out. Being a farmer myself I know how important these municipal drains are and elected I would like to continue with the ditch digging program.

Other projects are the hard topping of Flos Road 6 west from County Road 29 back to Atkinson Sideroad, also hard topped Flos Road 10 west form Hwy 27 to County Road 29. Other projects I supported is the Ontario Ministry of Infrastructure plan to bring high speed Internet access to more communities in Ontario with Springwater Twp being identified as one of these communities.

During this term of council, the Province came out with legislation allowing Additional Residential Units to be added to your existing Residential Dwelling there is a list of regulations you have to comply with but ask our building or planning department for information on this topic of Adding Residential Unit. I supported council on this new legislation. We have seen an increase of new applications coming before council for approval. A lot of the applicants are Mom and Dad's wanting to be close to their kids, The high cost of living and the Housing shortage the Province is facing is the reason for this much needed Legislation. I would like to go back and speak about the Covid -19. Just before everything got shut down. Arrangements were well underway to exercise the

Partnership Agreement we had with the Simcoe County School Board Pertaining to the Elmvale District High School. I was hoping to see programs put on so the residents and taxpayers of Springwater Twp, could participate in during the Winter months. The New addition was approximately 11 million dollars to build and provided us with a Double wide Gym with stage. New Cafeteria and Kitchen and state of the art class rooms, plus a fitness room with equipment provided the Elmvale Lions club. I'm hoping this fall when the School Board will lift the ban put in place because of the Pandemic and allows Springwater Twp to exercise the Partnership Agreement. In my second term of council (2014 to 2018) I supported the Partnership Agreement and I helped fund raise money to help purchase everything from time clocks to equipment, Our goal was to raise \$200,000 and we well exceeded the \$200,000. I can honestly say I was glad to give and help out as much as I could to this worth project, keeping our school in Elmvale was the number one reason why I ran for my second term. Covid -19 has affected a lot of us. It took our most personal approach to people and turned it into a weapon.

A hug, a kiss, even a handshake turned it into a weapon. Even as a municipality we struggled to provide the services people come to expect but we managed, and I know thing will get better. I want to mention this because as councillors we took this into account at budget time and if you look at our taxes over the last 4 years you will see we listened, not all councillors were on the same page. But the majority of us councillors were able to hold the line on taxes. The Residential tax is a blended rate 2019 - 1.76%, 2020 – 0.57%, 2021 – 0.00%, 2022 – 1.98%, I encourage people to compare, and you will find were not a bad place to live, and we get things done.

As a councillor of Ward #2 I have supported projects in other parts of the Twp, I want to mention this because I'm honoured to have the following councillors sign my nomination forms and support me in my bid to be the next mayor. Councillor Anita Moore Ward #4, Councillor George Cabral Ward #1 (now running for deputy mayor) and outgoing Councillor Jack Hanna Ward # 5. After 3 terms (12 years) Jack is hanging it up, I'm going to miss Jack and the people of Ward #5 are going to miss Jack. Whoever steps in to fill Jack Hanna has big shoes to fill. I wish Jack Hanna all the best in his next chapter in life. And finally former councillor Sandy McConkey, Sandy was councillor for Ward #4 from 2010 to 2018 year. These councillors have all signed my Nominations papers to run for Mayor of Springwater Twp.

Moving the order of business is very important for all of council to do and I look forward to doing it if elected as Mayor.

Before I wrap things up, I would like to speak about out Health care in Springwater Twp. When I was first elected back in 2010 Blood services had just left Elmvale and wherever I went I was told you had to get it back. Many thanks to our former Mayor Linda Collins and Former Deputy Mayor Dan McLean after countless meetings we finally got approved in 2012. Lifelabs blood services would come and provide blood services to day 10 years later it is doing very well and Life Labs has mentioned they would like to extend their hours of operation a lot of people come from all over to use the facility. Now that things are opening up South Georgian Bay Community Health Centre is providing a Nurse Practitioner, Social worker and Dietician/Diabetes councillor at the Spring Water Health Services centre in Elmvale (Besides Life Labs) every Wednesday 9 am to 4 pm. Providing health care to our residents is still a top priority to me in both ends of the Twp.

