Dear Editor,

I served as a Lieutenant with the Queen's Own Rifles regiment in the Second World War. In 1945, in the Rhine Valley, Germany, I was injured by an antipersonnel mine explosion, resulting in the loss of my left leg below the knee.

When I returned home from the war, I joined The War Amps and have been a member ever since. This Association was started by First World War amputee veterans to help each other adapt to their new reality as amputees.

In 1975, The War Amps established the Child Amputee (CHAMP) Program, which provides young amputees with financial assistance for artificial limbs and peer support from fellow amputees. The veteran members wanted to ensure that young amputees have the vital support they need, and it makes me very happy to see it's still going strong today!

I also take great comfort in knowing that Champs will continue to move the organization forward and keep spreading the message of remembrance, even after I no longer can. Through The War Amps Operation Legacy program, Champs have taken up the torch of remembrance to commemorate the sacrifices of those who served and continue to serve.

I can say with pride that the legacy and sacrifices my comrades and I have left behind will be remembered long into the future.



#### **Elmvale Initiatives**

I spoke to the Mayor before the election period began not as an editor but a voter in Ward 1. I mentioned to him that I hear from a lot of readers that the North of Springwater is under serviced. It is not convenient to drive to Midhurst for recreation and services. When the north enjoyed Flos township the people themselves built many of the recreational area themselves. I hear that the ball diamond, arena, tennis courts, curling club were all built with community donations and the hard work was done by the community itself.

Mayor Don Allen sent me a list of the initiatives that were brought to the northern areas of the township of Springwater.

The relationship between Canada's military and the blood system began with the early days of blood transfusion during WWI and grew as Canadians donated blood to help wounded troops during WWII. Since the start of our partnership in 2006, the Department of National Defense and the Canadian Armed Forces has collected 64,786 units of whole blood, plasma and platelets!

Calling all new and existing blood donors!

- Each year, over 100,000 new donors are needed to make up for those who can no longer donate. This helps ensure reliable access to blood and blood products for patients, where and when they need it.
- Currently, the need for plasma is more than four times what is donated in Canada. It could take over 100 plasma donations to help treat one patient for a year.
- All blood types are needed. Encourage a family member, friend or colleague to book an appointment to donate blood as well.
- O-negative blood donors are especially needed though because this blood type can be transfused to any patient. In times of emergency or for newborn patients, O-negative blood, the universal blood type, makes a lifesaving difference.
- If you're in general good health, now more than ever, we need your support to help fill every available appointment. Many donor centres have extended hours and are open on Remembrance Day. Confirm your eligibility, find a donor centre near you and book now at blood.ca

#### NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF THE NEW TOWNSHIP OF TINY ZONING BY-LAW 22-075

**TAKE NOTICE** that the Council for the Corporation of the Township of Tiny enacted By-law 22-075 on October 12, 2022, pursuant to Sections 26 and 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.13 as amended.

#### PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

**THE PURPOSE** of the by-law is that it is the new comprehensive Zoning By-law for the Township of Tiny pursuant to Sections 26 and 34 of the Planning Act R.S.O. 1990, c.P.13, as amended.

**THE EFFECT** of By-law 22-075 is to implement the Township's new Official Plan. A municipality is required to update its Zoning By-law no later than three years after the approval of an Official Plan. The Township's new Official Plan came into full force and effect on December 9, 2021. By-law No. 22-075 will replace the existing Zoning By-law 06-001 and implement the new Official Plan. The By-law regulates land uses and development, including how land may be used, lot sizes and dimension requirements, lot coverage, the types of buildings that are permitted, how buildings may be used, where buildings and other structures can be located, building setbacks, building heights, parking, and loading requirements. By-law 22-075 contains various transition provisions for proposed developments in the building permit process or the minor variance and site plan process.

Any and all written submissions relating to this application that were made to Council before its decision and any and all oral submissions related to this application that were made at a public meeting, held under the Planning Act, have been, on balance, taken into consideration by Council as part of its deliberations and final decision on this matter.

A key map is not provided as the new Zoning By-law applies to all lands within the Township of Tiny.

#### IF YOU WISH TO APPEAL TO THE ONTARIO LAND TRIBUNAL

Any person or public body may appeal the above-noted zoning by-law to the Ontario Land Tribunal by filing with the Clerk of the Township of Tiny by no later than November 16, 2022 at 4:30 PM, a notice of appeal and the reasons for the appeal, together with the required fee of \$1,100.00 for each application appealed, paid by certified cheque or money order, made payable to the Ontario Minister of Finance.

