There has been a 30+ year movement to try to privatize the shorelines in Tiny Township, Ontario. Access has slowly been restricted to backlot owners who pay taxes in the Township. These beaches have been used by all historically. As they should be, citing the Public Trust Doctrine.

On Monday, our newly elected Council implemented an interim bylaw. It is not a bylaw that takes our beaches back, as the many loopholes used in the past prevent that. It was however, one of the few things our progressive Council was capable of doing to protect our shorelines. This by-law is unique and can only be used once every 3 years.

Below is the letter Mario Galluzzo shared most accurately describing what has been happening over the past 30 plus years. Mario is one of the few shorefront owners who has stood up for this cause.

"For the past 30+ years we have been told by the private beach movement, otherwise known as FOTTSA (Federation of Tiny Township Shoreline Associations), that ownership of the beaches does not affect the access and enjoyment of our beaches.

Over the same period, restrictive actions by FOTTSA-backed Councils (under the guise of protecting our beaches from the "public") were implemented. This definition of "public" however, included all non-shoreline owners.

The Township then started removing garbage cans from the beach accesses and implemented a restrictive parking policy.

Also, prior to 2006, when shoreline residents applied under the Boundaries Act to acquire beaches https:// www.ontario.ca/laws/statute/90b10, they were denied as the beaches were zoned OS (open space public). Then, under the Official Plan 2006, all beaches not municipally owned were rezoned Private. Shortly thereafter, Boundary Act applications were approved. Fences and rock walls began to populate the beaches accompanied by Private Beach signs.

When questioned, Township staff would quote the following statement "any lands not owned by the Township are private".

At every turn the private beach movement slowly and meticulously pushed the narrative of private beaches and relentlessly choked of access so that the community would be restricted to the slivers of sand that were municipally owned, all the while ignoring the historical use of Tiny residents.

The private beach movement has always maintained there were no issues. All the while directing the Township's Councils to continue restricting beach access subsequently directing Township staff to promote private beach claims.

Now after 30 years of divisiveness, we have a Council that will put a stop to the private beach movement and the FOTTSA narrative.

This new Council's actions are a refreshing testament to the protection of our most valuable resource in Tiny, our beaches.

Let's fully support their efforts...

They will question the cost to fix the problems that they caused. We as a community need to point out that the cost to right the wrongs committed by them against our community, is well worth the investment to reunite our Township".

This is an historic event for us here in Tiny Township, but we need more publicity surrounding it.

We still have a long way to go, but it's a great start. Regards, Tara Jaeger

Springwater Township Council,

I am a resident of Midhurst, at 54 Doran Road.

It is rare that I would reach out to my local elected officials, but in this circumstance I am compelled to do so to express my disapproval for the Township's decision to discontinue use of the Springwater News as a medium of communication with residents about official town notices, news and council matters.

My current edition of the Springwater News has informed me today that Council has instead chosen to spend 4x the cost for direct mailers as its replacement medium of communication, at a potential incremental cost of \$60,000 annually for no incremental gain in frequency of communication and perhaps only marginal benefits in distribution targeting to just Springwater residents.

Having subsequently read the Township's report on communication options tabled at the May 3rd council meeting, and resulting meeting minutes and watched the streamed Council meeting discussion, the direct mail option had no analysis provided to indicate it would be a financially viable or effective communication option or what assumptions or research would underlie such a choice. The only fact included in the report was that direct mail would cost not less than \$0.17 of postage per household reached (excluding costs of paper, printing, layout and internal staff handling). Given the pre-existing reach and frequency of Springwater News as a directly mailed publication, this would represent a massive increase in cost for very little added gain in communication benefit. It would allow the Township to mail out less frequently, but such option was not explored and would represent a reduction in timely communication with residents. A reduction in frequency and budget could similarly be achieved by publishing in the Springwater News less often.

The ad hoc commentary during Council's discussion of the direct mailer option suggests the following per mail out: A cost of \$0.17 postage per mailer and a printing cost of up to \$1295 per 12,000 prints. This makes for a per mail out cost of up to \$3336 per mail out, and potentially more. Savings on print formats were discussed, but no one mentioned that postage alone is more than double the cost of Springwater News at \$850 per print all-in. That is a 4X cost increase merely to gain "complete control over when the Township publishes" and to send it directly to residents rather than being part of a newspaper which reaches substantially all of those same residents.

One councillor did express concern at the potential costs. The Mayor expressed concerns that there were no estimates of costs. One councillor was adamant to proceed without cost estimates. 4 of 7 voted in favour. But there was no thought or discussion of why the Township should spend 4x more money on mailing letters rather than more efficiently publishing in the newspaper. There was no challenge to the Township staff about how such a deficiently researched and prepared report would come to Council as a basis for decision-making on the option Council chose to focus upon. There were many words about whether Springwater News reaches too many people, some of whom may live outside the Township; But not any discussion of why spending 4x the amount of money to reach fewer people is a gainful use of tax dollars for communication purposes. Incrementally better targeting less than 5% of the potential audience at a cost of 4X more is not a winning formula.

