Sent to editor May 3, 2023 - An Open Letter to Springwater Township Council re: Special Council Meeting May 3, 2023 at 3pm

I urge you to cancel this meeting to avoid incurring any further embarrassment upon yourselves than you

First, you are in violation of your own rules of procedure. This agenda was not issued until Fri. Apr. 28, effectively disenfranchising the citizens you were elected to represent. The request to depute needed to have been filed the day prior to the agenda. Such actions have attempted to silence anyone who had concerns about the agenda.

Second, you are in violation of, at least, the Canadian Bill of Rights, the Ontario Human Rights Code, the Ontario Public Libraries Act, and the Ontario Municipal Act. You do not have the authority to censure or discipline neither the CEO of the Library nor any Library staff or board members. Nor do you have the authority to dictate what programs the Library offers. The Ontario Public Libraries Act was put in place to safeguard communities from egregious acts of interference such as you are attempting to do. You have the authority to accept or decline any budgetary request the library makes which is in excess of the amount determined by the province. You have the authority to appoint to the library board such members of the municipality who have applied to serve in that capacity. Just as you do not have the authority to dictate to the Ontario Provincial Police which particular officers you want serving Springwater, and how they do their job, you cannot exert such control over library staff & programming. The Library Board hires the CEO and, in their governance role, sets policy. The CEO then hires staff and determines programming which aligns with policy. ANY interference in library operations is ultra vires (in other words - beyond the scope of your entitlement) I am equally appalled and incensed with your stonewalling of the rainbow crosswalk. What kind of message are you sending to future voters that their concerns and efforts are neither wanted nor encouraged? Your comments that their fundraising efforts were inadequate were unconscionable. You may have been embarrassed, and rightly so, by having a staff member correct you that the costs of installing the rainbow crosswalk had increased by sevenfold.

Again, your intentions to discipline any staff member is ultra vires. As a Council, you hire the CAO, and entrust the operations, and hiring of staff to that person. Your budget deliberations are the extent of the influence you can exert.

I have spent my adult life working in support of libraries and young people. I cannot find the world to express the disappointment and disdain I feel about your actions attempting to block Drag Queen Storytime and the Rainbow Crosswalk. You are entitled to your own beliefs and opinions, but your rights end where mine begin. Canada is a democracy, not Nazi Germany nor Stalinist Russia.. Encouraging and allowing every member of society to exert their rights and freedoms does not diminish your own.

I urge you to cancel the 3pm meeting you have called for May 3, 2023. I do not want to be embarrassed to live in Springwater Township, nor to have my community become the laughing stock of every other

# Letter to the Editor of Springwater News - May

- I attended a Township of Springwater council meeting on May 3 for the first time since we moved here in 2008. I was there to support our wonderful library. Four council members pushed for a special meeting to discuss two LGBTQ initiatives:
- The Rainbow crosswalk across Elmvale main street. Elmvale high school students had raised funds to contribute.
- Drag Storytime at Elmvale Library family friendly storytime presented by drag performers. These presentations have been popular in libraries, schools and other venues for years.

#### Here are my takeways from the meeting:

1. This special council meeting was unnecessary. The first item could have been easily handled by a short conference call with the interested parties and the Mayor and CAO. Also two councillors complained council (original budget approved by council Aug. 2022 just under \$9000, updated to just over \$2000). CAO Schmidt explained that small projects that come in under budget are not routinely reported.

Second item was also was outside the responsibility of council. The interested parties should have called councilman Thompson (who is on Library Board) about defined roles and responsibilies of council and library organization. Not sure why such an informed source was bypassed? I was shocked that one councillor suggested defunding and even evicting the libraries!

- 2. These councillors may be unaware of the planned movement against LGBTQ by the Freedom General group who have orchestrated many angry, threatening and abusive protests against libraries in the last 4 months. (See Globe and Mail report April 23, 2023). Every library affected so far has stood their ground in support of program.
- 3. I was saddened, confused and embarrassed at the meeting inception and conduct of petitioners. There were young people attending from EDHS and LGBTQ groups. What kind of opinion do they now have of our local representatives?
- 4. We cannot allow these initiatives to be overuled by the minority. First because I don't want to see our township labeled as bigots and cowards while our neighbouring municipalities valiantly stand up to extremist opposition and angry protests. Secondly, not supporting inclusionary initiatives is a Human Rights Code violation (see p16 which defines Organizational Responsibility). This is the law folks! But I am truly grateful for council members and Mayor Coughlin who supported both initiatives.



#### **Rainbow Crosswalk Discussions Continue at Council**

By Dominika Zapolnik, Springwater News Reporter May 8, 2023 - A special meeting of council was called on May 3 to continue the discussion about a rainbow crosswalk initiative in Elmvale which received unanimous support from council at its last regular meeting on April 19, and was originally approved by the previous council.

The meeting was brought forward by petition from Deputy Mayor George Cabral and councillors Danielle Alexander, Phil Fisher, and Anita Moore with the meeting agenda citing "Processes, financial implications, and irregularities respecting original motion" as the reason for the request.

At the previous April 19 regular meeting of council, students from Elmvale District High School's (EDHS) Gender and Sexual Diversity Club presented a \$1,000 cheque to council to support this initiative. It was at this time that Cabral brought forward questions related to how the cost of the crosswalk went from what he recalled being between \$7,000 and \$,9000 to be shared equally between the township and students, to just over \$2,200.

