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



- Higher speed roads with heavier traffic are plowed first based on Provincial Maintenance Standards.
- Property owners are responsible for removing snow that accumulates at the end of driveways as a result of road maintenance.
- Disposing of or piling snow from private property onto a Highway or municipal lands, including ditches, is strictly prohibited.
- Sand is only applied to roads at major intersections, hills and corners during freezing rain/ icy conditions. Sand is not applied to straight-a-ways as it is the driver's responsibility to drive according to weather and road conditions.

Winter Parking

During the winter months, parking on the road is strictly prohibited at all times as it interferes with snow removal practices. The Township of Tiny does not have an allotted time of day to which parking on the road is allowed as snow removal can happen at any/ all times of day. Cars that are found to be parked on the roadside during snow removal operations will be ticketed and charged.

Hazards

- Ensure children refrain from building tunnels or forts inside snow banks by road ways.
- Township will not replace items (including mailboxes and garbage bins) that are damaged as a result of snow accumulation or force of snow off the plow blade. Please be sure to place items far enough back onto your property to keep them out of reach of this area to avoid destruction.

Did you know? The Interim Control By-law 23-044, as amended, prohibits the erection of any structure, fence, or sign through the duration of this by-law. This includes, but is not limited to, boathouses, retaining walls, patios, landscaping, decks, fences, walls, or shoreline alteration that are in proximity to the 178-metre contour elevation of the Georgian Bay Shoreline. Nov. 20, 2023- TINY - Our final columns for 2023 focus on programs that help seniors keep healthy, physically and socially, and the dedicated and talented volunteers and professionals who make them possible. Today we're highlighting Colin Eccles, and Aging Backwards.

With the holidays just around the corner, many of us are spending hours walking around the stores to find the perfect gift and just the right sized turkey. That also makes this a time when we're carrying and lifting and bending more than usual, which can result in a lot of pain or discomfort by the time the big day arrives. formances with local choirs.

Eccles began to take an interest in Essentrics and Aging Backwards, a fitness program developed by former Canadian ballerina Miranda Esmond-White, when he was teaching ballet, and found it a great fit with his work. He's been offering the program, which includes some moves from Pilates, Tai Chi and dance, and has now taught around the globe, for seven years.

He says that one of the difficulties faced by most people who exert themselves physically, for work or pleasure, is that the learning for one activity doesn't engage the entire body – for example, many golfers have back problems, think Tiger Woods – and result in systemic imbalances. Aging Backwards exercises involve constant movement to help improve stiff joints, release tension and break up scar tissue. Also cardio-vascular benefits result, as veins are strengthened by squeezing muscles, so the heart pumps easier. those bags of groceries and bending and stretching as we put up the tree, by rebalancing the entire body.



HEY DADS!

Who doesn't love a good visit to the emergency room with one or two kids? In my 17 years of being a father I've observed that there's two kinds of kids in this world. We have those kids that don't ever need to go to the emergency room and we have...boys. I think we've done pretty good, tallying up only three emergency room visits with our six daughters and three sons. You can probably deduce by now who the injured parties were. Yes, one was our middle son, Justice, and the other was our oldest son, Sterling. In all fairness, Justices' visit was after a car accident that wasn't his fault so I'll let him off the hook. But Sterling on the other hand...

The first visit to RVH with Sterling was a few years ago when he "tapped" an old glass window with his hand and shockingly "tapped" right through. His most recent visit to the emergency room was two weeks ago in the beautiful country of the Dominican Republic. This tropical emergency room was a slightly different, though not unpleasant, medical experience.

We were staying with some friends, Mike and Laura, near Puerto Plata, a popular destination for Canadian vacationers. Mike and Laura have built a beautiful guest house where they host short-term missionary teams visiting the Dominican Republic to serve the people. Behind the guest house they built a beautiful little fountain and concrete fish pond. You might say it's little enough for an 11-year-old boy to jump over. You would be wrong.

