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17 Racers Compete at the Midhurst Soapbox Derby and Classic Car Show



The annual Midhurst Soapbox Derby and Classic Car Show took place this past Saturday, June 17 on Doran Road. 17 racers aged eight to 13 competed in pro-built and home-built categories.

"It was an excellent day for the soapbox derby. The weather cooperated and the kids had a blast. This is a fun, community event. Having pro and home-built categories brings out racing fun and family ingenuity," said Jim Howell, Midhurst Soapbox Derby Ramp Coordinator.

Racers compete in pairs that are timed as they cross the finish line. To start the race, soapbox cars are loaded onto an inclined ramp and the racers climb in. After a countdown, a gate is dropped, and gravity assists the soapbox cars as they roll down the hill on Doran Road to the finish line by the Midhurst Community Hall.

"This is the first year that a scratch or home-built car has won all three categories: Fastest home-built car, an award for the best home-built car, and the car that beat the fastest pro-car - receiving the Midhurst Flyer trophy. Jonah's was the fastest car of the year. That rocks," Howell added.

The derby has been taking place in Midhurst since 2017, with a few years off as a result of COVID.

Happy 25th Anniversary Springwater News

I am so pleased to announce that this paper has been in business for twenty-five years!

Michael Jacobs started the paper on June 4, 1998, with 8 pages and 6,000 issues. I helped created the first edition which was a huge learning curve. With the help of COW printer staff, the rest of editions began to take shape and look like a traditional newspaper. Today, there are at least 24 pages (one issue was 32 pages), 16 in colour, and 19,650 copies per edition. 18,500 are mailed out to various postal codes by Canada Post.

The Elmvale Lance used to be the local paper in our area. Michael Jacobs used to write the odd article for the Lance (lovingly called the "Glance" by locals). Michael wrote "Michael's Musings" and "Michael's Corner" for the Lance and the Tiny Observer. The Lance was finally purchased by the Star Group, and it was run out of Creemore. Michael says, "I used to write the odd piece and would have to drive to Creemore with a picture and article in hand". The Lance folded in around 1996-97 and Michael thought a newspaper was missing in Elmvale, so he started up

the Springwater News. He only planned on publishing four editions when he started the paper. He grew the paper to what it is today, but in his 70's it was time for Michael to enjoy some free time away from the strict deadlines. I have taken up the torch and I am so grateful for the wonderful support I receive from the community.

Council Refuses to Listen to 617 People

I feel so badly for the residents of the Township of Springwater that council has decided against communicating in the Springwater News. The number of residents that engaged with council on this issue is impressive. What this means is no council update from the township and no Link communication. I have not received a mayor's message, but I am hopeful for one in the future. I also hope that council members will send in their own communication to keep you informed. I will continue to do everything I can to keep you informed on township issues moving forward. As always, my priority is to keep our community engaged and informed about what is happening in our township.

New "Springwater Village" Development Plan **Presented to Council**

June 19, 2023 - A presentation made to council, at its June 7 regular meeting, proposes a "unique community" to be built at 742 Bayfield Street. The presentation outlined plans for a diversity of housing options including a mixed-use medical facility for various medical needs including doctors and chiropractors. The plan also showed diverse housing types, including affordable rentals, townhomes, and a tiny-home community with an agricultural park, as well as plans for a year-round farmer's market, a trail system and greenspace.

Township of Springwater Council Votes to Continue with Direct Mailer to Communicate with Residents

Springwater resident, Cindy Schutt, brought forward a petition to council with over 600 resident signatures asking council to reconsider the decision made at its May 3 meeting to discontinue Township of Springwater Link communication in the Springwater

"I am here because I was very disappointed to hear that the Springwater Township Council has decided to stop communicating through the local newspaper, the Springwater News. I'm still confused as to why you would want to replace this cost-effective communication tool with a direct mailer which would cost us taxpayers four times the money. I figured I couldn't be the only one, so I reached out to our community with a petition," Schutt said.

Midhurst resident Glen Ampleford also spoke in support of keeping the Link in Springwater News due to lack of clarity about what the mailer would look like and how much it would cost.

"We still do not have any cost analysis. There is apparently not even clarity of what product is going to be distributed to the township's residents. Coun. Fisher was expecting an envelope. The administrator indicated it's just a flyer ... when you are talking about spending \$60,000 incrementally at a time of economic hardship and inflation for a lot of people who are struggling to put food on the table ... 60 grand on mailing flyers out. Are you kidding me? This is embarrassing ... Please explain to me how a decision of this dollar amount could be contemplated without cost-benefit analysis by Township staff," Ampleford stated.

