
made in advance and tickets secreted away in their annual Christmas card. That's the ticket, literally!



New COVID-19, Cold and Flu Care Clinic Now Open in North Simcoe

Due to the rising numbers of respiratory illnesses in our region, the North Simcoe Family Health Team (NSFHT) opened the COVID-19, Cold and Flu Care Clinic (CCFCC) today. The purpose of the new clinic is to ease the pressure on hospital emergency departments and provide alternative, accessible care for the community. The clinic's role is to provide assessment, testing and treatment, by appointment, for people experiencing COVID-19, cold, flu or other respiratory symptoms.

"With high numbers of respiratory viruses circulating in our region, we know this cold and flu season has been very challenging for many local residents. The goal of this clinic is to ease pressure on our local hospital emergency department while ensuring low-barrier care for members of our community, especially those who do not have a primary care provider," says Andrew Shantz, Executive Director of the North Simcoe Family Health Team.

Patients are encouraged to visit with their primary care provider first if they are sick and feel they need medical care. The CCFCC is not a walk-in clinic. Only those with COVID-19, cold, flu, or other respiratory symptoms will be scheduled for an appointment.

The COVID-19, Cold and Flu Care Clinic is open Monday to Friday and is located at 619 Prospect Blvd., Suite 2 in Midland. Same day or next day appointments must be made in advance online using the NSFHT website, or by calling 705-526-7804 ext. 253. Additional information can be found on the NSFHT website at www.nsfht.ca.

Consider visiting the COVID, Cold, and Flu Care Clinic if:

- You have symptoms such as cough, fever, shortness of breath, sore throat, or sinus congestion
- Your symptoms or your child's symptoms are getting worse or are not improving, and you feel that you need medical care
- You do not have a primary care provider or cannot access them in a timely manner
- You have been told by any health professional to go to a COVID-19, Cold and Flu Care Clinic
- You are at high risk of getting very sick from COVID-19 and you qualify for COVID-19 testing and treatment

About the North Simcoe Family Health Team

The North Simcoe Family Health Team (NSFHT) is one of 200 Family Health Teams that were created as part of the Ontario government's plan to reduce wait times and improve access to quality health care for Ontario residents. Since opening its doors in 2007, the NSFHT has strived to enhance the care that is provided to patients and families within our community by offering a variety of programs and services that support healthy living and overall wellness.

Individuals six months of age and older may also receive the vaccine at some local pharmacies or booked appointments through some primary care providers, and Family Health Teams who are offering the vaccine as part of their regular clinical practice. Pop-up and GO-VAXX mobile clinics will continue to be scheduled throughout Simcoe and Muskoka.

Individuals are recommended to receive the bivalent booster six months after their last dose of COVID-19 vaccine or COVID-19 infection, however people who want to receive their booster earlier can do so at a minimum of three months. As the respiratory season continues, high-risk populations are recommended to receive their bivalent booster as soon as they are eligible (i.e. the minimum three-month interval) to protect themselves as people spend more time indoors.

Staying up to date with all COVID-19 vaccine doses you are currently eligible for remains the best defense against infection, severe illness, long term COVID-19 symptoms, hospitalization, and death.

Sports with Patrick Townes



a phrase that I continuously hear primarily surrounding the sports of curling and fastball. It is somewhat of a challenge to get the younger generations involved in these sports. For curling, there are so many other sports and

activities to participate in when they are young, so the curling rink is not so much of an attractive place for kids to hang out. When it comes to fastball, the sport is somewhat of a niche these days and the fans out there are generally older in age, and likely have played themselves at some point in their lives.

It is mind boggling that Softball Canada talks about wanting to grow the game of fastball, and to try to build the sport back up to what it used to be. Many readers of this article will remember the good times when teams had to play out of their local areas just to make it to a regional or Provincial OASA event. Now you can simply enter a team to compete in whatever division is still offered. I bring up this point because this past week, the World Softball Championships were held in New Zealand, and I am going to take a guess that 99% of those who read this article did not even know about the week- long tournament. I am scared to know what 99% of the readership actually looks like.