"The issue that I have is more in the fashion with which the sidewalk (sic) came before council again this year, and it was the process that I think is faulty," Cabral said at this most recent meeting. "I think staff had an obligation to come before this council and make a presentation to say hey we have a revised number. Unfortunately, that didn't happen, and that is the cause of why we're sitting here today right now." "... the township has an annual budget with multiple projects in the budget," Springwater's chief administrative officer, Jeff Schmidt commented. "We come in under budget on many of those projects and we don't come back to council on an individual

project basis to update you on that so just to clarify

student delegation and their \$1,000 donation towards the crosswalk initiative. "When we have young members of our community coming to delegate in front of council, I'm sure it's scary ... we should be creating an environment where they feel like they can do that all the time."

After more discussion, the meeting ended with a resolution brought forward by Cabral and seconded by Fisher that asked "that a report be brought forward regarding the rainbow crosswalk project outlining changes to the costing, original estimates and how they were obtained, timelines and background information relating to the changes being proposed, including correspondence to such items, and that information relating to the construction details, paint equipment, etc. be included in the report." The resolution passed with Alexander, Cabral, Fisher, and Moore voting in favour of a report coming back to council.

#### Springwater Council Votes 4-3 in Favour of Supporting Library Programming including Drag Queen Story

During the special meeting, council also continued to discuss the Springwater Public Library programming, including a drag queen story time, which has become a hotly debated topic at council. Council has no oversight or control over library programming, so this was brought forward for discussion by petition from Alexander, Cabral, Fisher, and Moore.

"Well, everyone should know where I stand. I am against drag queen story time. When you talk about inclusivity, I'm sorry my definition of openness and inclusivity does not include having children subjected to this type of thing. Not any time, and not with taxpayer's dollars. I am totally opposed to it," Fisher stated.

Coun. Brad Thompson clarified that drag queen story time is actually funded by Friends of the Springwater Library and not taxation. "So, for those that are so worried about tax dollars, no tax dollars will be used for this event." Adding that this programming isn't new, that all libraries in the area have it, and that it is supported by the Simcoe County District School Board

"These are all very well-educated people. They're people that have the community's trust in protecting our children. In no way are any of us trying to groom children or harm children in any way at all. And I think that narrative is inappropriate, uncalled for, and there's no supporting evidence of such information," Thompson said.

Additional comments of support were offered by Mayor Jennifer Coughlin and Garwood.

"It (drag queen story time) has become divisive. I wish it wasn't. I wish we lived in a world where this was just another event happening ... we need to create an environment or support an environment that is welcoming," Garwood said. Adding that if it helps just one person, he sees it as worthwhile.

This discussion is a continuation from the April 19 council meeting, when the Springwater Public Library cancelled its regular program update to council citing safety concerns.

"It's not okay with me that the CEO of our library board was threatened, harassed to the point where she needed to have the police involved. That's not ok with me," Thompson said.

"I've seen a lot of hateful comments and I've seen a lot of hopeful comments. I would like to let you know that I stand for the hopeful comments," Thompson added before proposing a motion to support the library and its programming. The motion was carried with 4-3 in favour, with Alexander, Cabral and Fisher voting against supporting it.

May 8, 2023 - It is with deep regret that I am writing this to inform the residents of the Township of Springwater that council has decided to stop communicating through the Springwater News. I am saddened for you the reader, that this time-honoured tradition of getting your township information will end after the June 22, 2023 edition. Council has decided to use a direct mail option for the Link with a potential budget increase of \$4,973.20 per month for a bi-weekly mailing (or at staff's discretion for frequency of monthly or bi-weekly as needed).

"I don't believe we're here to lobby for local businesses, they stand alone. They have their own business practices, and they will live and die by them," Coun. Phil Fisher stated during the meeting. "I think that our main concern is to reach the vast majority of residents from the north to the south ... the amount of readership of the Springwater paper in at least the south end of the ward is not prevalent, so I believe that going towards a mailer at our discretion "

Just as a point of clarification here, when Springwater News did a one readership engagement for the Nest Box Giveaway, the results and postal

codes were tracked showing that the large majority of respondents were from the south end of the Township of Springwater, mainly from Midhurst.

Coun. Matt Garwood questioned the change and asked for clarification of exact numbers before making a decision on communication channels the township should use.

"We currently spend with the Springwater News \$1,841.67 per month, and ... if we went with the 8.5" w x 11" height at 12,000 pieces which is the \$1,295 plus HST plus the cost to actually mail, which would be the \$2,041.60 plus HST, roughly \$3,336.60 plus HST bi-weekly. We are looking at nearing \$7,000 a month in communication with (a) direct mailer. Where right now we're spending \$1,841.67. I completely agree that we should be looking at other alternatives and I think direct mail is a fantastic idea, but I do have deep concerns in regard to completely removing our presence in the Springwater News. I think folks throughout the municipality utilize the paper to figure out what's going on in Springwater Township," Garwood said.

#### **Editor's Comments**

If we look at last year's numbers for the Township of Springwater Link printed in the Springwater News, staff placed 16 full one-page and 10 twopage communications. It would seem to me that the communication will either have a lot less information or will cost a lot more. I agree with Garwood, that council should not be making financial decision without all the actuals of how much it will cost and what will be done.

"We should not be paying for sending the Link to the greater area of Tiny, Tay, and Oro-Medonte and we should not bare this cost," said Coun. Anita Moore. The facts are that the Springwater News cost for mailing is lower due the volume of distribution to these areas. The cost for mailing neighbourhood mail is \$.163 per piece for Springwater News but would be \$.176 per piece for Township of Springwater for a 12,000 distribution as apposed to 18, 675 distributions. This larger distribution saves the Township of Springwater mailing costs.

I want to assure you, my loyal readers, that Springwater News will continue to support our community and to thrive financially. There are many ways to cut costs. Although not ideal, we are creative, and we will continue to serve our residents as we always have.