The original motion as well as the motion to reconsider was a 4-3 vote with Deputy Mayor George Cabral, and Councillors Alexander, Fisher and Moore voting for the elimination of communicating with residents through the Link in the Springwater News. As a result, residents will receive Link communication from the Township of Springwater through a direct mailer.

Councillors on both sides of the issue weighed in with their perspectives.

Coun. Moore stated that her decision to support eliminating communication through Springwater News was not a financial one, but one made to address the challenges of reaching residents.

"We have a lot of new residents in my area and hundreds more coming. They don't know that in order to find Township of Springwater information that they need to look in the middle of the local newspaper. They just don't know that, and so we're missing out (on) communicating to people about job opportunities, business tenders, programming. We're missing out reaching a large number of people and so that needs to change," Moore said.

Coun. Thompson had a different view stating that the pros of continuing to communicate through the Springwater News outweighs any cons.

"... the cost of (a) direct mail flyer is going to be more expensive no matter which way any member of council wants to spin it ... The direct mail flyer does not provide a better way of communication. In fact, it may turn out to be a worse way. We really don't know. No one has provided me with any credible information speaking to the benefit of a direct mail flyer. For me this is also an easy way to support local business," Thompson said. Adding that "... this is an opportunity for us as council to actually listen to residents. 617 names on a petition I don't think can be ignored ... with this petition tonight, we should listen to taxpayers and rethink our position on this. I want you to know I'm listening. I am with you and would be happy to reconsider this and to help to find a solution for a better way."

Deputy Mayor Cabral countered stating he didn't think a direct mailer would cost as much as was being suggested and that it would be read by residents. "We say that (the) Springwater News, people throw it in the garbage. We say that the Barrie Advance comes (and) people just throw it in the garbage as well," Cabral said. "We talk about direct mail, yes it goes in the garbage, but from my own experience I look at what the direct mail is, and I decide whether or not I want to throw it out in the garbage. I'm telling

you, if it says Springwater Township on it, and it's of interest to me, I will read it." Mayor Coughlin expressed excitement over a future potential app that could be used to communicate with residents, citing that many in Springwater have opted out of receiving direct mail altogether.

"I would love for there to be an app and I can't wait for us to get to that point. I think that that is going to be a game changer ... I never heard from someone I want communication ... I

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would absolutely support a reconsideration of the decision. I think that to remove all communications from the paper, then we're left with what?" Coughlin said.

Coun. Alexander voted in favour of a direct mailer stating that the residents she spoke to don't read the

"... pretty much every single person I talked to said I don't read newspapers anymore. And then I had a couple other conversations with other residents again about separate issues, and that that kept coming up ... I just felt that I was fighting for something that the people that I was speaking with didn't want or didn't read," Alexander said. "... we have to have a written communication presence because it is our responsibility to try our best to reach every resident. And I feel like the direct mail option is something to try. I do think I am hopeful that if it's from the Township of Springwater, people will open it and try and read it," she added.

Coun. Garwood said he had a different experience in speaking with residents and that many expressed their support of continuing to receive township communication through the Springwater News.

"I do share concerns regarding completely removing our presence in the paper. I have heard from many residents who reference the paper often and know folks throughout the municipality utilize the paper to determine what is happening within our community. I do agree with looking at alternative communications options to ensure that all residents receive information, but I do believe that the Springwater News has been an effective outlet not only for the Elmvale community but all of Springwater," Garwood said. "I also want to mention many of the residents that I've heard from over the past few weeks were not from the Elmvale community. They were from the Midhurst community. They were from the Hillsdale and Phelpston communities, in the Minesing communities sharing their concerns and expressing their frustration (at this decision)."

TAKE NOTICE that the Council for the Corporation of the Township of Tiny passed By-law 23-044 on the 29th day of May 2023, and amending by-law 23-048 on the 7th day of June, pursuant to Section 38 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.13 as amended.

And take notice that Interim Control By-law 23-044, as amended will be in effect for a period of one (1) year from the date of passing, lapsing May 29th, 2024, but may be extended by Council for an additional one-year period in accordance with Section 38 of the Planning Act, or repealed by Council at an earlier date.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

THE PURPOSE of the By-law is to provide the Township with the opportunity to undertake a study to review its land use planning policies pertaining to retaining walls, fences, landscaping and structures in proximity to the 178 metre contour elevation of the Georgian Bay Shoreline; and to ensure that any retaining walls, fences, landscaping and structures are appropriately sited and regulated once the study has been completed.

