

Special Meeting of Council April 12, 2023

Council Asks for More Information on Lewis Gravel Pit Expansion Application

At a special meeting of council held on April 12, Township of Springwater Council asked staff to bring back additional information regarding a proposed expansion of the Galibier Materials Inc. Lewis Gravel Pit located at 2791 George Johnston Road before any decision is made regarding the expansion.

Council heard a presentation from a consultant on behalf of Galibier Materials Inc. about the proposed pit expansion which would see an additional 17.5 hectares of adjacent land on Seadon and George Johnston Roads added to the existing pit. It also included plans for environmental rehabilitation as well as the addition of berms to control noise and dust. Although there are no proposed changes to the annual tonnage or traffic and haul routes, numerous residents living close to the existing pit expressed concerns at the meeting about the even greater negative environmental and quality of life impacts they see this expansion having.

Residents urged council to consider these impacts and shared stories of dust and truck noise that are already negatively impacting their lives as a result of their close proximity to the existing gravel pit.

Council requested that the application be referred back to staff and that Galibier Materials Inc. delay their pursuit of the official plan and zoning by-law amendment until the province releases its update on the Aggregate Supply and Demand Study slated to be released in the first quarter of 2024. Township staff were also asked to find out the costs associated with an independent consultant to test the composition of the existing dust in the neighbourhood to determine its source, as well as obtain a legal opinion regarding the proposed setbacks in relation to the requirements outlined in the Aggregate Resources Act. Fees and Charges Scaled Back to 2022 Rates

Council voted to scale back the increase in the user fees and charges by-law (excluding building fees), originally approved in the 2023 budget, to 2022 rates. This change came as a result of feedback received from residents that the rates approved in the 2023 budget were significantly higher than 2022, making them too expensive to be affordable by users.

This decrease and resulting budget deficit of just over \$200,000 was cited as the reason for eliminating township staff positions originally approved in the 2023 budget (see below).

Council Votes 4-3 to Eliminate Township Positions Originally Approved in the 2023 Budget

Coun. Fisher led the discussion on the reconsideration of staff positions approved in the 2023 budget to make up the deficit resulting from scaling back fees and charges to 2022 rates.

"Since we are dipping back into the budget and this will affect taxpayers," Fisher said. "I'd like to propose the elimination of certain programs (sic) from the budget." Fisher brought forward the request to reconsider the farmer's market manager and economic development officer positions, and "... pushing off (sic) the snowplow operators until November."

After much discussion between councillors and township staff about the costs associated with various staff positions approved in the 2023 budget, Mayor Coughlin asked council to take some time to fully consider the implications of these decisions.

"While we hope that we have an understanding of how they (the positions) will impact the day-to-day operations of the corporation, I myself would hope that council would be amenable to put this back to staff and have staff come forward to us at a subsequent meeting with a cost savings," she said. "... I think we have identified staffing shortages and customer service (issues). We've had many members of the public come to us and it's not just about the roads not being plowed, it's about economic development. I don't want to sit here and reactively cut something from our budget."

After more back and forth, motions to keep two positions were defeated, with Deputy Mayor Cabral, Coun. Alexander, Coun. Fisher and Coun. Moore voting to eliminate the GIS Coordinator and the Economic Development Officer positions from the 2023 budget.

Rainbow Crosswalk in Elmvale Gets \$1000 Boost from Students

April 19 Regular Meeting of Council

Students from Elmvale District High School's (EDHS) Gender and Sexual Diversity Club presented a \$1,000 cheque to council for the creation of a rainbow crosswalk to be placed at Queen and Maria Streets, by the Springwater Library Branch in Elmvale.

Coun. Garwood thanked the delegation, stating that he was very impressed with the group and fully supports this initiative. Mayor Coughlin also offered words of support. "Congratulations on raising a thousand dollars. As a mom who is quite often asked to be part of fundraisers, I know how much effort goes into that."

Deputy Mayor Cabral stated that while he supports the initiative, he asked that the cheque presentation be deferred until a full understanding of the costs, which he recalled as being between \$7,000 and \$9,000 to be shared equally between the township and students, be brought back to council.

After further discussion, Township of Springwater General Manager Ramdeo clarified that the estimated cost of the initiative would be around \$2,200.