As a taxpayer, I am appalled at this decision in this time of inflation and economic hardship for many. My tax dollars do not appear to be used wisely in this regard. One might argue they are being frittered away. The ill-conceived approach here calls into question Council's decision-making on its much, much larger overall budget. Clearly, budgetary restraint is not a focus for Council when it can increase its spending on public notices by 4X without a considered thought as to whether that is a good use of resources.

The Township's use of the Springwater News also has the added benefit of contributing to an important forum for local businesses to advertise and reach local residents as well as one of the last remaining sources of local journalism. I enjoy reading the Springwater News. Myself, my wife and our three children all look through the paper each time it comes to our mailbox. I make a point of patronizing businesses which advertise, from Murray Brothers for small motor parts to Midhurst Pharmacy to Barrie Hill Farms, Steelers Pub and Midhurst Landscape. I found out about several of these businesses from their ads in Springwater News after we moved to Midhurst 6 years ago. Vibrant local journalism is quaint and incredibly important. It is also under siege due to forces beyond the control of the newspaper industry. Cutting it off for a higher cost, no more effective and likely less frequent direct mailer is misguided.

RVH's Emergency Department Launches Pilot Project Booking System For Minor Limb Injuries

May 31, 2023 - Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre (RVH) is pleased to announce a new pilot project booking system for some Emergency Department (ED) visits. Effective Thursday, June 1, the public can now book a same-day or next-day arrival time in the ED to be assessed and treated for minor injuries to a limb.

"As the busiest ED in the region, RVH will begin a new process where patients will be able to book an arrival time for registration for minor injuries such as a sprain, strain, or potential simple fracture to an arm or leg through an online booking portal. This new booking system is a pilot project with the goal to decrease overall wait times for patients by scheduling these arrival times earlier in the day to prevent ED overcrowding at the busiest times," says Sharon Ramagnano, Operations Director Emergency, Critical Care and Trauma.

The program will start with six specific arrival times a day Monday to Friday for triage, registration, provider assessment, and potentially an X-ray for those that may require this as part of their care. Patients will be directed to answer some simple questions online about the events surrounding their injury as well as any potential exclusion criteria such as bleeding, loss of consciousness, head, neck, or back injuries. The pilot project begins June 1, however since next day appointments are available the public can begin to book today, May 31

"The project will be continually evaluated to eventually expand and include other minor ailments such as simple cuts or lacerations, as well as cold and flu symptoms. Patients will also be asked if they would like to consent to having an anonymous survey sent to them to gather patient feedback on the new process to continue to improve," says Ramagnano. "The idea is to expand the number of assessments spots and grow the project."

RVH Launches New Visitor and Essential Care Partners Policy

June 1, 2023 - Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre (RVH) is pleased to announce the launch of its new Visitor and Essential Care Partner Presence Policy. Effective Thursday, June 1, visitors are welcome any time between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. with some exceptions. Essential Care Partners (ECP) are welcome 24 hours a day.

"RVH recognizes the important role Essential Care Partners and visitors play in promoting a supportive patient centered journey. Patient and TEAM RVH safety remains our top priority, however, with declining cases of COVID-19, we know it is the right time to introduce these welcome changes which will enhance the overall patient experience," Rachel Kean, Vice President, Quality, Risk and Patient Experience & Chief Privacy Officer.

An ECP is someone appointed by a patient or Substitute Decision Maker and can include family members, close friends, or other caregivers to provide support and function as a member of the care team. ECPs can attend the hospital more frequently and consistently and are not limited by regular visiting hours. Further details about the program and how to become an ECP can be found on RVH's website.

For visitors, exceptions include the Child and Youth Mental Health unit where visiting hours are seven days a week from 4 p.m. – 8 p.m. and the Adult Mental Health unit, where they are Monday to Fridays from 4 p.m. – 8 p.m. and weekends 9 a.m. – 8 p.m. Exceptions may apply to other specialty care areas, please speak with the patient's care team first. Children (less than 18 years) supervised by an adult, who is not the patient, are welcome. Children and the responsible adult must remain together at all times.

As a reminder, masking is optional in most public areas within RVH. Masking remains mandatory upon entering in-patients rooms; areas where patients are immunocompromised (e.g., cancer centre and dialysis); where there is risk to in-patients; and in areas, such as the Emergency Department.

