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

Dear Editor

Municipal budgets can expect to take a hit in coming years from an unexpected direction. The cost of controlling the rapidly expanding and fastgrowing tall invasive species called Phragmites can be expected to add red ink at the lower-tier level across the province.

As Invasive Phragmites (Phrag) spreads rapidly along rural roadsides, it has become a significant safety hazard at intersections by obstructing driver sightlines. The dense roots impact municipal infrastructure by clogging drains, ditches and culverts causing road flooding and related damage. Already Phrag is growing along over 1,000 kilometres of roadside in Ontario. The current cost to treat a single kilometre of Phraginfested roadside is estimated at \$6,000. When municipalities work closely with local partners and budget proactively for Phrag control, they can limit the spread, protect biodiversity and manage their liability.

Phrag also impacts recreational opportunities such as swimming, boating, fishing, birdwatching and hunting, costing local economies an estimated \$42.7 million a year, according to a cost/benefit analysis carried out for the Green Shovels Collaborative. Waterfront landowners take a double hit, seeing their property values reduced by \$357 million due to Phrag encroachment, the study indicates. (To access the study, search online for Green Shovels Phragmites summary report.)

The Marl-Tiny-Matchedash (M-T-M) Conservation Association has undertaken a three-year project to control Invasive Phragmites at Tiny Marsh. We wish to express our appreciation for funding support to our local municipality, the Township of Tiny, that allowed us to secure funding from Environment and Climate Change Canada and other organizations.

Municipalities alone will not be able to eliminate this economic and environmental burden and become Phrag-free. We join with the Ontario Phragmites Working Group and the Ontario Invasive Plant Council in calling for a substantial investment by governments to support municipalities and their partners' efforts in Invasive Phragmites control. Did you know that March is Nutrition Month in Canada? All month long, registered dietitians are sharing key "ingredients" for a healthier tomorrow including eating well on a budget. It may feel like you have to spend a lot of money to eat healthy, but this isn't necessarily true. If you 're open to making some grocery shopping trade-offs you can eat healthy and save money too.

Top Tips to Eating Healthy on a Budget:

- Buy only what you need.
- When possible, plan your meals in advance, make a shopping list and stick to it. Try to avoid impulsive buys and don't shop hungry.
- Buy in season and buy frozen fruits and vegetable when fresh is too expensive.
- Clip coupons, use coupon apps and buy on sale.
- Be more accepting of imperfect produce.
- Often bruised or misshapen fruits and vegetables are tossed when they could be used in smoothies, baked goods and casseroles. Most groceries stores will sell these items at a discount, saving you money.
- Choose healthy and inexpensive protein sources more often. Examples: eggs, edamame (soy beans), canned tuna and salmon, plain Greek yogurt, cottage cheese, tofu, seeds, nuts, peanut butter, beans, chick peas, lentils, ground turkey, and cheaper cuts of meat.
- Buy generic store brands more often.
- Be a Food Hero Shop Local and Donate to the Food Bank.

It's a good thing to donate what you don't need or use to your local food bank. Food insecurity is a hidden problem that has a big impact on communities.



Supporting our local food producers and small businesses is also good for our community and a great way to know where your food comes from. It also helps fight pollution and reduces your carbon footprint.

Swans and Sweetwater at Wye Marsh

The sounds of spring are in the wind at Wye Marsh. Trumpeter Swans are bobbing heads and honking, solidifying pair bonds. Pine Siskins are back at the feeder. And, as long-time Sugar Shack Volunteer Dave Robertson says, "You can hear the snow melt!"

Crunching through the snow with gear in hand, a small group is tapping maples. They are getting ready to hang buckets, collect maple sap, and turn it into liquid gold as part of the Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre's annual Sweetwater Harvest.

"I love it," says Robertson. "It reminds me of my childhood."

While many of us have fond memories of school trips to the sugar bush, Robertson's experience was a bit more involved.

Growing up in the country, he spent a lot of time working on the farm. Each spring, from age of 9 to 13, he would meet up with a couple of boys and head out to the bush. "I took the week off from school, and worked in the Sugar Shack," he recalls. "We lived, ate and slept in the bush. It was absolutely amazing!"

Now he enjoys the comradery among his fellow "Sapsuckers" at the Wye Marsh. The dedicated troupe of volunteers has been running maples syrup demonstrations for educational programs and weekend visitors for decades.

