Mar. 20, 2023 - With the 1000 Mile Challenge Completed I am left with a huge feat of endurance completed and a lifetime of memories.

1015 miles 27 hours and women all over North America inspired to "do hard things". There were many times I was laying on the ground and crawling away from my sled, wanting out, but my team kept me in it, reminded me of who I am and how much the women and girls in this country needed to see me get up and finish it. I have hundreds of comments and messages from women telling me how emotional it was to watch because once we went over the time everyone wanted to see me finish. The viewers increased as time went on, donations poured in with one man donating \$1 for every minute Lisa and Jeffrey went over 5, another man matching it with a third saying he was donating \$10 an hour. A woman so emotional and inspired put a post up asking all

women to donate \$25 for Lisa and it raised alone over \$5000 because the women wanted to see me finish. So did I finish in time no but did I go the distance and not ever quit I certainly did. I believe women needed someone to show them we can do hard things and women were built to do hard things. We can certainly compete for our place in a male dominated arena with courage determination and pure grit.

The whole event still makes me very emotional because although I didn't do it I'm 24 hours I rode an additional 3 with Jeffrey O'Donnell and rode through a blinding blizzard, snow dust, 6 moose sightings with the third being aggressive having a stand off with me on the trail, Jeff's sled broke down at the very start, I was physically exhausted, the trail conditions were horrendous and we had the recreational snowmobilers to contend with and patrol stopping us. It was the hardest thing I have ever done,

although if asked if I would do it again I would. Matter of fact I hear a World Record calling.

So the event was successful and we reached close to 90% of our original \$250,000 goal to send as many kids to camp as possible and I'm incredibly proud of what I've done.

With this year's return of the Elmvale Maple Syrup Festival, the board would like to offer some clarification as to why the festival has relocated from the main street to the arena parking area. This change is not something that has just been decided; at the Tree Lighting Ceremony the year previous to the pandemic, our plan was announced to relocate the vendors from the main street to the arena. For several years prior to the pandemic, in consultation with Springwater Township, the safety of the festival attendees has been a concern. It was becoming increasingly difficult to facilitate the closure of the main street.

In order to protect the safety of the festival goers, it has been determined that large concrete blocks must be placed at both ends of the main street to prevent any vehicle from entering the crowded vendor area. Part of the requirements stipulate that a large front end loader also be present at each end, with an operator on stand-by for the duration of the closure, to allow access of emergency vehicles to the main street area. An alternative to this would be to park fully loaded snow plow trucks at each entrance, again with an operator standing by for the duration of the closure. The financial cost to facilitate these measures is simply something the festival would not be able to afford.

With the world ever changing, the recent attack with

a vehicle on pedestrians in Quebec, killing two and injuring 9 others is the type of tragedy we are trying to prevent.

The Maple Syrup Committee understands that a number of the businesses on the main street have concerns and are disappointed with this decision. The festival has hired OPP paid duty officers to provide traffic control at the cross walk by the library, to allow safe access for the festival goers to cross to and from Maria St. The pancake house remains in the Community Hall and we will encourage all festival participants to visit the Elmvale business section.

The Elmvale Maple Syrup Festival Committee is a group of volunteers who donate countless hours to be able to hold the festival, which for the past 50+ years has been responsible for bringing hundreds of thousands of visitors to our community, and in turn allowing hundreds of thousands of dollars to be donated to various organizations in Elmvale and the surrounding area.

We thank everyone for their understanding and we hope to see you on April 29th.

We are soon approaching the date (APRIL 12th) on which our elected township officials will determine the fate of the Seadon road landscape. Will they allow our beautiful greenspace to remain untouched or will they permit Galibier Materials to desecrate 21 Hectares of forested land to add yet another gravel pit to the Springwater community.

Just a reminder that Springwater already contains 13 pits/quarries within a 10km radius of this location, and a total of 30 pits/quarries within 25km (all less than 10 minute drive away.) We do NOT need any more aggregate pits in Springwater!!

