Aug. 19, 2023 - Elmvale, ON: On Saturday, MPP Doug Downey was at the Elmvale Legion to formally congratulate the organisation on the work it's been doing since receiving a \$145,000 Capital grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) late last year. The grant was used to renovate the 90-year-old building that is the focal point for both Legion and community members for a variety of activities and meetings.

"Legions have long been the heart of our communities. They provide a space to gather, to honour, and to remember," said Doug Downey, MPP for Barrie-Springwater–Oro-Medonte. "These funds will help ensure that the Legion can continue to serve Elmvale, and that members can continue to support veterans and their families for years to come."

Funds from the OTF grant were used to help with the costs involved with installing new flooring throughout the building, a new ceiling in the lower level of the building, new lighting and outlets in the Club Room and the Upper Hall. The grant also helped with the costs of adding new drywall in some parts of the building and new paint on the walls, and accessibility upgrades to the building's washrooms.

The Elmvale Legion is used by not only members but also by a variety of community organisations for meetings, celebrations and fundraisers. Thanks to the \$145,000 grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation, people of all abilities will be able to access and enjoy both levels of the building.

"The impact of the Ontario Trillium Foundation grant cannot be overstated," said Graham Simmonds President of the Elmvale Legion Branch 262. "This grant has allowed needed renovations to be made. Our building is now fresh and bright, and our washrooms are now completely accessible. We also want to congratulate the Ontario Trillium Foundation on 40 years of granting and building healthy and vibrant communities across the province."



## Standing Ovation for Female Councillor Koch of Kenora on Human Rights Question at Recent AMO Conference

Aug. 23, 2023 London, ON - 186 municipalities in support, and growing weekly, along with Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Rural Ontario Municipal Association, and the Ontario Big City Mayors are calling on government to legislation to address the rampant and underreported instances of harassment perpetrated by municipally elected officials. The call is for legislation that would not only provide a process for removal of councillors who egregiously harass someone but would restrict subsequent reelection for those found guilty.

Councillor Lindsay Koch from Kenora stood up in the "Bear Pit" at the AMO conference in London last Tuesday, and asked the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing when this government will make this legislation a priority. She received the longest and loudest cheers accompanied by a standing ovation.


The push stems from 'The Women of Ontario Say NO'- a grassroots consortium of individuals, organizations and community groups that want to see the current reality addressed. As it stands, municipal councillors can perpetrate the most egregious acts of harassment with a maximum penalty of only 90 days suspension without pay. The call for legislative change includes amendments to the Municipal Act and City of Toronto Act that would legislate adherence to violence and harassment policies, provide a process for removal for investigated and substantiated acts (that includes a judicial review) and a restriction on subsequent re-election for those found guilty.

"The reality is that we have people in communities with the most power, who are effectively immune from the standards of treatment we have come to expect in every other workplace", states Emily McIntosh, lead advocate. "This is making communities sick and is a blatant gap in human rights legislation. Women, who are the primary victims, either suffer in silence, as removal isn't an option unless they go to the police and the person is convicted, or are forced to leave their jobs. This is unacceptable in today's world." *By Emily McIntosh*

The proposal seeks to permit a seniors continuum of care campus development that will include long-term care facilities, retirement residences, life lease seniors buildings and associated medical, pharmacy and associated retail uses. An MZO is necessary for the proposal to proceed as the lands are located outside of the Township's Settlement Area boundary, and to permit the development to occur in a timely manner.



#### **Ontario Preparing Students for Success** Students and parents can expect updated curriculum, more support and staffing for new school year

Aug-. 8, 2023 TORONTO — The Ontario government is providing new student supports and updating curriculum for the 2023-24 school year. These actions will refocus school boards on the development of foundational skills in read-ing, writing and math, supported by almost \$700 million more in base edu-cation funding, \$109 million in a new strategy to boost literacy rates, and the hiring of 2,000 more educators.

"Our government is delivering on our commitment to continue to raise the bar by boosting student success in the classroom with a focus on reading, writing, math, STEM disciplines, and learning about mental health literacy," said Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. "Our students deserve a stable and enjoyable school year with the full school experience of extracurricu-lars, clubs and more that build real life and job skills that go beyond the classroom."

