Midland Bay Landing Development Corporation Announces Short List of Pre-Qualified Developers For RFP



Midland Bay Landing Development Corporation (MBLDC) is pleased to announce that a short-list of pre-qualified development companies has been established following a Request for Pre-Qualifications

(RFPQ) process that began in February 2022. Selection criteria included demonstrated experience and financial capability to deliver Midland's 40-acre waterfront redevelopment project. The short-listed development companies are:

Having qualified for the second stage of the selection process, pre-qualified teams will begin preparing proposals in response to a Request for Proposals (RFP) that will be issued before the end of March and is expected to close in May 2022.

RFP Proposals will be submitted to MBLDC's Real Estate Advisor, N. Barry Lyons Consultants, who

Barry Lyons Consultants, who will evaluate the proposals against the criteria defined in the RFP and recommend a developer to MBLDC for approval. In turn, MBLDC anticipates recommending a preferred developer to Council for approval in late June 2022.

An independent Fairness Monitor has been engaged for both the RFPQ and RFP process.

Upon selection, the developer preferred will work in collaboration with both MBLDC and the Town Midland to revitalize 16 hectares (40 acres) of Midland's waterfront into a vibrant, mixed-use commercial and residential neighbourhood adjacent to Midland's historic harbour and recently revitalized Downtown.

A waterfront promenade and multi-use trail along the entire length of the property will



be the signature feature of Midland Bay Landing, combined with new parks and a large public square that will bring 10 acres of new open space to Midland for public use and enjoyment.

New low-rise residential units blended with boutiques, restaurants, artists' lofts, and commercial spaces will transform Midland Bay Landing into a vibrant, live-work-play community that is closely connected to Downtown and the trail network.

In addition, Midland Bay Landing is expected to generate significant new tax revenue that will enable the Town to expand its tax base and offer increased programs and services to the local community.

This June, we in Barrie, Springwater and Oro-Medonte have an opportunity to choose proven, progressive leadership.

While voters in Barrie's north recognize the hard work Mayor Jeff Lehman has done to support business and create jobs and opportunities for Barrie, those in Springwater and Oro-Medonte might not be aware of some of the extremely important things Jeff has been part of that benefit their communities.


Dear editor,


Bearbells and Beagles



The Town of Midland has received a \$287,100

Community Building Fund grant from the Government of Ontario and the Ontario Trillium Foundation. This grant focuses on assisting municipalities, Indigenous communities, and non-profit organizations in the community sport and recreation sectors by supporting repairs, renovations, and/or retrofitting of existing sport and recreation facilities. The Town's grant will be used to resurface tennis courts at Little Lake Park and the basketball court in Bayview Park. "Investments



in community and recreational infrastructure are essential in supporting community development, socialization, and connection," said Jill Dunlop, MPP for Simcoe North. "Through this fund, the Province supports the Town of Midland in revitalizing recreation platforms that will provide residents with upgraded and more accessible courts, building on healthy outdoor activity options for people of all ages." In addition to helping bring doctors closer to home and supporting community members in financial need, past proceeds have gone towards local food banks, local hospice care, student exchanges, bursary programs, public access AED units and more.

Phase 2 Consultation on Growing the Greenbelt

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) is launching the next phase in its consultation on Growing the Greenbelt. Protecting and expanding the Greenbelt have been identified as priorities by the Ontario government and included in its 2020 and 2021 budgets. Last spring, the MMAH conducted the first phase of consultation, which focused on ways to grow the size and enhance the quality of the Greenbelt. Afterwards, the Ministry undertook work to identify potential boundaries to grow the Greenbelt while supporting the need for housing development and job growth.

In the next phase of the consultation (Phase 2), the MMAH is seeking feedback on the proposed changes to the Greenbelt Plan (including the schedules) that could add thirteen new Urban River Valley areas to the Greenbelt. The public and interested stakeholders

Webinar Presentation on Phragmites

Phragmites australis (European Common Reed) is an invasive perennial grass that is spreading rapidly throughout Ontario causing severe impacts in our communities and ecosystems. The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority has developed a Phragmites & Invasive Species Action Plan for dealing with the species in the Nottawasaga Valley Watershed. They have also provided a 1-hour prerecorded webinar for anyone looking for up-todate information on what has been called "Canada's worst invasive plant". Hosted by Watersheds Canada, this presentation outlines why Phragmites is such a concern and what control methods have been used in sensitive habitats. Furthermore, it highlights successful control programs underway in Ontario as well as plans for implementing a province-wide control program. Access the webinar at youtube. com/watch?v=RQ7mlow3lDg.

LDD Moth Management Options

Council received a staff report containing options as outlined by the County of Simcoe to manage the ongoing LDD (Spongy) Moth outbreak. A further staff report was requested to provide a contingency plan with an identified funding source that could be used to mitigate any major infestation on municipal property. Staff were also asked to identify available vendors that can provide bulk treatment pricing for residents and to develop a method for residents to report large LDD Moth outbreaks.