THE EFFECT of By-law 23-044 is to prohibit any new development of retaining walls, fences, landscaping and structures that are in proximity to the 178 metre contour elevation of the Georgian Bay Shoreline. Amending By-law 23-048, included exemptions to By-law 23-044.

This By-law applies to all properties within the Limited Service Residential (LSR), Shoreline Residential (SR), Greenlands (GL) and Open Space One (OS1) Zones in the Township of Tiny.

Lakehead University Support Postsecondary Students to Overcome Pandemic Learning Challenges

June 9, 2023- The Ontario Council on Articulation and Transfer (ONCAT) has awarded over \$560,000 to eight postsecondary institutions in Ontario to develop programs and supports for students impacted by the pandemic.

These projects include summer courses to help students recover pandemic-related academic gaps, coaching and mentorship programs to help students transition to and adjust to postsecondary studies, and specialized supports for Indigenous learners, mature students, and prospective students from historically unrepresented groups.

All are designed to support the successful experience of students whose academic journeys have been disrupted over the last few years.

"Postsecondary institutions are still navigating the impacts of the pandemic on the sector, and it is crucial for them to be able to adapt to their students' ever-changing needs," said Jill Dunlop, Minister of Colleges and Universities.

"Through this funding provided by ONCAT, these eight institutions have created strategies to support students affected by the pandemic so they can reach their full academic potential."

Led by Dr. Leigh Potvin and Dr. Julie Rosenthal from Lakehead's School of Outdoor Recreation, Parks and Tourism, \$98,594 has been awarded for a project to enhance pathway-transfer for Indigenous students in the North with an interest and/or career goals in outdoor recreation, parks and/or tourism.

Participating institutions/partners include Collège Boréal, Confederation College of Applied Arts and Technology, Indigenous Tourism Ontario, Destination Northern Ontario, and Bingwi Neyaashi Anishinaabek (Sand Point First Nation).

"The results of this project will lead to opportunities for students to flow between and amongst partner institutions and also to choose from a robust set of mechanisms to enter post-secondary institutions," said Dr. Potvin.

Another project led by Andrea Tarsitano, Vice-Provost (Students) and Registrar, and Aimee Jaun, Associate Vice-Provost (Students), has been awarded

\$35,750 to enhance the transition of transfer and mature students to university. A team from both Lakehead campuses will work collaboratively with internal and external partners to develop a seminar course to help students develop awareness of university supports and academic expectations.

"The pandemic continues to impact students as they move along their academic pathways and we need to ensure that they are set up for success on their journey," said Dr. Adrienne Galway, Executive Director at ONCAT.

"These funding initiatives give students a strong foundation to build upon, especially those experiencing ongoing barriers to postsecondary access exacerbated by the pandemic."

Through the Seamless Transfer Program, a third project being led by Tarsitano and Jaun has received \$76,450 for the development of a mature student orientation leaders' model to increase capacity internally by creating a sustainable, broad support network of mentors and leaders.

Working collaboratively with Confederation College, this project will allow for early engagement in building awareness and offering of targeted supports for mature and transfer students in addition to students who face ongoing barriers.

"Once completed, both these projects will result in tangible supports for students who are experiencing academic life after a hiatus or who are new to the university context," said Tarsitano.

"As a student-centred university, Lakehead recognizes the global pandemic has negatively impacted students in many ways, especially mature and transfer students," said Dr. Michel S. Beaulieu, Associate Vice-Provost (Academic).

"ONCAT's support of these projects advances Lakehead University's commitment to providing a transformative university experience that facilitates achievement and success of our unique learners," said Dr. David Barnett, Provost and Vice-President. Children as Scapegoats

June 11, 2023 - An insidious problem that sometimes arises in families occurs when issues between the parents are not dealt with directly, and instead become acted out with the children.

An example might be a man who feels his wife is too controlling, perhaps even bossy, and so when he hears her disciplining a child, tells her to get off the child's back. Or the woman who feels her husband is too strict with the children, and so undermines his rules when he is not around.