Beginning this September, all publicly funded school boards will be re-quired to adopt provincial student achievement priorities and metrics to:

Help students improve EQAO scores in reading, writing and math;

Prepare students for future success to raise graduation rates, en-courage more students to participate in job skills programs and take senior math and science courses; and

Improve student engagement and awareness of mental health sup-ports. To further support students facing challenges with math, Ontario is invest-ing over \$71 million to launch the Math Action Achievement Plan, a strate-gy to boost math competence in the classroom and improve board ac-countability. This includes:

One lead per school board with the focus of helping improve math outcomes for students. These leads will be responsible for curricu-lum implementation and standardized training and lead board-wide actions to meet targets.

More than 300 math coaches will provide direct support in class-rooms. New Math Action Teams will work directly with school boards to identify and recommend targeted strategies to improve student achievement.

To ensure students have the skills they need to compete and succeed, the province is investing more than \$100 million to hire over 940 educators to support students from Grades 7 to 10 transition to high school. Ontario also intends to fund \$1 million per year for two years beginning in 2024 for the Ontario Science Centre to create hands-on learning experiences and vir-tual lesson plans for students, as well as STEM teaching materials for edu-cators.

For the 2023-24 school year, Ontario is introducing revamped curriculum supports to ensure student success including:

Language Curriculum: Last updated in 2006/2007, the revised Language and Français Grade 1 to 9 curriculums include founda-tional instruction to support reading and writing, critical thinking, and digital media literacy skills.

Educator Resources: The government has provided \$825,000 to Dyslexia Canada to develop, in partnership with International Dys-lexia Association Ontario, evidence-based systematic and explicit instruction resources and learning supports that are now ready for use.

Reading Screener and Supports: The province's \$109 million 2023-24 investment includes the largest screening program in Can-ada, funded with \$12.5 million annually to support students from Year 2 of Kindergarten to Grade 2 to be screened for early reading. Up to 700 literacy educators will work to support students who are behind in reading development.

Grade 10 Digital Technology and Innovations in the Changing World: This course will equip students to be innovative leaders by teaching them how to apply coding concepts and skills, build hands-on projects, and investigate artificial intelligence, cybersecu-rity, and other emerging digital technologies.

Financial Literacy Modules: Secondary students will learn how to create a budget, manage their money, protect themselves from fi-nancial scams, and plan for long-term purchases such as buying a house or car with new modules.

Mental Health Modules: The Ontario government has partnered with School Mental Health Ontario in collaboration with the Hospital for Sick Children to develop Mental Health Literacy Modules, for teacher use in Grades 7 and 8.

These measures will improve transparency for parents and ensure Ontar-io's public education system continues to focus on improving student out-comes by providing them with the skills and tools they need to succeed, particularly in key areas like reading, writing and math.

## Rest at the End Not the Middle



Aug. 28, 2023 - I recently had a group of women ask me how it was possible to make it through 1015 trail miles on a snowmobile as a fundraiser to send lowincome kids to summer camp. I started the same way I always do when people ask me this and I usually laugh and agree it was certainly a very grueling ride and experience. The part of the ride that is still the most vivid are the hydro lines. It was a total whiteout and had been for close to twelve hours, with heavy snow accumulation. We could not reschedule the ride due to two of us not being available after this day, so we pulled out of the Ramada parking lot knowing we were in for a challenging twenty-four hours. I did not know exactly how long we had been riding for or exactly how many miles we had travelled, but I did know I was tired, and I wanted to quit. My arms and shoulders were incredibly sore, and my knees had started to ache at this point. Riding through so much snow and breaking so much trail we had to physically exert ourselves a lot more than anticipated. Hydro lines are typically fast trails, however in a white out and in darkness with heavy snow on the trails they were quite challenging. I tried to always keep Jeffrey's taillight visible as my lifeline for the ride, knowing if I could see that light, I was ok. At no point was I worried about getting left behind on the trail, I knew this would never happen. Losing that taillight meant I was falling behind, and falling behind meant I was not going to get this ride done in time and that was my biggest fear. Knowing the people who doubted me would be right and the naysayers would be right and all the women who needed to see me finish would be let down, that was my biggest fear. I could not pull to the side of the trail and park, I could not call my husband or family to help me, I could only get myself out of this. I must rest at the end not in the middle because no one is coming to save me. I must keep this machine moving and I must tell myself that I can do just a little bit more, because just when I thought I had nothing left, there was always just a little bit more. Mile after mile I told myself this, just a little further, just a little bit more, you must keep going and you must finish these thousand miles, or you will regret it the rest of your life. In life you must find the strength to keep going because the pain of quitting will always last longer than the pain you are in now. Rest at the end, not in the middle.