If elected to the position of mayor I hope to use my years of experience as a councillor to lead the way. Springwater Twp is experiencing a lot of growth especially in the south end of the Twp and we need to manage that growth and I feel I can do that, Thank you Perry Ritchie.

As I continued my solo hike along the Ganaraska trail I was amazed by the response of both people in my social media group and by complete strangers to my adventure. I was overwhelmed by the support, which I was going to need to encourage me for the next week. I left the Ganaraska forest and headed

north along mostly country roads and railway trails. This is very difficult country, with frequent large hills including ski hills. At one point I was startled to notice an extremely large Buddha hanging out in an empty field. I still have no idea why this giant was placed here.

I had developed a blister, and not just a nice little blister. This was the monster of all blisters. It had formed under the calluses on the bottom of my right foot, and was now the size of a lemon. Every step was agony. I was unable to even pop this blister as it was under those hardened calluses. Yes I know, you should never pop a blister because you may introduce infection, but sometimes, well, sometimes you just have to; if only I could. I was also taping down my toenail that was detaching from the nail bed. I was now walking at a pace that was more limp than hike. This was really a miserable time for me and made the hike more a test of my mental endurance than an enjoyable experience. I would spend my 14-16 hr hiking days barely able to stand, and repeating "just keep swimming" to myself. Often I thought of giving up, but would remind myself, "what are you going to do? You have no other way to get home than to keep on going".

Fenelon Falls provided a much needed distraction. This area has a beautiful and vibrant waterfront, and allowed me a much needed rest for a "real" bathroom and a chance to freshen up. It is also where I was waylaid for almost an hour by children wanting to try to lift my back and many, many people wanting hard hit by drought, and the spots I had planned to to help me out; offering food, shelter and a ride to

most engaging and supportive of a total stranger I had come across. I was so encouraged and embraced by these strangers that they have left a lasting impression on me. Thank you.

Onward I would stumble until Buller Road where I met with a handsome man in his very nice vintage car who drove me to Moore's falls. Here I would have to declare defeat; I just could not deal with the pain any longer and called my husband to come get me. I felt defeated, humiliated, and embarrassed. I spent two days at home to recuperate and pulled that dang dead toenail off and had that giant blister finally pop. It was time to decide if I was going to continue. I was so close, less than a week and I would be done, but I was not sure if I could do it. The Queen Elizabeth II was my next section of trail. Three to five days of swamp and Canadian Shield, no cell signal, and trails marked as so dangerous that it should never be hiked alone. Well, why not? Bring it on!

A Further Afield Gem: Sunset **Point Park and Beach**

Sunset Point Park and Beach, although well known to the Collingwood crowd, is often overshadowed by the Nottawasaga Bay beaches of Wasaga and Tiny as well as by the beaches that grace the shores of Lake Simcoe in Barrie. Located at 57 St. Lawrence Street in Collingwood, this rocky beach boasts sparkling clear waters and phenomenal sunsets. The rocks, beautifully coloured and coming in a wide range of shapes and sizes that make for great landscaping material, require water shoes to comfortably navigate as you head toward the waters of this pebbly shore.

Both the beach and ample parkland areas are dog friendly, provide quick access to the waterfront trails, contain washroom facilities and are perfect for large picnics with family and friends. Hiking and biking are popular on land activities while wind surfers take advantage of the frequent breezes coming off of Georgian Bay. Volleyball courts are nearby for those who prefer team sports. The large stone Inukshuk is a popular spot for photos and, for those wanting a bite to eat, be sure to check out The Chipper. Famous for its fries, this canteen also offers a variety of other snacks, including ice cream.

In 1993 a wooden and concrete playground was built in an effort to enhance the Sunset Point experience. As time took its toll on the structures and as safety standards changed, it was decided the park should be demolished and replaced by a new 5 acre "Enviro Park". Although still under construction this



park emerged from the joint imaginings of the town of Collingwood's Parks, Recreation and Culture Department (Director Dean Collver), kids, youth and adults that attended public sessions and David Wood, a consultant with Envision Tatham. The park pays homage to the town's days as an early Ontario settlement with a nautical past. A 20 foot lighthouse certainly pushes that point home.

