Dear Editor

Having taken time to read over the Canada-Ukraine Free Trade Deal (CUFTA), it seems, this deal is not a very good deal for anyone – Canadians or Ukrainians. Not only does this agreement seem an attempt to bind future Canadian governments, it also seems to violate provincial jurisdiction.

Firstly, if you heat with firewood this really restricts you, as it was agreed, in 2016, by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, President Barack Obama, and President Enrique Peña Nieto, to reduce "black carbon" which includes deploying renewable energy and efficiency alternatives to firewood, in particular, remote communities.[1] With the CUFTA agreement, Parties are attempting to restrict their citizens from using firewood, to heat their homes (see Article 13.14 of the agreement).

Secondly, this agreement contradicts itself as to whether it is binding or not. In Article 13.3 it states that "the Parties recognize the sovereign right of each Party to establish its own levels of domestic environmental protection and its own environmental priorities, and to establish, adopt, or modify its environmental laws and policies accordingly;" but then in Article 13.4 it states:

"3. Without prejudice to Article 13.3(1), the Parties recognize that it is inappropriate to encourage trade or investment by weakening or reducing the protection afforded in their environmental laws. Accordingly, a Party shall not waive or otherwise derogate, or offer to waive or otherwise derogate, from its environmental laws in a manner that weakens or reduces the protection afforded in those law in order to encourage trade or investment between the Parties.

4. Nothing in this Chapter shall be construed to authorize a Party to enforce its environmental laws in the territory of the other Party."

In other words, Canada is fully bound by this agreement and the present laws established under this government. And the Ukraine, if we change governments and/or the rules, can take issue with Canada, including demanding a Panel be struck for dispute resolution (see Article 13.29). This includes the "carbon tax" issue (Article 13.10 para. 8).

Thirdly, provincial jurisdiction. Most certainly the federal government can enter into agreements as it did for soft-wood lumber - but when it comes to forest management - that is completely under provincial jurisdiction. So, when this agreement speaks to "Sustainable Forest Management," in Article 13.22, expressing that "each Party shall encourage trade in forest products from sustainably managed forests harvested in accordance with the law of the country of harvest," in Canada, it isn't the "country of harvest" laws - it would be the province of harvest laws. This would mean the federal government is attempting, through this agreement, (i) to bind the various provinces to an international bilateral agreement, and (ii) interfere, again, in provincial constitutional jurisdiction.

In light of this, it seems the Conservatives weren't only trying to protect the Ukrainians, but were, also, trying to protect Canadians. Perhaps an entirely different agreement should be struck leaving out the entirety of Article 13, considering Canada and the Ukraine already have international agreements, either pending or in place pertaining to all subjects in Article 13, wouldn't one agree? *Elizabeth Marshall*


Township of Tiny Welcomes 400 Attendees to Tree Lighting Celebration

Parking Program?

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Midland's Paid Parking Program is on hold for 2024 until further review based on a decision of Council at their December 6, 2023, Council Meeting. Subscribe to our Parking in Midland webpage to stay updated. Is Parking Downtown Free Now?

• Parking on downtown streets, Midland Harbour, Bayshore Drive and the Pete Pettersen Boat Launch is free during the day until further notice.

• Most streets have a 2 hour parking limit – see Bylaw 2021-24.

What about the Municipal Lots Downtown?

• Parking in the downtown municipal lots has been free since September 2022 and will remain free during the parking program review. There is no overnight parking in municipal lots year-round.

• There is an 8-hour parking limit - see By-law 2021-24.

What about Overnight Parking on Town Streets?

Dec. 11, 2023 - What's happening to the Paid Town will not change, other than the paid program. All parking by-laws are enforced, including winter parking restrictions, overnight parking in the municipal lots, parking over the permitted time limit, and any other illegal parking, which may result in a fine and/ or tow.

> • Get to know the Traffic By-law and Parking Bylaw on the Town's website here. It's every motorist's responsibility to know where they can legally park in Midland.

What's happening to the parking machines?

• The paid parking terminals will be shut down but remain in place until the review is completed. Sinage will be posted to advise visitors the program is on hold.

• The decision to leave the machines in place was to avoid the cost to remove and store the machines, and the cost to restore pavers and asphalt until the review is completed.

How is the parking program being reviewed? • Council directed staff to create a new Ad-hoc Parking Committee to include staff, BIA members, Council members and a member of the public. A terms of reference will be created, committee members will be appointed, and the new Committee will start meeting in 2024. Look for further information in the new year. • Once the Committee has completed their review in 2024, they'll make recommendations to Council for consideration of a new Paid Parking Program, which will start in 2025.