If you wish to appeal to the Ontario Land Tribunal, a copy of an appeal form is available from their website at www.olt.gov.on.ca or by calling toll free 1-800-855-1155.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a zoning by-law to the Ontario Land Tribunal. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Land Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

If no notice of appeal is filed within the above described time period, the Zoning By-Law shall be deemed to have come into force on the day it was passed.

Snow Valley Resort hosted the 4th induction ceremony for the **Springwater Sports Heritage Hall of Fame.** The event was well attended and all enjoyed the presentations put on by the 2021 inductees,

including groupings of teams, builders and athletes. The 2021 inductees included the following: 1954/55 Elmvale Comets, 1974 and 1975 Minesing Fastball Teams, Allan and Laura McNabb, Frank Archer, Elmvale District Lions Club, Adam Dixon, Alanna Kovacs-Gunn, Alexandra Paul, and Sarah Burke. Pictures have been included from the induction ceremony.

1954/55 Elmvale Comets: In 1954, The Elmvale Comets Women's Softball team dominated play in Simcoe County winning the highest championship level of ball available to them. The team, being all local Elmvale young ladies became the cream of the crop very quickly, defeating teams drawing from much larger town centers. In 1955, 13 players remained and subsequently won the BDLS League and were Playoff Champs. The team was very talented and important to the community, with the stands always crowded with fans, cheering on their home-town Champs! Team members included: Marlene Tinney (maiden name Turner), Shirley Richardson (maiden name McKay), Edith Bell (maiden name Robertson), Mary Bertram (maiden name McFadden), Ann Spence (maiden name Avrill), Ruth Ann Maw (maiden name Greenlaw), Ruth King (maiden name Bertram), Ann McDougall (maiden name Bertram), Marguerite Stone (maiden name Robillard), Marie Beacock (maiden name Reynolds), Mary Berthelotte, Anne McConnell (maiden name Ritchie), Marilyn Jamieson (maiden name Coe), Mel Barrett - Manager, Alvin Reynolds - President, Cecil Tinney – Coach, and Les McKay – Coach. Trish Campbell presented the awards to the team members and representatives.

**1974 Minesing Peewees:** The 1974 fastball team competed in the OASA playoffs when there were a large number of teams competing in the "C" division in the province. The Minesing team came from a farming community where families were busy with their summer and fall work, but they made sure that the boys were able to get to all their games which included a fair amount of travel throughout the province. The team was also made fun of because of their lack of uniforms, but they did not let that hurt their success. This team defeated Maple in the finals to become the Peewee "C" Champions for 1974. Team members included: Dan Luck, John Adams, Ken Thompson, Rob Priest, Alan Priest, Brent McLean, Jamie McLean, Dale Giffen, Doug Gillespie, Bill Luck, Barry Orser, Bob Murphy, Doug Murphy, Lorne Orser (Coach) and Larry Maw (Coach). Don Currie from Currie Truck Centre presented the awards. Allan Priest provided a great summary of both Peewee teams and highlighted the "gentlemen's" accomplishments.

1975 Minesing Peewees: As with the 1974 team, the 1975 team competed in the OASA playoffs when there were a large number of teams competing in the "C" division in the province. This team defeated Stouffville in the Peewee "C" finals to become champions for 1975. Team members included: Geoff Kenney, John Adams, Dale Giffen, Rob McLean, Allan Maw, Paul Priest, Alan Priest, Brent McLean, Ray McFadden, Brad Adams, Rob McNabb, Brent McNabb, Doug Murphy, Kevin Giffen, Bob Weatherill, Ken McNabb (Coach) and Allan McNabb (Coach). Vimel Patel and Michael Harte presented the awards.

Allan and Laura McNabb (Builder): Laura served on the Vespra Minor Softball league executive and was president for a number of years. This involved registering teams, developing schedules, securing playing fields and addressing any issues that might arise. For this work she received a minor softball award from the township. Laura also coached local teams including the 1983 Edenvale Squirts that included her son Ed. Allan worked tirelessly as the area OASA convenor from 1977 – 1984, organizing and overseeing schedules, rules, umpires and tournaments. He worked with many coaches and teams during this time and travelled

many miles to attend games and tournaments. Allan was always pleased to present OASA Pennants to winning teams, especially when they were local. Allan wore his convenors jacket with pride. Allan and Laura were involved in softball at the local level in Vespra/Springwater for at least 30 years. Dale Giffen presented the awards to Allan and Laura's son, James.