Aug. 28. 2023 - Who doesn't love a good visit to the emergency room with one or two kids? In my 17 years of being a father I've observed that there's two kinds of kids in this world. We have those kids that don't ever need to go to the emergency room and we have...boys. I think we've done pretty good, tallying up only three emergency room visits with our six daughters and three sons. You can probably deduce by now who the injured parties were. Yes, one was our middle son, Justice, and the other was our oldest son, Sterling. In all fairness, Justices' visit was after a car accident that wasn't his fault so I'll let him off the hook. But Sterling on the other hand...

The first visit to RVH with Sterling was a few years ago when he "tapped" an old glass window with his hand and shockingly "tapped" right through. His most recent visit to the emergency room was two weeks ago in the beautiful country of the Dominican Republic. This tropical emergency room was a slightly different, though not unpleasant, medical experience.

We were staying with some friends, Mike and Laura, near Puerto Plata, a popular destination for Canadian vacationers. Mike and Laura have built a beautiful guest house where they host short-term missionary teams visiting the Dominican Republic to serve the people. Behind the guest house they built a beautiful little fountain and concrete fish pond. You might say it's little enough for an 11-year-old boy to jump over. You would be wrong.

We noticed the fish pond when we arrived at the guest house and my children's father warned them that they might want to jump over and around the fountain and fish pond. He even said, "I bet some of you can jump right over this but that's a bad idea so please don't jump around the fish pond." Sometimes we obey our fathers and sometimes we attend class at the school of hard knocks. For 11-year-old Sterling, class was about to begin.

A few days later I heard one of our other children calling me in an emergency-room-type voice, "Dad! Sterling really needs you! He needs help!" When I got around the corner to the back of the guest house, I could hear Sterling calling. He was lying on the ground beside the fish pond. He was crying and holding his leg with his hands which were covered in blood. No bueno, amigo.

Not one to over-react in a situation such as this, I calmly asked him to take his hands off his leg so I could see what the problem was. I hoped we could avoid the DR hospital and bandage his small wound. When Sterling took his hand off his leg and I could see his shin bone, I realized bandages would be insufficient in this scenario. To "el hospital" we go! I was pleasantly surprised with our Dominican hospital experience. There were doctors, nurses and even English! After two hours, 11 stitches and 39 attempted phone calls to our travel insurance provider we were done at the hospital. Hopefully Sterling learned a lesson. He's recovering and pulling his own stitches out so it can't be that bad! Kids, if you're reading this, obey your parents the first time. It's less painful that way. They really do have your best interests at heart. Time flies, dads! Make every moment count! Even the Spanish hospital ones! Jason Weening rarely visits hospitals with his nine

Quoting Nathan: "Jesus is the Light of the world. He was sent into the world to cast out darkness; to point people to God; to call people to repentance for their sins; and to empower His followers to do good works that bring glory to God. As followers of Jesus are faithful to live according to God's standards, we too become the light of the world, pointing others to God's greatness. I hope these 27 Bible verses (https:// www.biblelyfe.com/blog/bible-verses-about-thelight-of-the-world) will encourage you to confront spiritual darkness through faith in Jesus."

Nathan organized Light of the World verses into five categories. I have included a verse from each category.

#### Jesus is the Light of the World.

John 8:12 \*When Jesus spoke again to the people, He said, "I am the Light of the world. Whoever follows Me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life."

#### The Lord is Our Light.

Psalm 18:28 \*You, Lord, keep my lamp burning; my God turns my darkness into light.