Garnering applause, Coun. Thompson chimed in and offered to personally pay any remaining difference, above the 50 percent originally agreed to, for the cost of the crosswalk.

"I wanted to send the message to the youth that council supports their endeavor," Thompson said in an email response to Springwater News. "It took a lot of effort for them to raise their \$1,000 and courage to come to present their cheque. I hope they left the meeting feeling great about what they accomplished. They should feel safe and that they live in a kind, caring, inclusive community!"

Council voted unanimously to move ahead with the initiative.

In an email response to Springwater News, Gregory Davidson, EDHS teacher who presented alongside the student delegation said that he and the students are appreciative of council's unanimous support.

"We will continue on the road ahead in creating safer spaces in our community," said Davidson. "Many students and teachers are looking forward to having this crosswalk as part of our community."

Springwater Public Library Cancels Presentation to Council Amid Safety Concerns

Springwater Public Library cancelled its regular update to council on April 19 amid safety concerns resulting from opposition to its drag queen story time program.

"It was cancelled due to safety concerns. Threatening Apr. 24, 2023

phone calls came in to the library so in an abundance of caution, it was recommended that we postpone the presentation to council," said Jodie Player Delgado, CEO of the Springwater Public Library. "The library would like to showcase all of our programs and services. There are many amazing things going on at the library such as our Circuit Makerspace, Battle of the Books, our new Seed Library and more. We are a place that is open to all and wish everyone to feel comfortable and safe. We are committed to ensuring that all staff and residents are safe at all times."

In an email request for comment from Springwater News, Mayor Coughlin stated she was disheartened when she learned that the library withdrew its presentation. "I believe in an inclusive Springwater, where diversity is not only welcomed but celebrated. I am hopeful that moving forward we are able to have an open dialogue, where perspectives can be discussed in a safe and respectful manner. There is no place for hate, bullying or creating fear in this township," she said.

During council question period, community advocate and former president of Fierté Simcoe Pride, Brandon Rhéal Amyot, spoke in support of the EDHS Gender and Sexual Diversity Club and the Springwater Public Library's drag queen story time.

"The sad reality is that I have to be here again today because our community is still under threat, and I have a responsibility to speak up, as all of us do, when we are under threat ... The public library had to cancel its presentation tonight because of safety concerns. And unfortunately, with this being a growing trend I don't think this will end tonight. I don't think it will end at next meeting. I don't think it will end anytime soon," Rhéal Amyot said. "So, I'm here to ask, what are you all going to do in response? How will you continue to show support for the 2S-LGBTQ+ community? I can't stress enough how public shows of support like tonight matter."

The Township of Tiny will be upgrading the play ground equipment at the Wyevale Park.



Let's Talk About... Timing of Blood Pressure Medications

Last year, a large study found that taking blood pressure medications before bed may lower the risk of serious heart-related complications more than taking the medications in the morning. Heart attacks and stroke are more likely to occur in the early morning hours than other times of day due to the natural rise in certain hormones that occurs right before people wake up. Taking blood pressure medications before bedtime leads to peak drug levels and lower blood pressure in the morning when risk of heart attacks and stroke is higher.

Some medications cause a dramatic drop in blood pressure soon after they are taken. We advise eople to take these medications at night to avoid falls. Other medications have a sedating effect, which can help people fall asleep. However, medications known as diuretics, which increase urination shouldn't be taken at night because they can prompt nighttime trips to the bathroom.

To optimize your medications you can check your blood pressure with a home monitor in both the morning and evening for a few days over the course of a week or so. Our pharmacists can use these values to individualize your medication timing. For those who take multiple medications, we often advise patients to take at least one of the medications in the evening. Have you ever wondered how you escaped a car accident with only a scratch, whereas it could have been so much worse? I have, on many occasions. There were times, while driving my car, when I changed the radio station or inserted a music disc into the CD drive, just to look up and see that I had swerved a little too far to the left, narrowly missing an oncoming car. Something or someone made me look up at just the right time.

Psalm 91:11-12 – For he will command his angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways; they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone. (NIV)

I remember a time when my youngest daughter and I were driving home from a shopping trip. It was wintertime. We were coming down a hill, and the stop light turned yellow. We came to a stop. We heard a muffled sound behind us, getting louder the closer it came towards us. By the time we realized what was happening, a huge transport truck passed us on the right-hand side driving through a red light.