The County of Simcoe, the Ontario Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry, Severn Sound Environmental Association and others have predicted that the current LDD moth infestation is on the decline and project low to moderate defoliation in 2022.

Craig Road Extension Project Update

An update on the status of the Craig Road Extension Project was provided to Council by Staff. Staff are proceeding to implement the project according to the 2009 Class Environmental Assessment Study and 2020 Environmental Study Report. The process to secure a design consultant is underway, and the project will move forward in tandem with the development of Neighbourhood 2. The new two-lane roadway will be approximately 2,750 metres in length, providing an east-west link between Russell Road and County Road 27 as well as an adjacent multi-use trail. It is projected to be open in the fall of 2025.

County of Simcoe Bursary Program

The Township of Springwater will once again participate in the County of Simcoe Bursary Program with a \$1000 donation. The donation guarantees one applicant from Springwater to receive a \$3000 bursary, for which the County of Simcoe will contribute the remaining \$2000.

Municipal Insurance Renewal

The renewal of an insurance policy with BFL Canada for a one-year term at a cost of \$526,380.64 was approved by Council.

Tree Clearing Request – D. Hickling

Council approved a tree clearing request for lands within the D. Hickling Plan of Subdivision. The agreement will allow for tree clearing in authorized areas with no site grading to occur at this stage.

Tree Clearing Request – Midhurst Heights

Council received a request for tree clearing at the Midhurst Heights Subdivision to allow for initial site preparation in Phases 1A, 1B, 1C and 1D. The request was approved with subsequent grading to be subject to a separate agreement once the engineering design is completed.

Animal Control and Pound Services Agreement Renewal

Council approved a two-year agreement ending March 31, 2024 with Devlin Farm Ltd to continue to provide animal control and pound facility services to the Township and its residents at a cost of \$4,500.00 per month.

Ontario Investing in Additional Supports for People Experiencing Homelessness in Simcoe County

New Homelessness Prevention Program Helping Break the Cycle of Home Insecurity

The Ontario government is investing an additional \$25 million annually in a new Homelessness Prevention Program to help more people experiencing or at risk of homelessness find the right housing services and other supports. The new program will simplify and streamline operations so municipal service managers can spend less time on paperwork and more time working with their clients to help find housing and other supports and help those at-risk of homelessness stay in their homes. The additional funding brings Ontario's total yearly investment in the program to close to \$464 million - almost half a billion dollars.

This includes a 2022-23 investment of \$11,352,900.00 for Simcoe County homelessness initiatives, up from the \$10.4 million provided last year under three separate programs.

"Too often well-meaning government programs disappoint because they come wrapped up in bureaucracy and red tape," said Simcoe-Grey MPP Jim Wilson. "Ontario's new Homelessness Prevention Program, and the additional funding that comes with it, will address a growing social challenge in our communities and help ensure that everyone in Simcoe County has a safe place to call home."

"Our government inherited a homelessness prevention system administered through several different government programs that was underfunded, fragmented and overly complex," said Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. "With Ontario's new Homelessness Prevention Program, we are simplifying the delivery of services and increasing funding so our municipal partners can spend more time focusing on providing vulnerable Ontarians with the supports they need to stay in their homes or get the housing they need."

The Homelessness Prevention Program launching on April 1, 2022, combines three programs: Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative, Home for Good, and the Strong Communities Rent Supplement Program. It will give service managers more flexibility to target funding where it is needed the most and allow for greater financial accountability by

measuring service managers' progress in reducing and preventing homelessness in their communities.

Access to this funding will be based on having in place a By-Name List that meets the provincial requirements and contains detailed, up-to-date information from individuals experiencing homelessness to help connect them to local supports.

The government is also investing an additional \$6.7 million in the Indigenous Supportive Housing Program, bringing the total annual investment to \$30 million.

The shortage of housing supply impacts all Ontarians, no matter their background or budget. The province's ongoing work to increase the supply of market housing complements historic investments to increase the supply of supportive and affordable housing for the most vulnerable. As part of the consultations through the Community Housing Renewal Strategy, the government is working with service managers and housing providers to make community housing more efficient and sustainable – helping to protect essential community housing stock and ensure Ontario's most vulnerable people remain housed.


QUICK FACTS

The new investments can be used to fund the operation of supportive housing units created through the province's \$1 billion Social Services Relief Fund (SSRF) – one of the biggest investments the province has made in affordable housing and homelessness supports in Ontario's history. Thanks to Ontario's SSRF, the government is helping to create approximately 1,200 new supportive housing units.

Ontario is also providing the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness with up to \$600,000 in 2022-23 to deliver by-name list training and implementation support related to HPP.

HPP is a direct response to feedback from the 2020-21 Supportive Housing Consultation. The changes made through the creation of the new program address recommendations in the Auditor General's 2021 value-for-money audit on homelessness.