#### The Light Casts Out Darkness.

John 1:5 \*The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

God Called You Out of Darkness and into the Light. John 12:44-46 \*Then Jesus cried out, "Whoever believes in Me does not believe in Me only, but in the One who sent Me. The one who looks at Me is seeing the One who sent Me. I have come into the world as a Light, so that no one who believes in Me should stay in darkness."

#### You are the Light of the World.

Acts 13:47-48 \*For this is what the Lord has commanded us: "I have made you a light for the Gentiles, that you may bring salvation to the ends of the earth." And when the Gentiles heard this, they were glad and honored the word of the Lord; and all who were appointed for eternal life believed.

#### Ask A Therapist: On Gathering

Q: I feel like I am living disconnected from the people around me. Ever since Covid, I have noticed that I just don't get together with others the way I used to but I'm not sure if it is worth the effort to come together anymore. Why should I bother?

A: So many people reported feelings of isolation and loneliness as a result of Covid lockdowns and protocols that led to a whole host of mental health concerns including - but not limited to increased anxiety, depression, disordered eating, substance abuse, relational conflict, and suicidality. Disconnection is a serious problem when it comes to the pursuit of a healthy life and seeking to reconnect with others in regular and meaningful ways is always worth the effort.

Inertia continues to play a role in people re-engaging with their lives since the pandemic. So many of us got used to a life lived primarily online and separated from the presence of others that we lost touch with how important it is to physically be together. Once our usual gatherings - parties, holidays, work events, church services, clubs, sports, weddings, funerals, and other social events - were brought to a halt we had to adapt to a life lived in isolation with screen time as the primary form of "connection". In some ways, we acclimatized to that existence and forgot how much the physical presence of others in our lives is directly proportional to our overall well-being.

Just like other habits, if you lose momentum with them, it can be difficult to get back on track so your struggle with motivation is understandable. However, let this be the encouragement you need to get back out there! You will not regret making time with people a regular part of your life again. We cannot be truly healthy when we are isolated. We are meant to live in community - surrounded by friends, family, neighbours, and colleagues. The research is clear that social support is a necessary and integral part of a life lived well.

So, start where you are to prioritize being with others again. Make that lunch date with a friend. Join a choir or cooking class. Order pizza to share with friends. Sign up for a sport this fall. Go back to church. Join a book club. Join a support or therapy group. Host a backyard potluck. Work a few days back in the office instead of at home. Go visit friends for the weekend. Go for a walk with a neighbour. Take one step at a time towards more connection in your day to day life. We need each other. We heal when we come together with life-giving others and in meaningful groups. Gathering is essential to our thriving. So, let's get together soon!

And patience develops strength of character in us and helps us trust God more each time we use it until finally our hope and faith are strong and steady. (TLB)

He provided personal support workers, nurses, caregivers, geriatric doctors who deal with the elderly and help patients with memory problems, as well as all sorts of support groups. 
water and refresh your memory on water safety tips. I hope you have a fun and safe weekend with family and friends.

Developing and adopting critical technologies like cybersecurity will increase Ontario's competitiveness around the world and create highly skilled jobs in the province's growing tech sector.

CCTX, a non-profit, cyber-threat sharing hub and collaboration centre, will receive up to \$5 million through the province's Critical Technology Initiatives program to launch the New Ontario Cybersecurity Excellence Initiative in partnership with Rogers Cybersecure Catalyst, Toronto Metropolitan University's national centre for training, innovation and collaboration in cybersecurity. The initiative will provide raining and support to entrepreneurs and

#### Beware the Unfunded Shareholder's Agreement

When working with business owners with partners, I always ask to read their shareholder's agreement. Sometimes, I get the deer in the headlight look from the person across from me. Either they don't know what that document is, or they do and then I hear:

"We haven't finished it yet."

"The lawyer is still working on it."

"We haven't signed it yet."

To understand why a shareholder's agreement is important, let's use an example:

Bob and Adam are equal business partners in BA Plumbing Inc. The business is very successful. Revenues are north of \$1 million and growing, they have 3 employees, and the business is just 5 years old. Bob is married to Cathy. I ask Adam, to envision Cathy, a dental hygienist. She doesn't have any skills in the trades, let alone plumbing, and doesn't understand how they operate the business.

