Township Staff to Move Forward on Barrie North Winter Tennis Lease Agreement for 20 Year Lease Term

By Dominika Zapolnk, Springwater News Reporter Apr. 11, 2025 - At its April 5, 2023 meeting, Township of Springwater Council voted to authorize staff to finalize negotiations with Barrie North Winter Tennis (BNWT) to include a 20 year lease term. BNWT leases the Doran Tennis Facility and maintains winter tennis operations at the facility located at 41 Spence Avenue in Midhurst. They have been without a lease since August of 2018, when the previous lease agreement expired. According to the April 5, 2023 Options Report, which includes among other items, the purchase of the clubhouse by the township for \$1, "Staff have been meeting and negotiating with BNWT for several months..." and the length of the lease agreement was the last term in the lease to be agreed on. \$100 Bursary Program Approved for Township **Elementary Schools**

A motion to create a bursary program for elementary schools in the township was brought forward by Coun. Moore and approved by council. The motion asked staff to draft a policy for a bursary award program available to each elementary school within the Township of Springwater for \$100 per school funded through taxation revenue. Schools would be required to apply for the bursary award program each year by April 1 and it would be up to each school to decide on how to spend the money.

Fees and Charges for Pavilion Rentals Amended

Council voted in favour of bringing forward an amendment to its April 19 meeting to vote on changes to the fees and charges for the rental of township pavilion locations to non-sport uses. The amendment proposes a half-day (for four hours or less) rental rate of \$33 for all township pavilion locations for nonsports related activities. A non-refundable deposit requirement of \$165 for all full and half day pavilion rentals will also be added to accommodate for damages and cleaning requirements.

Report Being Released Regarding Concerns **Over New Fees and Charges Study**

According to the Township of Springwater Facebook Page (posts on March 30 and April 6), township staff as well as Watson & Associates (consultants) met with Elmvale Arena user groups and organizations to provide background and information on the fees and charges study and how they were calculated. This comes after concerns were raised by users around the new fees and charges study adopted by council in this year's budget. Township staff will bring forward a report on the fees for council's consideration at its April 19 meeting. A report is to be released to the public regarding fees and charges on Thursday, April 13. This information was not recorded and shared on the township YouTube Channel.






EDITOR'S NOTES by Linda Belcourt, Publisher, Editor, Owner

Bears may wander into urban areas in search of food, but not every bear sighting is an emergency. Know who to call if you encounter a bear:

Non-Emergency Encounters

Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 (TTY 705-945-7641) if a bear is:

- Moving through a backyard or field but is not lingering
- Roaming around the neighbourhood
- Checking garbage cans
- Breaking into a shed where garbage or food is stored
- Knocking over a barbecue
- Pulling down a bird feeder
- In a tree

Becoming Ethical Beings

"Great spirits encounter violent opposition from mediocre minds." ~ Albert Einstein

Apr. 9, 2023 - We tend to think of bullying as something that happens in schools and amongst children. Great efforts are made to protect victims from bullies, and to educate children about bullying.

However, there is just as much bullying with adults. A partner can bully a spouse, a worker can bully a coworker, an employer can bully an employee. Bullying characterizes some workplaces and institutions.

It is, to my mind, disgraceful to see those in leadership roles demonstrating this kind of behaviour. A prime example of a leader who bullies is former president Donald Trump. He wants to control the narrative, rewrite the facts, and intimidate or humiliate any who speak out against him. When presented with the truth he denies what we all know to be true.

Surely adults can deal with others without descending into bullying behaviours. President Obama said, "We can disagree without being disagreeable." We should be able to deal with differences without denigrating or threatening others.

Opposing views or opinions can be expressed without attacking another person. It seems that those who feel a need to attack the person, rather than their viewpoint, has not matured beyond the level of the schoolyard bully.

Often, they are insecure and lacking in emotional intelligence, and may even be narcissists who have no respect for others and have an unreasonably high sense of their own importance. Einstein went on to explain: "The mediocre mind is incapable of understanding the man who refuses to bow blindly to conventional prejudices and chooses instead to express his opinions courageously and honestly."