As the light turned green, we noticed the truck on the side of the highway. We saw the driver's face. As far as I could see, he was apparently shaken and in shock. We surmised that his brakes must have failed. When we looked behind us, we wondered how this huge transport trailer could have passed us without impact. The truck had about two feet between my car and the lamp post to pass us. If that truck had hit us, it would have hit the passenger side where my daughter was sitting. It was a miracle. I believe it was an angel that intervened at just the right time.

We often don't recognize that these celestial beings have come to our aid until much later, when we reflect about the incident and wonder how we got through it and lived to tell about it.

God sends His angels to help and protect us, sometimes without our knowing about it at all. The least that we can do in return is to intervene to assist and guard others, and be an "angel" to them.

Prayer: Dear Lord, thank You for sending Your angels to help and protect us. Empower us to be "angels" to others, whether it be by volunteering in a retirement facility or hospital, sending a card, visiting the home-bound, making a phone call, sending flowers, or giving someone a much-needed hug. Amen.

Mistakes We Live

Apr. 16, 2023 - It's hard to admit we've made a mistake. The bigger the decision, and the more profound the consequences, the harder it is. If we've made a big investment in the square peg, and can't return it, then we may be tempted to try every possible way to get it into the round hole. Even if we are damaging the peg and the hole, we may still keep trying to force the situation.

If we're in the wrong job, or working with people who frustrate us, or do not respect us, we may complain about the job, or try to change the people. This can be very damaging to our self-esteem, self-confidence, and self-worth.

The reason it can be damaging is because unless we are in a situation that is based on true cooperation, and in which our input is genuinely welcomed and appreciated, our efforts will have little impact. They may even meet with resistance, but either way we will feel negated, rejected or ignored. These are not healthy feelings. Either we accept the fact that we are not in a truly democratic environment, and live with the consequences of our choice, or we find somewhere else to be.

The third option is to be an agent of change, but this also must be a conscious choice, because it is an extremely difficult path. It may or may not be comfortable, depending on the situation, but for sure it will exact an emotional toll.

Now let's imagine the same scenario, but this time

it's a marriage. Your spouse is just not acting the way you think a spouse should. He/she is not attentive, loving, interesting enough. He'd rather watch T.V. (always) than be with you. She'd rather be out with her girlfriends than to spend time with you. So you might rant and rage, nag, withdraw into silence, or distance emotionally. If this starts going on for years, any of the above responses may begin to become a way of life. You find yourself turning into a nag, or perhaps pulling back into your own little world.

At some point we have to ask ourselves how long we want to live our lives as the disgruntled employee, or the frustrated, alienated spouse. The problem is if we do it for too long, we lose the belief and confidence in ourselves, as well as the energy to do anything about it. And discouraging as it might seem, no one else can make it better.

We must decide what we deserve and know that we are worth it. We can only make our needs and wishes known, and see what the response is. If the pattern is that we don't count in the workplace, or in our own home, it may be time to count ourselves out.


Registration Opens May 2 For Summer Recreation Programs

Next Council Meeting: May 3, 2023

This summary is not a full representation of the meeting. For the official record, please refer to the minutes in the next Council Agenda. Past Council Meetings are available for viewing on the Township's YouTube channel.

Rainbow Crosswalk Cheque Presentation

The Elmvale District High School (EDHS) Gender and Sexual Diversity Club presented Council with a \$1000 cheque to be utilized toward the installation of a rainbow crosswalk at the intersection of Queen Street and Maria Street in Elmvale. (shown below)

At a meeting on August 3, 2022, Council agreed to partner with EDHS for the installation of the crosswalk to further promote inclusion and support towards the LGBTQ+ community in Springwater. The crosswalk is anticipated to be installed in May.

Fees and Charges By-law Amended

Council voted to amend the Fees and Charges Bylaw (2023-017), initially approved as part of the 2023 Budget on February 15, with a by-law that reflects the 2022 rates, excluding building fees. Staff have been directed to develop a new fee schedule with a public consultation process including user groups, residents and stakeholders.

To offset the estimated \$205,000 shortfall resulting from the amendment to the Fees and Charges By-law, Council removed two previously approved positions from the 2023 budget including the Economic Development Officer and the GIS Coordinator.

The amending by-law to reflect the 2022 rates will be presented to Council for consideration at the May 3 meeting.

