


#### **EDITOR'S NOTES**

#### An Open Letter from Eastern Canadian Grain money that was paid by farmers. Farmers requested

February 9, 2023 - Our farmers need your help. They are facing a 2023 planting and growing season filled with risks that they could not have foreseen To: The Government of Canada

Over the last year, Eastern Canadian farmers have done everything they can to produce an abundant grain crop that will help Canada and the world meet their food needs. The atrocity of the Russian invasion of Ukraine had an unparalleled impact on the world's grain supply and neighbouring countries and people across the world worried about where they would get their grain, placing a higher expectation and demand on Canada's farmers.

Growing our grains was made difficult for several

- 1. The rising costs of tools needed for food production were, and are, astronomical, even allowing for strong grain prices
- 2. Geopolitical and weather events in Canada and around the world were, and are, putting pressure on
- 3. Russia and Belarus have traditionally been a source of fertilizer for plant nutrition for Eastern Canada farmers and as sanctions were put in place, farmers and fertilizer companies needed to source from other areas of the world
- 4. Sourcing from places other than Russia and Belarus has resulted in access and availability
- 5. Canadian tariffs on fertilizers cost farmers more than \$34 million dollars in additional costs – at a time when the need for grain is so great and farmers must use fertilizer to produce enough food
- 6. Canadian tariffs have remained with farmers bearing the cost even though the UN and countries around the world from the European Union, the United States, and more have removed any tariffs as the need for food is much more important

In December 2022, Deputy Prime Minister Chrystia Freeland and Agriculture and Agri-Food Minister Marie-Claude Bibeau ensured farmers they were working on way to return the \$34 million in tariff

that the monies be returned directly to farmers, who have borne this utterly unreasonable cost.

In the last month, there has been no word from either Minister's office on the plan to return these funds to

In February, Canada will celebrate Canada Ag Day - a day to recognize all the effort and skill required to produce the food that Canada and the world needs. Eastern Canadian farmers are leaders in sustainable farming from cover cropping, to crop rotation, to water health best management practices, to environmentally sound tilling practices, and unmatched biodiversity and robust ecosystem planning. Eastern Canadian farmers are the foundation for more than 100,000 Canadian jobs and are responsible for more than \$20 billion in economic output. There is a lot to celebrate. But our farmers need your help. They are facing a 2023 planting and growing season filled with risks that they could not have foreseen – chief among them is access to fertilizer and increased costs that go far beyond any increased income.

We are ready to help our government with the following:

- 1. Immediate action to return the fertilizer tariff monies directly to the farmers who bore the cost; and
- 2. A plan to remove any impediments on farm input supply chains (for example the removal of current
- 3. A longer-term plan to help the agriculture industry source plant nutrition and other inputs from nonsanctioned sources; and
- 4. Longer-term investment in alternative plant nutrition technologies and domestic production

As a group, Grain Farmers of Ontario, Quebec Grain Growers and Atlantic Grain Council will always fight for actions that safeguard Canada's ability to produce

#### Township of Springwater Tax Increase Creeps Up to 3.91 Per Cent

The tax rate increase for Township of Springwater residents continues to creep up and now sits at 3.91 per cent after the latest special budget meeting. For an average home assessed at \$493,000, this means a \$161.95 (\$13.50 per month) property tax increase over 2022 levels.

For this 2023 draft budget, council voted to:

- adjust the proposed \$7,500 council discretionary budget to \$5,000 for each member of council per year
  add \$33,200 for a seasonal position to support the
- Springwater Farmer's Market

   update the Hillsdale Pavilion by painting a
- pickleball court and adding a permanent basketball net with \$2,000 funded through taxation

Coun. Garwood put forward the motion for the new seasonal position to support the farmer's market stating that he had "... heard this from many folks within the community and echo their support and their concern for the market's future."

Alexander, Coun. Ga who voted in favour.

Deputy Mayor Cabra lower the discretionar member of council per

The motion was seconded by Coun. Alexander who said that what she liked about the motion was it allowed council "... to take a step back, look at the farmer's market, how it's run, (and) what can we do to make it grow through a contract position so we're not tying ourselves (up) long term." Alexander also added that she had conversations with the township CAO who said that markets are often run by volunteers

and supported by municipalities depending on the community.

Opposition to the motion came from Coun. Fisher, who said that he didn't see the market as "... an economic driver from an agricultural perspective" and that he didn't think it should be the responsibility of the taxpayer to support it. Deputy Mayor Cabral agreed and suggested that since "... the market ran without township involvement for probably 12 years ..." he didn't see the need to hire someone to support it.

Mayor Coughlin offered her support of the motion stating that it is "... a compromise and a great opportunity for the market to continue and hopefully, for us as a municipality to see it grow."