Adult bullies also act like children who encourage others to bully the victim. Gossip is a good example of this. Badmouthing someone behind their back and trying to get others to side with them is characteristic. This can be seen in workplaces, neighbourhoods, and families. It can lead to efforts to isolate the victim, threaten them, or find ways to hurt or humiliate them. It calls to mind William Golding's 1954 novel "Lord of the Flies" which tells the story of a group of young

boys who find themselves alone on a deserted island. They develop rules and a system of organization, but without any adults to serve as a civilizing impulse, the children eventually become violent and brutal.

Increasingly we see this in politics and throughout society. It seems humans are devolv-ing rather than evolving. The moral of Golding's book is that the shape of a society must depend on the ethical nature of the individual. That is where positive change must begin.

At every level, individuals must ask themselves if their words or actions would be considered ethical by Mother Theresa, Nelson Mandela, or Mahatma Gandhi.

The ethical person does no harm, does or says nothing that may bring harm to another person, shames them for any reason, and avoids bullying behaviour. Being an ethical per-son also requires one to be responsible and accountable for one's actions and not covering them up.

How different our world and communities would be if each individual chose to act ethically, whether anyone was watching or not. That would be the civilizing impulse so desperately needed right now. *Gwen Randall-Young is an author and awardwinning psychologist. Police (OPP) remind you to exercise caution as black bears begin to come out of hibernation this spring. Bears waking from hibernation face a lack of natural food sources, leading them to look for food in garbage cans and bird feeders.

You can prevent bears from visiting your home and neighbourhood by:

• Storing garbage in waste containers with tight-fitting lids (indoors if possible)

• Waiting until pickup day to put out garbage

• Taking away bird feeders for the spring and summer (you can offer birds natural alternatives, such as flowers, nesting boxes and fresh water)

• Cleaning food residue and grease from outdoor barbecue grills – in-cluding grease traps – after each use

• Keeping pet food indoors

Bears entering your community are not necessarily a threat, but it is im-portant to know who to call if you encounter one. The province operates a nonemergency, toll-free Bear Wise reporting line (1-866-514-2327). The line is open 24/7 from April 1 to November 30. immediate threat to personal safety. Some threatening or aggressive behaviours include:

- Entering a schoolyard when school is in session
- Stalking people and lingering on-site
- Entering or trying to enter a residence
- Wandering into a public gathering
- Killing livestock/pets and lingering on site.

GBGH launches Emergency Wait Times Clock Webpage

March 30, 2023 – Starting this week, Georgian Bay General Hospital (GBGH) will publicly display projected wait times in the Emergency department (ED) via the hospital's websites – both in English and French. Within the coming weeks, GBGH will also post the wait times on a screen in the ED waiting room so patients can refer to it while already in the ED.

When viewing the wait times online, it shows two different categories types of wait time – main ED and Green Zone (See & Treat for minor illness or injury), as well as the number of patients who are:

• Currently waiting (have not yet seen a physician)

• Currently being treated (i.e. they've had an initial assessment by a physician)

"GBGH has continued its important work over the last year to improve emergency department wait times," says Matthew Lawson, president and CEO, GBGH. "The new ED wait time clock aligns with our hospital's commitment to be transparent with our community. It is also important for patients to understand what to expect when coming to the Emergency department so they can be better prepared for their visit."

This initiative was a significant priority for GBGH based on the following:

- Providing information to the public about the length of wait times to expect when visiting the ED can improve the patient experience
- It is an opportunity to increase awareness among patients and families about fluctuations in ED volumes, wait times and the triage process (based on the severity of a patient's condition and their type of injury/illness)

On the website, the public can also access a graph showing when the ED will be busiest over the next six hours (based on historical data from the previous 30 days); a list of alternative resources for minor illness; what to bring when coming to the ED; and a reminder to call 911 in case of serious injury or illness. The page is accessible through GBGH's website (gbgh.on.ca) and directly through the following link: https://gbghpredict.oculys.com Please note, wait times can change suddenly and dramatically based on evolving patient health status and volume.