Community-Based Strategic Plan

The 20-year Community-Based Strategic Plan has been adopted by Council. Following extensive public consultation the plan was drafted by McSweeney and

Associates and provides clear direction regarding the future priorities of the Township through the identification of a collective vision. The plan outlines five strategic priorities:

- Leveraging growth to improve Springwater as a community;
- Leveraging growth to improve Springwater's economy;
- Building community unity to support a sense of place;
- Addressing climate change while embracing environmental sustainability; and,
- Corporate actions.

To accomplish the objectives outlined in the strategic priorities, a set of ninety-three (93) community-based actions were developed. These actions provide realistic and feasible steps for the municipality to take in achieving its goals. An implementation plan will be developed and presented to Council at a subsequent meeting.

Integrity Commissioner Services

Council has directed staff to renew the agreement with Robert J. Swayze for Integrity Commissioner Services for a 4-year term, commencing September 15, 2023.

Mandatory COVID-19 Vaccination Policy Repealed

Council has repealed the Mandatory COVID-19 Vaccination Policy. The policy was implemented in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and required employees, members of Council and Committees to provide proof of vaccination or proof of medical exemption.

Slide-in Water Tank

The tender for a slide-in water tank / brine applicator was awarded to Road Maintenance Equipment & Services Inc. at a cost of \$38,500 plus HST.

Dear neighbours,

During the current cost-of-living crisis, I've received countless calls, emails, and letters from residents who are concerned about the inflationary pressures they're facing. Many families and businesses in our community are feeling the pinch because of the added costs of the government's carbon tax.

On April 1st, the Liberal carbon tax increased to \$65 a tonne, increasing the price of gasoline, home heating, and other fuels. Canada's Food Price Report for 2023 found that, by 2030, a typical 5,000-acre farm could see taxes of over \$150,000 a year which will hinder the owner's ability to make a profit. It's clear that this tax disproportionately affects our community's agricultural sector.

In response, Conservatives have introduced Bill C-234, which includes a real plan to save farmers tens of millions of dollars on upfront costs by removing the carbon tax from natural gas and propane used on farms. This legislation recently passed third reading in the House of Commons and will now head to the Senate for further debate.

Springwater Hosting 'Backyard Project Day'

Township of Springwater / April 17, 2023 – With the warmer weather upon us and thoughts turning to the summer months, the Township of Springwater will be hosting 'Backyard Project Day' on May 6, 2023.

Throughout 'Backyard Project Day', The Township will have staff on site to provide assistance with the building permit process, setting up an online portal account, document submission and Ontario Building Code Compliance.

In order to provide efficient service, the scope of projects applicable for Backyard Project Day has been limited to the following residential projects:

- Decks
- Gazebos
- Porches
- Pools (limited)
- Hot tubs
- Small Accessory Buildings

Staff will attempt to issue same-day permits. Any permits that are not issued that day will be prioritized the following week. Please note, should a property be located in an area regulated by the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority, or any other agency (i.e. Ministry of Transportation, etc.), the Township will not be able to issue your permit until approval is received from the applicable agency(ies).

To expedite the process, residents should bring the following documents:

- Application form, filled out to the best of their ability;
- Site plan showing setbacks to property lines and any other structures on the property;
- Drawings;
- Letter of authorization (if applicant is different than the property owner); and,
- Any additional documents that may be required for your project (e.g.: engineering, septic use permit etc). In addition to the Building Department, the following departments will have staff available during Backyard Project Day: Planning Services, Finance, By-law Enforcement, Springwater Fire and the Springwater Library. Representatives from BMR Pro and United Lumber will also be on site with product displays and demonstrations.

Backyard Project Day will take place on Saturday, May 6, 2023, from 9 am - 3 pm at the Township

Support for Homelessness Prevention in Simcoe County

at risk or experiencing homelessness

April 11, 2023 - SIMCOE COUNTY - The Ontario government is investing an additional \$202 million annually in the province's Homelessness Prevention Program and Indigenous Supporting Housing Program, bringing Ontario's total yearly investment in these programs to close to \$700 million. The additional funding will help those experiencing or at risk of homelessness and support community organizations delivering supportive housing.