This tournament was made up of the best 12 teams in the World. The defending champions Argentina were ranked #1 and were again the favourites to win the tournament. Canada was ranked #2 going into the tournament and that is where they would end up finishing. After defeating Australia in the round robin and losing to Argentina in the round robin, team Canada made the finals but fell short by a 5-2 score against the champions, Australia. This tournament boasted the best players in the world and it was very entertaining to watch. Part of growing the game is being able to watch it when it is located half way around the world. The games were live streamed and you could watch the whole tournament for a measly \$10.00. This was cheap entertainment. The issue here is, was the tournament really advertised? One would think Softball Canada would reach out to all the local organizations and minor softball programs to make mention of the tournament. For men's fastball, this is the Olympics. For anyone who wants to watch any of the games, please let me know and I can send you the information. All the games are saved and you can watch or re-watch at them anytime. The streaming was high quality, and looked like a legitimate production similar to that of a Sportsnet or Olympic broadcast.

If you go way back, I wrote an article about the importance of coaching. I often said that the players controlled the majority of the outcome and coaches did not necessarily play a pivotal role in some sports.

Growing the game - this is I was wrong. So much goes into strategy, game preparation and decision making. Our local fastball team lost our coach during the playoffs for one game due to Covid, and his absence was a big difference in the game result. The players need to focus on their job, and the coaches on theirs. One would think after Canada's tournament that the coaching staff will be replaced. A couple of observations were made at the tournament that hindered the performance of the

> The head coach decided to "hide" their top pitcher against Argentina during the round robin, assuming they would play that team in the finals. Canada lost the game and they did not even end up playing Argentina for a medal. The format was unique in that after the round robin, the top two teams went straight to the final. This format was criticized by many, but what does it mean? It means that every single game means something. Canada risked resting their top pitcher that could have resulted in them not even making the final. It is fine for coaches to prepare and have a strategy in a tournament or playoffs, but sometimes you cannot get to the last game until you win all the others. Also, the third base coach was there in spirit only. There were three separate plays in three different games where the coach was gazing off into space or looking at a play on another part of the diamond, instead of directing players or providing guidance right in front of him. The top hitter was "rested" in the last two games of the round robin and then went cold for the final game when he was reinstated into the lineup. And lastly, not one of the six coaches re-entered the team's catcher after he was pinch ran for, and therefore was ejected out the game when the opponent pointed out the error to the umpires. These mistakes are inexcusable and are crucial to the success of the team. It was frustrating to watch knowing Canada had the best team at the event, but not the best support staff.

> Another takeaway or worry that I noticed from the tournament is the attitude or presence of umpires around the world. Each umpire seemed to have an extremely unique strike call or out call when they did the bases. More than once batters would be half way down the first base line thinking that they walked, but it really just took the umpire three seconds to make the strike call. On the bases, an umpire would take five to six steps before making an out call and punching the air with authority. It brings out concerns on how umpires are being trained – are they taught to go home and practice a very unique out call in front of the mirror? A good umpire will tell you, if they are not noticed during a game that is a great thing. Of course there are expectations in terms of relationships and respect between players and umpires, but there is no need for an umpire to become a spectacle of the game and take away from the players, or embarrass them. Likewise, players should be returning the favour and not embarrassing umpires.

Federal Funding Boosts Local Tree Planting Programs



Action to reverse climate change and enhance the local environment in the Severn Sound region is getting a major helping hand. The Government of Canada is announcing over \$276,000 to aid in expanding the tree planting programs of the Severn Sound Environmental Association. Federal funding is provided through the 2 Billion Trees program, aimed at partnering with governments and organizations to plant two billion trees over 10 years.

"By supporting this project from the Severn Sound Environmental Association, we are advancing our climate goals, creating good jobs, and helping to

ensure increased resiliency and cleaner air in the local community," shares the Honourable Jonathan Wilkinson, Minister of Natural Resources Canada. "This investment advances Canada's goal of planting 2 billion trees, a key part of our plan to fight the twin crises of climate change and biodiversity loss.

"We are hoping to significantly increase our tree planting capacity," says Steffen Walma, Chair of the SSEA, "turning our existing smallscale tree planting program into a much larger one that will benefit both rural and urban constituents - resulting in environmental, social and economic benefits for all."

The Building Tree Planting Capacity in the Severn Sound Watershed Project includes hiring additional staff and developing local expertise on tree planting to be shared with Indigenous communities, property owners, municipalities and others interested in using forest cover to offset the impacts of climate change, managing stormwater, reducing flooding, protecting topsoil and improving water quality.