There is the case where a father feels his wife is babying their son, and so he's extra tough with him so he'll "learn to be a man." (Yes, this still happens.) Or the woman who is jealous of the closeness between her husband and their daughter, and so (often unconsciously) punishes the daughter by being very hard on her. And then on the simplest level is misdirected anger: you're angry at your spouse, so you yell at the kids.

These behaviours all arise either because we are unconscious about what we are really doing, or we are not taking responsibility for dealing with the issues in our lives. It is much easier, and less scary to act out our frustrations, than to confront and deal with what's really going on.

It is also much more damaging. It is really insecure and misdirected thinking that leads to the conclusion that it's better to carry on a kind of emotional guerrilla warfare than to go and get some help to change your process. Often these negative processes are so well entrenched that the couple feels hopeless about it ever changing. This is because what they often really want is for the other person to change. It's easy to get locked into this dead-end perspective, and that is why having a third party who can point out the blind spots can help you to move beyond them.

We all have limitations and need to grow, and sometimes children are the catalysts who set this growth in motion. So if there is a lot of conflict at your house over how the children are to be treated or disciplined, then you need to honestly look at what is going on between you and your spouse.

Children must not be made into scapegoats. If this is happening, staying together for the sake of the kids is ludicrous, because the child is being emotionally damaged. If you see this pattern in your family, talk it over with your partner, and vow to change it. If you need help, then get help. Do this... for the sake of the kids

The event organizers ensured that participant safety was a top priority. Motor marshals, pace cars, sweep cars, police, and first responders were all present to keep the traffic moving and make sure each rider was accounted for.

"154 riders went out on the routes and 154 riders came back, not a single Band-Aid was handed out," said Ian Gordon, Soldiers' Ride committee member and Safety Captain for the event.

The goal to raise \$25,000 for OSMH was more than doubled through the successful event.

"We are so honoured to see support from so many individuals and businesses in our community," said Kaitlyn St. Pierre, Senior Annual Giving Officer at OSMH Foundation and the event organizer. "So many members of the OSMH team supported this event through participation, donations to colleagues, and sponsorships. It was truly incredible."

Once my paperwork is finalized, I'll be travelling to Mugeta, a rural village in Northern Tanzania, to teach in the Mugeta Children's School. By many standards, it's considered to be a poor village, but what makes it rich is love that never fails.

Primary school in Tanzania ends at grade 7. The first time Joash Gambarage wore shoes, he had to borrow them to attend his grade 7 graduation. In 2010, Joash, a PhD candidate at the University of British Columbia at the time, told his family in Mugeta that he wanted to give back to the village by starting a primary school. His father, who owed 15 acres, told his son to build his school on that land.

Today, the school has approximately 300 students. An 80-bed dormitory ensures that students no longer walk up to five km to and from school daily. Academically, government testing ranks it as one of the top schools in its district.

Having received his Doctorate in Linguistics, Joash, who is now a lecturer at the University of British Columbia, travels to Mugeta with his wife, Neema, and his sons, Jones, and Eli, every summer to add to the school and visit his family there. The children of Mugeta follow him everywhere because they recognize love when they see it.


The people in the village support the school to the best of their abilities. Promoting equity in education, the school mobilizes educational, linguistic, health and recreational resources for the benefit of all the children in the area regardless of their gender, religion, or economic background. It advocates for the wellbeing of the community by empowering girls and women.

How does one develop the kind of love that starts a school with a bare piece of land and \$300? That convinces a utility company to waive certain fees so that the school can have electricity from the main road about two km away? That convinces a drilling company to dig not one, but two wells in a remote part of Tanzania - one well for the village and one for the school? How do we develop the kind of love that perseveres, against the odds, in the centre of God's will? How do we develop the kind of love that Dr. Joash Gambarage demonstrates daily to those around him, a man who, after all these years, still calls his wife "darling"?

He's a humble man who's risen from humble beginnings. What sustains him? Whatever woundedness he experienced, there is evidence that he exchanged it for love that never fails – the love of his risen Saviour!



It's clear that he relies on these seven words: God loves us, and we love Him. How might our lives change if we rely on these seven words? How are our lives changing as we rely on them? Who can we tell about the comforting, constant and consistent love of God, the love that never fails? Amen

Ask a Therapist by Sarah Covey On Creative Rest

Q: I just don't feel inspired. It's like the colour has gone out of my life and everything seems neutral and flat - can you help?