Centered around the concept of "modes of play" the

park offers something for a variety of different ages and abilities. Various sections of the park encourage either sensory stimulation, quiet play, physical play or exploration and activity. In addition to the usual features of swings, slides and climbing structures, the play space will also include a boardwalk with a firefly forest (canopy of lights that responds to sound), an outdoor classroom, performance stage, sensory garden and zipline leading to a parkour course. Between the youth and tot areas, there will be a shaded social hub with picnic tables and USB charging stations where parents can get a clear view of both sections. Other highlights include Discovery Beach (a big sandbox inlaid with "fossils"), Town Village (resembling homes typical of a small town) and Wetlands (inspired by Silver Creek Wetland, featuring blue and green play structures and cattails). A new shelter with a Harvest Table will also provide a great spot for munching, playing board games or socializing. A potential 3rd Phase, not yet scheduled or funded, is proposed to include a youth living room and adjacent multi-sport game court.

Although parking is no longer free (\$10), Sunset Point Park and Beach is still the perfect place

for spending the day with family and friends. This will be especially true with the completion of

the exciting new "Enviro Park". After viewing a spectacular sunset, don't be surprised to witness an exciting firework display, a common occurrence on public holidays. With the Labour Day

Weekend just around the corner, why not visit and have a blast?

Covey Wellness Centre Brings Mental Health Home

The Grand Re-opening of Covey Wellness Centre is fast approaching and all are welcome to attend and celebrate this milestone with the CWC team! result of lockdown measures and Covid responses throughout the course of the last two years. She began to see clients in her home office initially and as her business grew she signed a lease in January 2020 on Queen Street with a view to offer a wellness bookshop and inperson psychotherapy services under the name A New Leaf. Of course, once March 2020 came along, that plan was interrupted and almost all the psychotherapy services pivoted to online and retail was closed and this pattern of business closure continued over that two year term and it was difficult to get consistent momentum and presence in the physical space.


Despite the challenges that Covid brought, A New Leaf continued to add therapists to its team and began to serve more and more individuals and couples in the community. With our online capacity, we also began serving clients all over the country. Annie's Journal A Living Legacy, Part Two Written by Annie Warner Donnelly



On December 20, 2021, Ed Donnelly heard the words that none of us want to hear: the cancer had gotten ahead of the medical community's ability to stop it. He was given three to six months to live. June 20th was the sixth month date.

On June 21, Ed took out six stumps in the heat of a hot summer day. I don't know how he did it; he was already so weak. He became dehydrated requiring 5 days of intravenous fluids. On June 29, he was admitted to Hospice Simcoe.

Taking out those stumps at that time in his life illustrated an aspect of Ed's character: when he put his mind to something, nothing and no one could stop him. It was that strength of focus that drove him deeper into the word of God. He was constantly reading and studying. In the last months of his life, we had many endearing discussions about God's love and His provision for us.

God's promises sustained Ed, particularly Psalm 34, verse 4: "I sought the Lord and He heard me and delivered me from all my fears."

Jeremiah 29 holds the verses that formed the basis of his outreach ministry: "For I know the plans that I think toward you," says the Lord, "thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope. Then you will call upon Me and go and pray to Me, and I

will listen to you. And you will seek Me and find Me when you search for Me with all your heart. I will be found by you, says the Lord ..."

Those words are for all of us and that was Ed's experience. He often shared how he had sought the Lord with his whole heart and found Him. He was constantly encouraging others to do the same. Ed was never without a book or a pamphlet to give to whomever he met, wherever he met them.

Ed believed the first 10 words of the Bible with his whole heart ... "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth". He was constantly inviting others to believe these words too. God's words formed the foundation of his life. God's words rested on him and in him. They filled him with hope.

As life continues for each of us, let's remember that while perfection is beyond our reach, growing in love and joy, in peace and patience, in kindness and goodness, in gentleness and faithfulness; developing a sound mind and our ability to forgive and be forgiven – all of this is within our reach because in Christ, we are new creations. Our old beliefs, opinions, habits and unforgiveness can pass away. All things can become new. Let's remember that thinking that change is impossible is just an opinion.

A foundational piece of Ed's legacy is that in all things he pressed on. With God's help, we can too.