## GBGH adds ERCP to Surgical Program to Improve Access for Local Patients

August 17, 2023 – Georgian Bay General Hospital (GBGH) has added a new service to its growing surgical program in an effort to better serve its community. The hospital anticipates completing up to 100 endoscopic retrograde cholangiopancreatography (ERCP) procedures annually using a new piece of equipment called the C-Arm. ERCP is an advanced endoscopic procedure performed to access and repair bile and pancreatic ducts.

"ERCP is an important procedure for patients experiencing post-surgical complications such as a bile leak, malignant biliary obstructions and choledocholithiasis, which occurs when there are gallstones in the common bile duct," says Dr. Katherine Aucoin, general surgeon, GBGH. "I am very pleased we can now bring ERCP to local patients, as well as others across the region who may not have access to this procedure in their home hospital."

Emergent ERCP procedures will be performed by Dr. Aucoin for GBGH inpatients, as well as inpatients from other hospitals where they do not have this service available. Outpatients in the community who require this procedure on a semi-urgent or elective basis, can be referred by a physician to Dr. Aucoin at Bayside Surgical Associates.

"GBGH is committed to continually providing patient-centred care that aligns with the needs of the community we serve," says Dr. Vikram Ralhan, chief of staff and emergency physician, GBGH. "By expanding our services, we are improving access and bringing care closer to home for local patients. We will also continue to pursue equipment and technology, such as the C-Arm, which helps us improve patient experiences, outcomes and access to care. For all these reasons, the continued growth of GBGH's surgical program is a priority for this hospital."

Aug. 21, 2023 - In addition to destroying millions of hectares of forests, wildfires can have significant impacts on wildlife and their habitats. The effects of a forest fire on wildlife can vary depending on the intensity, severity, and frequency of the fire, as well as the specific species and ecosystems involved.

Here are some ways in which forest fires can negatively impact wildlife:

1. Direct Mortality. Wild animals have evolved to sense danger, including fires. In many cases, they know what to do to keep themselves and their families safe. Some animals like bears, ungulates, coyotes and cougars will flee and travel large distances. Other smaller animals will try to tough out the blaze, climbing trees, hiding under logs and rocks or burying themselves in the soil.

But despite their best efforts to find safety, many wild animals will be killed directly by the smoke, flames, or heat of a wildfire. This is especially true for slower-moving species including older animals, young animals, injured animals, snakes, lizards, frogs, nesting birds, porcupines and small grounddwelling mammals like squirrels, rabbits, voles, and mice.

Animals that are not killed directly from wildfire can suffer from ongoing risks and health problems. For example, research suggests that forest fires can weaken an animal's immune system, making them more susceptible to disease and infections (Albery et al., 2021). Sanderfoot et al. (2021) argues smoke inhalation can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning, respiratory distress, neurological impairment and other acute and chronic health conditions in wildlife. 2. Habitat Destruction and Loss of Food Sources. Forest fires can destroy or severely damage the habitats of many wildlife species. For animals that rely on vegetation for food, a forest fire can destroy their food sources. This can lead to food shortages and malnutrition, and create competition in new areas with other wildlife.

The loss of habitat may also drive wildlife to nearby urban environments, increasing their proximity to humans. It's important to be tolerant to these new visitors and extend compassion towards all wild animals in our communities, especially after wildfires. To help prevent wildlife encounters, please secure attractants including garbage, fallen fruit, compost, and other wildlife attractants. 3. Predator-Prey Dynamics. Forest fires can disrupt predator-prey dynamics. Predators may take advantage of the confusion and disorientation caused by fires to catch prey more easily. On the other hand, some prey species may be able to escape predators due to the chaos caused by the fire. 4. Loss of Shelter and Nesting Sites. Many animals rely on specific features of the landscape, such as fallen logs, snags (standing dead trees), and dense vegetation for shelter and nesting. Forest fires can destroy these features, affecting breeding success and their overall population. 5. Soil and Water Quality. The increased runoff and erosion that can occur after a fire can negatively impact water quality in nearby rivers and streams, affecting aquatic ecosystems and the animals that depend on them such as salmon. 6. Long-Term Effects. The recovery process after a fire can take years, even decades. During this time, wildlife populations and individuals may struggle to rebound as they wait for the ecosystem to restore itself.