Frank Archer (Builder): Frank Archer was the glue that held things together and was an outstanding organizer who had the courage to lead and the ability to rally the community behind him. In his professional career as a principal, he consistently made sport at HCES a priority. Frank was the leading force in bringing Artificial ice to the Arena and led numerous other key fund-raising campaigns. He was EMHA president for over ten years and took on roles of coach and manager for several teams including provincial Champions. Beyond sport, Frank spent over thirty-five years with the Fall Fair Board in various leadership capacities and was recognized as "Citizen of the Year" in 1985. In 2013, Frank sought to showcase the achievements of local "Sport" Athletes, Builders and Teams through his role as one of the founding members of the Springwater Sports Heritage Hall of Fame. Larry Simpson presented the award.

Elmvale District Lions Club (Builder): From its inception as a Chartered Club in May 1949, the Elmvale District Lions Club has had an extensive and generous history of supporting the development of Community Sport. Lions involvement in the promotion of Sport ranged from project managers, contractors, mentors, planners, partners, leaders, short and long- term financial supporters. As a result, many outstanding individuals and teams benefitted from the Lions enduring commitment and have brought recognition to this community. Beyond individuals, over the years many facilities were initiated/supported/rebuilt and/or updated. These efforts had the effect of extending the variety of Sporting opportunities that became available to the residents of Elmvale and District. Larry Simpson presented the award.

Adam Dixon (Athlete): At the age of ten Adam was diagnosed and underwent radical leg surgery to treat Ewing's Sarcoma. Adam and his parents sought out a Sledge Hockey Association team which might allow him to continue to play the game he loved and at which he had excelled. Thus began his six years of playing in his Dad's home town with the Elmvale Bears. By seventeen Adam officially joined the Canadian National squad for the 2006-07 season. A year later, he was on Team Canada at the Winter 2010 Paralympics. Adam has been an "on-ice" leader and a fierce competitor who has earned both Individual and Team achievements. Off ice, he has readily engaged in mentoring younger players and teams. He has been an active ambassador in increasing the awareness and achievements of Para Athletes. Jim Dixon, Adam's uncle, presented the award.


Alanna Kovacs-Gunn (Athlete): Starting at age 13, Alanna showed interest in track and field, in particular discus and javelin. Alanna's early participation in competitive sports helped her to build strength, speed and flexibility that she would later depend on. Javelin and discus require the body to respond to different movements and typically these two disciplines aren't performed by the same athlete. Alanna has travelled the world performing at the highest level while representing Ontario, Canada and for DePaul University in Chicago, Illinois. She has participated at the World Youth Championships, Pam Am Juniors, World Francophone Games, NACAC U23 Championships, NCAA Finals, Summer Games and the Pam Am Games to name a few. This highly decorated track and field athlete from Springwater continues to give back to her sport and community by helping to coach and being an active ambassador of her sport. The award was presented by Alanna's mother Monique.

Alexandra Paul (Athlete): Following the commencement of her skating lessons, at age five, Alexandra went on to successfully achieve numerous national and international skating accomplishments. Her determination and inherent talent reinforced her throughout an outstanding competitive Ice Dancing

career. Alexandra, and her Ice Dance partner Mitchell Islam, represented Canada at twenty international competitions. In addition to her demanding skating commitments, Alexandra found time to ensure her academic achievements met the same high standards she always aspired to. Following her retirement, she continued with her studies and completed the necessary requirements to be called to the Bar. Gord Paul, Alexandra's father presented the award.

Sarah Burke (Athlete): Sarah Burke is one of Canada's renowned winter sport athletes. From her rural roots and small ski hills to the world stage, Sarah represented her country and her discipline as a freestyle skier, with passion. What Sarah did to gain such national and international credit was far more than her enormous talent in the Women's Freestyle Skiing world. It was her influence and tenacity to lobby the ESPN X Games and the International Olympic Committee to include women in the half pipe and Superpipe competition, in their own event. The ESPN X Games was the first to start a new category of Women's Superpipe followed by the IOC launching during the Sochi Olympics. Sarah was deemed the "Best In The World" in her sport. Sarah proved she could not only compete with the men, but she could beat them too. Later in the newly formed Women's division, she would claim a gold medal in the half pipe in 2005, Silver in the Superpipe in 2005 followed by five gold Superpipe medals from 2007 through 2011. In 2012 while practicing for the Olympics in Sochi, Sarah had a tragic accident that would claim her life at 29. Sarah was married and left behind, a husband, her parents and her sister. The impact of Sarah's untimely death was felt around the world. Her teammates, competitors, friends and worldwide fan base would never forget her spirit on and off the hills. Sarah Burke's legacy will live on for generations to come. The award was presented to Sarah's father, Gord, by a close friend of Sarah's, Jessica Vander Kooij.



#### The Facts of Horseshoe Pitching

Horseshoe pitching, game for two or four players, most popular in the United States and Canada, in which players attempt to throw horseshoes so as to encircle a stake or to get them as close to the stake as possible.