"Aside from the great environmental positives of this 2-year Project, this federal investment into our region's economy means at least one new green job locally," says SSEA Executive Director, Julie Cayley, "as well as, indirect support of numerous other jobs - including tree nurseries, material and equipment suppliers, media service providers and professional foresters."

The newly expanded Project also aims to engage Indigenous and community groups, as well as, local schools by getting them involved in tree planting which till now has been about 10,000 trees annually for the Severn Sound Environmental Association.

A man sits, blank eyes staring at a wall. He is unaware of the people who love him, or who brought him to this place. His mind is confused, asking the same questions, over and over again: "Where am I?" "What happened?" "Who am I?" "Where are my children." He feels alone.

It has been over ten years since my husband was diagnosed with vascular dementia. Over the years, I noticed the slow decline in his body, speech and accomplishing simple tasks. It became harder and harder for me to attend to my husband's needs. I finally reached out to our local Home and Community Care Support Services, who organized a Personal Support Worker to come and help attend to my husband's daily needs. But over time things became progressively worse and one morning I found my husband on the floor; he had fallen and couldn't get back up. I called the ambulance and they drove him to the hospital where he stayed for over two months. It is from there that he ended up in a Long Term Care Home.

At first, it was very hard to leave my husband and his new home. But over time seeing how wonderful and dedicated the staff looked after their residents, I resigned to the fact that the home would do a better job than I could at this point in time.

As I look back, I realized that by the grace of God, my husband was never alone, as we are never alone. God was with him, as He is with us. God is with us through doctors, through caring hands of nurses, personal support workers and technicians. God is with us through a letter, a smile, a hug, a compassionate word and a small kind deed. To date, the home and staff are my husband's new family and I am at peace.

Prayer: Dear God, You are with us as You guide the people who help us. You are with us through family and friends, through loving deeds, letters, and words of comfort. Thank You, God, for being with us in whatever circumstance we are faced with. Thank you God for people who want to serve you by helping others. Amen.

Unhealthy Relationships

A warm, loving, nurturing relationship is a healthy thing. In such a relationship there is laughter, connection, intimacy, communication and fun. These qualities can reduce stress, reduce anxiety and depression, improve quality of life. They cause the body to produce endorphins: hormones that make us feel good and even reduce pain.

If a good relationship can contribute to our health, what happens if the relationship is not good.? Of course, there are variations depending on how negative the relationship is, and how much involvement there is, whether it is a spouse or immediate family member, extended family, a boss or colleague or a neighbor.

A negative relationship creates stress. It may also result in depression, anxiety, feelings of anger, sadness, or loneliness. Here, rather than good chemicals, the body produces stress hormones. In fact, studies have shown that after an angry or upsetting episode, the immune system is suppressed for six to eight hours! If another incident happens, or even re-living it as we tell someone about it, then the immune system suppressed for a further six to eight hours.

It is clear that if our relationship with someone in our lives is conflicted, we could be in an almost constant state of immune system suppression. We may not experience effects of this right away, but over time we may be vulnerable to a variety of health issues.

We need to think of stress, negativity, anger and conflict as things that are toxic to our bodies. We would not breathe or ingest substances we knew to be toxic to our bodies. Similarly, we should also practice ecology in our emotional environment. If the situation or interactions cannot be changed to create a more positive emotional climate, it may be time to make a move.

Some people realize they are in an unhealthy relationship, have tried to heal it, examined their part in all of it, and see it is unlikely to ever change. They can become stuck in a pattern of sharing with others all of the faults and misdeeds of the other, while doing little, if anything, to remove themselves from the situation.

Often it is fear of change that prevents them from taking steps to remove themselves from the bad situation. Some find a certain comfort is being "the victim."

Let's think of it like this. Imagine you are living in a house that has dangerous black mold in it. This is highly toxic. It is hard to imagine anyone acknowledging they know it is there, as well as how dangerous it is, and doing nothing about it.

Similarly imagine someone making a sizeable investment, watching it losing more and more every year, and continuing to put money into it. There comes a time when the pain of holding on becomes worse than the pain of letting go.

Just because one might have a high pain tolerance, that does not mean they should remain in painful situations.



The May Court Club of Barrie members pooled together and donated \$2,610.00 to the Barrie Food Bank.



Giving collectables, investments or fun as gifts Often I hear from others that they would like to

Often I hear from others ,that they would like to buy a special gift for a friend or family member. They know that friend or family member has a interest in XYZ item.