Contractors Deserve To Be Paid For Completed Work

Apr. 3, 2023 - The Barrie Construction Association is pleased to announce a new Ontario-wide campaign to raise awareness about Prompt Payment and Adjudication, processes provided under Ontario's new Construction Act to help contractors to get paid on time. The campaign is coordinated by the Council of Ontario Construction Associations (COCA), a federation of 29 member organizations that are listed on the following page.

The group has created The Prompt Payment and Adjudication Toolkit - a comprehensive online resource centre to help all parties to construction projects understand the rules.

The construction industry is plagued by routine payment delays. "Timely payment should be the norm in the construction industry like it is in every other sector", says COCA President Ian Cunningham. "Contractors deserve to be paid on time for work that they have completed. To ensure timely payment, they should make themselves aware of the prompt ayment and adjudication guidelines and be ready before a dispute arises."

Are You Doing Too Much for Your Teen?

Apr. 2, 2023 - There was a time when eighteen-yearolds left home to pursue post-secondary education or to work. They were not considered adults because they were eighteen, but rather because they were living as adults.

Things have changed and many young people live at home well into their twenties. There can be many reasons for this, but one is that it is simply too comfortable to leave.

It seems easy for parents to still feel a need to do so much for their children as they may not have noticed they are not "children" anymore. That or the parents are clinging too tightly to their young adult children as they are not ready to give up the parenting role.

I have worked with parents who still do their teens laundry, do all the grocery shopping and preparing meals, even making the kid's lunches. Often the parents may pay for the child's gas and give spending money. Who would want to leave?

This is not so much about getting young adults out of the house, as it is about helping them learn to do the things adults do to care for themselves. Learning to clean the house, empty the garbage, deal with the recycling, grocery shopping, preparing meals and, of course, doing their own laundry. It is also an important life experience to have a part time job if still in school.

My son started doing his own laundry when he was nine as his non "Suzy homemaker" mom turned all of his underwear pink! In our house the expectations were according to age and ability. From an early age they had chores, even if it was simply putting toys away when very young.

By age eleven they were each making one meal a week, and it was understood that once they had a driver's license, grocery shopping was on their list. This included checking to see what was needed, making a list, getting the groceries and putting them away.

By the time they went off to university, they were fully functional adults, and when home, we all got groceries together and they kept pointing out when I was not making the most economical choice. As students they became very good at spending wisely.


Not allowing young adults to take these responsibilities is enabling, even though it often comes from a place of love and wanting to make life easier for them. It can even be handicapping, especially when they are still at home in their late twenties. At that age it can be very hard to start being an adult, when they could have had ten years of practice by then. Twenties quickly turn into thirties!

If we wait too long to give them adult responsibilities, there is a good chance we will get pushback. Remember, a family is a team, and everyone should contribute to the well being of the whole.

Prompt Payment legislates mandatory timelines for payment. Adjudication is a dispute resolution process that allows a contractor or subcontractor to enforce claims for payment in a more efficient and less expensive way than the previous method of going through the court system.

Unfortunately, according to Cunningham, "Only a small number of contractors are using the prompt payment and adjudication tools provided under the Construction Act to get paid. Most don't know about this new process."

That's where the Prompt Payment and Adjudication Toolkit comes in. It features downloadable documents with clear, concise information for owners, contractors and subcontractors. Prompt Payment Adjudication 101 provides an overview of the Act in laymen's terms, and there is information about holdbacks and proper invoicing. A Prompt Payment webinar can also be viewed and there are links to government resources.



Apr. 6, 2023 - Just recently, the Federal Budget was tabled in the House of Commons by the Minister of Finance.

Ahead of Budget 2023, Conservatives had three requests: that the budget offer lower taxes for workers, the end of inflationary deficits driving up the cost of goods, and measures to increase the building of homes across the country. Unfortunately, none of these requests were met.

This year's budget misses the mark at a time when many Canadians are struggling to make ends meet and put food on the table. Instead of taking concrete actions to make life more affordable for Canadians, the Federal Budget includes \$43 billion in additional spending while doing nothing to address these concerns.