Fire Ban Implemented in Springwater Township

Wheel-y Successful First Annual **Town of Midland Public Works Palooza**

Summer Wildlife Attractant Checklist

May 29, 2023 - April showers led to May flowers, and summer is just days ahead. It's a time of adventure and outdoor fun for Canadians - and a time of adventure and outdoor fun for wildlife, too. Fortunately, reducing negative encounters around the home is as easy as following this wildlife attractant checklist!

Attractants are anything that may draw the attention of animals or encourage them to visit/return to a specific place. In numerous negative encounters, unmanaged attractants or feeding of wildlife are direct causes.

- 1. Outdoor pet food. Leaving a bowl of kibble in the catio, or the detritus from a Labrador retriever attacking their bowl on the lawn, will attract species of all kinds from small rodents like mice and rats up to coyotes or black bears. Ensure any outdoor pet food is cleaned up properly.
- 2. Barbecues, grills, and fire pits. Marshmallows are a delicious treat, but when left next to a firepit, quickly becomes a siren for all nearby wildlife. Likewise, the grease trap under a barbecue, and the scraps on barbecue or standalone grills can be attractants for numerous species.
- 3. Ripened fruits and vegetables. It's early in the season, but numerous species of plants like mulberries are already forming their aggregate fruits that will ripen and drop beginning in June. Picking ripe fruits and cleaning up fallen fruits can help prevent wildlife from hanging out and returning.
- 4. Bird feeders and feed stations. Providing feed to birds is a long-time hobby for many people. As all birders know, it's not easy to keep squirrels away from feeders. Likewise, the high-calorie, highprotein, high-fat seed is a beacon for black bears and other wildlife, including rodents. If you live in bear country, bird feeders should be removed outside of the winter season. Clean up fallen seed and consider planting native shrubs and trees to provide natural habitat, safety, and food sources for birds and other wildlife.
- 5. Check for access points. Many species (but in urban areas raccoons and squirrels particularly) will create multiple dens and caches for themselves. Spend time during seasonal changes to check your home or business for points through which animals may access attics, crawl spaces, and walls. Look specifically for gaps in structures like walls and roofs, seals around utility lines, and open spaces under decks or sheds.

If you need assistance removing wildlife from your home or business, please contact a humane wildlife removal operator (consider checking the AnimalKind.ca list if you're in British Columbia), and do not attempt any home repairs unless you have appropriate safety equipment.

Joint Bank Accounts - Do They Avoid Probate?

Estate planning is becoming very sophisticated in Ontario. It is common to hear the suggestion to add a family member to a senior parent's bank account and make the bank account Joint With Rights of Survivorship. According to banking institutions that offer these services, it's a sure-fire way to avoid the Estate Administration Tax, commonly known as probate.

I have a story about following a banker's advice.

The elderly father sold his primary residence and cottage property and moved into a care facility. In his Will, he named his 3 adult children to be his estate beneficiaries. One child lived close and assisted with managing the elderly father's expenses.

As a result of that responsibility, the adult child and elderly father were "joint with rights of survivorship" on the primary chequing account, and on the savings accounts. The savings accounts held the proceeds of the real estate transactions, amounting to over \$1million.

The banker assured everyone that due to the "joint with rights of survivorship" designation, the assets would bypass the Estate Administration Tax.

After the father passed away, the beneficiaries were shocked to find that the assets were placed into probate and could not be released, contrary to what they were led to believe. Nearly a year later, the executor issued a cheque for the Estate Administration Tax, the clearance certificate was produced by the Ministry, and the beneficiaries finally received their inheritances.

The Will named the three children and only one of the children was on the joint bank account. Subsequently, the \$1million in the bank, regardless of the "joint with rights of survivorship", was pulled into the sphere of the Will instruction and distributed accordingly.

Once my paperwork is finalized, I'll be travelling to Mugeta, a rural village in Northern Tanzania, to teach in the Mugeta Children's School. By many standards, it's considered to be a poor village, but what makes it rich is love that never fails.

Primary school in Tanzania ends at grade 7. The first time Joash Gambarage wore shoes, he had to borrow them to attend his grade 7 graduation. In 2010, Joash, a PhD candidate at the University of British Columbia at the time, told his family in Mugeta that he wanted to give back to the village by starting a primary school. His father, who owed 15 acres, told his son to build his school on that



Today, the school has approximately 300 students. An 80-bed dormitory ensures that students no longer walk up to five km to and from school daily. Academically, government testing ranks it as one of the top schools in its district.


Having received his Doctorate in Linguistics, Joash, who is now a lecturer at the University of British Columbia, travels to Mugeta with his wife, Neema, and his sons, Jones, and Eli, every summer to add to the school and visit his family there. The children of Mugeta follow him everywhere because they recognize love when they see it.

The people in the village support the school to the best of their abilities. Promoting equity in education, the school mobilizes educational, linguistic, health and recreational resources for the benefit of all the children in the area regardless of their gender, religion, or economic background. It advocates for the wellbeing of the community by empowering girls and women.