Horseshoe pitching may have derived from the game of quoits played by Roman officers during the Roman occupation of Britain (1st to 5th century). Their men, lacking quoits, presumably used horseshoes, though the existence of iron U-shaped horseshoes at that time remains undocumented. It is thought that peasants in medieval Britain also adapted horseshoes for use in improvised games of quoits. #### **Update From Doug Downey MPP**

The Province of Ontario is dedicated to ensuring students are able to stay in the classroom and catch up on missed learning through the Plan to Catch Up. Following the release of the 2021-22 EQAO results, which are consistent with global trends, it is clear that Ontario students need to remain in the class without interruption, with a special focus on catching up in math, reading and writing.

Building on the previously released Plan to Catch Up investments, new initiatives announced this month include:

- The launch of the Catch Up Payments web portal for direct payments to parents for additional tutoring supports, supplies or equipment to enhance student learning:
- Math Action Teams deployed to underperforming school boards;
- New digital resources to support parents, students and educators;
- New universal screening for reading for Ontario's youngest learners; and
- The extension of the government's historic tutoring support program.

The Ontario government has launched Catch Up Payments, offering parents \$200 or \$250 per child to help offset costs as they support their children as they catch up. This new initiative commits a total of \$365 million in direct financial relief for parents.

Starting October 20, parents with school-aged children up to 18 years old can apply for payments of \$200 for each child, while parents with school-aged children with special education needs, up to the age of 21, can apply for \$250. Families can apply for Catch

Up Payments through a secure website where they can create a unique profile for each eligible student. Applications for the Catch Up Payments will remain open until March 31, 2023.

The next steps in the Plan to Catch Up are a response to the EQAO assessment results and will help prepare students for future successes. New supports include:

- New digital resources, including elementary math course packs, provided by TVO and TFO Idello's Missions d'Élo, and access to the Grade 9 online math course for additional review and practice. Ontario is also providing an additional \$15 million being made available to school boards to offer a digital tool aligned with the Ontario curriculum to support students, parents and educators.
- Math Action Teams being deployed to underperforming school boards to promote high-impact math teaching practices in Ontario classrooms.
- Early reading enhancements that further our response to the Ontario Human Rights Commission's (OHRC) Right to Read Report, which includes a \$25 million investment in evidence-based reading intervention programs and professional assessments, and helps educators reach young students sooner. Beginning in the 2023-24 school year, students in year 2 of Kindergarten to Grade 2 will be screened for reading using evidence-based tools. The government will also work with school boards and labour partners this school year to establish a consistent set of recommended screening tools.
- Extending our historic \$175 million tutoring support program, previously set to expire on

December 31, 2022. The government is extending the investment in this publicly funded tutoring program to ensure students can continue to access supports they need to catch up.

- Continued modernization of curriculum, including a focus on math, science, computer studies, business studies, and technological education to ensure students are prepared with the skills they need for the jobs of tomorrow. This will include a regular curriculum review cycle that ensures curriculum is up-to-date and relevant to important job and life skills, including pathways to the skilled trades, supported by a Curriculum Review Guide for greater transparency to students and families.
- Attendance supports for struggling students, by working with school boards to create provincial expectations for how school boards help students with attendance difficulties and enable more students to benefit from consistent classroom learning.

#### **TOTAL LUNAR ECLIPSE NOV 8**



In the early morning hours of November 8, 2022, North America will witness the last total lunar eclipse of the year. This amazing sky show will play out with Eastern, Atlantic and Newfoundland time zones seeing most of the event until moonset. The rest of North America will enjoy the late but spectacular show. This is a very safe event as the full Beaver moon (full moon for November) will pass through the earth's shadow for a maximum of three hours and forty minutes.

Eclipses do not occur each month, due to the slight tilt of the moon's orbit around earth. Some months the full or new moon is positioned above or below the earth's shadow cast into space. There are a few times each year when the Sun, Earth and Moon line up to give us a solar or lunar eclipse. Each can be partially or totally covered. Throughout antiquity, the "Blood Moon" was an omen of the impending doom of war or even demons. Superstition ruled the skies in the early days.

The reddish or brownish-orange tinge of the lunar surface seen during totality is caused by the solar rays refracting through the earth's atmosphere, much like we see spectacular red sunsets at night. The next lunar eclipse will only be a slight partial of 12% on October 28, 2023, visible from the Atlantic provinces. The next total eclipse which all of North America can witness will be on March 14, 2025.



#### **Eclipse times are:**

**Eastern Time** 

Partial umbral eclipse begins: 4:09 a.m. Moon enters the earth's shadow.

Total lunar eclipse begins: 5:16 a.m. Moon turns dark orange or red.

Greatest eclipse: 5:59 a.m. Mid-point of the eclipse.