To make thing worse, on April 1st, the carbon tax increased to \$65/per tonne, which means that the price of gasoline, home heating and other fuels will see a corresponding increase. The Parliamentary Budget Officer has reported that the carbon tax will cost the average family between \$402 and \$847 in 2023, even after rebates.

The Liberal government continue to tax and spend, leading to increased interest rates, and adding fuel to the inflationary fire. Conservatives have a real plan to combat inflation and I can assure all residents that my Conservative colleagues and I will vote against all new tax increases to keep more money in your pocket.

We're currently in the Dominican Republic and some of my new neighbours here told us about a short hike through the bush to get to another nice beach close by. Not any regular beach, though. Ontario Launches New Ultra-Low Overnight Electricity Price Plan

Province's third electricity price plan will offer a new option to reduce energy costs

April 11, 2023 - Ministry of Energy – The Ontario government is launching a new Ultra-Low Overnight price plan as part of its plan to provide consumers with more ways to keep costs down, save money and take control of their energy bills. Starting May 1, 2023, customers of Toronto Hydro, London Hydro, Centre Wellington Hydro, Hearst Power, Renfrew Hydro, Wasaga Distribution, and Sioux Lookout Hydro can opt-in to this new optional electricity price plan, with all utilities required to offer it to customers within six months.

"Our government has put families back in control of their energy bills, and the new Ultra-Low Overnight price plan will give families and small businesses who use more electricity overnight more ways to save" said Todd Smith, Minister of Energy. "Starting May 1 customers can opt-in to the new ultra-low electricity price plan which could save them up to \$90 per year, while at the same time making our grid more efficient, helping to reduce costs for all ratepayers."


The new electricity pricing structure is a third option for electricity customers, in addition to the existing Time-of-Use (TOU) and Tiered plans. Customers that use more electricity at night, including shift workers and those that electrically heat their home or charge their electric vehicle, could save up to \$90 per year by shifting demand to the ultra-low overnight rate period when province-wide electricity demand is lower.

The new ultra-low overnight rate, set by the Ontario Energy Board, will be 2.4 cents per kilowatt-hour (kWh), which is 67 per cent lower than the current off-peak rate, in exchange for a higher on-peak rate. Delivery of this new ultra-low overnight rate is possible as Ontario continues to have excess clean electricity during overnight hours. Shifting electricity use to these hours will allow the province to better leverage Ontario's clean electricity grid, increasing grid efficiency, resulting in potential capacity cost savings for the electricity system of up to \$5.7 million


per year, helping to reduce costs for all Ontario ratepayers. "By making better use of the province's clean grid, our government is taking further action to keep electricity affordable in Ontario," said David Piccini,

electricity affordable in Ontario," said David Piccini, Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks. "Offering more options for smart electricity use is good news for Ontarians and the environment." As Ontario's electricity demand continues to grow, the government will continue to provide electricity relief for both people and businesses while investing in a clean and reliable energy system across the province.

"As more and more people across the province begin to use EVs, the Ultra-Low Overnight price plan will make it easier and less expensive to charge their vehicles in the evening," said Vic Fedeli, Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade. "Ontario continues to strengthen our province's endto-end EV supply chain, ensuring that the cars of the future are build right in Ontario by Ontario workers."

Ontario Strengthening Protections for Tenants

Proposed changes would also tackle delays at the Landlord and Tenant Board

April 05, 2023- Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing

Ontario is taking steps to support renters and rental housing providers by increasing the number of adjudicators and staff at the Landlord and Tenant Board to speed up decision timeframes, as well as strengthening a broad range of tenant protections.

Ontario is investing \$6.5 million to appoint an additional 40 adjudicators and hire five staff to improve service standards and continue to reduce active applications and decision timeframes at the Landlord and Tenant Board. This increase more than doubles the number of full-time adjudicators at the Landlord Tenant Board.

"Residents and rental housing providers deserve fast results, and government bureaucracy should not stand in the way," said Attorney General Doug Downey. "That is why we're investing millions of dollars to increase the number of adjudicators and staff at the Landlord and Tenant Board, so the board can continue its work to reduce its case load, improve client service and resolve disputes faster."