They also know that the person they want to buy for spends a lot of investigating, researching or hunting down these items of interest. The question is, how could you buy for a person into that area of interest ,without know much about it yourself? How can you start a junior collector and create a basis of a common hobby that can be shared by family at many different generations for many years to come?

Here is a quick checklist, use this always not just in December.

One, establish a budget.

Two, go back to number one and confirm your budget

Why this is of critical importance? It makes no sense to look at 5000\$ items if the budget is 500\$ or 100\$ items if the budget is 25\$. However you can have a whole lotta fun for 25\$.

Let's use hot wheels as a good example of a low cost of entry threshold, high enjoyment entry level activity. I stress however, this information is applicable to a wide range of items ,hobbies and interest. Hotwheels, as issued, are inexpensive. Many people collect and invest in hotwheels, and rare models are hunted, often for what could be considered a lifetime. Go to the internet, pose a few questions, such as buying tips for hotwheels. Then look for a most valuable, most collected. This question will establish the top end of the market and what is sought after. Then go to search new releases, to see what is coming out that probably has not been added to your recipient's collection.

Now you have three or four pieces of information. Ask a relative or friend of the person any info about what they want or are looking for. Or if you are encouraging a new person into the activity, ask what a good starter kit would be.

Go to a store dealer that sells new, or a resell dealer or a vintage market store[this actually is where you will probably get the most knowledge about the trends that collectors want, and talk to them about your budget ,and you research. Why did I choose hot wheels as an example? Hotwheels can be a lot of fun!

Hotwheels are as cheap, or as expensive as you want to spend. There are many rare models, with some of these having been around since hot wheels were introduced in 1968.

When a toy product has been around for 54 years, and when that product encapsules every kids dreams of cars, speed, superheroes, villains, cars they couldn't afford, cars they had ,cars they want to get and cars that have significant personal meaning to them ,you have created a massive interest base.

An interest base that large means that there are a percentage that will pay more to achieve what they consider to be a worthy goal of adding xyz model to their collection, or investment.

Hotwheels has produced many generations of teenagers and kids now adults, who all have their own sweet spots of things they like.

Want validation?

The most expensive sale of a hotwheel recorded was 70,000\$ for a Volkswagen rear loader beach bomb, so you can get significant appreciation if you gather the right pieces. Mattel estimates that 41 million children grew up playing with hotwheels, that the average collector has 1,550 cars, and that children between the ages of 5 to 15 have a average of 41 cars.

A great place to start a young collector and a great place for an older person to get involved with the younger.

In our stores, we often sell new in box, vintage[twenty to thirty years old] hot wheels for as little as to five dollars, with many of the collectible models[like Barbie or Racecars being in the 20 \$to 40\$ range.

Inexpensive ,great place to start ,family fun and you can probably get most if not all of your money back by reselling them [if you keep them in good condition] when the interest is over.








County Council Elects Basil Clarke as County of Simcoe Warden

Georgian Bay General Hospital Completes Major Renovation in Sterilization Department



Photo above: As part of its commitment to quality and safety, Georgian Bay General Hospital (GBGH) has completed a critical and complex renovation project in its medical device reprocessing department (MDRD). Within the hospital, this is where instruments, devices and equipment are sterilized to meet the highest standards for quality and safety. MDRD staff and project team members gathered in part of the new space to celebrate this milestone for GBGH and its surgical program. The hospital plans for continued growth in its surgical department and other services to align with the evolving needs of the community it serves.

Georgian Bay General Hospital (GBGH) is celebrating the completion of a major renovation to its sterilization department, which took place in two phases over the past four years amid pandemicrelated delays. The completion of this project marks a major milestone for the hospital which relies on safe, high-quality sterilization for a variety of instruments, equipment and devices used throughout the hospital.

"The redevelopment of our MDRD is an essential part of GBGH's strategic objectives to grow our surgical program to align our services with community needs, bringing care closer to home," says Matthew Lawson, president and CEO, GBGH. "Over the past six months, GBGH has been able to increase surgical volumes to 163 per cent of pre-pandemic levels. We've been successful in our strategy to grow our surgical volumes by investing in equipment, broadening the range services we provide and optimizing our OR spaces. Finalizing our new stateof-the-art MDRD project perfectly complements our hospital's ongoing surgical expansion plans."