Total lunar eclipse ends: 6:41 a.m. Moon begins to leave the shadow as it sets in the west.

Partial umbral eclipse ends: Moon ready set.



Fall is a good time for kids to get some opportunities to put their driving skills to the test. If you've been following along the last few weeks you've read about my kids crashing dirt bikes and lawn mowers. Today I invite you to read about them crashing ATV's.



My oldest daughter, Annabelle, almost has her full driver's license. She spends as much time as she can driving our 20-foot long van around. I spend as much time as I can keeping my mouth closed from the passenger seat. It's sometimes difficult. Calling 911 is obviously the first step. If there are others around checking for a pulse and starting CPR is next. One item that we have in our community and almost every village in Springwater is an Automated External Defibrillator or commonly called an AED. This life saving device is located at the community centre outdoors and at the front door. Anyone and everyone can use it. It provides step by step instructions and will never hurt a person with a beating heart. If others are nearby, send them for it. It is alarmed and there are a number of people in the community who will receive a notification and could potentially help out. Take the time to check it out and know that it is there to help. We have a great fire department but they are

6 to 10 minutes away. Our paramedic service does an exceptional job but they can be anywhere in the county and it will take time for them to get to you. Learn where the AED is and take a CPR course if possible. The life that you can possibly save may be someone truly close to you.

Tuesday, November 1 is an important day in Ontario. It is the start of Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week. In 2013, the Hawkins Gignac Act was proclaimed declaring that on November 1, no matter what day of the week it is, it will be Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week. Carbon monoxide is known as the silent killer. It does not smell, has no colour and is tasteless. The act was the work of John Gignac a retired Brantford firefighter who lost his niece and her family as a result of a carbon monoxide leak in their. Laurie Hawkins was a Woodstock Ontario OPP officer who along with her husband and two children perished from the effects of Carbon Monoxide poisoning. The Fire Protection and Public Education Act requires that every home that has fossil fuels or an attached garage to have working carbon monoxide alarms. Like smoke alarms, they have a life expectancy usually of about 7 years. Take the time now to check your carbon monoxide alarm and make certain it operates and doesn't require replacement. Our fire department can be contacted if you need assistance. Check yours today.

On Sunday, November 6 we return to Standard Time and our clocks go back one hour. Check your smoke alarms that require batteries and change them out. As well it is going to be dark longer so please watch for children getting on and off school buses particularly early in the morning.

Finally, on Friday, October 28, the annual Remembrance Day Poppy Campaign begins. Make your donation and wear a poppy for all that we have in our great country. It was because of the sacrifice of those who lost their lives that we have the freedoms we are grateful for. Let us all respect the fallen and remember that there will be services in Elmvale and at Springwater Park on November 11th.

#### HEALTHY MULLIGATAWNY SOUP

This fragrant soup, originating in India, is perfect for October sweater weather. With a hint of apple and spiced with curry, cumin, and coriander this vegan version of mulligatawny soup is packed with nutritious ingredients

and is easy on the wallet.



#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 1/2 tablespoon (23 ml) vegetable oil
- 2 medium onions, diced
- 3 cloves of garlic, crushed garlic
- 1 celery stalk, diced
- 2 carrots, diced
- 1 cup (250 ml) apple, peeled and diced
- 1 1/2 tablespoons (23 ml) curry powder
- 1 teaspoon (5 ml) cumin
- 1 teaspoon (5 ml) ground coriander
- 1/2 teaspoon (2.5 ml) black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon (2.5 ml) crushed red pepper (optional)
- 1/4 cup (63 ml) dried red lentils, well rinsed
- 1/4 cup (63 ml) white or brown rice
- 3/4 cup (188 ml) regular or lite coconut milk
- 6 cups (1500 ml) vegetable broth, mushroom broth or water
- Fresh lemon juice (1/2 lemon)

#### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Heat the vegetable oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add the diced onions and cook 5-7 minutes, stirring often until the onions are softened and slightly caramelized.
- 2. Add the crushed garlic, curry powder, cumin, coriander, black pepper, red pepper flakes (if using), chopped carrots, and celery and cook for 3-4 minutes.
- 3. Add the vegetable broth, lemon juice, lentils, rice, apples and coconut milk, cover and bring to a simmer for 20-30 minutes until the rice and lentils are tender.
- 4. Remove from the heat and serve as is or puree the soup with an immersion blender or regular blender until smooth.

The mental health benefits of outdoor activity is well known. Exercising releases endorphins, a feel good hormone. Exercise in nature and you have the added benefit of serotonin release, which increases the boost of that happiness output. Throw in some beautiful scenery and you have some of the best

therapy you can find for free. This is why I personally can have a more positive outlook on life as well as providing a chance to recharge for those challenging work days. Unfortunately, not all mental health problems can be solved with a trek in the woods.