RVH South Campus in Innisfil Advancing Through Provincial Support

Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre's (RVH) future South Campus is moving ahead with the announcement that the Town of Innisfil's request for a Minister's Zoning Order (MZO) was approved by the Hon. Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. This will bring enhanced access to healthcare and new jobs to the region. The MZO accelerates this project.

RVH's 83-acre South Campus site, at the southwest corner of Yonge Street and Innisfil Beach Road, was determined following an extensive three-year selection process, supported by ten thirdparty technical reviews and informed by 63,500 community consultation interactions with a wide range of stakeholders, including, Indigenous partners, environmental groups, vulnerable populations, healthcare partners and patients.

"Community consultation has been foundational to RVH's planning and for three years we've heard from stakeholders in every corner of our region. We understand residents of south Simcoe County want the South Campus built as soon as possible, but developing a hospital is complex and timelines can be long," says Janice Skot, RVH president and CEO. "The MZO provides provincial planning certainty that the South Campus can be built at this location as we continue to follow strict planning criteria. It also well-positions RVH to more quickly to secure provincial approvals for the plan which will improve the healthcare of area residents for generations to come."

The South Campus is part of RVH's integrated "one system; two site" capital plan which will evolve over the next two decades. The first phase of the South Campus, to be built within ten years, will be a Health Hub, focusing on outpatient care, including an Urgent Care Centre. It will expand to become a fullservice hospital, with a 24/7 Emergency Department, operating rooms and a birthing unit within 20 years. At maturity, the South Campus will be about the size of the current North Campus on Georgian Drive, seeing 350,000 patient visits each year.

"This MZO to accelerate the creation of the new South Campus Health Hub is yet another way our government is helping to get shovels in the ground for more hospitals, housing, and long-term care facilities, and build a stronger Ontario for everyone, says Minister Clark. "We will continue to provide our municipal partners, like the Town of Innisfil, with the tools and resources they need to deliver vital projects to their community."

At the same time, RVH's current North Campus will double in size, including a new nine-storey inpatient building. The North and South Campus are completely interdependent; one can't proceed without the other.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has reminded us how important it is to have access to hospital beds and healthcare close to home. The future South Campus will change the healthcare landscape in Simcoe County and ensure the care and well-being of our residents continues to be met long into the future," says Innisfil Mayor Lynn Dollin. "We are grateful to have the support from the province in bringing this critical infrastructure to our community."

RVH and the Town of Innisfil continue to seek feedback from residents on the South Campus through their websites RVHPlanourfuture.ca and Get Involved Innisfil.

History of Libraries

The first libraries consisted of archives of the earliest form of writing – the clay tablets in cuneiform script discovered in temple rooms in Sumer,[some dating back to 2600 BC. About an inch thick, tablets came in various shapes and sizes. Mudlike clay was placed in the wooden frames, and the surface was smoothed for writing and allowed to dry until damp. After being inscribed, the clay dried in the sun, or for a harder finish, was baked in a kiln. For storage, tablets could be stacked on edge, side by side, the contents described by a title written on the edge that faced out and was readily seen. The first libraries appeared five thousand years ago in Southwest Asia's Fertile Crescent, an area that ran from Mesopotamia to the Nile in Africa. Known as the cradle of civilization, the Fertile Crescent was the birthplace of writing, sometime before 3000 BC. (Murray, Stuart A.P.) These archives, which mainly consisted of the records of commercial transactions or inventories, mark the end of prehistory and the start of history. Source: https://en.wikipedia.org/

\$13.2 Billion Child Care Deal will Lower Fees for Families

that supports 300,000 families with expenses in

Ontario and Canada have signed a \$13.2 billion agreement that will lower fees for families and deliver an average of \$10 a day child care by September 2025

Highlights of Ontario's better deal include:

- A federal investment of \$13.2 billion over six years with the province having secured more certainty around out-year funding. The deal includes an additional year of funding of at least \$2.9 billion.
- The flexibility to allocate federal funding in a way that will allow the province to deliver an average of \$10 a day child care, including by spending the initial \$10.2 billion over four years instead of five.
- Enhanced protection against funding shortfalls through a mandated financial review process in year three the first of its kind in any provincial child care deal to reconcile the actual costs of the new national child care plan with funding.
- Reduction of child care fees through four steps of reduction to an average of \$10 a day per child five years old and younger by September 2025.
- Parent rebates, retroactive to April 1, will begin in May.
- Protection of all for-profit and non-profit child care spaces, helping to support predominantly female entrepreneurs across the province who provide high-quality child care services.
- Creation of approximately 86,000 new, highquality child care spaces for children five years old and younger.
- Hiring new early childhood educators and support improved compensation for all Registered Early Childhood Educators (RECEs) working in licensed child care.
- Maintain Ontario's child care tax credit program

Work with municipalities to enrol 5,000 licensed child care centres and home child care agencies into the program between now and September

licensed and unlicensed child care.

"From day one, I said our government wouldn't sign a deal that didn't work for Ontario parents and I'm so proud of the work we've done with our federal partners to land an agreement that will lower costs for families across the province," said Premier Doug Ford. "Given how complex Ontario's child care system is, we wanted to get this right. Today, we're delivering a deal that will keep money in the pockets of hard-working parents."