#### THE PERFECT PEACH SMOOTHIE RECIPE – A SUMMERTIME TREAT!

Aug. 25, 2023 - What a wonderful time of year for Ontario grown fruits and veggies! A local

favourite are peaches being sold in bulk at our farms, roadside stands and grocery stores. So juicy-ripe, delish and inexpensive, it's virtually impossible not to buy a surplus, and then what? Eating them straight up is a must, but here is another way to use up all of those fuzzies before they spoil. This healthy peach smoothie recipe is perfect for summer breakfasts or snacks and can be whipped up in a blender licketysplit.

#### **Ingredients:**

• 2 1/2 cups (625 ml) fresh (preferably, unpeeled) or frozen peaches

1 medium or large sized banana

• 1/3 cup (83 ml) Greek plain, vanilla or coconut yogurt

• 1 cup (250 ml) unsweetened almond, oat or dairy milk

• 2 tablespoons (30 ml) Chia seeds

• 1 tablespoon (15 ml) honey or maple syrup, optional

• 1 teaspoon (5 ml) vanilla, optional

1 teaspoon (5 ml) ground cinnamon, optional
 1/4 teaspoon (1.25 ml) ground ginger, optional

• Ice cubes, optional



I love hiking in the rain, especially a soft summer's rain. I love the sound of the drops hitting the leaves high above my head, then drip, drip, dropping their way down to plop on my shoulders, or to land softly in the woodland

leaf litter. The forest is quieter than usual, and the bird song and annoying chatter of red squirrels is replaced with a quiet hush that settles over the trees and all the creatures that inhabit this land. That is, until I hear it, the most terrifying sound I know. The sound comes closer, and closer, first from the front, then the back, until I feel I am surrounded. The sound!! It is almost ringing in my ears! So close now that I can almost see the beast that stalks me through the rain drops. SMACK. Well, that is one less mosquito, but the rain has brought out the hordes that will continue to plague me through this hike.

I parked off Horseshoe Valley Road and Old Second Road West of Craighurst. There is an ample parking site available for this Simcoe County Forest, which is called the Orrock Creek Northeast tract. The Simcoe County website has a great interactive map for all the forests and includes parking areas. It is worth checking out. This tract is the usual mix of trails, from hiking to ATV to motocross. After a short distance I left the wider trails and headed south on the Ganaraska trail, which is for hiking only. I ventured down a short gully and across a quagmire of thick black mud. There was no question of coming out of this hike with clean shoes and pants, though I attempted to limit the splatter. It is obvious that someone tries to put logs across the worst of the muck, which I was very grateful for. However, this would only be one of many gullies and gulches I would traverse, and not all were so well maintained. Eventually the Ganaraska trail deviated from even this small trail to one that is little used. It is clearly marked, though the blazes seemed to delight in leading me through the wettest, muddiest and buggiest areas available. I



#### **Instructions:**

1. Place all of the ingredients in a high-powered blender and blend until smooth. If you do not have a high-powered blender, add the peaches, 1/2 cup (125 ml) at a time to all of the other ingredients and blend in between.

2. Add ice or extra Greek, vanilla or coconut yogurt for a thicker smoothie. Add extra almond, oat or dairy milk for a thinner smoothie.



• The operation of any electronic device or group of connected electronic devices incorporating one or more loudspeakers or other electromechanical transducers, and intended for the production, reproduction, or amplification of sound;

· Persistent barking, calling or whining or other similar persistent noise made by any domestic pet or any other animal kept or used for any purpose other than agriculture.