In the words of our newly elected Mayor,

"I really feel that people who live in Springwater identify with the space, the openness, the forest, the trees. That's what makes Springwater different and you know when you're not in Barrie anymore." said Mayor Jennifer Coughlin

'Springwater is more than just a township, it is a way of life; our trails, wetlands, forests and farms provide a landscape that is incomparable. However, it is the people that make Springwater so extraordinary." Instagram - Jennifer Coughlin Instagram Page

I personally couldn't agree more with our Mayor's statement. My family and I moved here 6 years ago for many of the reasons listed above. Never in our wildest dreams did we ever expect to be faced with a proposed active gravel pit operation within 30m of my home, my yard and where we and our children play and relax. During our time here, there has already been a significant increase in noise pollution and truck traffic along George Johnston/Seadon, and an insufferable amount of dust/dirt which coats everything inside and outside our property. I just can't imagine how much this will all increase even further with 21 additional hectares of aggregate mining so close to our beautiful residential area.

The Licence application by Galibier Materials is now in the hands of the Ministry of Natural Resources to decide whether to allow yet another pit in our beautiful township.

Mar. 27, 2023 - During the last regular council meeting held on March 15, Township of Springwater Council approved the renewal of the non-resident recreation fee agreement with the City of Barrie until February 27, 2027, for a total cost of \$345,100. This agreement offers Springwater residents access to Barrie's recreational services for the same rate as its residents.

The Key Tag Service was launched in 1946 so that returning war amputee veterans could not only work for competitive wages, but also provide a service to Canadians that would generate funds for the Association's many programs, including CHAMP. The Key Tag Service continues to employ amputees and people with disabilities and has returned more than 1.5 million sets of lost keys to their owners.

Each key tag has a confidentially coded number. If you lose your keys, the finder can call the toll-free number on the back of the tag or place them in any mailbox in Canada, and The War Amps will return them to you by courier, free of charge.

The War Amps receives no government grants and its programs are possible through public support of the Key Tag and Address Label Service.



## Ask a Therapist: On Mental Rest

March 27, 2023

Q: I can't seem to settle my mind: I am forgetful, scattered, have difficulty making decisions, and I think about things over and over in my head! How can I get my mind to stop racing?

**A:** More and more of our therapy clients report that they cannot get their minds to settle down or stop thinking. They often feel distressed by intrusive thoughts or repeating thoughts and it is hard to cultivate a peaceful mind. They feel distracted or confused and can't seem to get the clarity they need for themselves in terms of their thinking patterns or their direction in life and relationships.

Sometimes this mental stress can be related to common cognitive distortions but sometimes it is simply that your mind is tired and it needs to rest. (For more information about cognitive distortions from our previous series visit our blog on CoveyWellnessCentre.com) We expect a lot from our minds and we can easily overload them with work projects, financial worries, relationship challenges, personal difficulties, care for loved ones, schedule management, and the myriad of decisions that need to be made each day. It's no surprise that many people feel that they are just on a hamster wheel making no progress when it comes to their mental health. Mental fatigue can be the result of many things but certainly it can be a symptom of simply having too many thoughts to sort through and not enough time or support to do so. Many people feel stuck mentally and long for something to change.

In her book, Sacred Rest, Dr. Saundra Dalton-Smith describes mental rest as a place where you sense mental peace and quiet and you don't have thoughts jumping around. When we are mentally well-rested we can process effectively and make clear decisions. We can know and understand what we think and form our opinions and next steps. We feel calm and collected and we are able to reflect effectively and respond from a sound mind. We can feel safe and able to simply be without thinking.

There are many tools that can be used to help the mind get the rest that it needs. Among the most popular are breathwork, psychotherapy, journalling, time in nature, and meditation (often in the form of mindfulness or prayer). There are several specific strategies within those categories that therapists employ to empower clients to take care of their mental health and there is a growing number of resources online and via apps to help cultivate an experience of greater mental calm.

Mental overload IS exhausting so don't hesitate to reach out for help if you are finding it difficult to settle and collect your thoughts or to have moments of mental rest in your day. Talk about your struggles with a trusted friend and/or begin to explore some research around mindfulness or breathing techniques. Reach out to a mental health professional who is trained to help you address this mental fatigue and to guide you to a renewed sense of peace and clarity. Don't underestimate the importance of a wellrested mind. Just like a well-rested body is directly connected to our overall well being, the health of our minds impacts all aspects of our lives.

Lastly, don't forget to check out one of the largest one day Maple Syrup Festivals in Ontario coming up





Mar. 6, 2023 - Have you spent any time driving around in a foreign country? The rules aren't the same, are they? Have you driven on the wrong, ahem, other side of the road in England? Have you driven through the dusty trails on an African safari? I've never done it but I've heard rumors that you can just fly down the Autobahn in Germany and there's not actually a speed limit! Can anyone verify that one?