How does one develop the kind of love that starts a school with a bare piece of land and \$300? That convinces a utility company to waive certain fees so that the school can have electricity from the main road about two km away? That convinces a drilling company to dig not one, but two wells in a remote part of Tanzania - one well for the village and one for the school? How do we develop the kind of love that perseveres, against the odds, in the centre of God's will? How do we develop the kind of love that Dr. Joash Gambarage demonstrates daily to those around him, a man who, after all these years, still calls his wife "darling"?

He's a humble man who's risen from humble beginnings. What sustains him? Whatever woundedness he experienced, there is evidence that he exchanged it for love that never fails – the love of his risen Saviour!

It's clear that he relies on these seven words: God loves us, and we love Him. How might our lives change if we rely on these seven words? How are our lives changing as we rely on them? Who can we tell about the comforting, constant and consistent love of God, the love that never fails? Amen

has been a passion of mine for a few years now. It hasn't always been like that.

I immigrated to Canada in 1957 from West Germany with my parents and brother. I was nine years old. We moved quite a few times during my life, and I guess that deep down inside, I regretted it, as I always had to make new friends, which was very hard at that time. When the kids found out that I had come from Germany, I became their target of literal insults. There came a time when I didn't want to tell anyone of my German heritage in order to avoid being bullied. As time went on, I became a victim of my surroundings, and I lashed out the only way I knew how. I was a troubled youth and hung around with the wrong crowd. I also rebelled by being a disturbance in class and not wanting to learn. I did not like geography or history or any other subjects that were taught. I never read any books that were assigned. I hated school. The telltale sign came when I looked at my report card. Back in those days, if you got a "D", "E" or "F", your parents' signature had to be on the report card. My parents never saw the report cards, because I forged their signatures. But I was found out at the end and got punished. And then one day, I met my husband-to-be. He was in grade 12 and I was in grade 9 — high school sweethearts, as they say. Things started to change then. We both attended the youth group in our church, and after some time, we got married. It was during that time that God was starting to tug at my heart, and I surrendered my life to the Lord.

It was when I went on a retreat and wrote a nonrhyming poem that the teacher suggested that I try and write a devotional and to date, I have written over one hundred devotionals that I share with you, the readers.


As I am writing this, I reflect on what has happened over the years and wonder why God chose someone like me to share His love with others.

Ask a Therapist by Sarah Covey On Emotional Rest



A: Despite the stereotype, therapists want to know how their clients FEEL about things for good reason! All of life is connected to emotion and yet few of us understand how to name and process our feelings in healthy ways. We find ourselves navigating the world around us with a view to make it work for other people without also thinking about the emotional impact that people-pleasing behaviour has on our wellbeing.

Emotional fatigue can emerge when we are not attuned to our own emotional landscape in a way that allows us to honour and prioritize our own needs above the needs of others. When our feelings are repressed and/or we are not able to honestly express our own experiences we can burn ourselves out carrying that emotional load.

Sometimes we have not been good at maintaining boundaries around the expectations of others in light of our own preferences. Other times we may have suppressed our own perspectives and concerns to avoid burdening others or to avoid their criticism. If you are a caregiver of any kind, you might experience this type of emotional exhaustion more readily than others because so much energy is directed to care for others that there is not enough left for yourself.

In order to restore some emotional capacity and release emotional burden, it is important to find safe places to share vulnerably and transparently about what you are feeling. We need to express our pain and our stories in an authentic way and to be listened to and validated without judgment. We all know the comfort that comes after a sincere venting session or an encouraging conversation with a friend who understands how we are feeling.

This need for uncensored self-expression is a common impetus for people to reach out and seek therapeutic support because a counsellor can facilitate that process of unburdening in a meaningful way. Sometimes it can be hard to open up and honestly say how you feel to the people around you in your regular life because it feels so raw and exposing. A therapist can provide support that might feel less intimidating and also help you to find strategies to continue to prioritize your emotional needs.

If you are feeling emotionally exhausted, don't continue to isolate yourself. Take some time to find the people in your life who will hold space for you to share authentically and who will help you give a voice to your feelings. Restorative emotional work is a vital component of every comprehensive self care

During an unprecedented cost-of-living crisis, Canadians are struggling to feed their families, pay their bills, and fill their tanks. I've heard from countless residents in our community who are unable to afford the increases to their gas and home heating bills caused the Liberal government's carbon tax.

To make matters worse, the Liberals are bringing in a second hidden carbon tax to further hike the price of gas, heat and groceries. According to the Parliamentary Budget Officer this second carbon tax will cost the average Canadian household an extra \$573 per year without any rebate, with families in some provinces facing costs as high as \$1157.