John Maw cleared most of the land of pine timber. His son Jim had the last 14 acres cleared by Sam Webber, who got the first three crops off the new land for clearing it. Albert, Jim's nephew, rented, then bought the farm. He hand-milked cows. The cream was separated and sold, with the milk going to pigs and calves. Peas, barley and oats were put through a rolling mill and fed to livestock

Ernest and Wilfred Maw had a well drilling outfit that used a horse to power a tumbling shaft. In 1930 Albert Maw needed more water, so he hired Homer Daley. Daley went down 200 feet and got stuck a 4 inch. He tried pulling the pipes up and broke them off nunarea below ground. Giving up that hole, Tom Kenney, a water witching neighbour advised drilling ten feet to the southeast, where a good artesian well was drilled at 223 feet. A new 150' well was drilled around

A frame house built after 1881 was grouted with a mixture of sawdust and cement for insulation. It was torn down in 1948, and a brick house built by Billy Rowell who also built barns. The lumber for this house was virgin pine trees cut out of Barrie Union Cemetery. Some trees had 70 feet of logs in them. One 25 foot log had thirteen 2 x 6 rafters.

Russell and his brother Bert farmed this lot and also Lot 19 with their father Albert. Larry farmed with Russell and finished pigs until 2006. Dust created when raising pigs was hard on the lungs so he switched to cash crops of wheat and soybeans.

# Ontario Making Progress on Work to Build at Least 1.5 Million Homes

Province announces next steps in its plan to increase the supply of homes of all types Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing

Aug. 22, 2023 - Today, Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, addressed delegates at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario conference. He spoke about the progress the government is making on its plan to get at least 1.5 million homes built by 2031 as well as the next steps it is taking to tackle the housing supply crisis in communities across Ontario.

Minister Clark announced that the province intends to appoint regional facilitators in Durham, Halton, Niagara, Waterloo, York and Simcoe County by September 11, 2023. These facilitators will be tasked with assessing local governance structures in these communities to ensure they are prepared to support future growth and meet the needs of their residents, particularly when it comes to building homes and housing-enabling infrastructure.

#### **OPP Investigate Impaired Drivers and Numerous** Vehicle Crashes Over the Weekend

(MIDLAND, ON)- Officers of the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment were kept busy with numerous calls for service which included eleven vehicle crashes and two impaired driving investigations over the weekend.

Officers responded to a report of a vehicle into the trees off of Wood Road at the intersection of McMann Side Road in Tay Township near 6:21 a.m. August 27, 2023. Investigators were unable to locate any occupants near the vehicle which had rolled numerous times as it entered the ditch and came to rest in the nearby trees. Investigation is continuing with a Barrie resident who apparently owns what is left of the vehicle and did not wish to speak with the police at the time as to what may have caused the crash.

#### There Never Was An Arrow – Canada's Legendary Jet Fighter Lives On At Edenvale Aerodrome PART I

Aug. 18, 2023 - "As a fighting instrument of war, which must include an aircraft, an engine and a sophisticated fire-control system, then of course there never was an Arrow." – David Golden, LLB, LLD (Honours), OC, former Deputy Minister of Defense Production, Deputy Minister of Industry and the first president of Telesat Canada

While the above words from David Golden are technically true, then-Prime Minister John Diefenbaker apparently attempted to make it seem that the Avro Arrow, the legendary Canadian supersonic, delta-winged, jet fighter-interceptor, never existed in any sense of the word.

The Canadian Air and Space Conservancy at Edenvale Aerodrome, west of Barrie, Ontario, is home to the only full-size replica of the legendary jet. Not only that, but it's the only full-size representation of the Avro Arrow.

Officially designated as CF-105, the Avro Arrow was produced in the mid-to-late 1950s by A.V. Roe (Canada), at their production plant adjacent to the Malton Airport, now known as Toronto Pearson International Airport. Intended as a replacement for the Royal Canadian Air Force's CF-100 Canuck, a very successful all-weather jet fighter-interceptor, also produced by A.V. Roe (Canada), the RCAF wanted something that would fly higher and faster, and provided specifications for a very advanced supersonic interceptor which eventually became the Avro Arrow. The Canadian Chiefs of Staff felt such a jet fighter was needed to counter the threat of Soviet bombers attacking North America.

All that came to an end on 20 February 1959, a day became known as "Black Friday" in the Canadian aviation industry, when the Avro Arrow program was cancelled by the government of Prime Minister John Diefenbaker. At the time, six copies of the Arrow were completed, with several others in various stages of production. Five of the completed copies were flown by test pilots, powered in the interim by the Pratt & Whitney J75 engine, as the Orenda Iroquois engine was not yet ready for use. The only copy of the Arrow that was fitted with the Iroquois engine, Arrow RL-206, was never flown.