The motion was carried by Mayor Coughlin, Coun. Alexander, Coun. Garwood, and Coun. Thompson

Deputy Mayor Cabral put forward an amendment to lower the discretionary fund allotment to \$5,000 per member of council per year with carryover allowance for unused amounts. The motion was originally brought forward by Cabral at the Jan. 20 budget meeting and proposed \$7,500 per year for members of council "... for use within their respective ward for special purchases, services, events and other worthwhile causes which in their opinion would be meaningful, beneficial and worthwhile to their ward and residents."

Coun. Thompson proposed that the discretionary budget be pulled altogether, and that the current \$1000 discretionary budget be maintained, citing that "... in the last four years, the five councillors in the five different wards ... have used a total of \$600 in total ... which equates to about \$30 per year per ward."

Deputy Mayor Cabral countered stating that "... due to the pandemic many of the things that would have come from the fund ... didn't happen."

Despite reservations from township CAO Schmidt advising members of council against being involved in the procurement process, citing the Collingwood Judicial Inquiry, and Mayor Coughlin's questions related to policies and process, the motion was passed with Deputy Mayor Cabral, Coun. Alexander, Coun. Fisher and Coun. Moore voting in favour.

The draft 2023 budget was first tabled during a Jan. 16 special council budget meeting, where township staff proposed a 3.52 per cent blended tax rate increase. After council deliberations on Jan. 20 the tax rate increased to 3.86 per cent and, after this most recent budget meeting, now sits at 3.91 per cent.

This latest draft budget will be referred to the next meeting of council on Feb. 15 at 6:30 pm for approval. The meeting can be viewed live at the Township Administration Centre located at 2231 Nursery Road in Minesing or online at: www.springwater.ca/live

# Public Notice - Township of Springwater Official Plan Pursuant to Section 17(17) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, as amended

A Public Open House and a Public Meeting will be held to present a new Official Plan for the Township of Springwater. The new Official Plan will modernize land use planning policies that will guide our community's growth and development for the next twenty-five years. This includes policies related to Growth Management, Infrastructure, Natural Heritage & Hazards and General Land Use Policy. We would like to hear from you as we finalize the new Official Plan before Council adoption.



#### What is an Official Plan?

An Official Plan is a long-range planning document containing goals, objectives and policies to guide land use, development and growth in the municipality.

#### Why is a new Official Plan being prepared?

The Township's current Official Plan was adopted in 1997 and has been amended more than sixty times. The new Official Plan will ensure the Township's planning policies conform with current Provincial policies and the County of Simcoe Official Plan. The new Official Plan has been drafted through the consideration of community and stakeholder input as well as planning studies and reports completed by the Township in recent years.

We encourage you to get involved and share your input. There's no better time to join important discussions that will help shape the future of our community. You can provide input in several ways:

To register please contact the Planning Department at publicmeetings@springwater.ca or call 705-728-4784 Ext. 2019 prior to the registration deadline.

#### 4. Staying Informed

If you wish to be notified of the decision of Springwater Council on the proposed Official Plan, you must make a written request to the municipality via email or letter. Otherwise, stay tuned to the project website for updates.

If a person or public body would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of Springwater Council to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT), but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township prior to the proposed official plan being adopted, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of Springwater before the proposed official plan is adopted, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT) unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

#### Dry Skin

Dry skin or "xeroderma" describes skin that may be rough to the touch,
have mild flaking or peeling and is often very itchy. It most commonly affects
the thighs, lower legs, and arms.

Applying a moisturizing cream or lotion at least twice a day can help relieve dryness. If applied just after a bath or shower, these agents can more effectively lock in moisture. If regular use of moisturizers does not provide relief, products containing urea or lactic acid may be used, however be warned these may sting if cuts or scrapes are present. For extremely itchy areas, steroid creams are useful and some mild steroids like hydrocortisone are now available without a prescription. Staying hydrated is also very important.

February 13, 2023 - Let's discover what the 1935 story of Boeing's Model 299 (p. 176 in Greg McKeown's book, "Effortless") has to do with us building a Biblical Framework. 1935, rival "In

companies Boeing, Martin, and Douglas were competing for

a lucrative contract to build long-range bombers. Boeing was expected to win. It could carry five times the specified number of bombs and had a range twice as long as its predecessors.

That all changed after its fateful test run. Carrying five crew members, the Model 299 rose gracefully off the runway before stalling at 300 feet, tipping sharply and crashing to the ground. Two of the crew were killed, including test pilot Major Ployer P. Hill.