As a first step, all Ontario families with children five years old and younger in participating licensed child care centres will see their fees reduced, up to 25 per cent, to a minimum of \$12 per day, retroactive to April 1, 2022. In December 2022, parents will see another reduction. In total, fees for families will be reduced in 2022, on average, by 50 per cent, relieving parents of \$1.1 billion in child care costs. Families will see further fee reductions in September 2024, culminating in a final reduction to an average of \$10-a-day child care by September 2025.

Additionally, this agreement supports the creation of 86,000 more licensed child care spaces to address increasing demand, including more than 15,000 licensed child care spaces created since 2019. To maintain the province's high quality of child care, the agreement also supports the recruitment of new early childhood educators, stable compensation for all Registered Early Childhood Educators (RECEs) working in licensed child care, including RECEs providing child care for children six to 12 years old.

"We have secured a deal for Ontario families that will significantly reduce child care costs for working moms and dads, and that starts today", said Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. "We were able to deliver a deal for Ontario families that includes billions in additional funding and a longer agreement that respects parents and provides financial support for families."

To support the child care sector in implementing these new measures, and to ensure the costs of inflation are covered, Ontario is investing \$395 million to ensure RECEs for the 6-12 age group benefit from the wage increases committed to RECEs for the 0-5 age group, as the federal program does not extend support to workers or children age 6-12.


To ensure a sustainable future that protects Ontario taxpayers and puts parents first, the Canada-Ontario agreement also ensures that the cost of implementing the agreement will continue to be monitored by Canada and Ontario with automatic review in year three of the agreement (2024-25). This automatic review mechanism is the first of its kind in any child care agreement in Canada.

Ontario will work with municipalities to enroll over 5,000 licensed child care centres and home child care agencies in the new program between now and September 1. Rebates to parents, retroactive to April 1, will begin in May, and will follow the enrolment of licensed centres and agencies into the new system. Ontario families will continue to benefit from the province's child care tax credit program, which remains in effect. This program provides an estimated 300,000 families with up to 75 per cent of their eligible expenses for licensed and unlicensed child care in centres, home-based care, camps and other

settings.
Ontario's agreement also recognizes its unique position of having the largest child care aged population in Canada and complements the province's world-class, fully funded, full-day kindergarten program for four- and five-year-olds. Over the course of the agreement, Ontario will be investing \$21.6 billion in full-day kindergarten. Together, through the Ontario Child Care Tax Credit (CARE), affordable child care options, and all-day kindergarten, Ontario parents are provided with a full array of options, benefits and supports for early years and child care.

In addition to the investments under the new national agreement, Ontario continues to invest more than \$2 billion a year in early years and child care, including:

- \$1.6 billion to support child care programs, including \$25.5 million for Indigenous-led, offreserve programming
- \$152 million for early years programs and EarlyON centres
- \$49.5 million for child care and child and family programs in First Nation communities
- \$390 million annually to support the Childcare Access and Relief from Expenses tax credit program, with the government providing a onetime, 20-per-cent top-up for the 2021 tax year
- \$3.6 billion a year to provide free, universal, full-day kindergarten for four- and five-yearolds within school settings.

LOVE NATURE: Can Wetlands Help? Heal Our Sick Lakes?

New research conducted by Ducks Unlimited Canada on Lake Erie provides hope that they can.

The Great Lakes region is home to over 30 per cent of Canadians and contains over one-fifth of the world's fresh water supply. Beyond the provision of drinking water, these lakes provide critical habitat for wildlife and offer recreational opportunities for millions of people.



Unfortunately, the growing presence of blue-green algae blooms are making Canada's most iconic lakes sick—and people, pets and wildlife along with them. As climate change threatens to accelerate the conditions under which these potentially toxic algae can thrive, new research completed by Ducks Unlimited Canada (DUC) is delivering a message of hope along with nature-based solutions to support clean water in Canada and beyond.

After two years of research conducted in the Lake Erie watershed, DUC's science is expanding our understanding of how wetlands effectively retain and filter nutrients like phosphorus from water before they travel to our rivers and lakes—reducing the threat of water quality problems like blue-green algae outbreaks. DUC's research took place at restored wetlands on the north side of Lake Erie—one of North America's notorious sick lakes—in a region that continues to experience significant wetland habitat loss.

DUC scientists measured the ability of small, restored wetlands to retain nutrients from water before they move downstream. The wetlands were shown to be effective at settling and processing nutrients, especially the most problematic form of phosphorus (soluble reactive phosphorus) known to contribute to the formation of blue-green algae. The research showed significant nutrient reduction in all four seasons. These results bolster findings from past research conducted by DUC, universities and other institutions, offering further evidence that investments in wetland habitat pay off significantly by flowing cleaner, healthier water into our lakes, year after year.