The two-phase project began in 2018, after GBGH proactively initiated an assessment of its sterilization processes and physical space to identify areas to improve efficiency and update equipment. After receiving recommendations, the hospital had to outsource medical device reprocessing to an external supplier, enabling a renovation project of this size to begin. Phase 1 of the project took place prepandemic and then was delayed. Phase 2 work has since occurred over the past eight months, resulting in the final completion this month.

Due to its complexity and duration, this project required great patience and flexibility among MDRD

staff and project team members. Recognizing the vast improvements the redevelopment would have

on the standard of device sterilization at GBGH, the team has embraced learning the latest equipment and the changes in workflow.

With the completion this project, GBGH will longer be externally contracting sterilization, which

consisted of transporting back and forth to the Greater Toronto Area the devices, instruments and equipment the hospital uses daily. Bringing sterilization back inhouse is a cost savings for the hospital and reduces the likelihood of logistical issues and errors with transport.

Between April 2021 and March 2022, GBGH performed 4,012 surgical procedures despite the pandemic-related ramp down of non-urgent and elective procedures. The hospital's plans to continue growing its surgical program are in part due to more than 3,700 local patients travelling elsewhere for surgical procedures which can be performed at GBGH. This equates to more than 600,000 kilometres and 7,500 hours of travel that could have been saved by local patients.

Jo Knows Nutrition

Gingerbread Goodness

With their soft centres and crispy edges, these healthy and extra spicy gingerbread cookies are fun to bake and decorate during the holiday season. Double or triple the recipe – these cookies will go fast!

INGREDIENTS

1 cup (250 ml) whole wheat flour 1 cup (250 ml) all-purpose flour 1 tablespoon (15 ml) cinnamon 1 tablespoon (15 ml) ginger 1/4 teaspoon (1.25 ml) nutmeg 1/4 teaspoon (1.25 ml) cloves 1/3 teaspoon (1.6 ml) baking soda 1/3 teaspoon (1.6 ml) salt 1/3 cup (83 ml) pure maple syrup 1/3 cup (83 ml) butter or margarine 1 egg or chia egg 1/3 cup (83 ml) molasses Extra flour for rolling the dough

ICING

1/2 cup (125 ml) icing sugar 1 tablespoon (15 ml) water

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350F (177C) and grease or line a baking sheet with parchment paper.
- 2. If using, make the chia egg by combining 1 tablespoon (15 ml) ground chia and 2 1/2 tablespoons (38 ml) water. Let sit for at least 10 minutes to thicken.
- 3. In a large mixing bowl, combine the whole wheat flour, all-purpose flour, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, cloves, baking soda and salt.
- 4. In a medium mixing bowl, add the butter or margarine, maple syrup, egg or chia egg and molasses. Beat with an electric mixer until well combined and fluffy.
- 5. Add the butter/margarine mixture to the flour mixture and knead until a dough is formed.
- 6. To make cookie cutter cookies, put the formed dough in the freezer for about 30 minutes.
- 7. Take the dough out of the freezer and let stantd for 5 minutes. Roll out the dough on a flour dusted surface to 1/4 inch (0.64 cm). Cut your cookie cutter shapes and place on the prepared cookie tray. 8. Bake for 8 minutes for soft cookies or 10-12 minutes for more crunchy cookies. Let cool.
- 9. To decorate your cookies (optional), whisk together the icing sugar and water until smooth and there are no lumps. Put the icing in a piping bag or resealable bag and cut a small hole at the tip. Decorate your cookies to add personality to your gingerbread men. ENJOY!

I'm not sure when I began to tabulate the messy events but I think when it got to 10 I knew we were


a part of something special. Something memorable. We missed a few regularly-scheduled events that weekend on account of all the not-scheduled events happening every few hours somewhere in our house.

Edward from England, and Johanna from Ireland, brought a horse and wagon from Oshawa to Apto, Concession 2, Flos Township. Their sons walked, driving six to eight cattle ahead of them. Bill (William) was about fourteen. After Edward died, Johanna moved her family to Concession 10, Lot 8, Vespra, and rented from John Morren. Thomas Stokes had previously rented the farm from 1881-1887.

Bill Grant left home around the age of eighteen. He worked in the bush and in saw mills in the Hillsdale and Coldwater areas before moving his family back to the farm his mother had rented in Minesing. Sleighs and teams of horses brought logs to the Minesing basket factory. Bill could get a load by himself as fast as a pair of men working. Charlie Grant drew logs after his dad Bill retired.