I urge you to watch the council meeting. This discussion starts at the 14:00 minute mark. You decide if your voice is being represented by your elected officials.

#### **Trails**

To ride on trails in Springwater you must be a member of the Central Ontario ATV Club (COATV) or Simcoe County Off Road Riders Association (SCORRA). Visit their websites for detailed trail maps or to purchase a membership.

#### Roads

Did you have a Rubik's Cube when you were a kid?

I think they've been around for almost a century. We watched a documentary on it. The first Rubik's Cube was made of wood, believe it or not.



It may even be scarred for life unless something is done about it.

This state of mind-confusion results in the lack of mental clarity, an intellectual fogginess, and an inability to do what the mind was created to do—think positively and act rationally. The heart-and-mind symbiotic relationship is so complex that when one gets hurt, the other feels the pain. When one is sick, the other is sick also.



#### God's Handiwork is Everywhere

*May 7, 2023* - Romans 1:20 - For since the creation of the world

His invisible attributes, His eternal power and divine nature, have been clearly seen, being understood through what has been made, so that they are without excuse. (NASB)

Have you ever examined the seed head of a dandelion before you puckered your lips together, blew, and watched its seeds scatter and rise into the air to fly away?

Have you ever seen a double rainbow? Or have you ever examined a snowflake that landed on your window sill? How intricate and perfect its design is, and yet each one is distinct from the others.

Have you ever looked at a sunset and felt content and at peace? Or have you ever listened to the waves as they caressed the shore in the moonlight? It's almost like a crescendo of voices praising their Creator.

Have you ever gone outside into your backyard at night, looked up and beheld the trillions upon trillions of stars that light up the night sky? Or have you ever been fortunate enough to see the northern lights? Living and moving brush strokes of red, green, blue, and violet colours dance across the night

sky. No one really understands how these auroras are produced. They are just another work of God, sharing His handiwork with His children.

Psalm 19:1 – The heavens are telling of the glory of God; and their expanse is declaring the work of His hands. (NASB)

God's handiwork and His footprints are all around us. But His goodness, love, and mercy are best seen in the revelation contained in His Word, the Bible. There we see the intricate preparations laid for the greatest revelation of His love in His Son. #### **Communication and Emotional Quicksand**

Apr. 30, 2023 - There is an interesting phenomenon that often occurs in communication when two people are having a disagreement. They disagree, of course, because each one has a different point of view. Ideally, the next step would be for each to express their own viewpoint, and really listen to understand the perspective of the other. Having done this, the next step would be to focus on solutions that incorporate the needs of both parties.

Too often the communication never gets to this stage. Rather, it becomes like a ping-pong game, in which the opponent's opinions or comments are immediately rejected or tossed back. Frustrated at not being understood, each side becomes more intense, more vocal, perhaps even derogatory or insulting.

Somewhere along the way the initial subject of discussion is lost, and it becomes individuals battling with each other instead of arguing a point. At this stage additional points of contention, unrelated to the original issue, are thrown in at random, adding more fuel to an already out of control fire.

The participants are now entering into a zone that I call 'emotional quicksand'. I use this term, because the more one struggles, the deeper one sinks. Let's look at an example. A wife tells her husband that she is feeling stressed and overwhelmed. (She wants him to hug her, give her sympathy and ask what he can do to help.) Instead, he replies by saying that he's just as stressed as she is and doesn't need her stuff as well. This makes her feel even more overwhelmed and resentful. Or he comes home and says he had a

hard day, and she replies that she'd trade jobs with him any day.

In both cases a request for support is rebuffed and replaced with the responders own concern. A teenager says he does not feel appreciated in the family, and a parent responds with a comment implying that if the teen did more, then there might be something to appreciate. In this instance there is both a rebuff and an added insult.

In all of these instances, one person is calling out, and their plea for understanding is shut down. Of course there will be hurt and anger, and the relationship deteriorates a little more. The more that the argument is debated, the worse everyone is going to feel. The more of these arguments they have, the more difficult it is to create a healthy relationship. The more unhealthy the relationship, the more likely it is to die.

Because it is so hard to get out of 'emotional quicksand', it is important to learn how to avoid it in the first place. Sometimes if you just stop the struggle for a bit, you can halt the downward process and find a way out. Other times, you need assistance in the form of professional help. The worst thing you can do is to continue the process that got you there in the first place.

#### Residents Concerned About Canada's Broken Bail System

May 1, 2023 - After a wave of violence and rising crime rates, I've heard from many residents who are concerned about Canada's broken bail system.

The Liberals have made life easier for violent criminals by repealing mandatory minimum sentences for gun crimes with Bill C-5, have made it easier to get bail with Bill C-75, and have failed to stop the flow of illegal crime guns across the US border. The result of this failed policy is clear; Violent crime has increased by 32% and gang-related murders have nearly doubled since 2015.

OPP commissioner Thomas Carrique stated recently in a letter to the Federal government that "a minority of offenders commit most of the crime in Canada, and the chronic nature of re-offending by these individuals is not adequately recognized in current bail and sentencing practices."

Under the Liberal government's justice laws, violent offenders are thrown back on the street, sometimes in the same hour of their arrest. This catch and release system puts the public at risk.

Earlier this year, all 13 Premiers, as well as the major police associations from Canada's largest cities, called on the Trudeau Liberals to reform Canada's bail system. The Liberals continue to ignore these calls.

On February 2nd, my Conservative colleagues put forward a motion that would have strengthened Canada's bail laws, however, the Liberal party voted against it. The Liberal government also will not commit to supporting a Conservative Private Member's Bill that would make it harder for people who commit violent offences with a firearm to be released on bail.