The combined impact of the two carbon taxes will be an extra 61 cents for every litre of gasoline. The first Trudeau carbon tax will cost 37 cents per litre, the second carbon tax 17 cents per litre and with the sales tax on the carbon taxes, it will all add up to 61 cents per litre.

The Parliamentary Budget Officer also noted that this second carbon tax disproportionately affects lower-income families and will shrink our economy.

This second carbon tax is a price that is simply too high for struggling Canadian families to pay. Conservatives will axe these taxes and bring home affordability for Canadians. A Conservative government will protect our environment through technology, not taxes.

June 4, 2023 - What do you do when the power goes out? We've been living in the Dominican Republic for three months and the power goes out here about once a week. I found that I passed through three stages of coping without electricity - excitement, annoyance and acceptance.

The first few times it happened it was fun and exciting. If it was during the day we noticed all the fans stopped spinning. If it was at night all the lights went out. If we were online all of a sudden we were offline. One of the kids might shout,"The power is out!" And the other doubtful and suspicious kids would attempt to test the hypothesis by flicking light switches on and off. After three attempts they might agree, "Yep. It's out."

A few times we wondered if it was just us or was the whole neighbourhood down? Looking out the window we could see lights on in sporadic intervals up the hill. I stopped moving to listen quietly to the hum of generators down the street. The lucky neighbours had generators. Which meant they had light and potentially...air conditioning. Not all the houses here have air conditioning. Our place has small units in the three bedrooms but none in the living areas. My neighbour George has two. Unfortunately, someone took the motor out of one and the parts out of the other. Power or no power, Senor George has no air conditioning. With parts not easily available here he's got to wait a few weeks to remedy the situation.

After the power had been out a few times it began to get annoying. Stage number two. If it's a smoking hot night without A/C that is annoying. If your kids were just watching a movie that is annoying. If you're about to join a Zoom meeting online that is annoying.



Flashlights help somewhat in the event of a power outage. If you can find them. I may be abnormal but I keep a headlamp flashlight in my closet so that if the power goes out I know exactly where to get light. My four-year-old son keeps his flashlight... well he doesn't exactly keep it anywhere. He plays with it, puts it in his back pocket, backpack or the backyard. When the power finally went back on last night he discovered his flashlight in the backyard where he had hidden it somewhere to keep it away from thieving sisters, naturally. Not all that helpful though when the power goes out and you actually need the light.

Which brings me to stage number three - Acceptance. I've come to accept the fact that the power is going to go out. Last night it went out at dinner time. Not convenient for the food preparation crew trying to make a meal for 11 people in the dark. Have you ever tried to spoon feed peas to a toddler in the dark while wearing a headlamp? That could get you on America's Got Talent. But we accept it and deal with it. We can't really complain too much when we're living on a beautiful tropical island right beside the ocean. No snow to shovel here lately.

We'll be able to look back at eating dinner in the Dominican darkness and sweating our faces off in the hot Dominican nights. Memories. It's all about the memories, right dads? Time flies! Make every moment count! Even if you can't see what you're spooning into your kids' mouth.

Ontario Launches Free Job Training for People with Disabilities

June 5, 2023 - The government of Ontario is investing \$6.5 million to support five innovative projects to help more than 3,7770 people with disabilities find meaningful jobs with businesses in their communities. These projects will connect jobseekers to careers in a variety of sectors, including health care, information technology, retail and hospitality. More than 2.6 million people in Ontario live with a disability, which can significantly increase risk of unemployment.

Giving people with disabilities a fair shot at a lifechanging job isn't simply the right thing to do, but it's also good for the economy. There are currently nearly 300,000 unfilled jobs across the province of Ontario. Therefore, the government is proud to invest in training programs that will lift people living with physical and intellectual disabilities up, giving them training and confidence they need to find meaningful work, earn a good paycheque, and lead purposedriven lives.

The projects being supported through this new funding are as follows:

Canadian National Institute for the Blind

- Canadian National Institute for the Blind is receiving \$3,476,885 for a project helping youth who are blind, partially sighted or deafblind find jobs. This includes providing mentorship and coaching programs, goal-setting workshops, accessible technology training and peer support groups.
- The program will also help Ontario employers better accommodate workers with sight loss.
- This project will help 1,300 people work in many sectors including health care, digital media, retail and education across Ontario.

Community Living Toronto

• Community Living Toronto is receiving

\$1,816,053 to support a project that aims to help more people with intellectual and developmental disabilities find jobs. Through the MyJobMatch (MJM), job seekers are connected with employers who are seeking to fill positions in industries such as hospitality, customer service, retail, IT, manufacturing, janitorial and maintenance.