Charlie also learned how to use dynamite. He blasted a ditch from the back of the farm to the Swaley Creek. He used dynamite to blast out a basement in the community center for the bowling alley. Charlie had cattle and pigs. Mamie could milk cows faster than a man. She churned butter and had laying hens. The cream went to Bessie's Dairy in Stayner.


Their daughter Meryl and the dog would go and get the cows from the pasture and help with the milking if her dad was working in the field. She would drive off the horse and slings when the hay or straw was put into the mow and while the men went out for another load Meryl would ride the horse bareback. Meryl and Barb Orchard, who lived next door, would also hook themselves to the slings, walk across the beam and pull the rope. This released the sling, dropping them into the mow below.

Ontario Creating More Affordable

Child Care Spaces Across the Province

locations and for populations most in need

The Ontario government is making child care more afforda-ble and accessible for families across the province, creating an additional 53,000 new, affordable licensed child care spaces by December 2026 – bringing our total to 86,000 new spaces since

In March 2022, Ontario secured a six-year, \$13.2 billion agreement with the federal government which will lower fees for families and deliver an aver-age of \$10 a day child care by September 2025. This included an initial in-vestment of \$10.2 billion for the first five years of the agreement and an additional commitment for at least \$3 billion in year six. Today, as part of that agreement, Ontario is announcing a targeted plan to create new licensed child care spaces, with a focus on increasing access to families across

"We are delivering savings directly to families while increasing access to child care spaces in communities small and large," said Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. "Our government is making child care affordable — with savings averaging between \$6,000 to \$10,000 per child by the end of this year — and investing in new spaces that will benefit parents for years to come. With the cost of living rising across the country, the Ontario government is increasing access to child care spaces and delivering needed financial relief for families."

The new spaces will be allocated to communities across Ontario using a model that incorporates demographics, socio-economic indicators, and existing licensed child care capacity. The new spaces will be part of the Can-ada-wide Early Learning and Child Care (CWELCC) system and includes a mix of not-for-profit and for-profit centres, a key priority of the Government of Ontario to respect and ultimately provide families with choice and flexibility. Additionally, the province will enhance the availability of flexible models of care for a changing economy and labour market – for example, child care spaces that are available on weekends and overnight to support people who work shifts.

To ensure child care spaces are also created in locations and for populations most in need including for children with special needs, Indigenous and Franco-Ontarian communities — Ontario is launching a \$213 million grant program for new and existing operators. These one-time grants, prioritizing regions with historically low rates of space availability, will help child care operators offset the initial costs of expanding or creating spaces, such as purchasing equipment or renovating facilities.

To date, 92 per cent of Ontario's licensed child care sites have enrolled in the CWELCC system. Families across the province with children in these centres are already seeing fee reductions of up to 25 per cent, retroactive to April 1, 2022. By the end of this year, families with children under the age of six in participating licensed child care programs will see a further fee reduction of up to 50 per cent relative to 2020 levels.

"Access to affordable, high-quality, flexible and inclusive early learning and child care is increasingly becoming a reality for families in Ontario, and across the country," said Karina Gould, federal Minister of Families, Children and Social Development. "The fee reduction announced today for centres as part of the Canada-wide system is a key step toward our ultimate goal for an average of \$10-a-day regulated child care. We will continue to work with the provinces and territories toward a better future for children, and families, everywhere in Canada."

Ontario remains committed to the success of the Canada-wide Early Learning and Child Care system and will continue to work with municipalities and stakeholders across the province to ensure affordable child care is available in communities where it is needed most.

Quick Facts

- Ontario's child care system offers a range of options for families with differing needs, including licensed, unlicensed, for-profit, not-for-profit, centre/ school-based and home-based child care.
- To ensure improved access, new child care space allocations will focus on the creation of affordable spaces in communities with children who need them most - rural communities, growth communities, low-income children, vulnerable

New grant program encouraging new spaces in children, children from diverse communities, children with special needs, Francophone and Indigenous children.