I will continue to advocate for harsh bail rules that will ensure violent offenders remain behind bars as they await trial, and if convicted are incarcerated for many years.

I would like to thank all residents who reached out to my office about this important issue. A Conservative government will do what is necessary to keep repeat violent offenders where they belong – behind bars.

May 5, 2023 - Springwater Township Public Library (STPL) is happy to announce that they received First Place in the annual TD Summer Reading Club Library Awards. The awards are given out to libraries across Canada to recognize and reward the most innovative and effective TD Summer Reading Programs.

The Summer Reading program at STPL was a mixture of face-to-face programs and videos. Children used the ReadSquared app to track their reading with 367 children reading for 155,946 minutes. They also created 57 book reviews, attended Family Reading nights at parks in Elmvale and Midhurst, attended programs at all the branches and watched storytime and programming videos online.

STPL's Children and Youth Librarian Amanda Hodgkinson was awarded the prize at the Saskatchewan Library Association Conference in Saskatoon. Ginger Tsang was responsible for the editing and animations of the video programs and was in attendance for the award presentation. The TD Summer Reading Award covered most of the costs of attending the award presentation. The award comprises of a plaque and \$8,000 for use in the children's area of the library.

Amanda says "We are completely overwhelmed with happiness and it's wonderful to see our amazing programs getting the recognition and appreciation they deserve. It's very validating for all the staff who worked hard to create our summer program and our community is worth it!"

#### **Water and Birds**

May 7, 2023 - Water is the lifeline of all life on Earth. The United States Geological Survey shows 71 of Earth is covered in water. 96.54 % is salt water found in coeans. And a mere 1.69 % is ground water while less than 1% is found in lakes.

David Suzuki, our world renowned Canadian environmentalist and scientist constantly reminds us, "Water is Life."

The theme this year for World Migratory Bird Day on May 13 is "Water - Sustaining Bird Life."

The Audubon Society reports the value of birds cannot be overstated. Many birds in tropical countries pollinate your favourite fruit. Here in Ontario the ruby- throated hummingbird is a master pollinator as it's long beak can reach down into long-throated flowers. We can help ruby-throated hummingbirds thrive, by planting red flowers and hanging up hummingbird feeders. You can also help birds by installing a bird bath with a fountain as birds are attracted to moving water.

Birds droppings know as guano have been recognized as important fertilizer from very early times. The nitrogen in sea bird droppings has been especially helpful in promoting the growth of native plants on barren landscapes.

The regrowth of forests are boosted by the tree seeds found in the droppings of birds as they fly across our vast land.

Science Daily reports birds around the world eat 400 to 500 million metric tonnes of beetles, flies, ants, moths, aphids, grasshoppers, crickets and other anthropods per year. This pest eating service add billions to the economy every year.

Vultures perform a valuable service by eating dead animals. Since vultures rarely come in contact with humans, vultures serve as a barrier to prevent diseases from proliferating in dead animals and spreading to humans. A serious decline in vulture populations has resulted in feral dogs in many countries eating carrion and spreading deadly rabies.

Lake Simcoe Region Authority tell us Lake Simcoe supports an astounding 141 different species of birds. Soon millions of birds will be migrating north and they all depend on an ecologically healthy aquatic ecosystems to keep them healthy and strong. Unfortunately, Lake Simcoe faces a number of detriments impacting its ecological health.

One major challenge facing Lake Simcoe is algae bloom triggered by too much phosphorus and nitrogen entering the watershed. Recently, a study demonstrated that algae bloom, as well as, killing cold water fish such as trout and herring, also jeopardizes the health and life expectancy of songbirds by compromising their immune systems, reproductive rates, and contributing to weight loss. Importunately, algae bloom is particularly harmful to migrating birds on their long and arduous journeys north.

Residents can help reduce algae bloom by avoiding the use of chemical fertilizers, rich in nitrogen and phosphorus, on their lawns.

LSRCA reports Lake Simcoe also faces another existential threat.

Excessive road, parking lots, and sidewalk salt is entering Lake Simcoe at an alarming rate. Right now models indicate that 64% of plant and animal life are detrimentally impacted by salt contamination. LSRCA warn us if salt concentrations continue to increase at the current rates, by 2110 we will exceed the chronic exposure guidelines.

When a lake's salt concentration keeps increasing, the sources of food for wildlife including migratory birds decrease. Only, marine birds have built -in water desalination systems. Too much salt will eventually weaken and kill non-marine birds. As insect eating birds die off, we will see an increase in mosquitoes.

There are alternatives to salt, such as, using brine salt and beet juice to de-ice roads. Here in Barrie the good news is the City uses salt brine and molasses quite successfully on arterial roads while sanding other roads.

To reduce the amount of salt being used, residents and municipalities can work together by applying best practices that have been developed. Here in the Lake Simcoe watershed, many owners of large parking lots and snow plow operators have been trained in the "Smart About Salt" program developed by the University of Waterloo.

Finally, as residents of a Bird Friendly City, we can all take actions

by writing to our government representative, and join one of the following organizations such as Nature Barrie, Rescue Lake Simcoe Coalition, Living Green, and AWARE.

On Saturday, May 13 World Migratory Bird Day, Nature Barrie will be hosting a Nature Barrie Bird Walk – starting at the Spirit Catcher from 10:30 to 12, rain or shine.

#### **Update From Doug Downey MPP**

#### **Ontario Strengthening Supports** to Combat Hate and Create Safer Communities

May 8, 2023 - The Ontario government is investing \$25.5 million over two years to help address the rise of hate incidents against religious and minority groups. The new Anti-Hate Security and Prevention Grant will help faith-based and cultural organizations enhance or implement measures to ensure community spaces remain safe and secure.