An investigation found that Major Hill, an Army Air Corps pilot with over 17 years of experience, had forgotten to release the rudder and elevator controls: a fatal error. More instructive, however, was the finding that Hill had been preoccupied by a myriad of other new complex procedures at the exact time he should have been executing these essential tasks. The army concluded that the Model 299 – the most technically sophisticated aircraft of its time – was too complicated for one person to fly and awarded the contract to Douglas."

Are we preoccupied with things that distract us from our essential tasks? Major Hill died because he lost sight of the tasks that would keep the plane flying.

As Christians, it is essential that we love the Lord our God with all our heart, mind, soul and strength and our neighbour as ourself. Will we die having lost sight of the One who is able to help us and keep us in perfect peace regardless of what is happening around

What can we learn from what happened next to Boeing's Model 299?

"A group of test pilots still believed that the Boeing plane was superior and would give the country a distinct military advantage. They simply needed a tool that would allow a single pilot to manage the advanced aeronautical technology ... And there is such a strategy – though it may seem almost ridiculous in its simplicity ... it's a modest but marvelous tool: the checklist.

Once the Boeing test pilots implemented checklists and flew over and over without incident ... the Army Air Corps ordered thousands of the planes. Renamed the B-17, the Model 299 dropped more bombs than any other US aircraft in World War II and helped turn the tide for the Allies ... the checklist isn't just useful for highly specialized tasks like flying an airplane. As the world gets more complex, we all need tools to help us remember what's important."

A Biblical Framework, whether it is for personal or family use, is like a spiritual checklist that will assist us as we choose to maintain our relationship with our heavenly Father, with Jesus and with the Holy Spirit amidst the increasing complexity of a world that often operates outside of God's word.

Next time, we'll look at how this can work for us.

John 10:27 – My sheep recognize my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. (TLB)


Sometimes, when we give in to false promises or we go astray, Jesus promises to leave the other ninetynine sheep in order to bring us back into His fold.

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#### Ask a Therapist: On Dream-Based Goals

February. 12, 2023-

Q: I read your most-recent column about shamebased goals and I'm curious to know more about dream-based goals - what is the difference between those motivations?

A: Dream-based goals, according to Matthias J. Barker, are goals that are sustained, visioned, and consistent. Unlike shame-based goals, which require that you keep connected to the shaming feelings to stay motivated, dream-based goals are connected to your values in a meaningful way that positively propels you forward towards achieving your goals.

Dream-based goals tend to run towards something as opposed to trying to escape something. If you are motivated by shame, the shame itself and getting away from that awful feeling is the fuel designed to help you accomplish your goal. But, once you run away from it, then you lose the motivation to continue in the goal. With dream-based goals you are not trying to escape something, you are moving towards a vision that you have for the future, towards an ideal that is aligned with your values. Working on physical fitness because you feel ashamed and judged by others is distinctly different from working on physical fitness because it allows you to enjoy your family in active and meaningful ways that being physically unwell would prevent.

Dream-based goals are not focused on a single outcome - lose 20 pounds, read a book a week, compete in a marathon, or the like - rather, they are founded on a vision for a life that is the result of the completion of those goals. To run a marathon is an achievement in and of itself but your commitment to do so might be more related to being part of a community of people training together and committed to healthy active lifestyles and as such connect with a value for belonging. Or it might be something that you are embarking on as a way to feel more connected to your body and the gift that movement brings to it. It might be more about being an inspiration to your children as a role-model for the perseverance and dedication that accomplishing that goal takes. You may embark on a particular goal trajectory where the point is about the character you are building in the process of working towards a goal rather than the actual accomplishment of that goal. It may be about the vitality and energy that you have in everyday life because you are committed to this goal and you have a vision for a life that is marked by those values. In any case, dream-based goals are motivating because they are connected to something that deeply matters to the goal setter.

Finally, dream-based goals allow you to access components of the motivation along the way to completing the goal and, even if the goal is not ultimately accomplished in the way you expected, you still experience the goodness of that process of moving towards it. To continue the marathon example, throughout the training you are experiencing the camaraderie of a group and you are increasing your energy and resilience incrementally and can sense that throughout the process - not just when you cross the finish line. You also may be working through some resistance along the way that is building the character that you are hoping to emulate for your kids. Dreambased goals help people to stay motivated in healthy ways because the journey is aligned with the ultimate reasons and values that matter to them, specifically.

Clearly, dream-based goals will be far more successful because they are created by considering the dreams and values in the core of a person. Goals that come from this place within will have the longevity that people are looking for to sustain change because they are authentic and aligned with things that really matter. If you are having trouble finding that dreambased motivation for your goals or if you feel that most of your motivation is still coming from shame, reach out to a counsellor today to help you create the vision and connections you need to move you forward and achieve those goals!