"I love talking to people - especially school kids - about how to make maple syrup" says Robertson. It can be a lot of fun surprising people with interesting facts about a sweet Canadian tradition. It's really rewarding when someone says, "I didn't know that!"

Unable to operate the Wye Marsh Sugar Shack for the past two years due to the pandemic, the Sapsuckers are eager to get back to work. They are tapping 31 trees, installing 100 spiles, and planning to collect enough sap to produce about 45 litres of maple syrup this season. And, if all goes well, they will get the chance to share their love of the season with you!

In response to rapidly changing public health regulations, the Wye Marsh is offering a modified Sweetwater Harvest Weekend program this year. While they are skipping the all-day pancake feast, horse drawn wagon rides and live entertainment, people will still have the chance to talk to the Sapsuckers and enjoy the beauty of the Marsh - as it stirs to life - after a very long cold winter.

From 10:00 am - 2:00 pm on March 19 & 20, March 26 & 27, and April 2 & 3, visitors can:

- Walk the Trails
- Visit the Sugar Shack
- Pop by the Birds of Prey Field
- Enjoy Family Fun in the Kids Zone
- Join a Guided Hike and
- Chat with a few Local Artisans in the Display Hall

Also, please note that:

- There will be no ticket sales at the gate
- Entry to the site will be limited to 100 people per hour

Wye Marsh has over 25 km of trails to explore, from winding through the cedar groves, into hardwood forest, to the floating boardwalk which immerses visitors in the cattails. It is a magical place for all ages to be inspired and fall in love with nature. Trails are accessible for all ages and abilities, with some loops being stroller friendly. Admission is \$12 for adults, \$9 for children aged 4-18, \$9 for seniors aged 65+, and children under 4 are free.

LDD (Spongy) Moth Management Options

In a September 14, 2021 staff report, the County of Simcoe outlined five options available to its member municipalities for managing the ongoing LDD (Spongy) Moth outbreak. An action report containing these options was on the agenda of the March 16th meeting of Springwater Council. The options include:

- Option 1 No active management
- Option 2 Enhanced communication and support with LDD Moth kits
- Option 3 The good neighbour approach
- Option 4 Active management through a LDD moth monitoring program
- Option 5 Active management with an aerial spray program

The County of Simcoe, the Ontario Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry, Severn Sound Environmental Association and others have predicted that the current LDD moth infestation is on the decline and project low to moderate defoliation in 2022. As such, the County is not planning for an aerial spray program in 2022 for any of the County Forests.

Township staff are recommending that Springwater Council move forward with Options 2 and 3. Staff do not support the do-nothing approach and have advised that the spray approaches come with risks and are either limited in efficacy or unavailable. The recommendation is to support residents through enhanced communications and the provision of LDD moth kits with instructions of actions to take between now and July to minimize the impact of the moths.

The March 16th Council meeting discussing this can be viewed on the Township's YouTube Channel.

Community Hub Development

The Township has acquired the community engagement support of 8 80 Cities to begin a public engagement process that will capture a vision for the future Community Hub at 1132 Snow Valley Road, commonly known as the Hasty Tract. Through focus groups, interviews, surveys and pop-up events, they are looking to speak to a broad spectrum of individuals and groups in our community to determine what the Community Hub should include, look like, and invoke. Keep an eye out for opportunities to share your thoughts and feedback. Community engagement opportunities will be posted to springwater.ca/ HastyTract and circulated on the Township's social media platforms.

County Residential Compost Sales

Compost sales are anticipated to run from May 9 to May 28th this year at the County of Simcoe's Solid Waste Management sites. Rates are \$20 per truck

or trailer load and \$5 for smaller loads e.g., cars. Mulch (brush chips) will continue to be available free of charge as quantities allow. Both the mulch and compost sales are to be self-loaded by residents. After May 28th, the County will continue to sell compost as stock allows but will no longer resupply non-composting sites until all the stock has been sold.

County of Simcoe Bursary Program

Pending Council's final approval, the Township will contribute \$1,000 to the 2022 County of Simcoe Bursary Program. Lower tier municipalities as well as the Cities of Barrie and Orillia have the opportunity to participate in this program every year by making a contribution of this amount. For each participating municipality, the County of Simcoe will then supplement the contribution by \$2,000, which guarantees an applicant from the participating municipality to receive one of the available \$3,000 bursaries. The Township has participated in the County of Simcoe Bursary Program for the last several years. In 2021, Springwater resident Carter Mack was selected to receive the \$3000 award and Paige Todd to receive one of five county-wide bursary awards.