This includes \$21,083,300 for the County of Simcoe, an 86% increase over the 2022-23 allocation funding. "Homelessness has been an ongoing problem in our community, and addressing this issue in a compassionate and dignified way provide many challenges," said Doug Downey, MPP for Barrie Springwater - Oro-Medonte. "With this 86% increase in funding our local service provider will be well equipped to combat the issue of homelessness and help those at risk of experiencing homelessness. Furthermore, this funding will allow service providers to identify and address key factors leading to homelessness that may be unique to our community. I am grateful we are able to work together to combat this ongoing issue with all-encompassing services."

The additional funding, announced in the 2023 Budget, represents a 40 per cent increase in funding by the government to support the most vulnerable by providing supportive housing and homelessness prevention services. Under the \$202 million, \$190.5 million each year will be allocated to the Homelessness Prevention Program (HPP), which gives Ontario's 47 Service Managers greater flexibility to allocate funding and make better use of existing resources to focus on delivering supports. "This \$21,083,300 investment is crucial to serving the needs in our community to continue growing and enhancing supportive housing, while assisting the increasing pressures on emergency shelters" said Andrea Khanjin, MPP for Barrie-Innisfil. "We

Province's additional investment will help people need to protect our most vulnerable, and that is by preventing and addressing homelessness."

> "Inflation has had an impact on the entire population, and as a result Ontario's homeless crisis is being felt across all cities, including Barrie," said Mayor Alex Nuttall. "I am incredibly supportive of this much needed investment in Barrie and look forward to working with all levels of government in a collaborative way to end homelessness in our city and throughout Ontario."

> The remaining \$11.5 million each year will be invested in the Indigenous Supportive Housing Program (ISHP), which provides Indigenousled, culturally appropriate long-term housing solutions and support services to Indigenous people experiencing or at risk of homelessness.

> "We know Ontario's housing supply crisis impacts all Ontarians, no matter their background or budget," said Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. "That's why we've increased funding for our homelessness prevention programs by more than 40 per cent. These measures

> complement the bold and transformational change we are implementing to tackle the housing supply crisis and get more homes built faster across Ontario."

> "During a time of economic challenges and change, our government is supporting those who have fallen on hard times and are experiencing, or are at risk of experiencing, homelessness," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "Ontario's 2023 Budget: Building a Strong Ontario is the right plan to support those who need it the most today while laying a strong fiscal foundation for future generations."

> The increased funding is a result of a revised funding model that better reflects the current needs of individuals who are facing homelessness across Ontario. Funding dollars are being increased to address increased needs, particularly during a time of rising inflation, and to help ensure that no service manager receives a decrease in funding compared to 2022-23 as a result of the transition to the new



model. "Supportive housing provides people in need with a roof over their heads. It also connects them with services that provide a hand up to improve their circumstances, including mental health support and job training," said Nina Tangri, Associate Minister for Housing. "Our government met with partners and stakeholders across the province this past fall – we heard their concerns and are addressing their valuable feedback to improve Ontario's supportive housing system. This investment will make a real impact to support housing providers that help vulnerable Ontarians each and every day."

The changes also address the recommendation in the Auditor General's 2021 value-for-money audit on homelessness, which called for a better funding model for homelessness programs that would target areas where funding is most needed.

In addition to reducing costs in other sectors, supportive housing provides people in Ontario with an opportunity to live happier, healthier and more fulfilling lives. Ontario will continue to support the most vulnerable by providing supportive housing and homelessness prevention services to help those most in need.along with information about their needs. This is to ensure that Service Managers have the up-to-date information they need from individuals experiencing homelessness to help connect people the right housing and supports as soon as they are available.

Springwater Piloting 'No Mow May'



Township of Springwater / April 19, 2023 – Put away your lawn mower and let your grass grow during the month of May. The Township of Springwater will be participating in the 'No Mow May' initiative, which aims to help pollinators such as honeybees and bumblebees by allowing wildflowers and other plants to flourish.

On March 1, 2023, Springwater Council approved a pilot project to allow for residents and businesses to let their lawns grow through the waiving of Section 4.1 (d) of the Clean, Safe, Properties By-law from May 1-31, 2023.

The goal of No Mow May is to pause mowing during the month of May, allowing flowers and weeds to bloom in early spring, when food sources are limited for local pollinators. In addition to increasing food sources for pollinators, not mowing in May also prevents disturbing insects and amphibians that may be burrowed or hiding in leaves and lawns.