February 13, 2023 - Have you ever flown anywhere with your family? Unless you're a frequent flyer, flying can be hectic, stressful, expensive and more! Flying with nine kids can be all of those things... times nine. Ever since we got married my patient wife and I have talked about taking our kids on a missions trip to show them how people in different parts of the world live. Hopefully, it will make them appreciate their cushy lives and mostly-stocked fridge. So we've decided to take our family to the Dominican Republic for six months to learn, explore, and help some missionaries we know with some projects. Since our giant van doesn't fly or float very well we decided to take other transportation. Last week we woke up in the middle of the night, drove to Pearson airport and (after many line-ups and much luggage being weighed) hopped on a plane and flew south for a few hours.

In anticipation of potentially losing a few kids along the way we took some pre-emptive measures.

The first pre-emptive measure was to get the whole crew matching bright red hoodies and t-shirts complete with Canada flags on the sleeves. In the event of a little one escaping from the pack we could simply ask someone, "Have you seen a kid running away in a red shirt that looks like us?" What I didn't anticipate was the many questions from strangers such as, "Are you a school group?" and, "Are you a team or something?" It seems that there aren't that many families of eleven wandering around Pearson looking lost and all matchy-matchy.


When we went to check our luggage they asked us how many families we were, didn't wait for an answer, and then attempted to check us in at two different desks. That didn't work very well since we were, in fact, one family. The slightly intimidated

clerk at one of the kiosks took on the challenge. He got into a rhythm processing our supplies, so that half an hour and one bathroom break later we were all checked in...almost. We learned that large hiking backpacks and playpens are oversized baggage, not to be checked in here with regular luggage. Six of us were carrying those large packs, so we all had to wander over to the oversized baggage to check the backpacks. But it was closed. So they sent us a few miles across the airport to another oversized baggage check-in and we were finally on our way. You can imagine the fun we were having, walking at five in the morning with a two-year-old, a four-year-old and a pair of six-year-olds. Which brings us to another pre-emptive measure: buddies.

For a few years now we have teamed each small person with a "buddy" - an older sibling who could assist them along the way. Even when you add up all the arms and eyes between my wife and I, you still only have four of each, so the buddy system allows us to leverage the other eyes and arms in the family. The older buddies came in handy, literally, holding their younger buddy's hands as we meandered around the airport. The buddy system also works well for passing out snacks, helping through security and not losing passports.

Finally everyone was through security, bags were all checked, seats were sat in and we were off to the sunny south. Our first few days in the DR have been full of new experiences already, and as long as my Visa card doesn't get denied again, our future will have groceries and new adventures! Time flies! Make every moment count!

Feb. 8, 2023: This month, I returned to Ottawa for Parliament's winter session. I am happy to be back on Parliament Hill to represent your voices and discuss your views with my colleagues.

Over the past few months, I have heard from countless residents who were concerned and outraged by the Liberal government's proposal to ban thousands of commonly used hunting rifles and shotguns.

In a surprise climbdown, the Liberals have withdrawn key amendments to Bill C-21, specifically G-4 and G-46 amendments that would have banned millions of hunting rifles. Unfortunately, this is only a temporary pause, and the Liberal government will no doubt try to ban hunting rifles if given the opportunity to do so.

In the coming weeks my colleagues and I on the Public Safety committee will hear from hunters, farmers, Indigenous groups, business owners, and the Minister of Public Safety to further discuss the future of this legislation.

The government faced a massive public backlash over this issue from Canadians, including many residents from our riding, who saw this for what it was - an attack on the livelihoods of hunters and farmers.

I would like to thank all residents who reached out to my office about this important issue. A Conservative government would create a committee composed of law enforcement officials, First Nations, hunters, and sport shooters to determine how firearms are classified.

We must ensure Canadians have access to legally obtained firearms for legitimate hunting, sporting, and agricultural purposes, while also ensuring that we reduce the criminal use of handguns.

February 10, 2023 - Successful Aging! What exactly does that mean? According to the experts in the field of Geriatrics, it means, having access to affordable and timely healthcare, financial security, and a safe, secure environment. To access some of the supporting systems in these areas applications are

There is a resource available in our region free of charge to assist mature adults in navigating such government systems, complete applications, and provide assistance to locate appropriate support. It is called Community Resource Navigators with online access at www.communityresourcenavigators@ gmail.com or by phone 705-241-8766 and is run by Mary Moreau who is a retired County of Simcoe Social Services Supervisor. This service is contracted through the Askennonia Seniors Centre in Midland and has been made possible through the County of Simcoe Community Investment Fund. It is available to all seniors whether a member of Askennonia or

This service began mid 2021 and during that time, over 100 seniors were assisted and has grown to supporting over 250 seniors in 2022. When we contacted Mary, she said her role is to connect seniors with resources and assist in navigating the application processes. She can meet with the seniors in their home or at the Askennonia Centre, whichever is convenient for them.