Ontario Connecting People Throughout Georgian Bay and Simcoe Muskoka to Mental Health Care Close to Home

New inpatient unit at Waypoint Centre for Mental Health Care will provide faster access to urgent care

Dec. 18, 2023 - The Ontario government is connecting communities throughout Georgian Bay and Simcoe Muskoka to mental health supports by investing in a new inpatient acute care unit at the Waypoint Centre for Mental Health Care. The new unit will expand access to specialized urgent mental health and addictions services, making it faster and easier for people and their families to connect to care closer to home.

"All Ontarians deserve to receive convenient care close to home, no matter where they live," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "By investing in a new inpatient acute care unit at Waypoint, our government is ensuring that people in the Georgian Bay region will have faster access to specialized mental health services and supports, when and where they need it most." Ontario is working with Waypoint to continue to advance this project. As a next step, a fair, open, and transparent tender process is expected to begin in the new year with construction starting shortly after. Submitted by Ministry of Health

Snow Removal

- Higher speed roads with heavier traffic are plowed first based on Provincial Maintenance Standards.
- Property owners are responsible for removing snow that accumulates at the end of driveways.

Winter Maintenance Reminders

- Disposing of or piling snow from private property onto a Highway or municipal lands, is strictly prohibited.
- Sand is only applied to roads at major intersections, hills and corners during freezing rain/ icy conditions. Sand is not applied to straight-a-ways as drivers must drive according to weather and road conditions.

Winter Parking

During the winter months, parking on the road is strictly prohibited at all times as it interferes with snow removal practices. The Township of Tiny does not have an allotted time of day to which parking on the road is allowed as snow removal can happen at any/ all times of day. Cars that are found to be parked on the roadside during snow removal operations will be ticketed and charged.

Hazards

- Ensure children refrain from building tunnels or forts inside snow banks by road ways.
- Township will not replace items (including mailboxes and garbage bins) that are damaged as a result of snow accumulation or force of snow off the plow blade. Please be sure to place items far enough back onto your property to keep them out of reach of this area to avoid destruction.

Town of Midland has Released the Draft 2024 Budget

(Dec. 13, 2023, Midland ON) The Town of Midland has released its Draft 2024 Budget to the public and is available on the Town's website. The proposed budget outlines a balanced strategy that ensures sustainable service delivery to Midland residents, while minimizing financial impacts on the tax levy.

"The Town's CFO presented a high-level overview of the Draft 2024 Budget at the December 6th Council meeting," said Town of Midland Mayor Bill Gordon. "Council looks forward to carefully reviewing this comprehensive document which includes the preliminary recommendations prepared by Town Administration. It's also important that the community becomes informed on the Draft 2024 Budget and takes the opportunity to provide feedback or attend the Budget Public Meeting on January 17th. Then in late January, Council and Staff will continue the budget process with three days of deliberations to arrive at an approved budget."

Highlights of the Draft 2024 Budget include:

• Enhancements to recreational spaces: Little Lake Park sits in the heart of Midland as a go to destination for all residents and visitors. Upgrades and full redesign to the well-loved community garden, as well as the exciting addition of a roof structure to cover Rotary Stage.

• Replacement of essential vehicles and equipment: Addition of required vehicles to create a new level of access and increase safety preparedness in Midland, a new accessible transit van and a pumper truck for Fire Department.

• Investing in sustainable infrastructure replacement: The Town's 10-Year Capital Plan ensures the vital reconstruction of infrastructure that ensures reliable and sustainable growth. • Supporting local organizations and boards: Through funding, in-kind services, or other means of support, the Town invests directly back into the community.

• Actively seeking grant funding to reduce the burden on the tax levy: Providing input for affordable and attainable housing, transforming public spaces with art, and improvements to infrastructure.

Proposed tax rates include:

• The Town's base budget increase is 4.46% (including the requests from Agencies, Boards and Commissions)

o This increase allows the Town to maintain service levels and provides for free downtown parking to the Community.

o Significant contributions will be made to Town capital reserves to ensure that the services provided today remain in place for residents and community partners to enjoy.

• With Council's strategic priorities in mind, Council and staff have also put forward several new investment and service recommendations for Council's careful consideration during budget deliberations. These requests, along with an increased contribution to the Sustainable Capital Levy equate to another 2.73%.