We noticed the fish pond when we arrived at the guest house and my children's father warned them that they might want to jump over and around the fountain and fish pond. He even said, "I bet some of you can jump right over this but that's a bad idea so please don't jump around the fish pond." Sometimes we obey our fathers and sometimes we attend class at the school of hard knocks. For 11-year-old Sterling, class was about to begin.

A few days later I heard one of our other children calling me in an emergency-room-type voice, "Dad! Sterling really needs you! He needs help!" When I got around the corner to the back of the guest house, I could hear Sterling calling. He was lying on the ground beside the fish pond. He was crying and holding his leg with his hands which were covered in blood. No bueno, amigo.

Not one to over-react in a situation such as this, I calmly asked him to take his hands off his leg so I could see what the problem was. I hoped we could avoid the DR hospital and bandage his small wound. When Sterling took his hand off his leg and I could see his shin bone, I realized bandages would be insufficient in this scenario. To "el hospital" we go!

I was pleasantly surprised with our Dominican hospital experience. There were doctors, nurses and even English! After two hours, 11 stitches and 39 attempted phone calls to our travel insurance provider we were done at the hospital. Hopefully Sterling learned a lesson. He's recovering and pulling his own stitches out so it can't be that bad! Kids, if you're reading this, obey your parents the first time. It's less painful that way. They really do have your best interests at heart. Time flies, dads! Make every moment count! Even the Spanish hospital ones!

Midland Cultural Centre (MCC) Teams Up with Partners for **Holiday Food Drive**



Studies show that about 70 % of adults over 50 yrs experience nocturnal leg cramps. A cramp occurs when a muscle involuntarily contracts and cannot relax. The most common areas of the body that experience muscle cramping are the calves, thighs, feet, hands, arms and rib cage.

Dianne and Helmut Paddags Move to Tiny



I enthusiastically participated in tennis, badminton, and table tennis at Askennonia Senior Centre. We joined various bridge clubs and learned to play bid euchre. We joined Probus and looked after the coffee for the meetings and produced the monthly newsletter for several years. From these activities we developed many long-lasting friendships.

Concurrently we supported the Huronia Community Foundation by photographing grant recipients and sending articles to the papers from various locations in the community. This helped us to find our way around North Simcoe. Over time, my involvement expanded as I joined the grants committee, eventually assuming the role of chairperson. This responsibility entailed setting criteria, evaluating and selecting charities for funding through the foundation. As a result of sending numerous items to Springwater News the editor, Michael Jacobs, issued me a press card so I could report on events when he was not available.

Simultaneously, our involvement extended to Georgian Shores Swinging Seniors social club at The Place, where we contributed by managing music for dances, organizing car rallies and producing bimonthly newsletters. Every month there were themed dances for the various seasons, spring fling, corn roast, Halloween, Christmas and New Year's Eve. When I was president in 2014 The Place celebrated its 40th anniversary. Looking back Dianne and I feel we made the right decision to leave Toronto and to seek out opportunities to meet so many like minded people who shared our vision of small town living and who made us feel welcome and appreciated. 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Simcoe County Warden Statement regarding Provincial Child Care Workforce Strategy

Midhurst/November 20, 2023 – Our Child Care sector is extremely important to our families, our economy and the health, wellbeing, and development of our youth. Last week, we were informed about the Ontario Government's comprehensive Child Care Workforce Strategy and its investment in Registered Early Childhood Educators (RECEs) across Ontario and here in Simcoe County. We were pleased to see that this strategy is comprehensive and is well-funded to provide increased wages and additional support for the recruitment of high quality, qualified Early Childhood Educators across the province.

We thank the Province for increasing the starting wage of over 650 RECEs in Simcoe County, employed by Child Care operators enrolled in the Canada-wide Early Learning and Child Care (CWELCC) system, to \$23.86/hour in 2024 from the planned \$20 per hour. This wage enhancement builds on actions taken by the province through the introduction in 2022 of a new wage floor for RECEs working in settings participating in the CWELCC system, which includes annual \$1 per hour wage increases begin-

ning in 2023.