For example, some of the applications previously completed were for the Ontario Senior Dental Program, Age Friendly Senior Grant (which assists seniors to remain at home through providing grants for accessibility modifications), transportation access with Community Reach, Old Age Security, and the Guaranteed Income supplement applications.

There is also an option to provide grocery cards as well as cards for personal items such as gas and taxis. And if all other resources have been exhausted, there is a discretionary fund that can provide assistance with items such as eyeglasses, dental or small repairs. In September 2022, Community Navigators started providing fresh produce bags to low income seniors. To register, seniors with low income can call Askennonia at 705-526-7609 at the beginning of each month and re-register monthly. All produce bags are to be picked up at the Centre usually in the 3rd week of the month. Being a member of Askennonia is not a requirement.

Recreation Programs in Tiny

There are many Recreation programs offered in Tiny and as noted on Tiny's website, the Township does not believe that anyone should have to miss out on the opportunity to get involved in recreation programs due to a lack of financial resources and welcome applications for assistance.

#### The Ontario Government is Connecting More People to Care at Home.

February 9, 2023 - The Ontario government is connecting people to convenient care at home and in their community. This means more constituents across Simcoe County can choose to stay in their homes longer as they age. Delivering convenient care at home provides a better experience for people and frees up more space in hospitals, long-term care homes, and doctors' offices.

In 2022, the Ontario government invested \$1 billion to the expansion of home-delivery and community care services to help nearly 700,000 families connect to the care they need in the comfort of their own home. With more caregiver supports and respite services being provided, work is underway to provide faster and more convenient care access that will be made available to constituents across Barrie – Springwater – Oro-Medonte.

Our government is working with Ontario Health Teams to create new, innovative, and modernized programs for people wanting to connect to care at home. With Your Health: A Plan for Connected and Convenient Care, we are also providing more virtual care options and connecting with other care providers such as family doctors, to ensure personal medical records follow people as they move between health professionals.

With the help of paramedicine, those living with chronic health conditions can now live at home more independently and avoid regular visits to the hospital waiting room. Ontario's expanded community paramedicine program is already in place in 55 communities and has connected more than 30,000 people to 24/7 non-emergency support at home. This initiative allows paramedics to use their training and expertise to provide home visits for a range of services. These services include making sure medication is taken as prescribed, educating people on how to properly manage their chronic conditions, and providing referrals to local community care providers

The Ontario government is also expanding palliative care services by adding 23 new hospice beds to the 500 beds already available across the province to provide patients with comfortable and dignified end-of-life care near their loved ones. Ensuring constituents across Simcoe County have a choice about where they spend their final days is an important part of ensuring all Ontarians can connect to the care they need throughout their entire life.

Home and community care services support people of all ages who require care in their home, at school or in the community. #### Non-Profit LTC Homes Are Being Gouged by Some Temporary Staffing Agencies

#### AdvantAge Ontario survey shows exorbitant fees, unsustainable situation

Feb. 14, 2023 (GLOBE NEWSWIRE) -- Not-for-profit long-term care homes are spending a concerning amount of their budgets on predatory temporary staffing agencies, some of which are exploiting the health human resource crisis by taking advantage of homes, according to a survey of 100 Ontario homes conducted by AdvantAge Ontario.

"Our members are spending tens of millions of dollars on temporary staff, rather than permanent care," said Lisa Levin, Chief Executive Officer of AdvantAge Ontario, which represents not-for-profit, municipally owned and charitable homes. "This is a problem and it's getting worse. We need government to push out the bad operators who are preying on homes in the midst of a staffing crisis."

The survey found homes are paying a very high price to fill staffing shortages – which, in the case of registered nurses (RNs), for example, are vacant 28 per cent of the time at respondent homes.

Some predatory agencies are taking advantage of the situation by charging exorbitant rates. Homes are forced to pay on average \$88 per hour for a temporary RN, more than twice their typical wage of \$43 per hour.

One agency charged \$150 per hour for this same position, 249 per cent more than the typical rate.

On top of these high wages, homes are paying agency service fees of up to 35 per cent, premiums for short-notice staff, and travel costs.

Rates for rural and northern homes are 30 per cent higher than urban homes.

"This is price gouging, plain and simple," said Levin. "It's an unsustainable situation."

AdvantAge Ontario is urging government to come up with a comprehensive health human resources strategy that puts restrictions on hourly rates for temporary staff. The plan would also improve wages, benefits and working conditions for health care workers.