A: Sometimes we can feel disconnected from wonder in our lives because we are experiencing a deficit of creativity. It may be that you are feeling depleted by the mundane, by bland unchanging routines, or by the inability to appreciate the simple beauty found in your day-to-day life.

While feelings of malaise can be a sign of mild depression it can also be symptomatic of a life in need of creative rest. A conversation with a therapist might be a helpful first step to determine the root causes of your languishing and to devise a plan of action to address them.

In order to attend to creative fatigue, we need to reconnect with our childlike wonderment. Restoring this part of ourselves can be greatly impacted by time in nature where the grandeur of creation fills us with awe. The feeling that accompanies the sound of ocean waves crashing on the shore or the magnificent sight and splendor of a sunset over the mountains can help to bring back the energy we have been missing.

Of course, savouring the beauty in art can be revitalizing as well. Sometimes just sitting to read some poetry out loud or putting a soul-stirring song on repeat in your playlist can rekindle some of the creative passion that has been dwindling. Small moments of noticing and relishing in the delight of simple creative pleasures can be highly restorative. For some, participating as the artist in activities can be a healthy way to maintain this creative vitality. Consider trying something new like a pottery course, a cooking class, an outdoor concert, a trip to the art gallery, a music lesson, or a screenplay workshop to ignite this part of yourself again. Or return to something creative that brought you joy in the past with which you have lost touch.

Don't neglect your surroundings either! It can be helpful to add colour, plants, and meaningful art pieces to your spaces to infuse some inspiration into the places you find yourself most often. It will make a difference if you spruce up your office with some interesting artifacts, add some art postcards to your cubicle cork board, or throw a colourful, handmade quilt onto your bed.

Although beauty surrounds us and is available to us every day, it can often seem like appreciating its presence is of lesser importance than the other items on your to-do list. I encourage you to make room for beauty and art in your life regularly and without apology because creativity is vital to your overall sense of wellbeing.





"To GIC or to GIA: that is the question"

If the title sounds familiar, think William Shakespeare's Hamlet "To be, or not to be".

Midland and Elmvale McDonalds partnered for McHappy Day





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

"It's through our new partnership with New Path that our team of multi-disciplinary partners can conduct forensic interviews across the broader region of Simcoe Muskoka and bring the supportive care of our Child & Youth Advocates closer to home for many families. We know the mental health effects of abuse on children and youth are significant and require on-going support through prevention education, early interventions, therapy, and timely system navigation; our community partners like New Path make it possible for us to ensure this happens."

New Path is the Lead Agency for child and youth mental health in Simcoe County with the goal of ensuring that all children, youth and families receive timely transitions to mental health services when and where they need them. This partnership helps to ensure access to crucial mental health supports for vulnerable children and youth in our community.

"This is a win-win and a wonderful partnership that has been made possible because of our hybrid working model at New Path, which leaves some of our offices available to be used by our partners, like the Child & Youth Advocacy Centre," says Jim Harris, CEO, New Path Youth and Family Services. "This creative use of space enables us to support the critical work of the Child & Youth Advocacy Centre and enhance those warm hand offs we always strive to make, meaning that children and youth that have experienced abuse will be referred seamlessly and more comfortably to mental health services at New Path. We are committed to working in collaboration with partners that support children and youth and sharing resources, which is simply the right thing to do."Child & Youth Advocates provide individualized coordination of the forensic interview, forensic interview support, and follow up/ongoing support with system navigation, needs assessments, key community & service referrals, education, and connection to cultural resources.

DANDILION TEA – NOT YOUR GARDEN **VARIETY WEED**

As the days warm up, front and backyards across the region are once again becoming littered with dandelions. Although dandelions are despised by most homeowners, these misunderstood weeds provide

a number of health benefits that may surprise you. Considered an herbal remedy, dandelion tea can be made from either the leaves, flowers or roots of the plant. Each version has a distinct taste that can be brightened with the addition of lemon juice or sweetened with honey, maple syrup or stevia. An obvious word of caution before you harvest your crop of dandelions - for safety's sake, please ensure that they have not been sprayed with pesticides or herbicides.

DANDELION TEA - 3 WAYS

ROASTED DANDELION ROOT TEA

Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) dried dandelion root
- 1 cup (250 ml) water
- Sweetener honey, maple syrup, brown sugar, stevia – optional
- Lemon Juice optional

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F (177 C).
- 2. Roast the dandelion roots for 30 minutes. 3. Grind the roasted roots in a blender, food processor
- or coffee grinder.
- 4. In a mug, add boiling water to the roasted roots and steep for 5-10 minutes.
- 5. Strain dandelion roots.
- 6. Add lemon juice and sweetener of choice if desired.
- 7. Serve hot or cold.