I don't think I've ever actually driven in other countries besides the United States. I've visited a few far-off places but I'm not usually the one responsible for avoiding potholes and ostriches and motorcycle (moto) drivers and cube vans and bicycles and Volkswagen Beetles and dump trucks. My kids were pretty interested in watching the roads when we arrived in the Dominican Republic last week and picked up our rental van.

## **Update From Doug Downey MPP**

## Ontario Government and Ontario Association of Optometrists Reach Historic Agreement

Association of Optometrists (OAO) ratified a new four-year funding agreement with the Government of Ontario. The changes in this agreement are based on the best available clinical evidence and expert opinion for providing people appropriate eye care, as well as the expert advice the OAO provided over months of bilateral discussions with the Ministry of

Beginning April 1, 2023, payments to optometrists will increase for some OHIP insured optometry services and for eye exams provided to social assistance recipients.

On September 1, 2023, changes included in the agreement will begin to help increase access to care for people with chronic diseases such as glaucoma and ocular complications due to diabetes. Seniors diagnosed with an eligible medical condition requiring ongoing monitoring will continue to receive an OHIP-insured annual eye exam as well as two follow-up minor assessments. Seniors who do not have an eligible medical condition, such as macular degeneration, glaucoma or diabetes, will continue to receive preventative eye care through an OHIP-insured eye exam every 18 months, as well as two additional follow-up minor assessments.

There are no changes under this agreement to the eligibility coverage for children or Ontarians receiving social assistance.

Changes for Seniors (65 or older) Effective September 1, 2023.

#### **Annual Eye Exams**

**Current:** One exam every 12 months for all seniors aged 65 years or older.

**Change:** Seniors with eligible medical conditions affecting their eyes such as macular degeneration, glaucoma or diabetes will continue to receive one exam every 12 months. Seniors without an eligible medical condition will receive one exam every 18 months.

Rationale: This change reflects consensus reached between the OAO and the Ministry of Health on an appropriate amount of OHIP coverage over this timeframe based on the best clinical evidence and prioritizes seniors with the highest needs. This change also aligns with other provinces, such as Manitoba and Nova Scotia, which insure eye exams every 24 months for healthy seniors.

## **Minor Follow-Up Assessments**

**Current:** Seniors aged 65 and older are eligible to receive an unlimited number of minor follow-up assessments following the annual eye exam.

Change: Seniors with eligible medical conditions affecting their eyes can receive two minor follow-up assessment exams every 12 months following the annual eye exam. Seniors without an eligible medical condition can receive two minor follow-up assessment exams every 18 months following the annual eye exam.

Rationale: This change reflects consensus reached between the OAO and the Ministry of Health on an appropriate amount of OHIP coverage over this timeframe based on the best clinical evidence and prioritizes seniors with the highest needs. This change also aligns with Alberta, which has a limit of one minor assessment per 12-months unless there are special circumstances.

## Changes to Coverage for Eligible Medical Conditions Effective September 1, 2023

## Amblyopia and Strabismus

**Current:** Adults aged 20 to 64 with amblyopia (lazy eye) and strabismus (misaligned eyes) are eligible to receive OHIP insured eye exams.

**Change:** Adults aged 20 to 64 who have sudden onset of strabismus will continue to be insured. Monitoring children with these conditions will continue to be insured. Adults aged 20 to 64 with

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On Tuesday March 21, 2023, members of the Ontario either of these conditions will continue to be able to seek medical care from a primary care provider in response to any complications or acute concerns.

**Rationale:** Clinical evidence demonstrates that monitoring these conditions is most effective in early childhood when the eye has not yet stabilized and when treatment can have an impact. This change also aligns with other provinces, including Manitoba, Quebec, Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan.

#### **Diabetes**

**Current:** Documented history of diabetes is required in order to be eligible to receive an insured eve exam.

**Change:** Optometrists can clinically assess and verify whether a patient has diabetes in order to receive an insured eye exam.

**Rationale:** This change empowers optometrists to clinically assess their patients and is informed by expert advice from the OAO to help ensure care is available to those that need it most. This is consistent with all other provinces that cover these services.

#### **Cataracts**

**Current:** Eye exams are insured by OHIP for people with cataracts, even when they do not experience decreased vision that impacts their daily life.

**Change:** Eye exams will continue to be insured for adults with cataracts that have clinically significant decreased vision that impacts their daily life, or when a surgery referral is made.