- This project will help 2,400 people access employment in Toronto and the surrounding area. Do Good Donuts
- Do Good Donuts is receiving \$149,230 for a project that supports youth with intellectual and or developmental disabilities through a work-based training program that includes hands-on training for front and back of house roles, and comprehensive wrap around supports including training for applicable certificates. Participants will also be supported as they transition into employment in the community.
- This project will help 15 people work in the hospitality industry within the greater Toronto area. Geneva Centre for Autism
- Geneva Centre for Autism is receiving \$848,890 to support a project that aims to better prepare people with autism for good jobs.
- Participants will receive eight weeks of accessible pre-employment group training followed by an additional four weeks of one-to-one support with an employment facilitator for skill building, career exploration, resource development, certification courses and other opportunities based on individual career goals and skills.
- This project will train 20 staff, from a network of 25 employers, to hire, accommodate, and retain employees with autism.



• It will also prepare 20 people to work in various sectors in the Toronto area.

PTP Adult Learning & Employment Programs

- PTP Adult Learning & Employment Programs is receiving \$256,177 to support a project to help people with intellectual disabilities find meaningful employment.
- Working with George Brown College's College Vocational (CV) Program, this program will focus on employability skills training, employment counselling, specialized workshops, and assistance in securing work placements.
- This project will help 35 people in the Toronto area work in their sectors of interest and could include hospitality, childcare, retail, and IT.

These projects are funded through the Skills Development Fund, a \$700 million initiative, which supports ground-breaking programs that connect jobseekers with the skills and training they need to find well-paying careers close to home. The government will be unveiling more programs to help people with disabilities in the coming months.


had me itching to be out in the bush. I headed out

on the smaller track that heads through an old growth forest, with large trunks of trees reaching up to the sky to form a cathedral of green above my head. As the coolness of the forest ends, I step out into the heat of the marsh and swamp. The local beaver has been busy, and the trail is flooded in multiple areas, and several times I had to balance across logs and jump across thick mud. If you are ok with mud on your shoes, then you will have no problem, however if you are afraid of snakes, you might want to take an alternative route. Five snakes, sunning themselves in the warm sun, and one that would be the most massive Gardiner snake I had ever seen that refused to make way for this hiker. Respect, I was happy to move off to the side and give him his space.

I spent three hours hiking through this area, travelling just over twelve km. I moved along trails that climbed to the top of the ski hills, and down into valleys full of ferns and ramps. I loved nibbling on these pungent members of the onion family while I walked among the cool forests. However, I became very concerned with the state of the forest this year. Usually by this time the undergrowth is deep and green, but this year there is less green, and the forest is covered in a thick layer of brittle dry leaves. We tend to think of the forest fires as not an issue here in our part of Ontario, but it is time to reconsider this. One spark from a cigarette, or an ember from a fire pit, would send our forests into an inferno. Please, it is up to all of us to keep both our forests and our neighbours safe.



sightings of Black Bears in and around the community. Ministry of Natural Resources staff have been seen in the Hendrie tract on a number of occasions with their dogs. You are reminded that it likely isn't too wise to allow dogs to roam free in the forest as they may encounter the bears while not near you. The MNR does not regularly trap bears to move them to other locations so it is important that we are aware that they do live nearby. If you have issues with bears, you can call the Ontario Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 to discuss it with MNR staff. You can also search Bear Wise on the internet and get valuable information as well.

No Mow May is over and we are now seeing more lawns and yards look neat and tidy. If you have been outside for any length of time you may have noticed that the mosquito population seems to have had a huge increase this year. With the dry warm weather of late, they are starting to die down and hopefully we will have an enjoyable season. What has been found interesting is that there has been observed that there are more Bumblebees around. Doing a bit of research, the bumblebee lives in smaller colonies than the honeybee and that a female bumblebee can sting many times although they try to ignore humans. Perhaps our little part in contributing to our planet is working.

This Spring has seen an unprecedented number of wildfires in Canada. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the affected families with hopes that they can weather the devastation and get back onto their feet. It is reported that this may become a new norm for us. If you ever spot smoke coming from any of our forests,

Understanding Depression

an effort to get out of bed or tend to personal care. Indeed, this does characterize some who are severely depressed and need medical care.

However, many in the general population suffer from chronic low-grade depression. They may function well in most aspects of life, and certainly do not look depressed, yet nothing brings them joy or happiness. Some experience irritability or a lack of tolerance for others. Others may constantly complain and criticize those around them. They are depressed but do not know it and blame other people or situations for their unhappiness.

Some may have gained weight, and while this causes more distress, they cannot summon the motivation to do anything about it. Increased dependency on substances, or spending more time on addictive behaviors (gambling, pornography, spending) are often indicators of depression.

In the absence of a major trigger for depression, such as the death of a loved one, loss of a job or relationship breakup, there is a good chance that there is a biochemical basis within the individual. Often this may be hereditary, but not always.