DANDELION LEAF TEA

Ingredients:

- 1-2 teaspoons (5-10 ml) dried leaves or 1-2 tablespoon (15-30 ml) chopped fresh leaves
- 1 cup (250 ml) water
- Sweetener honey, maple syrup, brown sugar, stevia – optional
- Lemon Juice optional

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F (177 C) and roast the dandelion leaves for 30 minutes if using dried leaves.
- 2. Grind the roasted or fresh leaves in a blender, food processor or coffee grinder.
- 3. In a mug, add boiling water to the roasted leaves and steep for 5-10 minutes.
- 4. Strain dandelion leaves.
- 5. Add lemon juice and sweetener of choice if desired.

6. Serve hot or cold.

DANDELION FLOWER TEA

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup (125 ml) loosely packed dandelion flowers, shredded
- 1 cup (250 ml) water
- Sweetener honey, maple syrup, brown sugar, stevia – optional
- Lemon Juice optional

Instructions:

- 1. In a mug, add boiling water to the dandelion petals.
- 2. Steep for 5-10 minutes.
- 3. Strain dandelion petals.
- 4. Add lemon juice and sweetener of choice if desired.
- 5. Serve hot or cold.

Today we start going down in sunlight, losing 2 seconds until we reach the winter solstice on December 21 at 10:27 PM making it the shortest day. It's interesting to note that what we learned in school, that spring, summer, fall and winter begin on the 21st of the month, is actually happening for summer and winter this year. Happy summer and hopefully you get to enjoy the longer days for the next month or so and warm weather. Strawberry season has kicked into full gear and will be for the next several weeks. The early heat and significant rain that occurred last week has the berry farmers looking forward to a good season. There are a number of farms in the area and hopefully you can get out to one and pick your own or purchase some already picked. One of the activities that was enjoyed in our community in years past was the Strawberry Supper. This was held in late June or on Canada Day and saw many in the community come out to one of the two sittings. Delicious salads and cold plates were served along with fresh strawberries from one of the local farms. It was a great event that was always sold out and many families came together and assisted. As a community association this was one of the major fundraising events of the year as the association was responsible for the maintenance costs of the community centre including heat and hydro. There aren't many strawberry suppers left to be found but if you can find one, it is an experience that you won't soon forget. The Huronia West OPP recently posted a statement to the communities that they police. In their statement they said the following, "Traffic safety is everyone's responsibility, drivers and other road users can significantly contribute to safer roads by complying with all traffic laws, respecting others, and avoiding taking unnecessary and dangerous risks. Officers will be actively enforcing the Highway Traffic Act,...including excessive speeds." This statement is very strongly worded and hopefully will



be the attitude that the officers take particularly in regards to enforcing the speed limit. Horseshoe Valley Road has changed from a county road to a highway with almost by minute examples of unsafe speeds and disrespect for others. Wilson Drive is also much busier now and speeding is a major factor. The OPP does have an online reporting system where you can report bad behavior and other incidents and perhaps they need to see more contacts from our community to be more visible along these roads. Residents can also encourage more direct notice by installing the yellow and black, Slow Down, Kids at Play signs on their property. There are about a dozen properties along Horseshoe that have the sign and if more did, then perhaps the traveling public may take notice. If you would like one reach out to our ward council member, Brad Thompson. Brad can be reached by email at brad.thompson@springwater.ca and he can arrange to get you one. Many in the community use the rail trail for recreational purposes. Last year the township, with grant money, upgraded the trail with a new base and pedestrian gates. They also worked on a new agreement with the dirt bike and atv associations on where they could travel. Shortly after the gates were installed, one on Coughlin Road was damaged by persons unknown. Over the past weekend, two gates were pushed out of the ground at the intersection of Phelpston Road and Flos Road 3. There were numerous vehicle tracks evident along that section of trail heading into Phelpston. It is disturbing to think that there are individuals who think that the trails are