**Rationale:** For many people, cataracts are caused by normal changes in their eyes as they age and go unnoticed. Clinical evidence demonstrates that monitoring patients who do not experience clinically significant decreased visual quality or require surgical treatment does not lead to improved health outcomes.

#### Uveitis

**Current:** Only people with uveitis (inflammation inside your eye) that is reoccurring receive an insured eye exam, regardless if it is currently inflamed or not.

**Change:** OHIP will insure an eye exam for any person if uveitis is currently inflamed (whether it is reoccurring or not).

**Rationale:** This change is informed by clinical evidence and expert advice from the OAO that identifying and treating uveitis when it is active is the most effective way of treating the condition. Monitoring of this condition does not reduce the risk of reoccurrence.

## Retinal Eye Disease, Corneal Disease and Optic Pathway Disease

**Current:** People with these conditions, regardless of it being active or not, are eligible for an insured eye exam at any time.

**Change:** People with active cases of these conditions will be insured under OHIP.

**Rationale:** This change is informed by clinical evidence and expert advice that monitoring conditions does not reduce the risk of reoccurrence once these conditions have stabilized, become inactive or no longer require treatment.

## Visual Field Assessments

Current: Visual field assessments, which are tests to measure the extent of what the eye sees in any direction without movement, are available to all OHIP patients even if they don't have a condition that would benefit from the test.

Change: People who benefit from this assessment, including those who are diagnosed with retinal disease, glaucoma, active optic pathway disease, acquired cranial nerve palsy causing strabismus, and those who require ocular drug toxicity screening, will be eligible for an OHIP-insured visual field assessment.

**Rationale:** This change is informed by expert advice from the OAO that there is no clinical need for people without these conditions to receive these tests.

#### <u>Changes to Eye Exam Referral Forms Effective</u> <u>September 1, 2023</u>

**Current:** People can obtain a referral letter from their primary care provider to receive an OHIP-insured eye exam from an optometrist.

**Change:** People with an eligible medical condition will be able to receive an insured eye exam from an optometrist without a referral letter.

**Rationale:** People with eligible medical conditions will continue to receive the appropriate level of OHIP insured care based on clinical evidence.

## Ontario Helping Low-Income Seniors

Government investing in the proposed expansion of the GAINS program

March 24, 2023 from Ministry for Seniors and Accessibility TORONTO — Ontario is supporting low-income seniors by proposing to expand the Guaranteed Annual Income System (GAINS) program to about 100,0000 more seniors and indexing the program annually to inflation.

Announced as part of the 2023 Budget: Building a Strong Ontario, the proposed expanded GAINS program would begin in July 2024.

"Our government is working for the Ontario seniors who have built this province so they can live comfortably and with dignity," said Peter Bethlen-falvy, Minister of Finance. "By expanding and annually indexing the GAINS program, we are providing financial support to more vulnerable low-income seniors and ensuring that when their costs rise due to inflation, our support also increases."

The provincial government is also investing close to \$1 million over three years to expand the Seniors Safety Line. This province wide resource is available 24/7 to help seniors who are experiencing or at risk of elder abuse, by connecting them with trained counsellors who can support and assist them.

"Our government is working hard for Ontario's seniors. They deserve to have steady and reliable programs, services and income supports now and into the future," said Raymond Cho, Ontario Minister for Seniors and Accessibility. "Increasing our investment in the GAINS program helps our most vulnerable seniors. They deserve dignity and respect, and this shows that our government takes the wellbeing of seniors very seriously."

In addition to providing support for seniors, the government's plan is taking significant actions to Build Ontario by driving economic growth, attracting new jobs and investments, and getting key infrastructure projects built faster. By working for workers, keeping costs down, and providing better services, the government is building a strong Ontario that is working for seniors, families, and businesses.

## **Quick Facts**

- As of January 2023, the Ontario government doubled the GAINS payment for all recipients for 12 months. This measure will increase the maximum GAINS payment to \$166 per month for single seniors, and to \$332 per month for couples a maximum increase of almost \$1,000 per person in 2023.
- You must file a tax return each year to be eligible for the GAINS program, even if you do not have income to report.

Meet at the Interpretive Centre (500 Tiny-Flos Townline, off County Rd. 6). Wear long sleeves and pants, sturdy footwear, a hat and gloves. Bring a water bottle. A tool to lever out the root - a dandelion weeder or small trowel is helpful. Bring one or use one of ours.