My hikes don't always go the way I want, whether I struggle with the beagles, foot injuries or perhaps the weather itself doesn't cooperate. Many years ago my mother and I set out for a late autumn hike on the Niagara Escarpment. The weather was beautiful and we had a fabulous day exploring the bluffs. On our return trip the daylight started to fade, giving us just enough time to get back to our car. It was at a small side trail that veered away from our intended destination that we both stopped, and decided we had to follow this path despite all logic. I truly believe in listening to intuition, as listening to that little voice had saved me more than once. This time, little voice led us to a situation that might have been difficult for us to comprehend, but that ultimately provided closure for others.

We followed this barely noticeable trail through golden fields and near some large hardwood trees. It was here we heard a strange noise; a sound I will never forget. A young man had decided that life was no longer worth living. My emotional reaction was intense sadness, that a life was lost when so young. This was a time when it was unusual to carry a cell phone, and we had to hike out of the bush to a little village in an attempt to find help. We knocked on door after door until a group of men opened theirs and allowed us to use their phone to contact the authorities. By this time it was twilight, and we were unsure how the police would find the young man in the dark, especially when the detective was wearing the requisite tan trench coat and brown loafers. No exactly ideal hiking wear, though he did fairly well. I led the group back to the area and left them to do what they had to do, while my mom and I returned home. Needless to say, this day had a profound and lasting impact on both of us.

Every November I remember this young man and his family. I am grateful that we were able to give his family closure. I wish this man would have been able to find help with his struggles. Mental health touches almost everyone. If you or anyone you know is struggling, please reach out. Speak to a friend or family member, contact your family doctor, call the crisis line at 705-728-5044, or go to your local emergency department. # Protecting the Parent/Child Relationship

#### Protecting the Parent/Child Relationship

How often do we hear ourselves, after an upsetting incident with our child or teen, saying to a friend or spouse that really, we believe in the goodness of our child.

However, in our anger, we may have forgotten to convey that message to the child. So, they have heard our anger, heard our fears, seen us freak out, and conclude that we must think that they are very bad people. We think that in order to make our point and prevent our children from becoming juvenile delinquents, we must react strongly when something is happening that causes us serious concern.

It is true that we may have to respond strongly, but that is different from reacting strongly.

Responding strongly means setting clear boundaries and ensuring understanding. Reacting strongly too often means blaming, criticizing, and perhaps even saying things we don't mean. Once we start this, children may respond in kind, and there is deep hurt on both sides.

Anger is the way that we often cover up the hurt or fear we are feeling, but anger creates more hurt, and soon we find that we are in a downward spiral. The parent feels that the child no longer loves him/her, and the child feels unloved by the parent, or at least, somewhat unsure of that love. The trust on both sides begins to dissolve. If the process continues, the parent-child relationship can be irreparably damaged.

Having recently worked with a couple of mother-daughter cases, I was able to see miraculous transformations. The mothers were open to my suggestions about what their daughters needed, and the daughters were open to hearing my interpretation of what their mothers were needing. It took several sessions, but gradually the anger and the fear dissolved, and now I am seeing laughter and love.

This does not mean that there is total understanding and acceptance of everything, but there is a mutual respect and compassion. There is also an increased ability to communicate and to negotiate agreements. This is called a win-win solution. It's the way that allows us to live 'happier' ever after.

If you are in a situation with a child that has deteriorated, then both you and the child are in pain that has become a vicious circle. Getting guidance from a professional or spiritual leader is so important.

Dysfunction in parent/child relationships can negatively impact the future of the child in life and relationships. I have seen the deep pain experienced by parents when their adult children want nothing to do with them. I have felt the ache in their hearts when they are not included in the lives of their grandchildren.

If there is struggle in your relationship with a child, the time to seek help is now.

This can prevent further damage to the relationship and ensure a happier future.



Sometimes information comes to us because we're looking for it; sometimes because we need it and sometimes, information just comes to us. Having opportunity to process information - to reject it or see it as something that can improve our lives - is a valuable choice

not to be squandered. So, here's some information that came to me recently.

Having a personal will expresses our desire to create a sense of order as we transfer our assets to others at the time of our death. Our will names an executor(s) and beneficiaries. Many people have told me their wills are in order and they believe they've done the best they could for their families.

However, this may not be the case if they haven't considered how Probate will impact the contents of their will. Here's some Probate information that could turn someone's world upside down.