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We can all agree the COVID-19 pandemic introduced us to new challenges that may have affected your mental health. You might have noticed you lost motivation to focus on hobbies, housekeeping, studying and exercise—that is okay. It makes sense that during particularly difficult and stressful times, we may struggle to identify what keeps us motivated or what gives us a feeling of happiness.

Like many others during the pandemic, we adopted a puppy. Sam was just 4 months old living on the streets in Manitoba when he was rescued and brought to Ontario. The first couple of months with Sam involved many vet visits to treat a variety of "lovely" conditions that Sam was experiencing. Each visit, our vet would marvel at Sam's sweetness and genuine love for other humans.

Caring for Sam during the pandemic helped my mental health. First, he encouraged me to increase my exercise levels, which was needed to deal with the "COVID 15" that I had experienced. He added structure to my day, which provided a daily routine. This daily routine increased my sense of focus and helped me feel grounded. Sam became an important part of my self-care plan.

Self-care is quite literally taking care of yourself. Your whole self. What do you do to keep well? According to the World Health Organization, "self-care is the ability of individuals, families and communities to promote health, prevent disease, maintain health, and cope with illness and disability with or without the support of a healthcare provider."

Self-care is important because it provides you with the power to take control of some aspects of your own health, improving your quality of life and decreasing or preventing the impacts of diseases or ailments in the future. It can also play a role in reducing anxiety.

Sam is a survivor. He had a second chance of life and definitely won the puppy lottery. Sam's resilience and kind personality has taught me a few lessons:

- 1. Be brave
- 2. Enjoy your food
- 3. Make the most of the outdoors during all the seasons, even when it is cold!
- 4. Forgive and don't hold a grudge
- 5. Learn to chill

Therefore, as we move forward and take each day as it comes, I encourage you to think about how you care for yourself and to remember Sam. Enjoy the simple walk and when it is hot outside, drink lots of water and rest under a shady tree.

Teenagers in Training

When we decide to start a family, the usual picture in our mind is of cute little babies, and maybe playful toddlers. We don't typically envision gangly preteens or rebellious adolescents.

Consequently, we may begin preparing too late. If you want your children to listen to you when they are older, you must begin when they are very young. This is as much about training yourself as it is about training your children. It is about taking the time to be clear about what you want to teach your child, being as patient and kind as you can be, and being consistent and following through.

It may seem like a big hassle when they are little and you have your hands full, and there may be times when you want to say, "Do it because I said so!". However, if you are not assisting them to develop self-discipline and to take responsibility, and instead you are relying on the authority (power) that you have over them, you will be left stranded if they reach a point when they no longer respect your authority.

So, if you say it is time to pick up the toys, then it is time to pick up the toys. Even if you have to stand there with them, or help to get them going, the toys must be picked up. If you say it's time to pick up the toys, and you say it fifteen times over a two-hour period, and go about your other work in between, then you are teaching them that you are not really serious. And ten years later they won't believe that you're serious about their curfew either

This is not so much about being stern and rigid, or creating a me-against-you power struggle, as it is about mutual co-operation and respect. It's also about flexibility in creating win-win outcomes. For example: "You don't want to put the puzzle away

because it's not finished yet. How about if we just move it out of the way and put all the other toys away."

If your children know that they can tell you what they need, and that you will listen, they will be more open and less defiant later on.

Many parents are so good to their children, perhaps catering too much to them so that they have almost everything they want. Parents feel that the children will really appreciate all of this as they get older and realize that they have had more than others. These parents also imagine that they will be spared the trials that other parents go through, because their children will like them so much.

Sadly, this often backfires. Children who are used to getting what they want as youngsters become frustrated and angry when suddenly parents are saying "No." They may want to start staying out late, dating, going to parties, etc. before parents feel they are ready. They may be sullen and demanding, and this is very painful for parents who feel they have given so much to their children. Not wanting to lose their affection, they may end up giving in to unrealistic demands, and then things rapidly slip out of control

So enjoy the little ones, and let them grow at their own pace. But once in a while, look at them as though they were "teenagers in training." Ask yourself if the defiant little "No!" that is so cute now, will still be cute in ten or fifteen years. Attention to detail now, will pay huge dividends later on.

CHARGES LAID OVER WEEKEND IN WASAGA BEACH

Members of the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) laid 191 charges over the weekend in Wasaga Beach and the main arteries leading into Town.