Garlic Mustard is an invasive herb native to Europe. It was brought to North America in the early 1800s for use as a nutritious edible herb. Since its arrival in North America it has escaped into the wild and is now one of Ontario's most aggressive forest invaders, crowding out native plants, including tree seedlings (the next generation for the forest) and woodland plants like Trillium and Trout Lily.

Garlic Mustard seeds are easily spread by people and animals. They can remain in the soil for up to 30 years and still be able to sprout. The plant's roots release chemicals that adversely affect the growth of other plants. The plant can grow in a wide range of sunny and fully shaded habitats. It does not provide a valuable food source or habitat for native wildlife.

- 1 ½ teaspoon minced garlic or ½ teaspoon (2.5 ml) garlic powder
- ½ teaspoon (2.5 ml) paprika (optional)
- 1 teaspoon (5 ml) Worcestershire sauce (optional)

## **Jo Knows Nutrition**

- 1 teaspoon (5 ml) salt
- 2 cups (500 ml) homemade or store-bought tomato sauce
- 2 tablespoons (30 ml) tomato paste (optional-makes the dish more flavourful)
- 1 ½ cups (instant white or brown rice, uncooked)
- 3/4 cup (188 ml) water
- 1/2 cup (125 ml) shredded Cheddar cheese or plant-based cheese

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat. If using beef, cook first and then drain the excess fat from the skillet. Note: plant-based meat or mushrooms can be cooked with the other ingredients and does not need to be drained.
- 2. In the skillet combine the meat, mushrooms or plant-based meat, onion, bell pepper, garlic, paprika, Worcestershire sauce and salt and cook until vegetables are tender, stirring occasionally.
- 3. Add tomato sauce, tomato paste, rice and water and stir to combine. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cover and simmer for 10 minutes or until the rice is tender
- 4. Remove from the heat and stir once more. Sprinkle with cheese and let stand for 2 minutes or until cheese melts before serving.

## **Bearbells** by Leslie Noonan



Mar. 27, 2023 - This is the time of year, when the temperature swings from warm enough to send trickles of thawing water down icy rivulets, and then back again to sub-zero temperatures with arctic winds, that can be a nightmare for hikers. The trails are either too

wet and muddy, or too icy to safely navigate. Well, I have a trick for this, a secret, a way to navigate many trails without getting muddy or flailing through rotten snow and ice.



I arrived at the parking area for Wildman Forest just off concession 4 west of Wyevale and then onto the little used Wildman sideroad. I am intensely curious who this wild man is, that the forest is named for. After all, should I be concerned about some heavily bearded and loin clothed man jumping out from behind a tree? Hmmm, maybe. Though to be honest, nowadays that really shouldn't surprise me. This is why I carry bear spray. Not for the random bear who is uninterested in me, but for the wildlife that runs around on two feet.

Just getting into the parking area can be a challenge,

as I am not sure who occasionally ploughs the area navigating the trails in this intermittent season

for parking. Today I made the decision to make a run at the snowbank to get in. I drive a small vehicle but tend to push its all-wheel drive to the limits. Granted, I loved the look that the guy in the jacked-up truck gave me when I ran at the snowbank, flew through the pile with snow flying high, and slid in behind him. That's right, my car is like me, small and squat and a bit aged, but never to be underestimated. I spent the next two hours hiking from the Wildman

Road then east towards Wyevale and back again. The day was warm with the spring sun, and I found myself removing my hat and mitts and opening my coat. This is why layers are so important in hiking. You want to be able to remove or add layers as the temperature changes. If you can tolerate wool, then this is the material you want to use. Unfortunately for me, I would swell up to look like a giant sheep if I tried to wear wool, so instead I use synthetic blends. I also ensure I always have a spare set of socks and mitts in this season, as it is very possible to step into a large puddle and end up with wet feet, or hands, or really any part of you. Those puddles are deviously deep sometimes. I strongly suggest hiking poles, as they can give you an idea about the depth of the bottomless pit you are trying to cross. This is an gentle hike with little elevation changes and an easily marked trail. A scrambling sound from a dead tree had me looking up and into the eyes of a racoon. With the longer days, the wildlife is reappearing.

I indicated that I might let you in my secret for

navigating the trails in this intermittent season between ice and mud. This is when I thank the snowmobilers. The OFSC trails are generally packed hard and retain the snow layer later than the surrounding areas, making it easier to trek the trails and avoid the mud. The trails are rarely used by anyone else at this time of year, so I get my solitude as well. By next month these trails will be a muddy mess and I will change my location to high ground hiking, such as Horseshoe Valley. Another good alternative is the rail trails. The Tiny rail trail from Elmvale to Penetanguishene is almost completely clear of snow and ice, yet the paved Tay trail is still deep in snow. I hate to complain, because within a few weeks we will be heading into mosquito season, ugh.