Ontario is also taking steps to make life easier for renters, with proposed changes that would enhance tenants' rights to install air conditioning in their units. The government is also proposing to strengthen protections against evictions due to renovations, demolitions and conversions, as well as those for landlord's own use.

"Today's announcement builds on the record number of rental housing starts that have occurred in recent years thanks to the actions our government has taken," said Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. "We know this record is being challenged by external economic factors, but we will continue to take actions that lay the groundwork for long-term housing supply growth. Meanwhile, our government is also taking real steps to make life easier, stabler and more predictable for tenants and landlords alike."

When evicting a tenant to use the unit themselves (or for their family), a landlord (or their family members) would have to move into the unit by a specific deadline.

When evicting a tenant to renovate a unit, landlords



would be required to:

• provide a report from a qualified person stating the unit must be vacant for renovations to take place

• update the tenant on the status of the renovation in writing (if they plan to return)

• give them a 60-day grace period to move back in, once the renovations are complete

If the landlord doesn't allow the tenant to move back in at the same rent, the tenant would have two years after moving out, or six months after renovations are complete (whichever is longer), to apply to the Landlord and Tenant Board for a remedy.

When a tenant is in arrears of rent, they may enter into a repayment agreement with their landlord to pay the rent they owe and avoid eviction. To make it easier for both tenants and landlords, the government is proposing to require use of the Landlord and Tenant Board's plain language repayment agreement form. This would help ensure all parties better understand their rights and responsibilities.

The province remains focused on its long-term goal of creating 1.5 million homes by 2031, including rental homes. In October 2022, More Homes Built Faster introduced changes to reduce barriers for home builders to replace older, mid-sized rental apartments with larger, more modern rental buildings.

The government is consulting on changes that will help to create a balanced framework governing municipal rental replacement by-laws. For example, the government is considering requiring replacement units to have the same core features (e.g., number of bedrooms) as original units. The proposals would also give existing tenants the right to move into the new unit while paying the same rent. This would help protect affordable housing while encouraging the revitalization of older, deteriorating buildings and increasing rental housing supply.

Breaches by Violent Offenders on Parole

Problems have arisen in our communities due to homes and in their communities. violent offenders being released on parole, and who with alarming regularity resume their criminal activities in breach of their parole conditions. Shootings, murders, assaults and the lucrative activities of drug and human trafficking are frequently resumed by these offenders.

Bill C-325 provides a much needed opportunity offenders. Diane Watts, Researcher, REAL Women of for changing the way in which we protect our Canada families and communities while also furthering the safe re-integration of offenders into society, which is ultimately the best way to protect our families and communities. A full and frank discussion on Bill C-325 provides the potential for much needed reforms and greater public awareness of the issues involved. It is hoped that this will result in constructive scrutiny of the Parole Board of Can-ada's failures to properly carry out its mandate, as well as judicial

failures to properly safeguard society from dangerous

This greatly endangers the lives of the public and our communities.

At the present time, violent offenders on conditional release who break the conditions, do not face any consequences for doing so, and the breach is not recorded on the offenders' record.

Private Member's Bill C-325

To alleviate these problems, on 10 March 2023 MP Pierre Paul-Hus (Charles-bourg-Haute-Saint-Charles) introduced Bill C-325, An Act to amend the Criminal Code and the Corrections and Conditional Release Act (conditions of release and conditional sentences).

Bill C-325 provides that if an offender on parole breaks the conditions, he will be liable to serve up to two years imprisonment, breaches of condition be recorded on the offender's record, and that offenders of certain violent criminal acts (e.g. sexual assault) be precluded from serving their sentences in their



Easy Egg Drop Soup

Extend your soup season with this easy on the wallet recipe. Using only a handful of ingredients, egg drop soup can be made in minutes with pre-prepared homemade or boxed broth. Consider adding chicken, fish, shellfish or tofu to boost the nutritional value of this

recipe even further. So simple to prepare and faster than Chinese takeout, there is a lot to love about this incredibly healthy and delicious soup.