The province has long believed that no Ontarian should live in fear that they will be targeted due to their background, who they love, or how they worship. This investment helps build on the province's mandate to combat hate, and will help build stronger, safer and more inclusive communities where everyone has a safe environment to practice their faith and express their culture and beliefs.

The Anti-Hate Security and Prevention Grant will provide up to \$10,000 to help religious groups, Indigenous communities and cultural communities better protect and secure their facilities from hatemotivated incidents, graffiti, vandalism or other damage. Grant funding can be used for things such as building upgrades, enhancing locks, installing cameras, training staff, completing security assessments, introducing safer cybersecurity measures, hiring short-term professional security personnel and making repairs.

This grant helps to address the most targeted groups of hate crimes from recent years, including Indigenous, Black, Muslim, Jewish and 2SLGBTQQIA+ communities. In 2021 alone, over 1,500 policerelated hate crimes were reported in Ontario.

Since 2021, the government has allocated \$40 million through the Ontario Grant to Support Anti-Hate Security Measures for Faith-Based and Cultural Organizations. The redesigned Anti-Hate Security and Prevention Grant will now cover the cost of additional prevention and capacity building measures, and allows for more organizations to apply.

#### Eligible organizations include:

- · Religious and spiritual communities (e.g., mosques, synagogues, temples, churches, etc.)
- First Nations, Inuit, Métis, and urban Indigenous organizations
- Cultural groups (e.g., 2SLGBTQQIA+ groups, Black, Asian and other diverse organizations offering programs, workshops and ceremonies that promote their communities' cultures)

#### Applications for the Anti-Hate Security and Prevention Grant will open in summer 2023.

The Ontario Grant to Support Anti-Hate Security Measures for Faith-Based and Cultural Organizations provided funding to more than 1,200 faith-based and cultural organizations to protect communities from hate. Ontario invested an additional \$1.6 million in the Anti-Racism Anti-Hate grand to support 25 additional projects. Through this grant, the Province has supported a total of 82 community projects to increase public education and awareness through the impacts of racism and hate.

The Ontario government is investing more than \$1.5 million through the 2022-2024 Safer and Vital Communities Grant program. This funding will help 17 community-based, not-for-profit organizations and First Nation Chiefs and Band Councils, support projects that prevent online hate crime, human trafficking and fraud.

for anyone who wants to enhance the native ecosystems on their property," said Rick Grillmayer, Manager of Forestry at NVCA. "The tree sale is perfect for landowners that don't have the space to plant acres of trees."

All proceeds from the event support NVCA's forestry program. This year, the forestry program will see more than 100,000 trees planted across the watershed. These future forests will help to moderate the effects of both drought and flooding, reduce soil erosion, provide habitat for wildlife and mitigate climate change. They are also an important economic resource by providing wood fibres.

"We typically sell half of our trees in the first hour," continued Grillmayer. "I invite everyone to come early, since there are lineups well before the event begins!"

At that time, we had a host of beautiful product: from Polish handblown glass to replica medieval swords. It turns out – glass giftware just wasn't the pull – the swords were! After discovering this dynamic and unique market, we promptly shut down The Perfect Gift, and reopened a month later as The Art of Warriors; selling all manner of movie replica weaponry that graced the big screen in movies like Lord of The Rings, Braveheart & The Last Samurai, we did not limit our product offering just to replicas. We also sold martial arts practice weapons along with hunting and practical survival gear.

In addition to our brick and mortar business home, we often participated in events all over Ontario; conventions, outdoor markets and various Highland Games, selling our products on the fly in an ingenious travelling roadshow developed by my husband. Much of the time, he hit the road and I ran the storefront; a busy life to be sure, but worth the education and connections we made in light of everything to come!

Given that the internet can be friend or foe, it turned out to be a bitter sweet relationship with The Art of Warriors. While it allowed people to see the same products we were selling online, very quickly we were finding that online only stores were becoming the main supply to consumers for that type of product. Knowing that, we turned our efforts to selling at conventions and events only.

Five years later, we decided to rent this wonderful gem of a retail space in the heart of lovely Elmvale! A working office for our painting and contracting business (lots of irons in the fire), and a place to store and showcase all of our retail goods while we waited for summer shows! Tim came up with the name. He managed to parle ALL of our names (except his – his decision) into the name: Jack's On Queen. J – Jack, A – Adam & Arlene, C – Colton, K-Kimberley. And of course, it's located at 18 Queen Street West. In addition to the replicas we sold, we added some additions of comic books, games and other types of movie and pop-culture memorabilia. We opened with some limited hours and never expected what happened – to happen!

IT EXPLODED – into table top gaming, crafting, fundraising events, and generally, just having some good, clean fun, playing games and getting to know one another! What is table top gaming, besides just sitting down with a box of Monopoly? Well, let me expand: Tsuro, Red Dragon Inn, Fluxx, Epic Spell Wars (some of my favourite board games); Magic: The Gathering, Pokemon, Dungeons & Dragons, 40K, Age of Sigmar – to name just a few.

People from all over Simcoe, Muskoka and even some City Folk have donned our door over the years and we are so very grateful to have heard our store's name referenced as far as Niagara-on-the-Lake. Truly, we are so very thankful for the Community of Players we have come to know and love

When we say that we know and love this Community - that is NO idle comment, no lightly peppered false adoration for those who have become our Friends. It is heartfelt, earnest and this Community has brought a profound sense of meaning to our existence as a family. Part of what has made it so special is that this space is not just merely a place to laugh and have fun, but we have found ourselves to sometimes be host to those who need a friend; sometimes those who may be marginalized or ignored anywhere else - only to find that they are some of the most beautiful people, the kindest people, the most engaging people, we've ever met. This is not just your average event space – this is a SPECIAL place. And it is the people who walk through our doors to visit with us who make it so. We are blessed & privileged to call each member our Friend.