The County has made several updates to the program for 2022. In May 2021, County Council approved the expansion of eligibility requirements to include Simcoe County students who have successfully completed their OSSD through an accredited homeschooling program, such as the Independent Learning Centre or the Virtual Learning Centre. In addition, they broadened the scope of accepted Post-Secondary Institutions to include educational programs provided by institutions such as Trade Schools.

Craig Road Extension Project Update

Township staff are proceeding to implement the Craig Road Extension Project according to the 2009 Class Environmental Assessment Study and 2020 Environmental Study Report. Before construction can begin, there are several steps to complete, including the Craig Road conceptual design, land acquisition, detailed design, and regulatory approvals. Below are the project steps from this point to the completion of construction:

The new two-lane roadway will be approximately 2,750 metres long, providing an east-west link between Russell Road and County Road 27. The project is planned to move forward in tandem with Phase 1 development of Neighbourhood 2 (Midhurst Settlement Area) and alongside the completion of the ultimate wastewater treatment plant in Neighbourhood 1. The present estimated cost to complete the Craig Road Extension is \$19,000,000; however, as the conceptual design process is outstanding, this estimate has a +/-30% margin of error. The project will be entirely funded through development charges.





Council Meeting Highlights: March 2, 2022

Next Council Meeting: March 16, 2022

Noise Exemption Request – Carson Road Developments Inc.

Council approved a Noise By-law exemption that Carson Road Developments Inc. requested in order to install a sanitary effluent main and conduct minor tree clearing along Hwy 26 and Wilson Drive. The exemption will allow some of the works along Hwy 26 to be completed overnight, in compliance with construction time limitations imposed on the developer by the Ministry of Transportation. Construction is scheduled to conclude in June 2022.

Partners for Climate Protection Program

Council provided authorization for the Township of Springwater to join the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) Partners for Climate Protection (PCP) Program. The PCP program provides a five-milestone framework for Canadian municipalities to engage in climate change action planning, which include:

- 1. Developing a community-wide greenhouse gas (GHG) inventory
- 2. Setting a GHG reduction target
- 3. Developing a local climate action plan
- 4. Implementing said action plan
- 5. Monitoring and reporting on progress

Through services approved in the 2022 Budget, the Severn Sound Environmental Association will assist the Township in obtaining membership and achieving Milestones 1 and 2. PCP membership commits a municipality to moving through all five milestones within 10 years of joining the program.

Naloxone Access for Springwater Fire & Emergency Services

Council approved an agreement with the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit that will register Springwater Fire & Emergency Services for the Ontario Naloxone Program (ONP). Under this agreement, the department will receive the required amount of Naloxone kits to be placed on fire apparatus and replenished as required. All Springwater Fire & Emergency Services firefighters have been trained to administer Naloxone through the Simcoe County Paramedic Services Quality Care Program.

Mandatory Firefighter Certification

The Provincial Government has announced a new regulation that would establish mandatory minimum certification standards for firefighters within the Province of Ontario. The proposed approach provides flexibility to meet local training needs based on the level of fire protection service set by municipal council. Through a new timelimited "legacy" option, certain firefighters would be exempt from certification standards based on their prior knowledge, skills and training. The regulation would not change or add any new regulatory requirements on fire departments that are currently training and certifying to full NFPA standards. It is proposed to come into effect on July 1, 2022.

Should My Next Vehicle be a Plug-in Hybrid or Fully Electric?

With fuel prices seemingly on a never-ending upwards trajectory, many people are asking themselves if their next vehicle should be a plug-in hybrid (PHEV) or a Battery Electric Vehicle (BEV). As with many things in life, the answer is "It depends". Many factors should go into your decision, and one of the first among them should be what exactly do you do with your vehicle. If your daily commute is greater than a 300 kilometer round trip, than a Hybrid might be right for you. Most new BEV's have ranges that go from about 400 to 500 kilometers, some even more, so if your daily drive exceeds 75 per cent of the range of an electric vehicle, you should consider a PHEV instead, for the moment anyway. If you do not have a daily commute that exceeds a 300 kilometer round trip, then I think your best choice would be a full Battery Electric Vehicle. This technology has come a very long way and is moving well into the mainstream for most people. If you can charge at home, your electricity cost will run you about 20 per cent of a similar Gas or Diesel vehicle, I know it sounds far-fetched, but I have been getting this in the real world for about five years. If you have to fast charge, you will still likely be at about half the fuel cost of a combustion vehicle and depending on the type of car you buy and the charger you use, you can charge 10 to 80 per cent or about 300 kilometers in as little as 18 minutes (based on the Hyundai Ionic 5).