To support the pilot project, the Springwater Parks, Recreation and Facilities team will be evaluating Township parkland and open spaces to determine which properties may be a good fit for the program.

"Understanding that 80 per cent of all flowering plants rely on pollinators to produce seeds, By-law Services recognizes the importance of No Mow May. By waiving the Clean, Safe, Properties By-law, we are pleased to offer residents an opportunity to participate and reconsider their yard maintenance plans during the month of May," says Brittany Kellington, Supervisor of By-law Services.



Coconut Kefir – Homemade Goodness for the Gut

Almost as popular as yogurt in Eastern Europe, kefir is worth getting to know for its tangy flavour and important health benefits. Traditionally made with cow's milk and fermented with bacteria

and yeast, kefir is becoming more popular in North America and is now available in many grocery stores across the continent. Like yogurt, kefir can also be made at home using dairy or a milk substitute with a starter kit that can be bought online or at your local health food store. Alternatively, this recipe hack for a mock kefir bypasses the need for a starter kit all together and uses probiotic capsules instead.



INGREDIENTS

2 cans coconut milk (1 can, 13.5 FL. OZ, 400 ml) 1-2 capsules probiotics – your preferred brand



Apr. 23, 2023 - I am often asked about how fearful I am in the bush. My honest answer is...rarely. I am genuinely less frightened by the animals out there that I may encounter than I am by encountering another person. If I hear people coming

I started out on a well used path, but within a kilometre or so began to experience intense anxiety. There was no rational reason for me to be so anxious, but I became so terrified that I had to stop myself from running in panic. The terror was intense, yet I could not identify the source. I listened to my lizard brain and quickly headed out of the area. As this was a loop trail, I returned to where I had started, only to find bear scat and evidence that a bear had been following me along the trail. I believe that my subconscious was registering an immediate danger threat that my conscious self was not aware off. Always, always listen to your lizard brain. He is a slippery little fellow, but he knows when there is danger near even when your highly evolved primate brain doesn't register it.

There is another trail where I always have high anxiety, yet I have no rational reason for it. I love

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Put the coconut milk and the probiotic capsule(s) in a blender and combine until the coconut milk consistency is very smooth.
- 2. Transfer to a 32-ounce (1 litre) mason jar and fasten the lid loosely.
- 3. Keep the mason jar on the kitchen counter for 24 hours to allow the fermentation to take place.
- 4. Once done, reserve 1/2 cup (125 ml) of the kefir as a "starter" for your next batch.
- 5. When you're ready to make your next batch, combine the reserved kefir with 1 can of coconut milk and repeat steps 1 through 4.
- 6. Store the coconut kefir in the refrigerator for up to 4 days. Kefir can also be frozen for future use. ENJOY!

this trail, as it is a beautiful route through hardwood forests, fields and alongside deep cedar forests. Yet, I always feel anxious along the last section of trail. wood forest. It is the next section that my anxiety leaps into high gear.

On my right is a deep cedar forest and on my left is a small field. It is at this point my heart rate begins to accelerate and I plan escape routes if anything should come out of that cedar forest. After all, there is a fence I can clamber over before the zombies get me. As I continue along the trail, I come to a barn. Not your red painted happy barn, but an old, abandoned barn, with a line of crows along its ridge line cawing out their shrill displeasure at my intrusion. There doesn't seem to be any road or trail to this barn, just an empty field. This is seriously a scene out of the zombie show "walking dead", and my anxiety arises from what might be in that barn. I have been out here several times and yet still become highly anxious every time. Unfortunately, today's hike ended in disappointment, as that scary barn is no longer there, probably to hide evidence of the zombies. The crows remain, though they now congregate around a solitary tree in the same field.

Once past the now empty field you head up a steep and water eroded trail. While I continue to check behind me, generally my anxiety disappears at this point. At the top of the hill, you can turn right and eventually head out to Flos road 4 and return by the same trail. If you feel adventurous, the trail also has a left turn that I have never taken, and curious me wonders where this goes. But this is when the crows begin their cacophony and leave their tree to investigate what I am doing. No thanks, as my imagination has me picturing silent people with pitchforks. I would love to hear from anyone that is brave enough to pursue this route.