Depression is painful and the depressed person is

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suffering. They can feel alienated from life. They are unable to enjoy anything. If all food were tasteless, how much would we look forward to any meal?

It is said there is more depression (and anxiety) since Covid. Further, world events can add to a sense of hopelessness, as well as generating fear. The highest rates of depression are in those aged twelve to twenty-five. Our young people had their lives turned upside down with the pandemic. The world is so much different now than when most of us grew up.

If depression is suspected, a visit with one's physician or a psychologist is in order. A professional can objectively assess the individual and make recommendations. If a person is suicidal, it is an emergency.

Often people with chronic depression have been that way most of their lives, and do not know what it feels like to experience genuine happiness and positive mood. Consequently, they may resist the notion that they are depressed, because their emotional state seems normal to them.

It is normal to feel sadness or stress sometimes, but it is also normal to feel happiness and excitement. If the positive end seems missing from your scale of emotions do talk to someone about it. Otherwise, physical and mental health, along with work and relationships will suffer.


at the helm, your trip is sure to be memorable.



Minesing was called Tomlinson Settlement after the first settlers who bought Concession 8, E 1/2 Lot 8 in 1847. John Laird, the first postmaster for Minesing from 1864-1867, named it Laird Settlement. The neighbours were not happy with the name. When visiting Indians who lived on the banks of the Nottawasaga River, Colin McDougall was told the area was known as Min-is-sing, meaning island.

Laird's two daughters. Isabella and Mary were not trained teachers. They initially taught school in their parent's home where students paid 2¢ per day. In 1861 a frame building was built and used as a school, church, Sunday school and concert hall. Half the early settlers could not read or write, and now that they were landowners they realized the value of an education. A new brick school was built by the Davenport brothers in 1880. It burned in 1897.

The Atlas of 1881 listed Mrs. R.P. Dixon as coming to Minesing in 1873. In 1887 Richard Dixon was listed as a farmer with the address as Toronto. His brother David and cousin James came from England in 1856. David bought Lot 1, S 1/2, Concession 11. James returned from California, worked for Richard and later purchased Lot 1 N 1/2, Concession 11. Richard had a young cousin working for him. When a storm came up Richard and the boy stepped into the barn. After the rain stopped the boy stepped outside to pull burrs out of the dog. A crack of lightning came and the boy was killed

Irvin (Jimmy) Johnston owned this farm when he inherited his mother's farm on Concession 9, W 1/2 Lot 6. Vespra Township. This farm had 100 workable acres while the other had only 40 workable. Irvin wasn't sure if he could afford both so he sold off the W 1/2 of Lot 6 to John Plowright.

Alan G. Johnston, Audrey Stillman, A History of the Community of Minesing p. 63 & 85, 1881 Atlas of Simcoe County, A History of Vespra Township p. 643, 654 & 789.



The barn was originally on mud sills. The single boarded stable was very cold, allowing in wind, rain and snow Fred Priest helped raise the barn 7-8° onto a cement foundation using railway ties to jack it up.

Concession 9, E 1/2 Lot 6, Vespra Township 2500 Highway 26, Springwater Township



This bank barn was built into the side of a hill, with access to the threshing floor at ground level.



The lower level was accessed from the back, with a ladder inside leading to the mow and threshing floor. The farm originally had 100 workable acres. Highway 26 cut the farm in half. with property being sold to a number of people. Larry Camack bought 68 acres of land in 1980 from Irvin's son Bill Johnston. The barn is now on a 3 acre parcel.

Georgian Bay District Secondary School Placed in Lockdown

Police Recover Water Gun and Student Taken into Custody

June 6, 2023 - (MIDLAND, ON) - A Midland high school was placed into lockdown today after a student was observed walking into the building with a firearm. Members of the Southern Georgian Bay Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) were called to Georgian Bay District Secondary School around 11:30 a.m.

A student was seen on surveillance video entering the school while holding a pistol shaped object and police were immediately contacted. The school was placed into lockdown while officers responded and entered the school. The student was located in a classroom and was taken into custody. Police located a water gun which resembles a Sig Sauer handgun.

The investigation is on-going and the names of the involved young person will not be released due to provisions contained in the Youth Criminal Justice Act.

The lockdown was lifted at approximately 11:45 a.m. All occupants of the school are safe. Police would like to thank staff and students of the school for their cooperation during this stressful incident.

SEVEN CHARGES AGAINST INDIVIDUAL IN SEX TRAFFICKING CASE

Police Believe There Are More Victims

(BARRIE, ON) - Police have arrested and charged a Barrie resident in a human trafficking investigation. The Provincial Human Trafficking Intelligence-Led Joint Forces Strategy (IJFS) members began an investigation, named Project CHANCE, in January 2023 when they received information of suspected human trafficking. An international female student was allegedly exploited in the sex trade through an online advertisement by a company called "Scarlet Room Agency," which claimed to provide security and training for sex workers. An addition victim has also been identified.