• If all service recommendations are adopted, the Town rate of 7.19%, is expected to blend down to a rate of 5.86%, when the impact of the County and Board of Education are considered.

o This all-in rate translates into an increase of \$7.76 per month per \$100,000 of residential property assessment.

o The Water Rate will increase by 5% = This equals an additional \$1.80 per month for a typical

user.

o This increase supports the critical infrastructure necessary to deliver clean, safe drinking water.

o The Wastewater Rate will increase by 4% This equals an additional \$1.60 per month for a typical user.

o This increase supports the critical infrastructure necessary to effectively treat wastewater before it is discharged in Georgian Bay.

"We are confident this draft budget balances affordability while supporting the quality delivery of services that our residents rely on, and ensures ongoing vital enhancements to our infrastructure," said CFO Lindsay Barron. "While we continue to face numerous economic pressures, we have worked to keep the tax rate consistent in recent years to limit the overall tax levy impact. We look forward to receiving input from Council and the community over the six-week budget review period. Comments or questions can be e-mailed to budget@midland.ca."

A TINY SENIOR MOMENT

The holidays are upon us, and with them come our hopes for a happy and healthy 2024. We'll soon be thinking about what we can do through the winter months to keep well and active. In this third column focusing on Tiny's fitness programs and the people who make them possible, we're highlighting Samantha Edmonds and the Zumba ® program.

If you had to describe Samantha Edmonds in a single word it might be "caring". This mother of two has been an Educational Assistant with the Simcoe County District School Board for more than two decades. 

Springwater Council Approves 2024 Budget Township of Springwater

Dec. 6, 2023 – Springwater Council officially adopted the Township's 2024 Budget & Business Plan at a meeting held on December 6.

The Township's 2024 Budget was approved with a 1.22% net tax increase over 2023 rates. When combined with the County of Simcoe's approved tax increase of 3.7% and the education rate which is assumed to remain neutral, residents can expect to see a 1.83% blended tax increase on their 2024 property tax bill.

For an average home in Springwater assessed at \$497,000, the approved blended rate amounts to a \$79.34 increase over 2023 levels, or \$6.61 per month

For every tax dollar spent:

- \$0.49 is retained by the Township of Springwater
- \$0.33 is retained by the County of Simcoe; and
- \$0.18 goes towards Education.

The budget includes gross expenditures of \$70.9 million, comprised of \$24.9 million in tax supported operating expenses, \$20.9 million in carry forward capital projects and \$19.3 million in new capital expenses, \$3.2 million for water operations and \$2.6

million for wastewater operations.

The 2024 Capital Budget includes \$9.9 million in funding for Fire Station 2 construction and furnishings; \$8.5 million for the construction of Craig Road; and \$4.4 million in wastewater treatment plant upgrades. Additionally, residents can expect to see road, traffic and infrastructure improvements throughout the Township and will receive the same or improved levels of service with respect to fire and emergency services, winter road maintenance, libraries, planning, building services, recreation and by-law enforcement.

Since 2016, the operating budget has included 1% to support capital infrastructure and reduce the infrastructure gap identified in the Township's 2022 Asset Management Plan. These funds will be dedicated to the future replacement of roads, bridges, fleet, facilities and parks.





Local infrastructure funding will help create jobs and support economic growth in Barrie – Springwater – Oro-Medonte

Dec. 13, 2023 - BARRIE— The Ontario government is investing \$5,956,561 to help renew and rehabilitate critical infrastructure in Barrie – Springwater – Oro-Medonte The funding is being delivered through the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF) and is part of the government's plan to support economic growth and job creation.

This funding includes:

\$4,439,360 for Simcoe County

\$1,053,595 for the Township of Springwater, and \$463,606 for the Township of Oro-Medonte

Dec. 14, 2023 - Today, the Ontario government announced that beginning no later than January 1, 2026, consumers will be able to buy beer, wine, cider, coolers, seltzers, and other low-alcohol ready-to-drink beverages at all participating convenience, grocery and big box stores across the province. This new, more open marketplace will introduce up to 8,500 new stores where these products can be purchased, the largest expansion of consumer choice and convenience since the end of prohibition almost 100 years ago. Spirits like vodka, gin and whisky will continue to be sold at the LCBO.