Between Friday, August 26, and Sunday, August 28, 2022, preliminary numbers show officers responded to 327 calls for service and laid 191 charges. Of those, 154 were Highway Traffic Act (HTA)-related, which included 37 speed-related, 18 improper or no muffler, and 6 unnecessary noise.

In addition, three motorists were charged with impaired operation and officers conducted two RIDE

There are numerous active investigations into the incidents that transpired in Wasaga Beach this past weekend, including property damage and break and enters. The OPP will conduct thorough and exhaustive investigations holding those responsible accountable.

Residents and visitors of Wasaga Beach who have not yet reported property damage or other crime from the weekend are asked to call police.

OPP ANNOUNCES CHANGES TO ITS PROVINCIAL TOW PROGRAM FOR 2023 **OPP Introduces New Towing/Storage Operator Service Application/Requirements**

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is implementing changes to its Provincial Tow Program that affect how Tow & Storage Service Operators (TSSOs) apply to provide OPP-requested tow services in 2023.

Among the changes, TSSOs are now required to complete their own Electronic Criminal Record Check which includes an agency letter acknowledging this requirement. These links are now available on the OPP Provincial Tow Program webpage at opp.ca.

With the Ministry of Transportation (MTO)-led Tow Zone Pilot Program now in place, the OPP will adhere to the guidelines set out in this Greater Toronto Area (GTA) pilot.

For the OPP Provincial Tow Program (all areas outside the GTA Tow Zone Pilot Program scope), the existing practice of obtaining or dispatching a TSSO will remain the same as the current practice. Only TSSOs that have been approved to be on a Detachment TSSO Tow List will be dispatched for police requested tows.

TSSOs applying to be on an OPP Detachment Tow List (for the OPP Provincial Tow Program) must submit their application between September 1 (or earlier) and October 15 to be on the list for the following calendar year. TSSOs who were approved for the 2022 tow list are reminded that they must reapply to be accepted for the 2023 calendar year as outlined above.

TSSOs with questions can contact their local OPP detachment.

The OPP encourages all tow companies, operators and drivers to educate themselves about the rules and regulations around providing police-requested tow services under the OPP Provincial Tow Program.

OPP Marine Patrol Notes - Don't Feed the Bears Boaters checked by marine officers from the

Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment in even late August continue to be short on essential vessel safety equipment and lifejackets. Over the August 19-28, 2022, time period officers checked 82 vessels for safety equipment resulting in 12 operators being charged and 14 operators were warned for violations under the Canada Shipping Act.

Marine officers logged 69 hours of patrol time on the waters of Georgian Bay focusing efforts on Giants Tomb and Beckwith Island areas along with patrols of Gloucester Pool and the Trent System keeping a watch for impaired operators. Five operators were tested on the roadside screening device for blood/ alcohol levels and two of those operators received a 3 - day drivers licence suspension and six operators were served tickets for Liquor Licence Control Act offences.

Numerous investigations were also conducted as the officers responded to 16 calls for service on numerous bodies of water located within the Detachment patrol area.

Officers are currently conducting an injury investigation after a unresponsive 55 year old male was removed from the waters of Six Mile Lake near Winding Way. Emergency Services were dispatched at approximately 8:30 p.m. August 28, 2022 to assist the male who had been operating a personal watercraft when he went into the water. As the summer season nears to a close, so do the wild food sources that bears count on for their next meal. Leaving untidy garbage cans, poorly cleaned BBQ's, bird feeders and improper ways of disposing of food products only helps to invite bears and possibly their cubs to your cottage. TWELVE YEARS LATER, THE SEARCH FOR SONIA VARASCHIN'S KILLER CONTINUES \$50,000 Reward Offered

August 30th marks the 12th anniversary of the murder of 42-year-old Sonia VARASCHIN. Investigators have never stopped the search for the killer and seek the public's assistance to bring resolution to Sonia's family.

On August 30, 2010, officers from the former Orangeville Police Service (OPS) began an investigation after Sonia VARASCHIN's white Toyota Corolla was found abandoned behind a

business on Broadway in downtown Orangeville. On the same day, OPS requested assistance from the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP). On September 5, 2010, Sonia VARASHIN's remains were found in a wooded area just off of Beechgrove Side Road.