As a result of the investigation, on May 25, 2023, IJFS members arrested Casey PERRYMAN, 40 years old of Barrie, and charged him with the following Criminal Code offences:

- Exercise Control, Direction or Influence of a person, as per Section 286.3(1) - two counts;
- Material benefit from sexual services, as per Section 286.2(1);
- Advertising sexual services, as per Section 286.4 - two counts;
- Receiving material benefit from sexual services, as per Section 286.2(1); and,
- Sexual assault, as per Section 271.

The accused remains in custody pending a bail hearing on June 7 at the Bradford Courthouse.

The victims are in a place of safety and being provided support. Police believe there are more victims and asks anyone with information to contact the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) at 1-888-310-1122.

partner agencies who supported this IJFS investigation include the Barrie Police Service, Halton Regional Police Service, Peel Regional Police, Toronto Police Service, York Regional Police, Windsor Police Service, London Police Service, Waterloo Regional Police Service and Six Nations Police Service. The Repeat Offender Parole Enforcement Team, Digital Forensic Unit, the Financial Transactions and Reports Analysis Centre of Canada (FINTRAC) and members of the Orillia OPP Detachment also assisted.

ABOUT THE IJFS

On March 6, 2020, the Government of Ontario announced funding to establish the IJFS, consisting of full-time investigators and analysts who are assigned to participating police agencies across Ontario, including municipal and First Nations, along with additional resources to the OPP. The IJFS has increased the capacity for policing by assisting in identifying, investigating and disrupting multi-jurisdictional human trafficking organizations operating within Ontario.

June 5, 2023 - A 28 year old Barrie male has been charged with three counts of Careless Driving Cause Bodily Harm contrary to the Highway Traffic Act as a result of the crash that sent the accused and three victims to hospital with serious injuries. The accused will appear before the Provincial Court of Justice on August 21, 2023 to face the charges.

Investigators wish to thank area residents and motorists alike for their patience today as the roadway was closed for almost eight hours for investigation.

OPP Officers from Several Detachments Nab Driver after Numerous Driving Complaints on Highway 400

(MIDLAND, ON)- On the afternoon of June 4, 2023, the OPP Communication Centre was in receipt of numerous 911 calls from motorists reporting the actions of a lone vehicle south bound on Highway 400 in the Parry Sound area. The vehicle was being operated in a very erratic manner along with forcing other vehicles off the roadway as it headed south into Simcoe County.

Officers from the Southern Georgian Bay Huronia West and Orillia OPP Detachments were able to intercept the suspect vehicle in the area of Horseshoe Valley Road at approximately 2:51 p.m. were able to safely stop the suspect vehicle with a resounding sign of approval from passing motorists.

The lone male driver was arrested at the scene and transported to Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment for further investigation.

MOTORCYCLE SERIOUS SINGLE COLLISION IN SPRINGWATER

Age of Rider, Closure Reopening

(SPRINGWATER TOWNSHIP, ON) - Members of the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) are investigating a serious single motorcycle collision in Phelpston, Springwater Township.

On June 5, 2023, shortly after 5:30 a.m., Huronia West OPP and emergency services were called to a single vehicle collision on County Road 27, where a motorcycle left the roadway and struck a sign in the ditch, which is believed to have occurred sometime around 1:00 a.m. The lone rider, a 17-year-old male from Barrie, was taken to local hospital and later transported by Ornge to a Toronto-area hospital with serious injuries.

One of the vehicle drivers was extricated by fire services prior to transport to an area hospital and was further transported to a Toronto area trauma hospital for treatment of injuries sustained in the crash.

As a result of the crash investigation, a 33-year-old male of North York has been charged with Careless Driving contrary to the Highway Traffic Act.

As the years rolled on, all the people I knew who loved and were involved in classic cars and motorcycles had a few sad things happen to them. Some are comical, some are depressing.

British sports cars with fixed steering wheels, the beer bellies got too big and they could not get in them any more, so they sold them.

To Women who once thought these things were cool, classic cars suddenly became hot, uncomfortable, noisy, smelly, rough to ride in, they were and are.

Hot rods and muscles cars required taking a second

mortgage on your house to buy fuel, before it reached its current levels.

Their backs hurt, they cannot bend down to get in, they cannot manipulate the clutch stick shift. There is no room for the grand kids. They do not have enough seat belts. I don't want to have to wait for you to explain to everyone who comes up to you getting a coffee, while you give them the life history of the car.

This describes users, drivers and ageing consumers. Yet true classics are hitting new highs in values, seldom get driven to buy groceries or get coffees, and often get better treatment than members of the