for their enjoyment only and not everyone else's and would cause that type of damage for their pleasure. If you see such activity, on the trails or in our parks, don't engage with the individuals but do take photos and send them to the township bylaw department. They will work with the police to bring the necessary justice to these irresponsible people. Regardless of where the grant money came from, it is your money that goes into these enhancements and anyone damaging them should and must be held responsible. Next week the school year will officially end. Other than snow days, our children were able to complete a full year for the first time in three. Our community extends our collective congratulations to all who graduated this year whether from kindergarten, elementary, high school, college or university. We are proud of your accomplishments and wish you all the best for the future. Canada Day is next weekend. There are no activities planned in our community but our neighbours to the north in Phelpston will be having fireworks that evening. A reminder that while the municipality does not have a fireworks bylaw, be considerate. There are many pets in the village and loud noises cause them to panic and unfortunately as was the last time there were fireworks ignited, run away. Most residents will expect fireworks at dusk but please not after 10PM. Your consideration is appreciated. That's all for this week, THANKS for READING, BE WELL and HAPPY CANADA DAY!

A 'CHIP' OFF....



When Dwight and Mary Bryan bought the farm the barn and house had been severed from the farm land. There were stanchions for 8-10 cows and stalls for horses. Dwight removed a cedar block foundation from the smaller barn and cemented it. A low wall in the larger barn was added so the pigs wouldn't root at the stone foundation. Bryans had 25 sows with feed coming from Alliston Feed Services Ltd. Five hundred laying hens produced eggs for the Brookdale Restaurant and other restaurants in Barrie. At that time the eggs did not have to be graded.



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OPP REPORT

Complaints of Shoplifting in Midland Retail Stores Over the Weekend Keep OPP Officers Busy

(June 19, 2023 MIDLAND, ON)- Calls to the Ontario Provincial Police Communication Centre for shoplifting offences from Midland area retail stores kept officers from the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment busy over the weekend.

THE OPP WOULD LIKE TO RAISE FRAUD AWARENESS DURING SENIORS MONTH

(OTTAWA, ON) - June is Seniors Month in Ontario and the 2023 theme is "Working for Seniors." The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) would like to raise awareness about frauds that target Ontario seniors, who have spent their entire life saving funds for their golden years. The OPP asks that we work collectively at sharing important fraud prevention tips with seniors in your life.

Being able to recognize frauds targeting seniors will go a long way in helping to combat cyber enabled frauds. With the public's help we want to deliver information, tips and strategies for Ontario's Seniors. In 2022, the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC)

received fraud reports totalling a staggering \$531 million in victim losses. A devastating \$138 million (26%) in losses were reported by senior victims. According to the CAFC, seniors lose on average 33% more than other demographics. It is estimated that only 5-10% of victims report scams and frauds to the CAFC or law enforcement.

According to the CAFC, in 2022, the top frauds affecting seniors were:

Investment frauds represented \$79.1 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$36.5 million.

Romance frauds represented \$19.5 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$8.8 million.

Service scams represented \$8.5 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$6 million.

Extortion frauds represented \$7.7 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$542,000.

Emergency-Grandparent scams represented \$7.1 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$4.3 million.

City receives \$325,000 in grants for greenhouse gas reduction work

City working to achieve net-zero emission by

(Barrie, ON) - The City of Barrie was recently awarded grants, valued at \$325,000, from Natural Resources Canada (NRCAN) and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM). Both of these grants will assist the City in its efforts in corporate and community energy conservation and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

"This funding will help get us one step closer to achieving our plan of net-zero emission by 2050," said Adam McMullin, Manager of Energy Management. "Thank you to Natural Resources Canada and FCM for making these grants available. The funding will make a huge difference as we work towards creating a more sustainable community."

Barrie will receive \$200,000 from FCM's Green Municipal Fund's Community Buildings Retrofit. The City is currently conducting greenhouse gas emission audits at ten City facilities, and this funding will cover 80 percent the cost. These audits will focus on existing and future building operations to reduce energy consumption and greenhouse gas emissions at the facilities.

The City also recently received a grant of \$125,000 from Natural Resources Canada's Zero Emission Vehicle Awareness Initiative (ZEVAI). ZEVAI helps fund outreach, education, and capacity-building activities, ultimately enabling greater adoption of zero emission vehicles by Canadians in all regions of

This funding will support the launch of a program called Electrify Barrie that includes a series of activities, including:

- Raising awareness of electric vehicle (EV) and EV charging stations within Barrie
- Conducting research to understand potential barriers to EV ownership and utilization
- Assessing the current state of Barrie's EV charging stations

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








Two Fundraisers for MRI for **Georgian Bay General Hospital**