Not being mowed are the front side lawn area of the Administration Centre, a section of the Minesing Station Parkette and different roadside and parkettes that will not negatively impact outdoor recreation or safety. Residents are also encouraged to delay mowing their lawns as much as possible and consider any areas of their property that can remain uncut all summer. Leaving your grass to grow a little longer and consider planting a pollinator garden with asters, bee balm, milkweed and coneflowers will definitely help the pollinators. We are fortunate that our Anniversary Garden has a number of these plants already growing in it as well as other native plants. Selective cleaning in the garden will occur over the next several weeks to encourage the growth of our native plants and somewhere where the pollinators can get a start on the season. Let's all do our part in No Mow May and help get our pollinators back. Over the next several weeks slide by the community park and check out the early bloomers of tulips and daffodils which are making their way up. Hopefully the garden will be in full bloom soon.

Are you a crafter or artisan and live in the community? If so then you should consider being part of the Anten Mills Fall Artisans and Crafters fair on Saturday, September 30. The fair is now in its 3rd year starting off as part of the Anten Mills



Stewart L. Page 1897-1973 Inducted 1984

Stewart Lewis Page was born Oct. 11, 1897 at Thornhill in York County.

He was a graduate of Richmond Hill

High School, served the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1918 and attend the Ontario Agricultural College in 1924.

Mr. Page was assistant agricultural representative Wentworth County in 1924 and became the representative for North Simcoe 1925, an office that he held until 1967.

He organized the first Boys and Girls Club in North Simcoe, the Soil and Crop Improvement Association, Junior Fair section of the Barrie Fair, the first crop convention and

seed fair and the first Junior Soil and Crop Club with 59 members in 1950. That club led to the first soils course at O.A.C. in 1951.

He helped to initiate and organize

the Simcoe County Federation of Agriculture and the first certified seed potato growers in the county, the "Lafountaine Restricted Seed Potato Area."

He initiated the first tuber unit method of producing seed potatoes their own patented bags

> "Norsimcoe Brand" resulting in championship at the Royal Winter Fair.


His accomplishments extended into the community where he was a member of the Kiwanis Club, Theatre Guild, Drama Club, Corinthian Masonic Lodge, County Library Board and Collier Street United Church.


He was author of "At the First Table" for the county council. He married Margery E. Wright on Mar. 22, 1922 at Richmond

no children.

Bill McNabb's brother Jack was conscripted near the end of W.W. I and was at the White Cliffs of Dover when the war ended. Bill was left at home to help run the farm. When Jack returned after the war, Bill went west to Manitoba. Bill had enough money when he returned to buy this 50 acre farm across the road from where he was raised. There were still pine stumps on the farm

Bill dismantled a pine timber barn that was on the rise half way between the present house and barn. A number of the cedar sleepers in this barn had burn marks from the fire in 1881. It had been very dry in 1881 and there were fires from Edenvale to Elmvale and to what is now the Ministry of Natural Resources in Midhurst. Many trees burned by the fire were sound and used to rebuild. The muck that

Bill bought two old barns from the present day Edenvale airport. They were taken down timber by timber and board by board. Bill's son Allan was thirteen and old enough to drive the tractor and haul the lumber down. Allan was also given the job of making pins for the barn to connect the tenons to the mortises. White ash was pounded into a steel form to create the round pins

Jack Lockhart from New Lowell looked after the cement work for the house and the barn. Jack Pickering, helped by his brother Frank, took the three 36×56 ° barns and made one. The north side of the barn was built into the side of the hill. The sleepers were 18 feet long and together made the 36 foot expanse. An extra sleeper was needed, and it came out of the Princess skating rink in Minesing. After the frame was up and before the roof was started, Frank Pickering shimmied up and walked all around the barn on the 10 inch beams. Bill Peacock bought what wood was left over.

OPP Seeking Assistance in Locating Stolen Statues from Tiny Township Home

(TINY TOWNSHIP, ON)- Members of the Southern Georgian Bay Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) are seeking the assistance of the community in locating a number of bronze garden statues that where taken from a residence in the Cedar Ridge development, Tiny Township over the recent winter months.

The victims returned recently and noted that five bronze coloured garden statues which vary in size from 39 to 49 inches in height and weight approximately 100 lbs each were removed from the garden area of their home.

The statues are further described as being made of bronze created from a process known as "lost wax casting" and have a value of approximately \$20,000.00 in total and are very sentimental to the owner who welcomes their safe return. HAPPY 123RD GRAN!!