The request is contained in the Association's 2023 pre-budget submission, which also calls on government to:

- Stabilize long-term care by committing to predictable, consistent, and multi-year funding.
- Provide permanent, guaranteed infection prevention and control funding to homes.
- Make funding available so homes can transition to emotion-focused models of care, which goes beyond just looking at a person's physical needs and instead nourishes their emotional and spiritual needs in a home-like environment.

The requests are designed to help stabilize a sector reeling from decades of chronic underfunding, coupled with the continuing impacts of COVID-19 and the burden of new red tape on homes.

The high fees charged by some temporary staffing agencies is the latest pressure on not-for-profit homes, which a large majority of Ontarians choose as their first choice for LTC homes.

AdvantAge Ontario's survey found that temporary direct care staff (which include Registered Practical Nurses, RNs and Personal Support Workers) worked an average of 7 per cent of their homes' total hours but were paid 16.4 per cent of all wages.

In total, the 100 homes surveyed are spending \$6 million per month on temporary staff.

Nearly half, or 44 per cent, said they are now unsure they will meet the government target of four hours of daily direct care.

"Temporary staffing agencies are an important part of the health care system and have been for a long time. Many of them act responsibly," said Levin. "But some of them do not. Those agencies are taking advantage of a staffing crisis in the sector. If government fails to take action to control exploitative agencies, there will be serious consequences. Vulnerable seniors are already receiving less care as a result, and the situation is getting worse."

The German Canadian Club was very active through their 52-year history, and often made donations to support local charities through their initiatives. This gift brings their total investment at GBGH to nearly \$64,000.

"Although the organization is formally dissolved, their mission to build community will live on through these generous gifts. We are truly honoured to be part of that legacy."

GBGH will be offering MRI service to residents as soon as it is able to complete construction and commissioning of the new machine. 



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




# 3 Recipes to Upgrade Boxed Mac N' Cheese

Feb. 13, 2023- While this has not been a great winter for snowshoeing, the last few weeks of fresh snow has made me very happy. I love snowshoeing, and if you know me, you know I love little used trails with as much solitude as possible. My all-time favourite trail for a short snowshoe is at the Wye

Marsh. Most of the trails here are very well used, yet somehow the Graham McDonald trail is mostly forgotten. I generally walk through the trampled down areas of main trails, until entering the snowshoe trail where I stop to put on my snowshoes. I rarely find anyone following this trail farther than the first few hundred meters before stopping and turning around at a wildlife information sign. These people have lost out on a rare opportunity to explore a little used, but truly beautiful area.

The main trail is a short loop trail, which is very well marked with bright orange snowshoe signs. The trail is perfect for beginners and is only about a kilometre or so in length. For those with more experience, the trail veers off to the right and heads out to Freshet creek. This trail is not suitable for beginner snowshoeing, and I highly recommended poles. Every year I struggle to find the trail after clambering over a log and finding myself in an area of deadfalls and brush. This section is very poorly marked, and it is unusual to find anyone out before me to lead the way. The great thing about snowshoeing is that you can't really get lost, as you always can follow your own trail out. Unless it is a blizzard, or the earth tilts on its axis, or maybe a sudden ups welling of the earth's magma; but generally you are good.

The back trail is beautiful. In twenty years, I have only met one other person on the trail. The quiet out here is complete. The only sounds are my own breath, the wind stirring the firs above my head and

## Shrimp or Chicken Fajita Mac N' Cheese INGREDIENTS

1 box prepared mac and cheese

1 cup (250 ml) shrimp or cubed chicken, uncooked 1/4 cup (63 ml) green onion or white onion, thinly sliced

1 green and red pepper, thinly sliced

1 tablespoon (15 ml) olive oil

1 clove garlic, crushed or 1/8 teaspoon (0.6 ml) garlic powder

1 teaspoon (5 ml) chili powder

1 teaspoon (5 ml) cumin

1/4 teaspoon (1.25 ml) oregano

Lime wedges, fresh chopped cilantro and hot sauce to serve

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

1. In a frying pan on medium-high heat, sauté the peppers and onions with the oregano,

cumin and chili powder for 6 - 8 minutes.

2. Add the shrimp or chicken and cook until done, about 4-5 minutes for the shrimp and

7-10 minutes for the cubed chicken.

- 3. Stir in the crushed garlic or garlic powder and cook for an additional minute.
- 4. Keep the fajita mixture warm on low heat, stirring occasionally.
- 5. In a large pot prepare the boxed mac n' cheese according to the directions.

Rabbit tracks were everywhere, and where there are rabbit tracks, there is often a lot of covote prints. No signs of a struggle though, so hopefully the little furry bunnies made it to safety. This is a great trail that takes about an hour or so to go out and return.