The increased salaries will help recruit new REC-Es and support staff retention. As labour shortages have been a challenge in this important sector, this increased funding will ensure wages more closely align with industry standards and hopefully support recruitment efforts. The hiring of more RECEs will also support the County's goals as we continue building up licenced child care in our region by creating over 3,000 new child care spaces.

Earlier this fall, County of Simcoe Council took significant action to building up futures through the approval of the region's new Early Learning and Child Care Directed Growth Strategy, a five-point plan that creates spaces, increases affordability, and builds knowledge of the positive impacts that a strengthened early learning and Child Care system will have in our communities.

I'm pleased that both the County and the Province continue to invest in new strategies and supports for this important sector to assist workers, families and our economy.

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

This area is still little known and retains the quiet and peace of a true backcountry site. gines and the destruction of pristine wilderness. Areas that are not meant for the motorized groups and allow only foot traffic through areas of wilderness where the footprints of humans are minimal. After all, if you truly love nature and the outdoors, you will want the environment to remain as little impacted as possible. That is my rant, though you will get the full impact if I ever catch you tossing your garbage out your car window or littering the trails with your garbage. Bring on that Karen moment!!!

The Torrence Barrens is one of the most serene and beautiful areas I have ever been to. I stumbled upon this area years ago while on one of my many road



trips exploring areas I did not know, and while taking random side roads that led off into the unknown. I followed a very narrow and incredibly winding road through marsh and Canadian Shield, and then noted a very weathered sign indicating that I was in the Tor-

rence Badlands. Well, of course I needed to check this out. I found a small parking area and pulled in and put on my hiking shoes. The trail at this time was minimal, and I spent many moments looking for the markers through the mounds of rocks and scrub. It was even more interesting when I came to an old and dilapidated bridge needed to cross between two land areas separated by a swamp. In total this trail led me across 12 kms of large rocks and through marsh, across a sketchy boardwalk where you could reach down and pluck a cranberry, next to a still lake. Unfortunately, more people are now aware of this area, and the evidence of ignorant humans are everywhere, from the discarded water bottles on the side of the trail to the Tim Horton's cups hung in the trees.

My most recent trip to this gorgeous area was this weekend. A relatively warm November day had my family and I heading to the now named Torrence Barrens. The small parking lot was full except for one spot, which I was grateful to take as there is no parking on the narrow road. We headed down the trail, with the warm sun shining down and a cool north breeze wrapping its icy fingers around us. Hoar frost covered the scant vegetation and a thin skein of brittle ice lay over the small areas of water. This area is as beautiful as I remembered, with a calm lake surrounded by the hard granite of the Canadian Shield and strands of oak, juniper, and larch. The silence out here is complete, as there is no noise of radios, cars or other motorized vehicles. This, this is what I crave; that silence of backcountry hiking, where the only noise is the rustle of brown leaves in the cold wind. My teenage son felt the connection to this backcountry, and as we gazed across one calm lake with that silence settling between us, he confided that he could spend hours out here just listening to that silence. My heart.

The Torrence Barrens is the worlds only dark sky preserve. The world's only.... say that again, the world's only... dark sky preserve. This area is unique in that there are few houses or cottages and there are no large urban areas nearby. This area is a haven for night sky watchers of stars and northern lights. Hence why I don't want people out here lighting campfires and tearing around on motorized vehicles, and why I am hesitant to tell the general public about this area. We need to respect the environment, and especially those environmentally sensitive areas that are becoming increasingly rare as subdivisions pop up in previous green areas. Our green areas are becoming smaller, and fractured, and hurt, and as we lose green areas, we lose ourselves and to our connections to our world and our place within it. Respect.

- A splash or two of hot sauce, optional Instructions:

1. In a bowl, combine the smoked fish, sour cream, Greek yogurt or plant-based yogurt, onion or shallot, prepared horseradish, Worcestershire sauce, lemon juice and zest, salt (optional), black pepper (optional), hot sauce (optional). Refrigerate if not using immediately.