"We're building the case that restoring the lost functions of wetlands in watersheds can empower communities to help heal their sick lakes," says Bryan Page, the DUC research biologist overseeing the Lake Erie study led by DUC's Institute for Wetland and Waterfowl Research. The North American Wetlands Conservation Act of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service provided funding for both years of the study. Year two of the study was funded in partnership with the Government of Canada via the Great Lakes Protection Initiative, and year one with the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry and the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority. Support from local participating landowners was integral to the research.

Page's colleague, DUC research scientist Pascal Badiou, is working closely with the University of Waterloo and Ducks Unlimited science colleagues on the U.S. side of Lake Erie on a research partnership




that will build on and scale up this knowledge and its applications for healthy watersheds, even in highly developed areas.

"Decisions being made today on land-use planning policy and wetland management are impacting our future," says DUC CEO Larry Kaumeyer. "We now know that even small wetlands can deliver ecosystem services like improved water quality, flood attenuation, and carbon sequestration while providing critical habitat for at-risk wildlife species."

DUC used World Water Day, March 22, to celebrate the completion of the study at a virtual event. It's spring! Almost. Springy-winter. Slushy, sloppy, muddy, wintery spring. Ugly yard season. Spring officially began about a week ago. I remember growing up and March Break could bring a couple scenarios. There could be a week of riding GT Snowracers, skating on ponds, rivers and canals, or it could be a week of warmish, melty street hockey weather. You never knew what you were going to get. We lived in town so walking home from school there would be bits of flat melting ice on the side of the road with the water draining beneath it. This left a small gap of space between the road and the ice. If we jumped up and down on the ice pieces they would crack and break apart. We could then chuck the pieces in the air and smash them on the road. I'm not sure why that was so much fun but if you've done it you know that it was.

There's a spring smell in the air that begins this time of year. I remember thinking that baseball season wasn't too far away when I smelled that spring smell. The evaporator was a great improvement over boiling sap on an open fire between cinder blocks. It was a great improvement over spilling maple syrup into an open fire between cinder blocks. As an added bonus we were able to re-purpose the old piano we had sitting on our junk pile. The kids and I got to play (safely) with axes and it provided much fuel for the boiling process. May it rest in peace.

My dear wife appreciated the new boiling system with its fancy trays. She was very patient with the steady flow of blackened, soot-covered pots and pans coming back in the kitchen from off the fire. Some of those pots and pans disappeared with kids into the backyard never to be seen again. May they rest in peace also.

So enjoy the spring, dads! Do spring things with your kids. Do spring things with axes. Do spring things with fire! Safely of course, as we dads mostly do. Time flies! Make every moment count!

Container Gardening Tips with a Master Gardener

Recently Pat Cook, a gardening expert with the Simcoe County Master Gardeners, discussed healthy container gardening

at The Springwater Library. As a dietitian I know the health benefits of growing your own food (i.e., no pesticides), but I have been nervous to commit to caring for a garden when I can barely keep my houseplants alive. After Pat's library lecture the idea of growing food in containers seems doable and less daunting than digging garden beds in my backyard.

If like me you're ready to try container gardening, read on



Tips for vegetable gardens in containers:

- Include flowers like marigolds, nasturtiums, and sweet alyssum to attract pollinators and beneficial insects (i.e., insects that help to control damaging garden pests).
- Keep in mind how big the mature plant will be at the end of the season and choose the right size pot and location.
- Look for dwarf or patio varieties of tomatoes & peppers.



Use your container space wisely

- Think up, not out and grow vertically. Tomatoes, peas, beans, cucumbers, squash are examples of vegetables that will grow up a trellis, cage or stake and save space.
- Interplant by growing more than one plant in the same container. Tomatoes will grow nicely with basil, or other herbs at their base. Plant fast growing crops like lettuce or arugula between crops such as onions and carrots.

Other

- Containers need careful monitoring for water & fertilizer as they dry out faster and deplete their nutrients more quickly.
- A regular liquid fertilizer every 10-14 days of 10-10-10 is recommended.
- A great way to check if your containers need more water is to lift them up. If they are light weight, they need water.
- Sunlight requirements:
- Full sun (6-8 hours)- tomato, pepper, eggplant,

- melons, cucumber, beans, squash.
- Part sun (4-6 hours)- broccoli, carrots, radishes, beets, turnips and potatoes.
- Low sun/shade (3-4 hours)-arugula, kale, spinach, lettuce and other leafy greens.

WAR AMPS 2022 KEY TAG MAILING BEGINS IN MINESING

The War Amps begins its 2022 key tag mailing to Minesing and surrounding area this week with the theme "You Make Our Programs Possible."

This is illustrated through the story of 12-year-old Cooper Tidmarsh who lost part of his right leg in a lawn mower accident. Cooper, a member of The War Amps Child Amputee (CHAMP) Program, receives financial assistance for artificial limbs and devices and also attends regional seminars where Champs and their parents learn about the latest in artificial limbs, dealing with teasing and staring, and parenting an amputee child.