"If an estate's assets include real property which doesn't pass to another person by right of survivorship, its value at the time of a person's death may be subject to the Estate Administration Tax (EAT) imposed by the Probate process. The EAT is based on the value of the estate, which is the value of all assets owned by the deceased at the time of death.

Beginning January 1, 2020, the EAT has been eliminated for the first \$50,000 of the value of the estate. For estates over \$50,000, the EAT will be calculated as \$15 for every \$1,000 (or part thereof) of the value of the estate." This information was taken from https://www.ontario.ca/page/estateadministration-tax#section-3

So, let's look at what could turn someone's world upside down: real property which doesn't pass to another person by right of survivorship. Perhaps the most vital piece of real property to be considered is the matrimonial home. If the spouse who dies is the only name on title, the home will be considered an asset owned by that spouse at the time of death. It will become part of that spouse's estate and because its value will probably be over \$50,000, the home and all other assets in that spouse's name only, will become subject to the Estate Administration Tax (EAT).

One way to ensure right of survivorship of the matrimonial home is for the name of each spouse to

I'm not a lawyer, but as I've spoken with others and encouraged them to seek legal advice, I've witnessed the stress, the anguish even, of just thinking that their matrimonial home may have to go through probate before the surviving spouse's name can go on title.

God is love. He longs for us to be so loving that we're willing to create a sense of order as we make plans to transfer our assets to the person we pledged to love. Let's follow God's words in 2 Thessalonians chapter 3, verse 13: "... brothers and sisters, never tire of doing what is good."

Doing what's good is what love is all about, isn't it? It's a valuable choice whatever the circumstances.



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#### Statement by Warden Cornell on Innisfil Tragedy Relief Funding was used during the pandemic to

Our thoughts and deepest sympathies are with our partners at the South Simcoe Police Services, our Paramedic Services team, our neighbours in the Town of Innisfil, and the loved ones and communities impacted by the tragic events of last evening. Together, as a County, we are here to support you.

Tragic incidents such as this are not common in our communities; however, this is an important reminder of how our first responders put themselves at risk each day to protect and serve our communities and residents.

#### **Carts and Waste Management Survey Results**

Prior to the implementation of automated cart collection in November 2021, staff had committed to undertaking a survey to gauge public response to carts. A professional market research and consulting company, Malatest, was retained through a competitive procurement process to develop and undertake the survey, analyze data and provide a final report.

On October 11, 2022, Council received the results of an extensive public survey that was conducted in June 2022. The County of Simcoe conducted and received 5,650 responses regarding residential waste collection and disposal services. Eighty-eight per cent of survey participants reported that they are either satisfied or very satisfied with the new automated cart collection. Eighty-two per cent of participants indicated that they are either satisfied or very satisfied with the County's waste disposal sites (landfills and transfer centres).

Prior to the move to automated cart collection, labour shortages were leading to significant delays in service. The County is pleased with the restoration of collection consistency after moving to a four day collection schedule under the new automated collection program.

#### Simcoe Village Campus Project Update

On June 14, 2022 the County received written communication from the Long-Term Care Capital Development Division of the Ministry of Long-Term Care that Preliminary Design Plans for the Simcoe Manor and Village Project have been approved. As of September 7, the next steps moving forward consist of Ministry detailed design approval, site plan approval, building permit application and continued site preparation processes including earthworks.

On October 11, 2022, Council received an updated report on the Simcoe Village Campus project, including a presentation. Information was provided on project planning and approvals, key construction milestones and project schedule, design development, communications, working group meetings and fundraising. This initial site preparation phase is expected to be completed in mid-2023, building construction will begin shortly after with occupancy for the long-term care home, Village Centre, and Supportive Housing components anticipated for mid-2025. #### Winter Warming Programs 2022-2023

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, warming centres originated from community-based collaborations and initiatives, operated and funded outside the system of homelessness prevention services and support administered by the County of Simcoe. However, in consideration of the reduced operating capacity in homeless shelter settings required by public health during the COVID-19 pandemic, Social Services

Relief Funding was used during the pandemic to address warming needs for unsheltered homeless individuals.

In May 2022, County of Simcoe Council approved the allocation of \$100,000 from pandemic-specific Social Services Relief Fund funding to assist communities in Simcoe County response to warming centre needs on a one-time basis during winter 2022-23

On October 11, 2022, Council received a report on Winter Warming Programs for Winter 2022-23. Two proposals were received as of the submission deadline of August 11, 2022, one for warming centre operations in the City of Barrie and one for warming centre operations in the City of Orillia. Although there were no submissions received for warming centre operations in Alliston (South Simcoe), Collingwood (South Georgian Bay) or Midland (North Simcoe), shelter operators in these communities enhanced their services to address warming needs within their operations during winter 2021-2022. In consideration of the anticipated increased demand for shelter services as the colder weather approaches, County staff is actively engaged with funded shelter operators and other key stakeholders in South Simcoe, Collingwood and Midland to identify funding requirements to support warming centre operations. The County is working with our community partners towards having warming centres open in the communities identified above before winter arrives.