During those years, there were always those who we became particularly close with, and continue to be so. An excellent example is our new partner in gaming, Shane Cloutier. Shane is a professional musician, who both records his own music, and teaches guitar, ukele, and bass. He's incredibly talented! Shane and his 4 children often came to Jack's on Queen to spend a Saturday or Sunday playing Magic: The Gathering, or DnD. The kids really held a special place in MY heart – they are, each one of them, tremendously bright, unique and endearing. We enjoyed getting to know Shane, and later his wife Lydia, and it turns out that not only were they excellent customers, they became very special friends! I think one of the favourite things we like to do together is LAUGH!

However, in 2020, the world changed abruptly, laughter in short supply - for everyone. Tim and I decided that with all of our other business interests, and with COVID introducing the need for various types of adjustments to the way stores like ours should operate, and not having the resources to do that component justice, we decided to pass the torch on to someone new who would be able to bring all of those needs along side and serve this great Community. 

# Asparagus Frittata –A Traditional Italian Omelette

May 6, 2023 - Hurray, it's springtime which means that asparagus is plentiful and affordable. This Italian-style omelette is absolutely delicious for breakfast, lunch or even a light

supper served with a mixed green salad and some whole grain crusty bread. Bursting with protein, high-fibre veggies and flavour, this asparagus frittata



is ready and on the table in no time.

Today, with the gentle rain falling around her, she would be able to walk a short twenty five feet before needing to head back. I would look down and see little Boo with her tail wagging as she struggled to manage even a few steps. She never whimpered or complained, just kept on going. It was back to the car, then only a very short ride to the vet. Betty Boop perked up and became excited at her

favorite place in the world, the place of unlimited treats!! What dog doesn't like the vets.... oh wait, there is Mr. B trembling in panic at the thought of having his nails trimmed; what a diva. Today though, we didn't go in the front doors like we usually do, instead we went in the side entrance, into the quiet room with a couch, a blanket on the floor and paw prints in plaster on display. Mr. B paced the room while Betty looked in the corners for treats. Dr. Tiffany came into our small room, the room no pet owner wants to go into. I gently held little Boo while Dr. Tiffany gave her a sedative. As Betty slowly began to sink into the floor, Mr. B. gently licked her face while I pulled her close and spoke softly into her ear, "you are such a good girl, we love you so much". My son and I took turns holding her small little body and crying into her soft red fur until it was time for the final injection. This is when the tears really start, and roll down my cheeks in large rivulets, and I struggle to stifle the large knot in my throat that threatens to choke me with my sorrow. We said goodbye to our little pocket beagle, the little senior rescue who came into our lives a short four years ago, yet who made such a huge impact on our lives. It is so important for families to be there for the last moments of their fur babies, no matter how hard it is on us; we owe them this last moment of comfort.

- 2 tablespoons (30 ml) fresh dill, chopped or 1-2 teaspoons (5-10 ml) dried dill
- 1-2 cloves garlic or 1/8 -1/4 teaspoon (0.63-1.25 ml) garlic powder
- salt and pepper to taste

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Preheat your oven to 375°F/190°C
- 2. Heat the olive oil in a large cast iron or ovenproof frying pan over medium heat. Add

the onions and cook for about 3 minutes - stirring occasionally - until they soften

and turn translucent.

- 3. Add the asparagus and sauté 5–10 minutes until slightly softened, but still firm to bite.
- 4. In a large mixing bowl, whisk eggs or chickpea flour and water until thoroughly

combined. Add the cheese or nutritional yeast, dill, garlic, salt and pepper.

5. Pour egg mixture over asparagus and onions and cook in the oven until the eggs are set,

20 to 30 minutes.

6. Invert frittata onto a plate, cut into wedges and serve hot.

and gorgeous senior rescue beagle, Karma, when my husband came across a social media post about a woman who had passed away, and her daughter was trying to place her mom's two ten-year-old beagles. Absolutely not! I repeatedly told my husband that we could not take on two more seniors...and he continued to show me their pictures and tell me how much they needed us. Miss Betty Boop was a pocket beagle with weird eyes and a bark like a seal, while Mr. B. was a large hound from Texas with an extreme fear for rain, wind, and having his nails trimmed! Eventually I caved, as I could not allow these two beagles to be separated after sharing a decade together. This duo joined our home and provided so much love to us over the years. The hardest thing about rescuing seniors, is that the time you have to spend with them is so short. Yet, they give you so much love, as though they are so thankful for letting them live out there last days in a loving home.

Sharing grief with others helps with the loss, in what ever form that loss comes in. There are numerous studies that show that the loss of a pet is as emotionally difficult as the loss of a human. Grief has so many forms and is different for each person. There is no route that you must follow, no script, and no timeline for when you stop grieving.

There can be transference of grief, where the death of a pet can cause emotional reactions that are about past trauma or death that has not been dealt with. Anticipatory grief often occurs with families that have a loved one with a diagnosis of dementia, where families mourn the loss of the person through their dementia progression. Whatever form grief comes in, it is difficult, and scary and so very sad. It may feel suffocating and unbearable. Talk to others, share your grief, share your story, and hopefully find joy in memories.