Twelve years later, the investigation into the murder remains active under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch. The OPP will never close an unsolved homicide.

A \$50,000 reward remains in place for information that leads to the arrest and conviction of the person(s) responsible for the murder of Sonia VARASCHIN. Over 1,500 tips have been received from the public. Investigators continue to seek the one piece of information that will lead to an arrest.

The OPP will conduct thorough and exhaustive investigations leading to arrest and prosecution. Those responsible will be held accountable to the fullest extent of the law.



We will hold her close within our hearts and there you will remain, to walk and guide us through our lives, until we meet again.



'DON'T YOU WANNA RAINDANCE...'

Do you ever wonder what lies beneath? When you see Hoover Dam at the lowest levels ever, since 1937, and Lake Mead's water level dropping twenty-six feet in one year, you are going to uncover some

secrets!

I toured Hoover Dam in 2008 and you could see the 'bathtub ring' along the edges of the Colorado River as it feeds into the Dam which provides hydroelectric power and controls any seasonal flooding of the river. It subsequently fills Lake Mead as a major reservoir. This was a beautiful sight in 2008 and you could see many a fishing boat hoping to catch a forty-pound Striped Bass!

Tourists will have to think twice now before hanging the 'gone fishing' sign as there is only

one usable boat launch left (out of six). With 7.5 million visitors annually, there are going to be some disappointments for sure. A forty pounder, however, pales in comparison to what you might catch on your hook should you succeed in getting onto the lake's shrinking expanse. As the waters receded, artifacts galore have shown up wedged deeply into the silty bottom of the lake. Imagine seeing a World War IIera Higgins landing craft, numerous shattered boat remains, trash and lost watches. Could be a treasure trove of gold or more misadventures unveiled as the waters edge shrinks.

More traumatizing would be the recent discovery by two sisters paddle boarding, who dug up what they thought might be an animal skeleton but soon discovered it was.... human. OMG, and what about the poor man in the barrel having been laid to 'unrest' since the seventies, in the murky waters. What a

> Aside from these misadventures, the decline in those 'dam' waters will impact so many and not in a positive way. When the levels drop below 1,000 feet, it will affect the dam's ability to operate hydropower turbines. 1.3 million people in Nevada, Arizona California depend on it. Oh, let there be rain!

Droughts being experienced worldwide. In Brazil, the current drought is one of the worst ever

recorded. Coffee production is expected to fall 23% this year, and low reservoir levels mean the country cannot fully utilize its hydroelectric plants, driving up their electricity bills. Coffee, and everything else is going way up!

The mighty river Danube is now at one of its lowest levels in almost a century, exposing the hulks of dozens of explosives-laden German warships sunk during World War Two near Serbia's river port town of Prahovo.

There were hundreds scuttled along the Danube by Nazi Germany's Black Sea fleet in 1944 while retreating from Soviet forces. This graveyard of German flotilla leaves quite a disaster for the people of Prahovo, from an ecological perspective. Seventysix years later, a clean-up is in order.

In Madagascar, drought has left hundreds of thousands of people malnourished, to the edge of famine. A sad, sad, state-of-affairs in many areas of the world right now.

Closer to home, Orr Lake with its 4.4 miles of shoreline, does not appear to be suffering any major water loss thanks to the professionally managed dam on the southwest side of the lake and the year-round flow of the MacDonald Road and South Orr Lake streams. It was inn 1812, that a military road was built between Barrie and Penetanguishene, providing a route to Orr Lake. The newly accessible stands of pine surrounding the lake serviced at least three sawmills. The largest mill was owned by W.F. Orr, for whom the lake is named.

Truly, let us be thankful for the rains and the highwater tables here that will keep Orr Lake secrets safe for as long as possible. I lost a 12-foot aluminum fishing boat that went adrift, quite a few years back and no amount of snorkelling unravelled the mystery of "Did it sink or swim to a new home"?

We have been lucky to receive quite a deluge of rain in recent weeks which fully drenched my lawn and gardens. I happily stayed inside and listened to another of my old favs, "Rain Dance" by the Guess Who. Next time it pours, I will be 'Singing in the Rain!"