It's nice to see more daylight every day as our days are getting longer. Back when Winter began, the sun rose at 7:52 AM and set at 4:43 PM for a total of 8 hours and 52 minutes of daylight. Today, February 16, the sun rose at 7:17 AM and will set at 5:43 PM for a total of 10 hours and 31 minutes of daylight. Each day we gain over 2 and a half minutes more daylight and on February 26 we go over 3 minutes per day. What is also nicer is that by the 26th of the month, the sun will rise before 7 AM which makes it even more pleasant especially in the morning. Spring officially begins on Monday March 20. Making it light longer in the evening is that Daylight Saving Time will begin on Sunday March 12 which is also the first Sunday of the school March Break. Ontario has made the decision to stop the annual change to turn our clocks ahead or back each year by adopting Daylight Saving Time year round. This will only occur when the State of New York and the Province of Quebec agree to do the same thing. In November of 2020, a bill was passed in the Ontario Legislature making daylight saving permanent in Ontario but the bill has yet to be proclaimed into force as we await our neighbours to do the same thing. There is no time frame as to when that will occur.

#### Young Adults Living at Home

February 12, 2023 - There was a time when it was rent does not mean they cannot set the rules. common for young people to leave home once they turned eighteen. By the time children left home, parents were still in their early forties. The age of parenthood has increased over time, so now parents may be much older before their children go out on their own.

Increasingly, young adults are still living at home longer than in the past. This creates some dilemmas both for the parents and the adult child. Often boundaries become muddled, because there is still a parent-child relationship, only now all are adults.

Every situation is different; however, some general guidelines always apply. Although this may be tough to swallow, when you are living in your parent's home, your "adult" status in the outside world does not supersede your "child" status at home. Just because you are over eighteen does not give you special rights to break house rules.

What this means is that it is your parents' house, and they can make the rules. If you want to make the rules, you must get your own house! What you cannot do is to argue with them about how they want things to be in their own home, any more than you would want them to make rules once you live on your own.

Even if you are paying rent, it is likely less than you would pay to rent your own place, so your parents are, in effect, subsidizing you. The fact that you pay

Renting from parents is not the same as renting from a landlord. If you want the freedom to live as you like, it is time to become and independent adult. As long as you live in your parents' home, you are a still a dependent. A landlord would not feed you, pay for your utilities or let you borrow their car. Your furniture, Wi-Fi, and home insurance would not be covered by your landlord.

So, if parents want you in by a certain time so you are not waking them with your coming and going, you need to honor that. If they expect you to do certain chores, you need to contribute in that way as well. In fact, you should offer to help. If you are working full time, it would be nice to contribute something to the grocery budget. You should also make some of the meals.

Remember too, now that you are an adult your parents should be free of parent-child conflicts. They have undoubtedly worked hard all their lives and deserve to enjoy this time. I have seen too many adults, who, in their later life are consistently stressed by an adult child living at home. If they have generously allowed you to stay on, be thankful, and strive to make their lives easier, not harder.

This was my fifth fundraiser and hair donation for this charity since 2008.


Every year, thousands of Canadian children lose their hair to cancer treatments, alopecia, and other medical causes. The Angel Hair for Kids program



#### Weekend Traffic Notes from North Simcoe Roadways

Traffic issues over the weekend on North Simcoe roadways kept officers from the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment busy responding to those events. Officers issued 43 traffic violations under the Highway Traffic Act for a variety of offences as motorists drove through the detachment area. Of note, were the speeders travelling through the Highway 93 corridor while numerous construction crews worked to repair Hydro lines along side the highway along with a traffic light control malfunction in Waverley which tasked an officer to manually direct traffic within the intersection.

A 66 year old Penetanguishene man was charged with Careless Driving after he sped through the County Road 93 roundabout and his Toyota rolled into the ditch at approximately 1:00 p.m. February 12, 2023. Further investigation led officers to impound the involved vehicle and issue a 3-Day suspension ADLS as part of a drinking and driving investigation as per the ADLS guidelines.

12 vehicle crash's were investigated by patrol officers who also conducted 16 Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (R.I.D.E.) check stops, checking drivers for signs of impairment and investigated 19 traffic complaints.

#### **Incident of Impaired Driving**

At 2:55 a.m. February 12, 2023 officers were dispatched to a vehicle in the ditch off Highway 400 in the area of Crooked Bay Road, Georgian Bay Township. The lone driver was located and upon exiting the vehicle, the driver was arrested for impaired driving and transported to Orillia Detachment for further investigation by a OPP Drug Recognition Expert.

As a result of this investigation, Cameron BOATMAN 34 years of Shanty Bay has been charged criminally with Operation while impaired blood drug concentration and further with Operation while impaired - drugs.