It's important to practice food safety when storing, handling and preparing eggs to reduce the risk of salmonella food poisoning. Eggs should be refrigerated and used up before the expiry date on the carton and it's best to discard any cracked eggs. When handling raw eggs, be sure to wash your hands, utensils and cookware thoroughly and ideally, eggs should be fully cooked and not runny. These guidelines are especially important for the elderly, pregnant, immunocompromised and for young children.



INGREDIENTS

• 6 cups (1500 ml) chicken, vegetable or mushroom broth

- 1 1/2 tablespoons (23 ml) soy sauce
- 4 large, eggs beaten
- 1 1/2 tablespoons (23 ml) cornstarch
- 4 green onions sliced, optional

• 1 cup (250 ml) mushrooms thinly sliced, optional

• 1-2 cups (250-500 ml) sliced chicken, fish, shellfish

or tofu, optional

INSTRUCTIONS

1. In a large pot, bring 5 1/2 cups (1,375 ml) of broth, soy sauce, green onions, mushrooms, chicken, fish, shellfish or tofu to a boil.

2. In a small bowl, whisk the reserved 1/2 cup (125 ml) of cold broth with the cornstarch until combined.



Apr. 8, 2023 - The days are finally getting longer, and the sun's warmth is penetrating even the deepest forests. This is the time of year where I begin to condition myself for the upcoming hiking season. I focus on shorter trails that

have significant elevation changes, and the steeper the better. I have always been one of those people that take stairs instead of elevators, and at work I start my day with a climb up six flights of stairs. Not bad for a chubby little bunny. I headed out today to the area adjoining the Horseshoe ski hills. Parking is available right across from the entrance to the Settlers Ghost golf club. 3. While stirring the simmering soup, slowly pour the egg mixture into the pot. Continue to stir while you bring the soup back to a simmer.

4. To serve, garnish each soup bowl with additional sliced green onions.

dry. I could hear the cold north wind rustling the bare limbs above my head, yet I was protected and warm down in the gulch. This is not a trail where others have walked, and only the occasionally ATV track marred the white snow. Eventually the trail climbed to the top of the Horseshoes ski lifts, though I had to be careful to not enter the private forest to the east. At this point the elevation changes are frequent and steep and can be challenging if hikers are not conditioned to steep terrain (use those stairs, not elevators!). I strongly suggest avoiding heading to the trail that runs north and then west along the road. It is never a confidence booster to be stumbling over mud and ice, desperately trying to keep your balance as your arms wave in the air, while the multitudes gawk at you from the safety of their warm cars. By the summer, these trail will be the domain of the motorized groups, so now is the time to explore this hardwood forest.

The International Plowing Match was held on this farm in 1938. Hydro was brought from Minesing in 1937 to supply electricity for the IPM. A Beattie Brother's water pump was donated to Newman during the International Ploughing Match. The tent city covered 18 acres, with ploughing competitions at the neighbouring farms of Bill and Doug McNabb, Harry Giffen, and Albert S. and Russell Maw. Almost all of the ploughing was done with horses. A small John Deere tractor with rubber instead of steel tires and a Dion threshing machine of Leo Moreau's were on display.

The original L shaped barn built in the 1880s burned in 1950. It was about the same size as the barn across the road also built by Bennetts. Wilfred Sage was burned when he got the cows out. Others carried out the chickens. A new set of harnesses made by Sam Allen was forgotten hanging on a peg.

When tractors began replacing teams of horses, the teams were still used to strike out the field and finish the plowing. The tractors did the main work. The horses were sold after the barn burned in 1951.

Lorrie and Ron married August 28, 1982. Grain had been combined a few days earlier and the weight of the grain collapsed the floor of the granary. Ron didn't get his hair cut but he did make it to the wedding. Ron raises sheep and grows hay, grain, and beans.





OPP REPORT

LOADED HANDGUN SEIZED DURING DRUG INVESTIGATION

(Collingwood, ON) - Members of the Collingwood and Blue Mountains Detachment Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have charged two people in relation to a drug trafficking investigation in Collingwood.

Several months ago, the Collingwood CSCU received information into trafficking of cocaine and fentanyl in the Collingwood. The investigation revealed that one of the suspects had been released on bail for previous charges and had failed to attend court.