A tornado went through the property and then east to the Midhurst Reforestation area on Highway 26 in June 1950. Irving and Dora Carson hid in the cellar, and when the tornado had passed only the barn's foundation and granary were left. The wind blew through the end of the barn, moved the roof like a kite and landed the whole mess in the barn yard. Neighbours and total strangers helped clean up.

The logs for the new barn were score hacked about ½ to ¾ of an inch deep with a 4 or 5" wide adze. The score hacking, done on each side, became the cutting guide for the broad ax. It was tedious, hard work, but a beautiful thing to see. 'They were real craftsmen in their day.' Murray's grandfather Louis Carson was very good at hewing timbers.

George Wicklum laid out the north end of the barn on the barn floor and then engineered pulleys and ropes to pull it upright. Murray pulled the whole end of the barn up with a little Ferguson tractor. Murray remembers hanging 40-60' up, legs wrapped around the timber, hanging on for dear life while putting a brace in the mortise. Doug Kearns from Midhurst, who was in his 50s, was standing on top of the timber jumping up and down on it. When they were building the barn Henry Alfred was up at the peak of the barn. Henry said he'd stand on his head for \$5.00. No one had the \$5.00 but he stood on his head anyway

The new barn was built by George Wicklum. This was the first time George was the main builder. The Carsons tore down an old barn owned by Mr. Donnelly on the west side of Wilson Road. It had sat a hundred years, and it was a dirty, dusty job disassembling it. Some timbers were refitted into the new barn. Others were cut from theirs and Clarence Carson's bush. It took about a month from start to finish.

In Murray's grandparents' day a hired man was paid \$10/month and room and board in the summer, and in the winter just room and board. A hired girl was paid \$10/month.





## **OPP REPORT**

## OPP SNAG LARGE AMOUNT OF DRUGS AND CASH DURING TRAFFIC STOP

Mar. 20, 2023 - Members of the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have laid numerous drug related charges and seized a substantial quantity of drugs and cash as a result of a traffic stop within Springwater Township.

On the evening of Friday March 17, 2023, around 9:00p.m. an officer was on general uniform patrol on County Road 27 within Springwater Twp. The officer noted a traffic violation from a passing motorist and a traffic stop was commenced. Upon interacting with the driver, a small amount of cannabis was seen readily available to the driver. From there a search of the vehicle commenced where a substantial amount of various types of suspected drugs and trafficking paraphernalia were located and seized as follows;

- · Cocaine 137.6 grams
- · Fentanyl 16.3 grams
- · Psilocybin 6.3 grams
- · Oxycodone 57 pills
- · Hydromorphone 9 pills
- \$3,575 Canadian currency
- · Infiniti weighing scale x 2
- · Apple IPHONE

The street value of the seized substances is estimated to be in excess of \$20,000.

As a result of the investigation, a 19 year-old male from Elmvale was arrested and criminally charged with the following;

- · Possession of a Schedule I substance for the purpose of trafficking- Opioid (Other than Heroin) x3
- · Possession of a Schedule I substance for the purpose of trafficking Cocaine
- · Possession of a Schedule III substance for the purpose of trafficking

Various other charges were also laid under the Highway Traffic Act, Tobacco Tax Act, Cannabis & Control Act 2017, and Cannabis Act.

The accused is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Collingwood, on April 18, 2023.

## **Drug Impaired Charges after Collision in Tay Township**

Mar. 17, 2023 - A collision involving a pickup truck has lead officers to arrest and charge a driver suspected of being impaired by a of drug.

On March 16, 2023 at 5:45 p.m., officers from the Southern Georgian Bay detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, along with paramedics from Simcoe County EMS arrived at a collision on Old Fort Road near Hogg Valley Road in the Township of Tay. Assistance was offered to the driver of the damaged pickup truck, who was alone in the vehicle with a dog. Fortunately, neither were injured however, officers discovered evidence of drug use and impairment being displayed by the driver. The individual was placed under arrest and a subsequent search located a quantity of a suspected controlled substance. The individual was transported to detachment for an evaluation.