The accused was released on an recognizance to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice on March 2, 2023 and further faces a 90 day drivers licence suspension and a 7 day vehicle impoundment as per the Ministry of Transportation ADLS suspension guidelines.

The suspect vehicle is described as being a newer model Dodge Ram crew cab pick up truck, grey or olive in colour with tinted windows. #### Door-To-Door Sales/ Liens/Mortgage Fraud Complex door-to-door sales scams - Avoid further victimization

Ontario's Serious Fraud Office (SFO) is shining a light on a multi-layered door-to-door sales scam, which leaves victims with poor renovations, liens or a mortgage on their homes.

Despite rules banning door-to-door sales, criminals have not stopped. Those involved in these frauds are persuasive and persistent. They continue to visit the homes of vulnerable individuals and endear themselves, giving the impression they are a friendly helper.

#### **HOW DOES THIS FRAUD UNFOLD?**

Fraudsters approach individuals at the door of their home or by phone and use compelling tactics to persuade the homeowner that a new appliance, contract or service is required; something that was never asked for or needed. These have included: air cleaners, air conditioners, air purifiers, duct cleaning, furnaces, water filters, water heaters, water treatment devices or even bundles of these goods and services.

After the service has been completed or device installed, a few things can happen to make a bad situation even worse.

#### Whether by phone or in person:

The victim is contacted by someone claiming to be from a law firm offering assistance to exit previously signed contracts, remove possible liens and consolidate incurred debts. Victims are told they may be eligible to receive a grant for a significant amount of money IF they agree to exit the contract.

If a grant was offered, the victim is contacted by a home renovation company and is persuaded to sign a contract and speak with a finance company on the phone. They are led to believe this is required to comply with the grant, BUT it is actually the process to have a mortgage approved on their home.

The funds are then deposited into the victim's bank account, leading the victim to believe they have received the grant, but it is actually funds from the home equity mortgage taken out on their home.

The victim is told not to touch the money, as it must go toward renovations, as well as to the payments they were making for installed equipment.

## TIPS TO PROTECT YOURSELF/YOUR LOVED ONES

Answer your door only if you are expecting an invited guest

Do not allow unsolicited visitors into your home

Hang up on unsolicited phone calls

Never share personal information or copies of any bills or financial statements

Do not make a decision on the spot

Do not sign blank documents

Take the time to understand what you are signing and ask questions

Do not answer questions on a phone/video call if you are being told the answers by someone else (if someone is telling you to answer 'yes'/ 'no')

Check regularly on family or others who might be vulnerable to persuasive and persistent individuals

Talk to the bank about a vulnerable loved one to prevent suspicious withdrawals

Understand no renovations are free

Visit Canada.ca to review green grant opportunities Ask yourself: why has this person offered to help and how do they know your situation

Consider checking your credit history online at TransUnion and Equifax

Look up your property on the Land Registry Ontario website

Install video cameras around your home or video capturing doorbells

#### **RED FLAGS**

The person visiting you says you have won a classaction lawsuit regarding the installation of your equipment and the money can only be used towards renovations to your home

You are told your home is now a 'green home' after the installation of some equipment and therefore you qualify for a grant. A condition of the grant is that you can only use the money to do renovations or add more equipment

A financial company approaches you, unsolicited, indicating they can help you get out of payments or to consolidate your debt

If you are told renovations are free

If you do not have input on the renovations a company does or what materials they use

If you are pressured to have renovations started right away

Renovations in these frauds have included: flooring, painting, smart thermostats, vanities, sinks, toilets, showers, kitchens cabinets and insulation. They are often poor quality and are left unfinished

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#### Going Deeper and How Scary It Can Be



Wednesdays give you the opportunity to save \$10 off of your visit.

Vetta Nordic Spa is located at 3210 Line 3 North in Oro-Medonte. In the heart of the Horseshoe Valley, this Finnish inspired spa also ensures you are surrounded by nature. It's open 7 days a week from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m. The Hot (Kuuma) part of the cycle



includes hot pools, Vetta signature scented steam rooms, small electric saunas, a large wood burning sauna, a hot stone room and an exfoliating salt scrub and shower experience. The cold part of the cycle includes cold plunge pools and a cold plunge bucket. To relax (Levata), take advantage of the relaxation rooms/areas, sit by one of the gas or wood burning

rooms/areas, sit by one of the gas or wood burning fires, sink into a Muskoka chair or lounger or indulge in a massage. Take some time to socialize at the inspa bistro or Finnish inspired restaurant.

Going to an outdoor spa in the winter is an amazing experience that is sure to be repeated. To try something a little different, check out Le Scandinave or Vetta Spas.