Apr. 26, 2023 - Well, she would have been that age today if she had not slipped away from us in August of 1984 at the tender age of Eightyfour! I say tender age because in my mind, she was too young to be

leaving us. She had a youthful, feisty spirit and had just celebrated her ninth anniversary to her second husband. After being a widow for several years, she met Clarence at Church and after 6 months of courtship, they were married in the summer of 1975. They proceeded to travel all over the countryside. Trips were planned to California and other southern States as Clarence was about 13 years younger and loved to drive on the open highway. They even took a trip out to the west coast of Canada to find Gran's long-lost brother who had disappeared (purposefully lol) after the war (that would be WW2). It seems he did not want to come back to the wife and four kids but that is a story for another day.

It was a busy Spring, that year of 1984. I was living in Georgetown as a single mom with two small children and rented a small apartment in a home in the old part of town. It was a very reasonable rent that was subsidized by my willingness to cut the grass, rake the lawns, and do a bit of upkeep on the century home as the owners were quite elderly. The secondfloor windows overlooked a nearby Funeral Home. They were quiet neighbours.

Working full-time as a bookkeeper in Brampton and taking care of the home and the needs of two active young boys gave me no time to rest and even less time to dream, you would think.

For several months, I would dream that I was in the washroom (seated...was my impression) and I knew that I was not going to leave the room. I would look at the bathroom door and just know 'this was it'.... fade to black. It seemed a disjointed dream and I would often wake up in a sweat. There are just some dreams you do not forget, but repeated dreams really get your attention.

I was incredibly sad with the passing of my Grandmother that year but there were a few other events to happen that summer. My ex-hubby and his new partner had just had a baby girl and it would be late on a Friday evening before I could drop the kids off for 'his' weekend. I would have waited till the

next morning, but I had plans to go up north and it was agreed this would work out for both of us.

After settling the kids in with him and having a quick cup of tea to celebrate the new baby, I headed back to Georgetown along Steeles Ave. West. I had planned to take McLaughlin Road, north to Hwy 7 West. With so many things to plan for the weekend getaway and no cell phone to recite notes to, your mind tends to 'autopilot' home. I seemed to be following a dark line on the road and somewhere a part of my mind was judging it to be a tar line. At almost midnight, there was basically no traffic at all, and I was still following this line past the next lights. I did notice one car up ahead that brightened up the dark road with brake lights. They veered to the right and slowed down before continuing westward.

Knowing these roads as I did, I questioned the sudden movement outside the single lane. What was that up ahead? A big white dog on the road?? I was still following this line and started to slow down hoping this poor animal was not suffering.

I came to a near stop before I was frozen in disbelief as I became witness to what I had been following this last mile. A bloodline. I circled quite slowly around what appeared to be a dummy on the road, but this was not Halloween. It was a cool night in August, and this was a human body! Lifeless and quite literally worn to the point of not having a full head of hair anymore if you can picture that but please don't. I had been following this shiny, tar-like bloodline for over a mile. Another car soon pulled up and quickly spun off to no doubt, call Police. I stayed in the car until they arrived saying a silent prayer for this poor soul. It was not the car ahead of me that had hit him (Ira was his name; just new to Ontario from Newfoundland and I will not forget him) but they later found out who did. Somehow the poor 21-yearold lad had tried to walk home from a local bar but had passed out on the road.

Not an hour later, as I was finally on my way home, no less than five Cop cars flew past me with lights flashing. I caught up to them as they converged onto a driveway just a mile or two west of the accident scene. As it turned out, another young man that should not have been at the wheel, somehow was distracted and hit him. Either from fear or ignorance, he drove from the scene without the knowledge he was dragging his 'forever mistake' under the carriage

of his car. Oh, how a joyful day can turn so, so sad... Nightmares were abundant after that, for some time. Getting back to my other dreams, they did stop in

July of that summer. The Summer my gran died. I even stopped mentioning "I think if I die, it will be in the washroom," to everyone I met. Life got back to routine by the Fall, and I was able to spend more time consoling my mother who had lost her mother and you never get over that (at any age). So, I asked her; "Where was Gran when she died?" She sipped her tea and murmured "In the bathroom dear...you know, on the John." I immediately flushed!