#### Museum Acquisition of 1911 Tudhope-Everitt Car

County staff were contacted recently with an opportunity to purchase a 1911 Tudhope-Everitt car. This car was made at the Tudhope factory in Orillia, using the Everitt design for the bulk of components. Of these cars assembled, only 4 cars are accounted for – two 1911 models, and two 1912 models. The other 1911 model is part of the Burnaby Village Museum collection in British Columbia. The Tudhope-Everitt has been described as "the most completely Canadian car, with more Canadian-made components than any other".

On October 11, 2022, Council approved the acquisition of the 1911 Tudhope-Everitt Car for the Simcoe County Museum Collection using museum reserve funding.

#### Simcoe County Hospice Alliance Funding Request

On May 24, 2022, the Simcoe County Hospice Alliance submitted a written request to the Warden asking County Council to consider continuing with capital funding support to this group for an additional five-year period from 2021-2025. This request was approved in the amount of \$500K per year for a total of \$2.5 million over the newly recommended term.

On October 7, 2022, County Councillor and Chair of the Human Services Committee, Rob Keffer and General Manager of Health and Emergency Services, Jane Sinclair celebrated presented World Hospice and Palliative Care Day with our Hospice Alliance partners. During this event, Councillor Keffer raised a symbolic flag and presented the Alliance with a cheque for \$1 million representing allocations for the first two (2) years of this five (5) year funding commitment (2021 and 2022).

The accused was released from police custody on a recognizance to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice on October 27, 2022 and as well, faces 90 day drivers licence suspensions as per the Ministry of Transportation (ADLS) guidelines and a seven day vehicle impound.

Earlier on October 14, 2022 at 6:36 a.m. officers responded to a report of a suspicious vehicle that had been stationary in the intersection of Burke and Robert Streets, Penetanguishene for a significant length of time. Attending officers awoke and spoke with the lone driver and entered into an impaired driving investigation. Further investigation revealed a large quantity of Canadian currency along with a quantity of cocaine and fentanyl which was seized as part of the investigation.

Using the services of an drug recognition officer (DRE), the investigation concluded with Timothy John NESSMAN 47 years of Midland being charged with the following offences-

The accused was held in custody for a bail hearing and will appear before the Ontario Court of Justice at a future date and as well, faces 90 day drivers licence suspensions as per the Ministry of Transportation (ADLS) guidelines and a seven day vehicle impound. Officers conducted five R.I.D.E. check programs over the weekend and checked 119 drivers for signs of impaired driving and investigated thirteen vehicle collisions.

#### OPP and Canadian Anti Fraud Centre Raise Awareness of Personal Information Theft in **Phishing Prevention and Awareness: Part 2**

The following bulletin was prepared by the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC) for October's Cyber Month campaign and supported by the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and members of the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment to inform and educate Canadians of ongoing financial scams.

Phishing emails or text messages all have the same goal of trying to steal your personal information or infecting your devices and/or your networks. Knowing what to watch for, in an email or text message, can protect you from potentially becoming a victim.

#### **Phishing Prevention Tips**

Avoid clicking on links:

Phishing messages will ask you to click on a link or to respond "Y" to receive the link. Don't click on the link. If you are not sure if the message is legitimate, contact the agency or company directly to confirm the legitimacy or login to your account (the way you normally would).

Don't download attachments:

Fraudsters will often ask you to download an attachment. Remember that attachments can contain viruses, spyware and malware. Never download attachments. Contact the company or agency directly to verify the legitimacy before potentially infecting your device and/or network. Watch for spelling mistakes:

Phishing messages often have spelling mistakes. Read the message carefully and remember that official communication from service providers, government agencies and financial institutions will not have spelling errors.

Email address spoofing:

Similar to "caller ID spoofing", fraudsters have the ability to make legitimate email addresses appear. Never trust the sender's email address; it can be altered to convince you that the email is legitimate. Before reacting, reach out to the sender directly by telephone by looking up their official phone

Beware of spoofed Government of Canada or law enforcement messages:

Fraudsters continue to claim that they are contacting you from the Government of Canada or law enforcement agency (Canada Revenue Agency, Service Canada, Royal Canadian Mounted Police etc.). The phishing messages often claim that payment is being sent via e-transfer. The message will ask you to click on a link to accept the funds. Please note: The Government of Canada will never send funds via email or e-transfer. Don't click on the link; fraudsters are trying to steal your personal information!