As a result of the investigation, Kyle PODWORNY, 34 years of Tay Township faces the following charges contrary to the Criminal Code and the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act:

Operation While Impaired - Alcohol and/or Drugs Possession of a Schedule 1 Substance

The accused was released from custody to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Midland on March 16, 2023. When charged with impaired driving, the driver's license of the accused is suspended for 90 days and the vehicle they were operating is impounded for 7 days.

## DRUG WARRANT EXECUTED AT WASAGA BEACH HOME

(Collingwood, ON) - members of the Collingwood and Blue Mountains Detachment Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) and the Huronia West Detachment CSCU of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have charged a man in connection to a drug trafficking investigation in Collingwood and Wasaga Beach.

In January 2023 the Collingwood CSCU commenced an investigation into cocaine and fentanyl trafficking in Collingwood and Wasaga Beach. On March 17, 2023 members of the Collingwood CSCU, Huronia West CSCU and Orillia CSCU executed a Controlled Drugs and Substance Act search warrant at a residence on 73rd Street South, Wasaga Beach. As a result, a quantity of fentanyl, cocaine, and pharmaceutical narcotics with an estimated value over \$9000 and over \$2000 in Canadian currency were seized. The target of the investigation was located inside of the residence and taken into custody without incident. The investigation revealed that the target male was on a Conditional Sentence Order and was to be in his residence in the Greater Toronto Area.

As a result of the investigation, Christopher ANOFF, 30 years of age, of Toronto has been charged with the following offences:

- · Possession of a Schedule I Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking Cocaine
- · Possession of a Schedule I Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking Fentanyl
- · Breach of Conditional Sentence Oder
- · Possession of Imitation Weapon for a Dangerous Purpose

The accused appeared in Bail Court today, he remains in custody. The accused will appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Collingwood at a future date.

## **OPP and CAFC Raise Awareness of Midland Area Residents Being Victimized by Emergency - Grandparent Scam**

Mar. 18, 2023 - Members of the Southern Georgian Bay Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC) would like raise the awareness that Emergency - Grandparent scams do exist and can be very costly.

The OPP Communication Centre has received over 13 reports of persons in the Midland area being solicited over the phone or by internet means since March 11, 2023 with a claim that a family member is in urgent need of financial support. Some of these callers did become victims of the incident and investigations are currently ongoing.

In some cases, the caller claimed to be a police officer even providing an alleged rank and badge number. The callers requested Canadian currency and or gift cards in excess of \$5,000.00 and arranged for the cash/gift cards to be picked up from the victims home

Remember, Canadian police officers do not and will not ask for cash or gift cards. If you receive a telephone call or an electronic message from police or persons in authority asking for money to assist a friend or family member, your first call should be to the OPP Communications Centre at 1-888-310-1122. Do not provide any identification or your address.

On March 15, 2023, police received a call for service involving information of a male suspect being in the possession of various forms of child pornography from conversations with a minor. As the investigation continued, it was learned that the male suspect was attempting to lure the victim using various methods.

As the Huronia West OPP Crime Unit took hold of the investigation, a suspect was identified where various search warrants were written and executed at the suspects home. Various evidentiary items were seized for forensic analysis including a cell phone and tablet

As a result of the investigation, a 21 year-old man from Paisley Ontario has been arrested and criminally charged with the following:

- · Transmit sexually explicit material to a person under 16 years of age
- · Luring a person under 16 years of age by means of telecommunication
- · Possession of Child Pornography

The accused was held for a bail hearing and released on strict conditions while awaiting his next court date.

The quote above is the singular most common movie quote in history, and fading fast into replacement, by something else, of which I cannot identify. Why? My personal experience and age do not make me a primary candidate for mass marketing, value judgment manipulation, I no longer care what is cool, identifiers. Scarlet and Rhett butler from Gone with the Wind spun off a series of items that were bought, gathered, collected. These included figurines, Royal Daltons, China, pictures, books, uniforms, dresses and the related activities to utilize these items.

When was the last time you were invited to or heard about a Gone with the Wind party? So as the appreciation and utilization dropped, the values followed, in all the things created to celebrate Rhett and Scarlett. Guess what went up in value? Actual items used in the movies, things worn or touched by the actors. As these were not mass produced, the individual items which were very singular in nature became rarer in ratio to the number of people who were interested. What is the point? Having fun and filing a desire to associate via owning something related to an event, thing, person or occurrence is actually a condition whereby we live through the object vicariously. Living through the objects vicariously does not guarantee or suggest value but it creates and fulfils emotional needs.