"We made a promise to the people of Ontario to deliver more choice and convenience," said Premier Doug Ford. "Today, we're delivering on that promise. There's no reason why Ontario consumers shouldn't enjoy the same convenient shopping experience as Canadians in every other prov-ince when buying some wine for their holiday party or a case of beer or seltzers on their way to the cottage." As a first step in the transition to a new retail marketplace, the government has informed Brewers Retail Inc. (The Beer Store) that the Master Frame-work Agreement (MFA), signed and extended for ten years by the previous government in 2015 and limited the number of retail stores that could be authorized to sell alcohol, will not be renewed after it expires on December 31, 2025. The Beer Store and LCBO will continue their retail operations in Ontario's new marketplace. "The people of Ontario will soon have more choice and convenience on where they can buy alcohol," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "As we move towards implementing this expansion, our government will be taking a responsible, measured approach so we can ensure our transition to a new marketplace is smooth, safe and stable." 29 Sperling Immunization Clinic Closing Dec. 20

Dec. 13, 2023 - SIMCOE MUSKOKA – After three years of operation and more than 300,000 doses of COVID-19 vaccine provided to the public, the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU) will close the immunization clinic at 29 Sperling Dr. in Barrie at 4 p.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 20. Until then, the health unit will continue to offer COVID-19 vaccinations by walk-in and appointment on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Appointments are available online through the Provincial Vaccine Contact Centre or by calling 1-833-943-3900.

The clinic closure comes as health units across Ontario resume their core programs and local pharmacies are now providing the majority of COVID-19 vaccinations to residents. Individuals aged six months and older are able to receive the COVID-19 XBB vaccine formulation free of charge at participating local pharmacies and some health care providers. Since September 2023, 75 percent of COVID-19 vaccinations have been administered at local pharmacies across Simcoe Muskoka.

Two elements in this song have made it of particular interest to children as well as adults. First is the attention-getting opening-line warning, "You better watch out," and second is the delightful promise of an upcoming event, "Santa Claus is comin' to town." Coupled with a bouncy and catchy melody, these teasers have made the 1932 composition by lyricist Haven Gillespie and musician John Frederick Coots one of the most successful of all popular Christmas carols. Only "Rudolph" and "White Christmas" have outsold this depression-era joyful gem. The True Meaning of Christmas!

Each December, I vowed to make Christmas a calm and peaceful experience. I had cut back on nonessential obligations — extensive card writing, endless baking, decorating, and even overspending. Yet still, I found myself exhausted, unable to appreciate the precious family moments, and of course, the true meaning of Christmas.

My son, Nicholas, was in kindergarten that year. It was an exciting season for a six year old. For weeks, he'd been memorizing songs for his school's "Winter Pageant." I didn't have the heart to tell him I'd be working the night of the production. Unwilling to miss his shining moment, I spoke with his teacher. She assured me there'd be a dress rehearsal the morning of the presentation. All parents unable to attend that evening were welcome to come then. Fortunately, Nicholas seemed happy with the compromise. So, the morning of the dress rehearsal, I filed in ten minutes early, found a spot on the cafeteria floor and sat down. Around the room, I saw several other parents quietly scampering to their seats. As I waited, the students were led into the room. Each class, accompanied by their teacher, sat cross-legged on the floor. Then, each group, one by one, rose to perform their song.

Because the public school system had long stopped referring to the holiday as "Christmas," I didn't expect anything other than fun, commercial entertainment — songs of reindeer, Santa Claus, snowflakes, and good cheer.

So, when my son's class rose to sing, "Christmas Love," I was slightly taken aback by its bold title. Nicholas was aglow, as were all of his classmates, adorned in fuzzy mittens, red sweaters, and bright snowcaps upon their heads. Those in the front rowcenter stage — held up large letters, one by one, to spell out the title of the song. As the class would sing "C is for Christmas," a child would hold up the letter C. Then, "H is for Happy," and on and on, until each child holding up his portion had presented the complete message, "Christmas Love." The performance was going smoothly, until suddenly, we noticed her; a small, quiet, girl in the front row holding the letter "M" upside down -totally unaware her letter "M" appeared as a "W."

The audience of 1st through 6th graders snickered at this little one's mistake. But she had no idea they were laughing at her, so she stood tall, proudly holding her "W." Although many teachers tried to shush the children, the laughter continued until the last letter was raised, and we all saw it together.

A hush came over the audience and eyes began to widen. In that instant, we understood — the reason we were there, why we celebrated the holiday in the first place, why even in the chaos, there was a purpose for our festivities.

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

The new unit will expand access to specialized urgent mental health and addictions services, making it faster and easier for people and their families to connect to care closer to home.

"All Ontarians deserve to receive convenient care close to home, no matter where they live," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "By investing in a new inpatient acute care unit at Waypoint, our government is ensuring that people in the Georgian Bay region will have faster access to specialized mental health services and supports, when and where they need it most."