With a BEV you will have almost no service on your vehicle whatsoever, certainly no oil and filter changes, etc. In short, many of the things that need service or can go wrong on your vehicle (engine, exhaust, emissions control, transmission, etc.) don't exist in a BEV. By some estimations your average Internal Combustion vehicle has about 2000 moving parts. On a BEV, you are looking at about 20, and all those parts are subject to eventual failure. BEV's are not perfect; i.e., you do have some maintenance, of course, on things like, tires, windshield wipers and washer fluid, but that's about it ... even your brakes ware slower due to regenerative breaking. Both a BEV and a PHEV will usually be more tun to drive than a comparable combustion engine (ICE) vehicle, but even here the performance of a BEV is just so much better than just about anything else on the road. It's a blast to drive, with lower stress, less noise and you just feel more in control than you do in an ICE car.

For good reason, many people were nervous about taking the plunge into this new technology. They were worried about battery life, reliability, and range, not to mention charging on a road trip, so these vehicles were mostly purchased by the wealthy and early adopters. Well, mainstream electric cars have been in production for more than a decade now, and many of the kinks have been worked out. The batteries will last the life of the vehicle. Reliability of electric cars is generally higher than their combustion counterparts and it truly is easy to find a fast charger when you need it.

In the end, I would not choose the PHEV because it has few of the advantages of the BEV, and all of the disadvantages of an ICE vehicle, and you still have to buy gas!

SWIFT Update

On February 22, 2022, the Warden and CAO briefed Council on the Southwestern Integrated Fibre Technology (SWIFT) board's activities. SWIFT is a non-profit municipally led broadband expansion project created to improve internet connectivity in underserved communities and rural areas across Southwestern Ontario.

Warden Cornell indicated that all 97 SWIFT contracts totaling an investment of \$268 million in broadband infrastructure have now been awarded. Councillors were interested in having a GIS map from the County which shows where high speed internet is/isn't available – CAO Aitken indicated that staff are working on this and will keep Councillors updated as it progresses.

Human Trafficking

The crime of human trafficking in Ontario is threatening our most vulnerable population, and Ontario resources have reportedly served 427 young girls that have been victimized/exploited since 2013.

On March 8, 2022, Council approved the County of Simcoe to raise further awareness to the issue of human trafficking by utilizing communications platforms, and to initiate training and a strategy for all staff and council, working with Simcoe County, community partners, and school boards to eradicate human trafficking. Council also approved forwarding a copy of the resolution regarding human trafficking and sexual exploitation to all Simcoe County MPPs/MPs and municipalities to support in further awareness and action.

Carts Accessibility Accommodation Process

The Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA) and the Ontario Human Rights Code require that the County, as a provider of services, accommodate persons with disabilities.

On February 22, 2022, Council received a report on the curbside waste collection carts accessibility accommodation process, which is intended to remove barriers for persons with disabilities and is consistent with many other Ontario municipal jurisdictions that provide automated cart collection.

The report highlighted research that confirms that carts represent major physical improvements and have several ergonomic advantages over manual systems, including reduced reaching and bending, reduced back and shoulder stress, and reduced lifting and carrying.

On March 8, 2022, Council approved the proposed accommodations and application process. Staff will also investigate and incorporate additional accommodation options that keep within and enhance the curbside waste cart collection service accommodation process.

Anten Mills by Dennis Gannon







Simcoe Uplands Petition Calls on Ottawa to Protect Purest Water

The Government of Canada is being asked to take action to protect the purest water known to science.

A petition published on the House of Commons website urges that the federal government use the Canada Water Act and any other relevant legislation to protect the pristine waters of the Simcoe Uplands also known as French's Hill - so that research may proceed into how this purity is created and maintained.

Protection needs to be put in place before the resource is lost, says Dr. Michael Powell of the University of Alberta, one of the scientists involved in the five-year research project.