- The Ontario government is streamlining the application process for new child care operators when they apply for a licence. They will learn about their eligibility for child care funding before investing heavily in becoming licensed. The applicants will also have to submit key municipal approvals, including zoning and permitted use, together with their application. This will significantly reduce the time it takes the applicant to acquire a licence.
- Currently, there are more than 5,500 child care centres, 139 licensed home child care agencies, and around 464,000 licensed spaces in Ontario.
- Since 2018, the Ontario government has invested over \$1.5 billion in capital projects within the education sector, including 4,908 new, licensed child care spaces within schools. In 2021, the Ontario gov-ernment invested more than \$95 million to create 3,094 more school-based licensed child care spaces for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers.
- On November 24, 2022, the government announced an expansion to the dual credit program to attract 420 students over two years into Early Childhood Education career pathways.

EMERGENCY SCAM UNDER INVESTIGATION IN WASAGA BEACH Multiple Incidents Reported in One Day

Members of the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) are issuing a warning and seeking the public's assistance in relation to an emergency scam, also known as the grandparent scam, investigation in Wasaga Beach after multiple incidents were reported in one day.

In one of the reported incidents, which occurred on the morning of December 9, 2022, an elderly victim was contacted by someone who identified as their grandson, and claimed they had been arrested and required \$10,000 for bail. The victim also spoke to another male during the call, who claimed to be a police officer. The second male confirmed the arrest and advised he would send someone to the victim's home to collect the bail money. The male posing as a police officer provided a code to share with the individual collecting the money to ensure it was received by the correct person. Approximately 15 minutes after the call, a male attended the victim's residence and collected \$5,000. Later in the day, the victim received another call from a male who identified as a police officer advising they would be following up with the victim to collect the remaining \$5,000

Members of the public are cautioned that officers would never attend a residence to obtain bail money. Investigators are seeking the public's assistance to identify the male who attended the victim's residence.

The male is described as:

- · 20-25 years of age
- · White
- · Approximately 6" tall
- · Medium build
- · Dark short hair
- · Clean shaven
- · Wearing dark-coloured dress pants, dress shirt and a dark jacket

Multiple similar incidents have been reported in Wasaga Beach and surrounding areas. Members of the public are asked to speak to their grandparents and vulnerable loved ones about protecting themselves from becoming a victim of fraud.

Driver Arrested After Fleeing Police in Midland

A Midland man faces several charges after driving off from a traffic stop then being combative with officers. On December 10, 2022, just before 8 a.m., a member of the Southern Georgian Bay Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police was conducting speed enforcement on Simcoe Road 93 in the Town of Midland. The officers observed a vehicle travelling more that 40 kilometers over the speed limit and then stopped the vehicle on Highway 12. While speaking with the officer, the driver refused to identify himself and was argumentative with the officer. The driver then fled in his vehicle before the traffic stop was completed.

Officers observed the vehicle turn into a subdivision nearby and stop the vehicle. The driver exited his vehicle and was physically aggressive toward officers. Officers arrested and took control of him and he was transported to the detachment nearby.

As a result of this investigation, Jordan HILL, 32 years of Midland was charged with the following offences contrary to the Criminal Code of Canada and the Highway Traffic Act of Ontario:

Flight from Peace Officer

Assault with Intent to Resist Arrest

Drive Motor Vehicle - Perform Stunt - Excessive Speed

Speeding

Driver Fail to Give Identification

The accused was released with an Undertaking compelling him to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice on February 2, 2023. In cases of stunt driving, the drivers license of the charged person is suspended for 30 days and the vehicle they were operating is towed and impounded for 14 days.

Fire Crews Respond to Residential Fire on Old Second South





Just after 1:00 am on Wednesday, December 7, 2022, Springwater Fire & Emergency Services responded to a reported structure fire on Old Second South.

When emergency crews arrived on scene, they found a home fully involved with

fire. Four Springwater fire stations and 30 firefighters responded to the call. A water tanker shuttle was established to bring the fire under control as quickly as possible.

The home had working smoke alarms and all four occupants were able to escape just in time, wearing

only the clothes they had on at the time. Sadly, the family's cat perished in the fire. The family does have insurance.

The cause of the fire was accidental in nature and damage is estimated at approximately \$400,000.00.

"Crews did a fantastic job of getting this fire under control," said Deputy Fire Chief Jeff French. "The fire was challenging as the roof of the residence was covered in solar panels creating continuous live electricity. Crews worked throughout the night to bring the fire under control."

When properly installed and maintained, smoke alarms can be the difference between life and death. "This fire is another example of how working smoke alarms save lives when seconds count," adds French.

It is the law to have working smoke alarms installed on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas.