If you find yourself overwhelmed, there is help. For the loss of a pet the SPCA does offer some counselling options and there are numerous online supports. Hospice Simcoe also offers counselling for pets as well as people. For other losses, there are a variety of supports. CMHA offers support and counselling and can be self-referred through their website. North Simcoe Muskoka Hospice and Palliative Network offers resources and counselling for children and adults. The Catholic Family Services is also another excellent resource. You are not alone, reach out.

A note here, for the fabulous team at Georgian Bay Veterinary services in Perkinsfield. They are amazing and have supported us through our many rescues and our end-of-life care for our beagles. Thanks especially to Dr. Tiffany and to all the team, as we say goodbye to our smallest beagle with the biggest personality. Thank you

May 7, 2023 - Have you noticed that vehicles don't seem to come to a complete stop at stop signs? It was bugging me that I didn't help the loon while I was sitting there trying to figure out the solution. So, to clear my mind I met up with my friend and we saw the owl, no babies yet. It was really bugging me, so on my way home I said I was going to stop by and try something, one more time. Barb's neighbours had seen it on land trying to find bigger water, so it could feed and also taken off from.

A loon isn't meant to walk on land very far, if you watch my loon hatching video you can see how close the nest is to the water. The other thing is they need a lot of water to take off from, at least 90 feet to 1,320 feet. I had a plan that maybe I could help guide it to the bigger water if it wasn't injured.

At 5:36 pm I arrived back at the pond, and the loon was gone! I was told to look around and spotted it on the grass. I geared up, quickly and thought maybe I can grab it with my net even, and release it. At 5:41pm I sent the group a message, I had checked the loon out and released it

Georgian Bay Gals That Give

April 25, 2023 -This is the 10th Giving Event! Hard to believe this all began in 2018! The membership have since it's inception given-back \$325,000 to various charities in our community! Isn't that incredible?!

This time around the chosen charity is GBGH! (Georgian Bay General Hospital)

Georgian Bay Gals That Give are a group of likeminded people that are so fortunate to live, work and play in the beautiful area of Georgian Bay, Ontario. We are grounded in a tradition of giving to our community and are motivated and committed to giving back and making a difference to keep our communities strong and vibrant. Gbay Gals Give holds a social twice a year where, as part of being a member, each member is obligated to donate \$200 at each social to the charity chosen by the members.

#### We give back to our local community.

The process to give requires little time or effort. Before each scheduled social, members are sent an email with a link to participate in a survey to nominate a charity of their choice, should they choose to do so. A second survey is then sent to the members to vote for a charity from all the charities that were submitted. The charity with the greatest number of votes is the charity chosen for that social. Before the social, an email is sent to members identifying the chosen charity and information on how to donate to the charity. Members donate their \$200 directly to the chosen charity, through the methods the charity has provided or at the social. Each member receives a tax receipt for their donation directly from the chosen charity. Once a charity has been chosen and receives donations, it is not eligible for another nomination for four years.

Members are obligated to make a minimum oneyear commitment to ensure maximum impact for the giving. Each member is required to make a donation even if they are unable to make the social and regardless which charity was selected. Donations must be made in a timely fashion. Each member



commits to an annual donation of \$400 payable twice per year (\$200 each Spring and Fall). All personal and contact information of members is only used for the purposes for which it is collected.


To get things started the committee voted that the first donation was to the Georgian Bay General Hospital. All subsequent donations are decided by the whole membership. Think of the impact a \$200 per member donation can make when combined with a greater membership.


Eligible charities for nomination must be local within North Simcoe. Nominations may be organizations with a significant need to operate successfully within our community and perhaps receive little or no government funding. Once the charity is chosen, they are not eligible for consideration again for another four years.

To date they have raised over \$328,000 for:

The Georgian Bay General Hospital: \$24,200 on June 7, 2018, Hospice Huronia: \$36,650 on October 15, 2018, Georgian Bay Cancer Support Centre: \$33,000 on May 27, 2019, Huronia Transition Homes: \$40,750 on October 21, 2019, The Guesthouse Shelter: \$35,000 on October 19, 2020, CLH Foundation: \$36,800 on May 31, 2021, Hospice Huronia: \$37,200 for October 18, 2021 Virtual Event, Community Reach: \$42,200 for May 30, 2022, Split: Warm and Cozy Childrens Charity \$21,250 and Georgian Bay Food Network \$22,000 for October 3, 2022

#### **Stunt Driving Investigation Leads OPP to Drug** Investigation

Significant Seizure of Cash & Drugs

(TAY TOWNSHIP, ON, May 3, 2023) - As a result of a vehicle stop by a uniform officer of the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment, a significant seizure of Canadian currency and drugs have been removed from the streets of North Simcoe.

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#### Ask a Therapist: On Social Rest

Q: I feel like I am around people all the time but it just wears me out. Is that just because I am an introvert?

A: There is an energy that we experience when we are around people which has the potential to be draining or life-giving. It's broadly true that extroverted people tend to be energized by time with others whereas introverted people tend to be depleted by social experiences; however, there is more than that to consider when examining the value of social interaction. Both extroverts and introverts need time with others and time in solitude in some proportion to maintain their holistic health but often the energy of the particular people in one's social circles matters

The degree to which a social interaction is restorative is an important thing to consider when you are choosing your communities and connections. Social rest is found by recognizing both the need for face-to-face, meaningful, and authentic connections with others while placing good boundaries around negativity.

Even as an introverted person, it may not be the simple fact that you are around people most of the time that is depleting you; rather, it may be that you are spending time with people who always need or demand something from you or who are consistently negative and that energy will cause social fatigue. If you are someone in a helping profession, you may experience exhaustion due to an overexposure to grief, suffering, and challenging circumstances that understandably are a heavy energetic burden and this can lead to compassion fatigue in your interactions with others as well.