Paraphrasing from an article he recently wrote with Dr. William Shotyk, Bocock Chair for Agriculture and the Environment at the University of Alberta, Powell points out that the waters of Tiny Township are a natural treasure, one unique to Canada.

"If they are lost our chance to study and understand natural processes responsible for their quality and our capacity to implement new levels of resource

protection will be gone – a natural analog for water purification will be lost, forever."

He added: "Aggregate throughout occurs Ontario, pristine water only occurs here. We must better understand this resource before it is destroyed. Do we want aggregate in the short term, or pristine water forever?"

Beth Brass Elson, one of the Nishnaabekweg who led the battle to prevent Dump Site 41 from being built atop the water, deplores the continuing struggle. "A lot of prayers and hard work have gone out to help protect this precious aquifer," she said. "We should not have to save the same water source twice." She called on all to sign the petition and pass along the message. "Some of the World's Purest Water is calling for your help. Nibi (Water), we all need it to

The petition, which can be accessed at https://petitions. ourcommons.ca/en/Petition/Details?Petition=e-3867 is sponsored by Simcoe North MP Adam Chambers. "This is a matter of great importance to residents of Simcoe North and citizens across Canada and we thank our MP for bringing the matter forward," said AWARE Simcoe Chair Don Morgan.

The Federation of Tiny Township Shoreline Associations (FoTTSA), AWARE Simcoe, Friends of the Waverley Uplands and the local farm community are among the many groups that have worked over many years to preserve the exceptional groundwater. For 15 years, the Elmvale Foundation has been raising awareness of the unique quality of these waters, and using this as a tool for public education about our environment.

Powell noted that there's an urgent need for action. "I have visited the slopes and terraces of French's Hill and I have seen the wetlands that occur at every level.

"I have also seen how parts of French's Hill have been stripped of trees and soil, and I understand how this will impact filtration and water quality - with time, almost 50 per cent of the northern section of French's Hill will be impacted in this way."



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THREE GREAT VOLUNTEERS RETIRE

One of the casualties caused from COVID has been to deny organizations the ability to gather to celebrate the commitment that our volunteers do for our Community.

Springwater Fire Station 5 (Elmvale) would like to acknowledge the retirement of three volunteer firefighters with a combined term of approximately 85 years.



Russ Stroud retires from Springwater Fire & Emergency Services after 39 years of service.

Russ Stroud joined the fire department when it was Flos-Elmvale Fire in 1983. After Dick Columbus retired in 1991, Russ stepped in and served as Chief until amalgamation in 1994. Once that happened Russ became the District Chief of Station #5 in Elmvale which is part of the new Springwater Fire & Emergency Services. After a few years Russ chose to step down from District Chief to a Captain's position and then to a regular firefighter's position where he remained until retirement. Personally, I will always remember getting to the fire hall and Russ waiting in the truck for others to get in. Russ was one of the best pumper operators I have worked with. We would barely get the hose lines laid out and set before Russ would have the water on its way.

Russ also took on the task, and will continue to be, our resident historian within Station #5. Russ has put together a very impressive collection of articles and photos from the history of the fire services in Elmvale and area along with a collection of fire fighting artifacts. If you ever get the chance to visit Station #5, ask for a tour to take in the display Russ has put together.

One of Russ's proudest moments was when his daughter, Leslie, joined the Department and became a valuable member of Station #5. Over his 39 years

with the department Russ has helped to mentor and train many new firefighters, especially with driving and pump operation.

The second firefighter we would like to acknowledge is Paul Kenney. Paul joined the Department in 1992 and quickly acquired the skills needed to become a first class firefighter. Paul became our resident tanker operator. He knew where all the water supply areas were in the Township including hydrants, rivers, ponds, etc. He was quick to get there and have things set up to acquire the water needed at fire scenes. Paul also was great at training and mentoring new firefighters. Every firefighter at Station #5 had a great respect and admiration for Paul's talents. Paul retired from the Springwater Fire Service on February 28 2022.

Last, but not least, we would like to acknowledge the service of Scott Tuck. Scott joined the Department in 2002 and it quickly became obvious that he was a great addition to the team at Station #5. Scott was always ready and willing for any challenge. Scott was always the first to be packed up and ready to enter a burning building. Scott always had the tool or gadget needed. We actually named our rescue truck "Gadget" after him. Scott had many talents in fire fighting but his main interest was with auto extrication. He became our training instructor for auto extrication and because of him our firefighters are highly skilled in this area.


still a work in progress.