So, what is it that creates value? It is knowing what the future will hold based on today. Look at the things your 9- to 12-year-old love. Look at figureheads in sports and media. Very important, look for things that are supported in media, but not necessarily in production of a collectible item. I can guarantee the more mass produced an item is, the greater the devaluation, after it hits critical mass of having enough awareness and accessibility of something related to the circumstance that is being celebrated promoted or remembered. Occasionally thing get more valuable other than less because of something that has happened currently that triggers desire for a older object. A barometer of the value of certain older items is when the counterfeit market goes after them and creates fakes. This indicates high potential value, limited or nonexistent supply and a opportunity to delude, defraud, innocent inventors. Witness the recent arrest in Barrie of various individuals selling counterfeit Morrissey artwork to very experienced galleries and collectors.



## Views from the Cottage by Melanie Martyn



FAIR LAND...
When the railroad did not run...".
One of my favourite songs was the Canadian Railroad Trilogy, by Gordon

"THERE WAS A TIME IN THIS

Lightfoot. The CBC commissioned him to write a song to commemorate our centennial year, 1967. The lyrics

take your mind from sea to sea, through the pristine wilderness, virgin forest stands, plains of the prairies to the majestic Rockies. There is even a children's picture book by Ian Wallace (published 2010) that features beautiful colour pastel illustrations for the song's lyrics. The song encapsulates the pride of a young nation with great hopes for the future, but it also depicts the toil and sadness of the workers paid minimally for their efforts and suffering loss of life and limb in the name of progress. Also, I think of the thousands of Chinese labourers who were so far from their loved ones and were paid and appreciated even less than their hard-working counterparts of a lighter colour. Thoughts also come to mind now, of the many indigenous people that were forced off their land to make way for the iron highway. Oh, the skeletons... I still love the song, but with more of an awareness and some sadness of the story it truly tells.

I have not been on a train in many, many years but the news of so many derailments of late had me questioning whether I'd ever want to board a train again. Derailments appear to be a cost of doing business with an expected occurrence due to failure of a track or the wheels that run along them. Loss of life has not been too prevalent overall but the impact of a derailment like the one in East Palestine, Ohio, has more far-reaching detrimental effects than we can even guess at this time. I would like to think that a rail line company could be counted on to be over zealous on safety controls when it comes to the transport of thousands of gallons of toxic chemicals. If they are not, what does that say about their safety precautions when transporting precious cargo such as our little fannies. Across Canada we've had an average of 84 derailments per year but, thankfully, these appear to be more of the cargo variety. Comparatively, the States can have an average of 1,700 derailments per year but we are looking at an extensive amount of railway coverage in total. There is one thing I know for sure and that is that an automobile cannot stand up to the force of an oncoming train that cannot stop on a dime. A recent collision happened this past month in Severn Township when a vehicle crossed a track while railway signals were flashing. What was that driver thinking? They were lucky to escape with their lives and I'm sure we will hear more about the cause in future updates.

My earliest memory of trains will always bring me back to the trip with my grandparents. They took

the four of us kids from Toronto to Hamilton and back in 1960. I was very young but I recall my Pops saying it was one of the last times this particular train would run and he wanted us to experience it. It was exciting for a young pre-schooler though I'm sure it was not a steam train, I remember it as having a mist around it as the whistle blew its 'toot-toot'! What a ride!

Trains are a force to be reckoned with and who doesn't recall putting pennies

or other coins on the track and standing far back, waiting for the huge caboose to flatten our change into works of art. As kids, we'd always be putting our ears to the track to see if we could feel the vibration of the coming choo-choo. The force and wind that blew our hair, even at a distance, was enough to give you a high respect for its power. We'd wave at the Conductor and wait for every car to go by so we could check out the caboose and then run to find the coins. They were never in the same place as we'd put them but we'd find most, if not all. I still have an elongated penny from 1963.

We can thank the many railways that have long since been de-commissioned as their tracks were lifted leaving walking/biking paths in their place. I've often hiked the trails through Elmvale and further north for exercise and solace. Year-round they are a welcome respite from the day-to-day stresses of life. A favourite time of year is the Fall, when you can harvest the wild grapes that grow here and there along the trek. At this time of year, I'll be happy to greet the new growth of Spring but I'll be carrying along, a thick rolled up magazine. More about that later but until then, don't lose your 'train of thought'. Happy Spring and looking forward to things like fresh maple syrup! (March 28, 2023)