Unhealthy and hurting people often bring toxicity and strife to their relationships and these types of relationships can be particularly depleting. On the other hand, spending time with healthy people who are genuinely invested in bringing goodness to your life will restore your energy in tremendous ways.

Making conscious choices to connect with positive friends, family, colleagues, and other restorative people (like mentors, teachers, doctors, clergy, and counsellors) will make all the difference. A therapist can help clients discern and assess the level of depletion or the restorative capacity of particular



relationship dynamics in your life. They can help you build a plan to increase positive connections while placing healthy boundaries to protect against ongoing negative interactions.

Needless to say, being socially disconnected negatively affects your wellbeing in significant ways and many are recovering from that reality having dominated their lives through the pandemic; but, it's also prudent to assess the quality of the social interactions you are choosing and to remember that you need the positive energy of life-giving people to keep you healthy! What is one step that you could take today to bring some vitality back to your social

The best example of a sleeper is the rookie card, commonly available in all sports sets. You just have to be able to pick out the right guys from the rookie roster. For instance, the Wayne Gretzky rookie card, Topps, 1979, gem state (a perfect card), is valued at \$1,200,000. That's not bad for a few pennies in 1979, and it is essential to note that this is in US dollars.

So, don't yell at your husband when he tells you he is investing in your child's future, paying for their education with his collection of rookie cards. He might just be right!

**GORDON MERIDITH LIGHTFOOT** - NOV 17, 1938 **– MA**Y 1ST, 2023

#### 'PUSSY WILLOWS, CAT TAILS, SOFT WINDS AND ROSES

May 8, 2023 - This is how I will always remember Gordon Lightfoot...the song written for memories of Orillia, Ontario, his birthplace. It was so, so, sad to hear the news of his passing. I am truly grateful for the effect his music had on my life and those of my family in years past.



#### Just some of his achievements:

Gordon received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Trent University in Spring 1979 and was made a Companion of the Order of Canada in May 2003. In November 1997, the Governor General's Performing Arts Award, Canada's highest honour in the performing arts, was bestowed. On February 6, 2012, Lightfoot was presented with the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. June of that year saw his induction into the Songwriters Hall of Fame and on June 6, 2015, Lightfoot received an honorary Doctor of Music in his hometown of Orillia from Lakehead University.

Lightfoot received no less than sixteen Juno Awards—for top folk singer in 1965, 1966, 1968, 1969, 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977, for top male vocalist in 1967, 1970, 1971, 1972 and 1973, and as composer of the year in 1972 and 1976. A true Canadian icon, in 1980 he was named Canadian male recording artist of the decade, for his work in the 1970s.

Lightfoot was inducted into the Canadian Music Hall of Fame in 1986, the Canadian Country Music


the Order of Canada, the country's highest civilian honour and as well he became a member of the Order of Ontario. In 1977, he received the Vanier Award from the Canadian Jaycees. In 2007 Canada Post honoured Lightfoot with a postage stamp! On June 24, 2012, Lightfoot was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame in a New York City ceremony and on June 16, 2014, Lightfoot was awarded the prestigious Lifetime Achievement Award by SOCAN at the 2014 SOCAN Awards in Toronto.

On October 23, 2015, Lightfoot was honoured with a 4-metre-tall bronze sculpture which sits out on the point at Tudhope Park and the shores of Lake Couchiching. The sculpture, called Golden Leaves—A Tribute to Gordon Lightfoot, features Lightfoot sitting cross-legged, playing an acoustic guitar underneath an arch of golden maple leaves. Many of the leaves depict scenes from Lightfoot's 1975 greatest hits album, Gord's Gold. In 2017 a bronze bust was placed at the Orillia Opera House where he had sung so many, many, years before.

In 2017, he was awarded the Gold Medal of the Royal Canadian Geographical Society

You can watch a 2019 documentary film Gordon Lightfoot: If You Could Read My Mind that was produced by Martha Kehoe and Joan Tosoni.

I grew up on Bass Lake in the summers of the late fifties until the late seventies. Orillia was our go to place to shop, do the laundry, watch the latest 007 movie, and visit friends my dad made in his youth. His Pussywillows song became a forever memory of my summers spent on the Lake, hiking in the fields and forests, playing in Couchiching Park, looking out from the Bandstand, climbing the Champlain monument, and admiring the cannons. Taking a ride on the miniature railroad was a highlight! My gran, Mildred Pilling lived to 102 and was often out with the Lightfoot seniors for parties and community gatherings in the 30's and into the early 40's before moving to Toronto. She'd often tell stories of bouncing Gordon on her knee, never knowing he'd become one of Canada's most treasured icons. She lived on Peter Street West, and I suppose was a neighbour. New Year's eve parties at the Armoury were a must do, and dad on occasion babysat or so he mentioned more than once with pride. So long ago...



United Church. As I waited in the long, long lineup of mourners this past Sunday, you could overhear memories being shared by hundreds of strangers that came together to pay their last respects to a man that Hall of Fame in 2001 and into Canada's Walk of Fame impacted all our lives with his music and the messages in 1998. In May 2003 he was made a Companion of therein. Some 2,400 mourners laughed, cried, and

stood in the pouring rain for hours, bringing the song Rainy Day People to new life. Gone but never to be forgotten, play on Gordon, play your Sundown for us, just one more time.

As I write this, I am listening to Gord's Gold album on my 1973 Pioneer turntable. To listen is a heavenly respite, but to read his lyrics is a journey that may take years with over 500 songs penned.

Thank you for the songs, thank you for the memories, thank you for the Summer Side of Life!