The Iroquois engine was reported to be lighter with more thrust. Many experts believe if Arrow RL-206 had flown, it would have succeeded in more-than surpassing Mach 2, something that would have made cancellation of the project harder to justify.

In a very controversial move, Diefenbaker's government ordered that all completed or partially completed copies of the Arrow were cut up with torches and sold to a scrap dealer in Hamilton, Ontario, for around \$4355 for each Arrow. All design drawings and tools were also ordered destroyed, along with all photos and film footage of the Arrow



taxiing and flying. Former A.V. Roe (Canada) test pilot Peter Cope equated the destruction order as a "de-Stalinization" project; an attempt to wipe out all evidence that the Arrow ever existed. That order remains a subject of bitter controversy to this day.

Despite this order from Ottawa, an assortment of Arrow artifacts do remain to this day, along with photographs, drawings and film footage. There are no fully-intact copies of the Avro Arrow remaining, however, despite the insistence of some Arrow enthusiasts. The nose cone section of Avro Arrow RL-206, currently on display at the Canada Aviation and Space Museum in Ottawa, is the largest intact piece of an original Avro Arrow left in existence.

Two wing tips and an Iroquois engine are also a part of the Canada Aviation and Space Museum's collection.

While not authentic Arrow components, a Delta Test Vehicle, one of the 12 test models that was fired into Lake Ontario from the Point Petrie Test Range, near Trenton, Ontario, between 1954 and 1957, was recovered after extensive searching in 2018. Later generation test models were also found in September 2020.

These scale models of the Avro Arrow, about nine feet long — a 1/8 scale of the actual plane, were used for flight testing, as A.V. Roe didn't have access to a big enough wind tunnel that could reach high enough speeds for their testing. It's also on display in at the Canada Aviation and Space Museum.

#### The Avro Arrow Rises Again

In the late 1990s, a group of retired engineers who once worked at Avro Canada decided to build a full-scale replica of the Avro Arrow. Assisted by interns from the adjacent Bombardier aircraft plant, construction of the replica took place at the Toronto Air & Space Museum, an aviation museum established in 1997, in the original De Havilland Plant #1, the oldest aircraft factory remaining in Canada, having stood since 1929.

Headed up by chief engineer Claude Sherwood,

a former draftsperson at AVRO, who had some large scale original drawings of the Arrow in his possession, the replica was completed in the autumn of 2006, and was put on display at the museum.

Other aviation artifacts in the museum's collection included a wartime RCAF de Havilland DH 82C Tiger Moth trainer, and postwar Canadair CT-133, Canadair CT-114 Tutor and Beechcraft CT-134 Musketeer trainers, de Havilland CS-2F Tracker, and Bell CH-136 Kiowa helicopter.

Civilian aircraft included a Fleet 80 Canuck, a Zenair CH 200 homebuilt and the UFM Easy Riser ultralight flown by "Father Goose" Bill Lishman, along with historic archival material and exhibits reflecting major developments in Canada's aviation history, most of which took place in the Ontario region.

On 20 September 2011, the museum, then renamed the Canada Air Space Museum, was forced to close when their lease was cancelled, along with other tenants in Plant #1, so that the building could be re-developed. The museum was able to store their collection, including the Arrow replica, at Pearson International Airport until they could secure a new facility.

The museum and their collection remained in limbo until 2018, when Milan Kroupa, owner of the Edenvale Aerodrome, a re-activated World War II RCAF airfield, offered up a hangar at the aerodrome for the museum's use. Re-named the Canadian Air and Space Conservancy in 2019, the museum "...is dedicated to telling the story of aviation, both civil and military in Canada. From the JN-4 Jenny to the Space Shuttle, Canadians have contributed far more to the aviation and aerospace industries both at home and abroad than is largely known or appreciated. Using the Avro Arrow Replica as the opening of the narrative, CASM will endeavour to tell the story of men and women and the machines they designed, built and flew; who have made Canada what it is today." 