A word of caution is required before consuming smoked trout as raw or undercooked fish carries an increased risk of developing foodborne illnesses. To protect the public, Health Canada recommends that young children, older adults, pregnant women and those who are immunocompromised should not consume raw, undercooked or refrigerated smoked fish.




Vanishing Barns

Stories From the Past

Following the big forest fires of 1881-82, when over forty of the pioneer barns and homes were destroyed by fire in Vespra, Flos and Sunnidale townships, there was no sympathetic government to assist in rebuilding. Such help as was received came from other pioneers, who managed to save their homes and crops. Thousands of acres of fertile lands could now be cleared with one-third of the trouble and labor that was required previous to the burning of the forests. Fresh settlers came in and every farm was a hive of activity. Log shacks were put up. Land cleared. Every fine night during the summer log piles burning lit up the country side for miles around. Everywhere neighbors were exchanging work, assisting each other. As a result hundreds of acres of land were cleared. Within the next two or three years the amount of land under cultivation was such as to demand a barn. During the winter months every good stick of lumber was drawn out or set aside for building timber. Towards spring there would be bees, making timber, when several neighbours would gather and for two or three days xes and broadaxes would ring from morning until night.

At other farms, teams would be busy drawing logs to the local sawmills where they were sawed into lumber or the smaller sized timber. Managers of the lumber mills were most considerate in arranging the cutting of the lumber, so that a man would take his logs to the sawmill and have a return load of lumber. By the first of April, the ladies would be having long talks, men who could work swiftly and yet place every brace in its place and secure same with a pin in the main piece of timber. Possibly the most difficult job was the choosing of sides. Two captains would be selected. Bill Grant, now of Minesing, was usually the first man called; then Jim Graham, George Culham, Alex Gilchrist, Hugh Lavery, the Daley Brothers, Moore Brothers, John Huth, Sam Doner, the Livingston Brothers, Frank Jacobs, Alf Foyston and many others equal or better man than those named. Two men who were always on opposite sides were R. G. Richardson and W. C. Webb. Both these men made a special study of handling the pike pole squads and many races were decided by their skillful work.

I have yet to see better sportsmanship than was displayed in the races at the barn raisings. There were accidents, some of them serious, some fatal and others amusing. The dash and vim with which all went into the race from oldest to youngest was wonderful. From the Irish settlements around Phelpston and Vigo came one of the ablest and most dashing bunch of men, where work, a race or excitement came in. I recall a barn raising at the farm of Mattew Malroy. The wildest part of the race was on both sides drawing rafters. One heavy rafter was breaking over the plate, slipped and took the man with it to the ground almost thirty feet below. Someone remarked that there was a man down with a rafter. A well-known Irish Canadian of Flos was drawing a rafter next to myself. He called out `Never mind the man, send up the rafter, and a moment later we were ahead by half a rafter; then swinging down to the door cap, dropped to the ground calling for everyone off the building and in the same breath asking: who is hurt. Away like a flash he went to the side of the injured man, saying stand back, boys, let him have the fresh air. Later I walked up the road with him to supper and we heard the remark: Loftus is a very fine boy and one of the best men on the building. If he survives he will never go up on a building again. My Irish friend gave me a sly wink, saying they don't know Loftus. They didn't. I saw him several times afterwards in the midst of the excitement at a barn raising and one of the best men present.

Possibly one of the most amusing barn raisings was at David Culham's. (Concession 1, W 1/2 Lot 23, Flos Township). The very best and ablest men of the surrounding country were there and all were looking forward to a real test and close race. One captain in his choosing called the older, experienced veterans; the other, the younger men (also experienced). There were many amused smiles. The young men considered they could win as they wished. However, the veterans were determined to win if possible. They did. They simply out-generated the younger men and gave us the worst defeat there had been for several years. We sat on the framework and laughed. Someone said: there is a mighty good lesson in this for all of us. And we agreed. Afterwards we enjoyed our supper, the victims of much good natured banter, especially from the ladies, who, I often thought, played the greater part in home building and the training of the character of the young people of our country."

OPP Investigators Seeking Assistance In Solving Commercial Break and Enter in Midland