This investment will support planning and construction to renovate over 10,000 square feet of existing space at Waypoint. 

Dec. 18, 2023 - In Matthew 9:35-36, we read: "Then Jesus went to all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the good news of the kingdom, and healing every disease and every sickness. When He saw the crowds, He felt compassion for them because they were weary and

worn out, like sheep without a shepherd." We may not feel like a "sheep without a shepherd"

but many of us know what it's like to feel "weary and worn out." Sometimes, in our stubbornness to "do it all on our own", we extend ourselves beyond what we can reasonably accomplish. Sometimes, we say "yes", when we should say, "Let me think about that, or let me pray about that." Both responses give us time to consider the details of the request and to be certain it's something we can accomplish in the time we have available.

Sometimes, we turn down help because we believe we can do it better than others. Sometimes, we push ourselves past our ability to complete tasks in relation to a deadline because we believe it's what we have to do so others can see how capable we are. Sometimes, we become lost in the never-ending maze of trying "to do it all to have it all". Compassion for others dwindles as compassion for ourself is minimized.

We don't know why people in the crowds were weary and worn out, but we do know that Jesus came to show us how much God the Father loves us. It's good news that the compassion that flows out of God's love has no expiry date!

The Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John are filled with the stories of Jesus' life on earth including His conception; His birth; and His growing years. The many signs, wonders, and miracles He performed during His ministry demonstrate His compassion for people. His death and resurrection are vital components of the story of salvation. Some Bibles place these events in chronological order which helps us to take a fresh look at His life.

Before Jesus was taken up into heaven, He said He was not leaving us as orphans. The presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives is ours for the asking; He never leaves us nor forsakes us. Then Jesus said in John 14:18: "... I am coming to you."

The Apostle Paul describes Jesus' second coming in 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18: "For the Lord Himself will descend from heaven with a shout, with the archangel's voice, and with the trumpet of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are still alive will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will always be with the Lord. Therefore encourage one another with these words."

As we recall Jesus' time on earth through the words of the familiar hymns and Bible readings, let's be encouraged and remember – Jesus is coming to us again. Amen.



TRAFFIC COMPLAINT TO THE HURONIA WEST OPP LEADS TO THE ARREST OF AN IMPAIRED DRIVER WITH YOUTHS IN THE VE

(Dec. 13, 2023 - TOWN OF WASAGA BEACH, CLEARVIEW AND SPRINGWATER TOWN-SHIPS, ON) - Members of the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have arrested an impaired driver who had youths in the vehicle, following a traffic complaint.

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In the interest of increased public safety, Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment interim Detachment Commander Todd Pittman is very pleased to notify the residents of North Simcoe that the detachment has implemented a technology based community safety resource named CAMSafe. CAMSafe is a program aimed at creating a database of residential and commercial security cameras within a community that may function as a resource for police when investigating offences and crimes.

When a police officer uses the CAMSafe database, they will see a map of the local area of the incident showing registered participants. Officers will be able to click on registered addresses to view further details, such as property owner contact information. Officers will not be able access your security cameras or cloud-based accounts to examine camera footage unless they make a request to the property owner using contact information from the database.

Interested community members are only required to provide basic contact information and camera location but, can include more details if desired, such as direction the camera faces, footage retention details or screenshots of the camera view. Registrants can only view their own information and can delete their account or change their information at any time.

"This technology partnership will help front line police officers patrolling our communities be more effective in solving crimes with the support of area residents and businesses that affect our property and citizens providing a safer community along with the positive attributes it brings to the area for tourism and business. 


Wolf Bells

Dec. 14/2023 - I love finding unexpected hiking areas. I am always on the lookout for trails leading off and into the new and unknown, and on to new adventures. Often this involves another Simcoe County Forest

trail, of which there are 150 properties, encompassing 33,726 acres! More than enough land for a quiet and peaceful hike away from the crowds.

There is a very large tract of Simcoe County Forest just outside of Midhurst. I first noticed this forest while taking Nursery Road to avoid the traffic on Highway 27, and while driving past the thick forest I happened to look to my left and see a very large canine sitting just inside the gloom. This large beast sat shoulder high to the fence post he was standing next to, his brown and black fur forming a thick ruff around his broad shoulders. I stopped dead in the middle of the road, rolled down my window, and stared in wonder at this magnificent creature, and he stared right back with his intelligent amber eyes. At times likes this the world ceases to exist beyond



the moment of that connection. The spell was broken by another car coming down the road, and the canine turned back to the dark forest and disappeared between the brown tree trunks. Goosebumps swept down my arms and I felt an incredible awe that still stays with me today.