The Key Tag Service was launched in 1946 so that returning war amputee veterans could not only work for competitive wages, but also provide a service to Canadians that would generate funds for the Association's many programs, including CHAMP. The Key Tag Service continues to employ amputees and people with disabilities, and has returned more than 1.5 million sets of lost keys to their owners.

Each key tag has a confidentially coded number. If you lose your keys, the finder can call the toll-free number on the back of the tag or place them in any mailbox in Canada, and The War Amps will return them to you by courier, free of charge.

The War Amps receives no government grants and its programs are possible through public support of the Key Tag and Address Label Service.

Annie's Journal

There's a story in 1 Kings 12:1-7 that demonstrates how resting certain words provides physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual rest. After King Solomon died: his son, Rehoboam, became

king.

And Rehoboam went to Shechem, for Israel had gone to Shechem to make him king. So it happened, when Jeroboam the son of Nebat heard it (he was still in Egypt, for he had fled from the presence of King Solomon and had been dwelling in Egypt), that they sent and called him.

Then Jeroboam and the whole assembly of Israel came and spoke to Rehoboam, saying, "Your father made our yoke heavy; now therefore, lighten the burdensome service of your father, and his heavy yoke which he put on us, and we will serve you."

So he (Rehoboam) said to them, "Depart for three days, then come back to me." And the people departed.

Then King Rehoboam consulted the elders who stood before his father Solomon while he still lived, and he said, "How do you advise me to answer these people?"

And they spoke to him saying, "If you will be a servant to these people today, and serve them, and answer them, and speak good words to them, then they will be your servants forever."

The words of the elders seem to be good wisdom for us today. To speak good words means we must lay to rest words of condemnation, words of harmful criticism, hurtful words, confusing words, words of despair - lay to rest every word that is not filled with the love of God, that is not reflecting, revealing and resembling the character of God.

Following the advice of these elders will make our description of the love of God believable. The evidence will be in our words and actions. Spiritual change in our behaviour is always convincing proof of God's ability to transform our lives.

In our case, being a servant to the people around us helps the Holy Spirit lead them to serve God forever. This is one way we can help the Gospel be alive in the world.

By making the decision to speak only good words, we rest our physical bodies from the upset of negative emotional responses; we rest our minds from the turmoil of negative thoughts and words; and we rescue ourselves from the struggle between speaking good words in love vs the harmful words our human hearts sometimes want to shout.

This doesn't mean that there won't be times when we must speak a word of correction, but by cultivating the habit of speaking good words, even our words of correction can become pearls of wisdom and comfort.

Are you wondering if King Rehoboam heeded the elders' words? The story continues in 1 Kings chapter 12. Unfortunately, verse 8 describes what some of us do from time to time.

May we begin to think of rest as more than just physical rest. God's rest embodies our full being. May we surrender to His care, by His grace and for His glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Annie's Devotions is a very popular Springwater News column. We are grateful for her inspiring words. Her husband has written to the Springwater News in the past and here is his latest update. God bless them both.

Today is my 79th birthday and I am very happy to be able to write about my health. All my life everyone has always asked me how old I was and me being reluctant at disclosing my age, I wouldn't tell, and then in these latest years I would say I will be 100 on my next. But now I am very happy to tell my age, a few years back I asked the Lord to let me live to 82, but now that is to close, an extension to a bigger number is needed.

Since January 2021 I was told I had cancer and it is in my lungs on both sides and probably stage 4, but they are not sure so maybe stage 3. They, {RVH} team which I will say, treated me very well said 6 months to a year to live. And here I am today over that timeline and looking forward to more.

I agreed to do 30 treatments of radiation and 6 treatments of chemo which they recommended. That was finished in august, then I was put on a program of immunotherapy weekly for indefinite time. The pills and the side effects were severe, so they reduced the ratio, which helped, but they suggested that I do 1 strong treatment of radiation on my left side lung as it had increased in size since the last CT scan, followed by another 6 chemo treatments.

I took the radiation treatment and was told that 1 out of three people will experience high pain level. I was one of those, and the pain shot through the roof even with the strong pills I took. But after a few days the pain dropped back better than before, with the hydromorphone pills supplemented with Tylenol

extra strength. Then there was the 6 chemo treatments that were to be very high to deal with. I took 1 of that chemo and experienced very bad side effects along with nose bleeds and very strong pills. I was going to be taking around 15 pills daily for chemo, constipation, cholesterol, and pain management.

Now, again I stopped chemo and am on pain pills to control pain as needed. The cancer has moved into my bones according to the last CT. I felt a very sore spot on my back starting back in October, that had always been cured by the chiropractor, but not this time. I am taking 24mg of hydromorphone daily now and sometimes Tylenol to help me through the 24

Today on my birthday I feel great, and my appetite is coming back a bit, I weigh 158 lbs. I have been to the mandarin buffet before the latest shut down but come away dissatisfied with the small amount of food I eat, the treatments will do that to you.