On April 3, 2023 Collingwood CSCU and members of the Collingwood OPP conducted a traffic stop in relation to this investigation on Highway 26 in Collingwood and arrested the three occupants of the vehicle. Ontario Helping Families Save Money with Energy-Efficiency Program

April 05, 2023 - Ministry of Energy - Ontario is helping thousands of additional families reduce their energy use and save money by updating the eligibility for the Energy Affordability Program which provides free home-efficiency upgrades for Ontarians who are looking for support with their energy bills. "With this update to the Energy Affordability Program, Ontario is ensuring access to free home energy-efficiency up-grades like insulation, smart thermostats, and energy-efficient refrigerators and air conditioners."

The Energy Affordability Program offers energy saving measures that can help participating households manage their energy use and lower electricity costs by up to \$750 per year depending on eligibility, at no cost to the customer. The energyefficiency upgrades and types of support available are tailored based on various factors including home heating system, location and an assessment of energy needs.

What Happened to the Classic Car Market?

Apr. 10, 2023 - In a nutshell, the players all got old. I remember attending various shows and events at the CNE over the 90s for cars and hot rods, and I noticed a strange thing.

Actually, it was my wife who pointed it out to me: 'Where did all the young guys go? This is a sea of gray'.

As the years rolled on, all the people I knew who loved and were involved in classic cars and motorcycles had a few sad things happen to them. Some are comical, some are depressing. British sports cars with fixed steering wheels, the beer bellies got too big and they could not get in them anymore, so they sold them.

For women who once thought these things were cool, classic cars suddenly became hot, uncomfortable, noisy, smelly, and rough to ride in. And they still are. Hot rods and muscle cars required taking a second mortgage on your house to buy fuel before it reached its current levels.

Their backs hurt, they cannot bend down to get in, they cannot manipulate the clutch stick shift.

There is no room for the grandkids. They do not have enough seat belts. I don't want to have to wait for you

to explain to everyone who comes up to you getting a coffee, while you give them the life history of the car. This describes users, drivers, and aging consumers.

PET- CT Scanner Arrives at RVH

March 31, 2023 - Today, Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre (RVH) received a very special delivery – the first PET- CT scanner in the region!

Early this morning trucks carrying the PET-CT arrived at the health centre, its final stop on a long trek from Germany.

"RVH has always focused on putting the best tools in the hands of the most skilled professionals. Today we took another significant step forward to ensure Simcoe Muskoka residents can more easily access the latest technology, so they can be diagnosed and treated faster, and ultimately on the road to recovery sooner. It is truly a day to remember," says Gail Hunt, RVH President and CEO.

The PET-CT arrived in several pieces which will be securely stored in a temporary storage area in RVH's Main lobby adjacent to the Imaging Department until mid-summer while its permanent home is being constructed. This renovation is made possible thanks to a \$1 million investment from the Ontario government to renovate an already designated space within the health centre to house the new PET-CT scanner.


Ontario Health (Cancer Care Ontario) is funding the \$2.7 million cost of the PET-CT. The addition of the PET-CT is also made possible by a generous \$500,000 donation from valued RVH donor, Barrie Welding and Machine, as well as support from Jane and Dr. Paul Voorheis, a long-time RVH radiologist, former Imaging Medical Director, and interim Chief of Staff.

"A PET-CT is a dual imaging system that combines precise diagnostic functionality (the PET) with the anatomical images of organs (the CT scan). The PET-CT will be most often used to diagnose and monitor patients with cancer," says Heather Gillis, RVH Director of Operations for Medical Imaging, Pathology and Laboratory Medicine. This is exciting news for the more than 600 patients each year who must travel outside Simcoe Muskoka to access this diagnostic service. We are committed to bringing care closer to home ensuring residents from across the region have access to advanced diagnostic equipment, so they do not have to travel long distances – away from their family and friends, at a time when they are most anxious and afraid."

The PET-CT is expected to be up-and-running by the fall, with more than 1,000 scans anticipated to be performed in the first year the PET-CT is in operation. *Submitted by Jessica Dolan*