GBGH officially opens new dialysis site in Midland

Georgian Bay General Hospital (GBGH) officially opened its new Dialysis unit today during a small ceremony held at the Midland site (611 Prospect Boulevard). Formerly provided at the hospital's Penetanguishene site, Dialysis services were permanently relocated to Midland in February 2022 after a four-year approval and construction process. The new site is bright and modern with state-of-theart technology to serve Dialysis patients for decades to follow.

"The ideal location for Dialysis services is in a community setting which is easily accessible and has other amenities, such as other health services, in close proximity," says Gail Hunt, president and CEO, GBGH. "Dialysis units also have very specific requirements for water and HVAC systems, making the search for a location challenging. This newly constructed building meets that criteria and then some, with a bright and modern layout to enhance the patient experience, as well as the equipment and technology to continue providing the highest quality of Dialysis care for many years to come."

The new space includes private treatment spaces for each patient, something not available in the previous site, as well as additional room to increase from the current nine Dialysis stations up to 12 if needed in the future. There is also a nutrition room where patients are able to eat before starting their treatment. Also included in the new space are examination rooms, a waiting room, technical and mechanical

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HIDDEN GEMS

Located at 1898 Gill Rd. in Midhurst, Smith Tract is part of the Ganaraska Trail and is accessed from the same parking lot that provides entry to the Tiffin Tract. Although right next to one another, these tracts provide quite a different experience. For those wanting a longer and more challenging hike, while still enjoying the solitude of less traveled wooded areas, Smith Tract may fit the bill.

Apart from the thundering sound of the train (this path skirts the railway line in a couple of sections) at the very beginning of my journey, this section of forest provided a very pleasantly peaceful experience. I did not encounter anyone else during my two hour hike but was fortunate enough to be visited by a couple of friendly chickadees. No motorized vehicles are allowed in this tract.

The main section of the trail can accommodate three to four people across and involves a gradual change in elevation. There are multiple single file paths that break off from the main trail that offer additional challenges. These narrower trails are quite circuitous and change elevation frequently. These trails mostly go through red and white pine forested areas although you may encounter some deciduous trees as well.



The highlight of this hike was walking along the shores of Bear Creek. The sound of tiny rapids and waterfalls added to the charm of this babbling little brook. Animal footprints were abundant along its banks and in a couple of spots fallen trees made for very convenient bridges. The combination of the rocky creek bed and icy crust made for spectacular photo ops.

Another section of this trail that I quite enjoyed was the swampy section. The flora changes slightly in this area and there is quite a bit of underbrush and shrubbery to manoeuvre around. Dead trees also played a part in the landscape and they stood out in stark contract to the blindingly white snow on the surrounding ground.

With a few days left to enjoy the March Break, why not check out Smith Tract. You won't be

disappointed.

the Alberta rink is skipped by Kevin Koe. I can only imagine what is running through some people's minds when they see Team Canada vs. Team Wildcard on their television guides.

There have been many arguments put out regarding whether or not it is an advantage or disadvantage to curl with three players instead of the standard four. In events like this, and with the importance of sweeping in the game today, it is absolutely a disadvantage to play with three players. One plus though is that two players get to shoot three stones and they may become more aware of the ice conditions, extra practice, etc. -- but that also takes a lot out of you when you have to sweep every single rock. There should be a rule in these events that a team needs to carry an extra player.

When Canada is going through their process to find a team to represent our Country at the World Championships, many countries have already hand selected their teams and funded their seasons with the anticipation of representing their country. This makes it difficult for Canadian teams to prepare for world events. Sometimes it may seem harder to get out of Canada than win the big World events.

"I Will Walk With You", that really struck home with me. A short synopsis of the story is as follows:






On Forging Friendships: Harald loved his newfound home in Canada, loved to share it with new immigrants, welcoming them and helping them get established.

A graveside memorial service will be held at a later date.



CANYON ADVENTURE AND

It was a frosty 38 degree (Fahrenheit)

mid march afternoon about fourteen years ago when my teen son and I o the depths of the Grand Canyon at (south rim). Grand Canyon Village

By the time we hit the bottom flats, I could not bend my knees to step down the last few switchbacks and make it the rest of the way to the Ranch.