The nurse comes by every 2 weeks to check up on me and take my vitals, she is very happy with the results and so am I.

I can cook for myself at the moment and take care of myself, because Ann is recovering from CV19.

Praise be to God that He watches over us all as He promised. But if He let's me live till he comes or puts me to sleep to await His arrival, Thanks be to God. Blessings Ed



County of Simcoe Meeting Highlights

Earth Hour

Each year, at 8:30 p.m. on the last Saturday of March, supporters from over 190 countries and territories unite to raise awareness of the issues facing our Earth.

On March 26 we once again ask residents to participate in the Earth Hour celebrations by switching off all non-essential lights for 60 minutes. This simple action helps towards a better future for us and our planet. An hour that could change decades.

County of Simcoe Paramedic Services 2021 Response Time Performance and Defibrillator **Registration and Public Access Act Update**

As per the Ambulance Act, every year all Paramedic Services are required to report their Response Time Performance Plan's response targets and actuals to the Ministry of Health, to be reported no later than March 31st of the following year.

On March 8, 2022, Council received a report on response time performance, which highlighted that all response time targets were met in 2021 overall. While the report identified some challenges in Q3, these were attributed to peak call volume for the year coupled with staffing challenges across local hospitals, paramedic services and some allied agencies. There was a subsequent rebound in Q4 metrics as call volume slightly reduced.

On March 8, 2022, Council also received a report on the status and implications of Bill 141, which will create a province-wide registry of publicly accessible automated external defibrillators (AED), mandate AEDs are located, ensure they are registered with Ambulance dispatch centres and make the AED locations identifiable and accessible for members of the public to use to offer a greater chance of patient survival. The County of Simcoe has completed a stakeholder survey and await the results of this process, the release of regulations and the final date the Act will come in effect.

Georgian Manor Long-Term Care Home Bed **Expansion Announcement**

As the regional provider of specialized Behavioural Support Services to all 26 long-term care homes in the North Simcoe Muskoka (NSM) catchment area and as a member of the Specialized Geriatric Services (SGS) program led by Waypoint Centre for Mental Health, the County has been engaged in ongoing planning discussions over the past decade to establish a behavioural support transitional unit (BSTU) in this region.

Following a comprehensive review and consultation process, Ontario Health Central (formally NSM LHIN) has approved Georgian Manor to host a 16- bed BSTU, subject to provincial funding for additional operational costs to support this level of care. The approval to construct an additional 16 beds will ensure Georgian Manor can maintain existing bed capacity for long-term care services as well as operate an additional specialized behavioural support program in the home.

On March 22, 2022, Council approved that subject to provincial approval and operational funding, that a regional BSTU be established and operated. The BSTU will house individuals with greater behavioural needs due to their illness or condition, and as such require more specialized care and supervision.

On March 8, 2022, Council received the Simcoe County Forest 2021 Annual Report, which highlighted exceptional values attained through timber sales; the planting of 30,750 seedlings, primarily at the Packard Tract; management of invasive species, insects and pathogens; and special projects, such as the Coughlin Stream Crossing and Rehabilitation.

OPP Officers Providing Speed Enforcement in Community Speeding and Traffic Complaint

During the month of February 2022, uniform officers from the Southern Georgian Bay detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have responded to public complaints of motorists and commercial vehicles speeding and other related traffic violations on area roadways.

Calls to the OPP Communications Centre and through the OPP Online Reporting have been recorded and acted upon as follows:

- Officers attended 53 complaint areas and issued 294 tickets and warned 192 drivers for their driving infractions.
- 119 Hours of focused patrol in these noted
- Officers conducted R.I.D.E. at 99 check stops checking 831 vehicles for signs of impairment along with trail side R.I.D.E. checks of 568 snowmobiles.
- 8 Charges of impaired driving were issued after investigation.
- 11 Drivers provided breath samples on a Roadside Screening Device (ASD) at those R.I.D.E. check stops.
- 6 Dangerous Driving Charges were issued after investigation. 3 Charges of flight from police were issued
- after investigation
- 2 Drivers were charged with driving while prohibited under the Criminal Code of Canada 2 Drivers lost their driving privileges and
- vehicles after they were stopped and charged for a stunt driving offence - exceeding the posted speeds limits as follows with the introduction of the Moving Ontario More Safety Act, also known as the MOMS Act to increase road safety.

The first change is an increase in the previous seven-day vehicle impoundment period to 14 days. The second change is the introduction of a lower speed threshold for street racing offenders on municipal roads. On roads with a posted speed limit of less than 80 km/h, drivers caught traveling 40 km/h over the speed limit face racing/stunt driving charges (the previous limit was 50 km/h over the speed limit).

Ontario Building a Stronger, More Resilient Stevenson Memorial Hospital

Expanded Services Will Improve Patient Care in Simcoe County

As part of its plan to build a stronger and more resilient health care system that is better prepared to respond to crisis, the Ontario government is expanding services that will be offered at Stevenson Memorial Hospital as part of its redevelopment plan. With this next stage of approval completed, Ontario is one step closer to getting shovels in the ground to upgrade the hospital and improve access to care for patients and families in Simcoe County.