Now, people that I tell this to insist that it must have been a large coyote that I saw, and that there are no wolves near Barrie. I disagree to both those statements. I have seen my share of coyotes and they are a fraction of the size of the large canine I saw. Coyotes also have slender muzzles and larger pointed ears while the fellow I saw had a short blunter nose and rounded bushy ears. I have heard of the possibility of hybrids in this area, wolf and dogs mixes. Perhaps, but I remain staunch in my opinion that I was very lucky to have had a close encounter with a wolf. Only one thing was left to do, to find a trail into that forest and see what other encounters I could have.

That encounter was several years ago, and though I have never seen any other large canine except for those with thick pet collars, I continue to return to explore this large expanse of forest. For a quieter trek park off Nursery Road, as there are several different trails that lead off along thick mixed forests



deep with leaf litter. There are also trails leading off from the parking lot of the Simcoe county administration trails near the gazebo. This section is very popular with dog owners and is much too busy for me to be interested in. Today I started at the car pool parking at the corner of Hwy 27 and 26. This trail is narrow and leads down into the ravine. At first the only sounds are the cars on the highways, which disappears the further down you go, until it is the sound of the infant Nottawasaga River that you hear. The trail winds along the river and through deep cedar forests before travelling back up the ravine to those well-trod trails. From here I turn right and continue along the top of the ravine next to a precipitous drop, and in some places the trail has started to erode. Ugh, I stand well back from the edge with a sick feeling in my stomach and inch my way past. From here there is a plethora of trails to explore over many hours, both easy and mostly level trails and others that wind up and down that ravine. I have yet repeat my previous encounter with the wolf, though I often wonder if those amber eyes have followed me along this quiet trail.

Springwater Council Meeting Highlights

2024 Budget Approval

The Township's 2024 Budget was approved with a 1.22% net tax increase over 2023 rates. When combined with the County of Simcoe's approved tax increase of 3.7% and the education rate which is assumed to remain neutral, residents can expect to see a 1.83% blended tax increase on their 2024 property tax bill. For an average home in Springwater assessed at \$497,000, the approved blended rate amounts to a \$79.34 increase over 2023 levels, or \$6.61 per month.

Old Orchard Road Speed Reduction

The speed limit on Old Orchard Rd has been reduced to 60 km/h, 500 meters west of the CP railroad crossing to 250 meters east of the CP railroad crossing. This adjustment aims to offer motorists more warning time due to insufficient sight-stopping distance.

Water & Wastewater Rate Study

Council has approved a 4% annual increase for water rates and a 10% annual increase for wastewater rates for 2024 to 2028, as well as the necessary front-ending required for Elmvale wastewater projects. The new rates are being implemented following a Water & Wastewater Rate Study completed in 2023. Not all residents of Springwater are connected to municipal water and/or wastewater services; only those benefiting properties are charged the water and/or wastewater rate. A by-law with the new rates will be submitted for final approval at the December 20 meeting. The new rates will be effective February 1, 2024.

Remington Minister's Zoning Order (MZO) Request Endorsed

Council has voted to endorse Remington Group Inc.'s request to locate a seniors medical campus on lands known as 727 Bayfield Street North though a Provincial Land Use approval process. The senior's medical campus as proposed includes Long-Term Care facilities, retirement residences, hospice care, life leases, and associated medical office and retail opportunities.

Tender Awards

Council has awarded the tender for a new Tandem Truck to Currie Truck Centre in the amount of \$400,635 plus HST.

The tender for two (2) ³/₄ Ton Crew Cab Pickup Trucks was awarded to Haliburton Chrysler Dodge Jeep RAM Ltd. at a cost of \$165,535 excluding HST. Elmvale Hanging Basket Program

Following Council's direction, the Township will assume the coordination and implementation of the Downtown Elmvale memorial hanging basket program. The program includes the purchase, coordination and maintenance of 65 hanging floral baskets in downtown Elmvale from May through September. The program was previously run by the Elmvale District Garden Enthusiast (EDGE).Queen St W for the market.

Midhurst Heights – Stage 3 Subdivision Agreement

Council received a delegation from Clarose Midhurst GP Inc. requesting a Stage 3 Subdivision Agreement for the Midhurst Heights neighbourhood. Council has requested a staff report regarding the Stage 3 Agreement be brought forward at the January 17, 2024 meeting of Council. 