"After decades of under investment from previous governments, we are delivering on our promise to bring communities all across Ontario the quality health care they deserve," said Premier Doug Ford. "With this redevelopment, Stevenson Memorial will be able to provide the people and families of Simcoe County the critical services they need closer to where they live."

In 2019, the government provided Stevenson Memorial Hospital with \$1 million for Phase 1 of the hospital's redevelopment. Since then, the hospital has worked closely with the province to finalize expanded services that will better meet the needs of patients and families. Once Phase 1 is completed, the redeveloped hospital will include:

a new emergency department that is triple the size of the current department;

expanded diagnostic and surgical services;

a brand new birthing suite; and

space to accommodate nine new inpatient beds at the hospital, increasing the total number of beds from 38 to 47.

"Investing in Stevenson Memorial Hospital is a key part of our government's plan to build a stronger, more resilient health care system and end hallway health care for all Ontarians," said Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "Patients

and families in Simcoe County can look forward to a new and expanded services that will benefit them for generations to come."

Ontario is working with Stevenson Memorial Hospital to progress to the next stage of the planning process, which includes designing the new redeveloped hospital and finalizing operational, space and funding requirements for the expanded services.

"We need to meet the health care needs of our community, while we build for the future growth of our region. Preparation is the key to success. Expanding services will mean that we are better prepared to respond and can act quickly, which is especially crucial in the health care field. People want to feel confident that when they need help, help will be available. This redevelopment goes a long way to ensure that in our community."

Our family was lucky enough to have a cottage on Bass Lake, near Orillia (off 14th Line Oro then) from the late fifties to the late seventies.

We Torontonians (the Pillings) would head up as early as the unplowed private lane would allow us. At times, we would even park at the end of the lane and trek through a quarter mile of snow just to escape the city, mid-winter.

With Springs' arrival, there would only be a skiff of



snow and we could actually spend a weekend on the lake in our un-insulated, log style, frame dwelling. It had three small bedrooms and an open area where the oil space-heater was quickly put to use after a peek for mice or other creatures taking good advantage of our absence. Every bedroom had a pee-pot and if brave, you'd get exercise by running outside to the 'out-house' (more on those adventures to come).

The kitchen featured a long snack-bar type counter (it actually was one) with 6 vintage stools you could



twirl around on to your hearts content! The kitchen had an old metal pitcher pump where you'd pump about fifty times to get prime from the old dug well out front. The forties style McClary electric stove came in handy because; it was grounded. Now that was important because in a bad lightning storm, there was apt to be a flash of blue light that jumped from the pump's spout to the stove. You did not, I repeat, did not stand in the kitchen between those two fixtures in a thunderstorm!

The first trip up would always be exciting for myself and three older brothers. After settling in and doing our chores (that's what we used to call work without allowance lol), we knew we could take off, disappear, escape to the forest! As soon as I was able to whine loud enough to make my brothers take me along with them, I experienced what would be an annual event, the hike to the Sugar Shack!

If I recall correctly, it was the old Langman Farm that would 'forgive us our trespasses'. The long walk into the woods and over some old stone fences would eventually lead us to a path past a stream and up to an old wooden shack. Along the way we stopped to lift the lids of the pails of water. At least that's what

I thought it looked like. A few bugs would be doing the backstroke in there and I'd rescue them out of danger for my good deed of the day.

You could smell sweetness in the the air before you the generous billowing steam out from above the shack's weathered tin roof. This was my first time and I'll never forget it! We peeked in the open door where two old guys (everyone is old when you are five lol) were busy inside. One was



stoking the fire and the other pouring pails of what looked like water into a huge metal trough where a rolling boil of amber liquid was the centre of attention. I was too shy to say a word, but I listened well (even at that age). They showed us the wood barrels of sap collected from the Sugar Maples in the forest we had just hiked through. That was a lot of sap! They explained the process to us, and I found it hard to believe that forty barrels would give them only one barrel of the 'sweet gold' I was about to taste.

The one fellow (must have been old man Langman himself?) took a soup ladle and dipped us out some sap to slurp up as best we could. I was not too impressed with this myself, as in those days Kool-Aid was King! He then took that same ladle and dipped it into the boiling, frothing mixture to extract a generous sample of pure golden liquid. He held the ladle atop an open barrel of sap for a minute or so to cool. The fun began then as we each took a turn to sip from the ladle. All I can say is "I was hooked!!". We were just so excited, and they got a kick out of seeing the 'shy one' grin from ear to ear! A small bottle was gifted to us and we practically ran the whole way back to the now warm and cozy cottage to share our prize. Surely, pancakes would be the best idea for supper!!

Just to bring back memories, I decided to tap my very own Sugar Maple for the first time ever, here at Orr Lake. With about ten quarts (40 cups) collected over the last few weeks, I expect my 'cup of gold' to be the best ever!
