



A TINY SENIOR MOMENT

Dec. 7, 2023 - Our final columns for 2023 focus on programs that help seniors keep healthy, and the dedicated and talented volunteers and professionals who make them possible. Today we're highlighting Dino Pangrazzi and Cheryl Moore who lead the Township of Tiny's yoga programs. How does a man from the corporate world and a social worker with a big-city practice wind up teaching yoga and meditation in Lafontaine? A decision to change their lifestyles made more than 20 years ago brought Dino Pangrazzi and life partner Cheryl Moore to our community.

Pangrazzi had a life-long interest in sports and wellness so he decided to take a fitness training program at Humber College after leaving his long-term position in the chemical industry. Eventually he started taking certification courses for mat and chair yoga.

At about the same time, Moore was becoming disenchanted with her practice She felt her work should have more connection to clients' emotional and spiritual well-being and went to Seneca College to increase her knowledge of holistic health, which recognizes the interconnectedness of body, mind and spirit.

The couple then moved to this area, where they began to make a contribution to the community. They were as busy as ever. In addition to starting work in fitness and healing, they ran a bed & breakfast for 10 years. About a decade ago, Pangrazzi became a volunteer firefighter, which had been a childhood dream. It was another big change for them both. He's now on call 24/7, and is involved in a lot of public education work and she is a member of the Georgian Bay Healing Hub, and maintains her busy practice.

They still find time to teach yoga and meditation for the Township of Tiny. This winter, they will offer the program Yoga and Meditation, starting Monday, January 15, 7:00 - 8:30 p.m. at the Lafontaine Community Centre. It's appropriate for people of all ages in part because of their intuitive people skills and also because participants are encouraged to use accommodations, which may be suggested or self-guided, so that they can enjoy the program without undue stress. It offers a weekly evening of fun, meeting new people and getting the body moving in ways that you don't typically do to increase your flexibility and range of motion. Add to that the benefits of guided meditations enhanced by enchanting music and you'll end your day unplugged and recharged.

For those seeking a more physically challenging program, Yoga for Exercise will be led by Pangrazzi starting Wednesday, January 17, 5:30 - 6:15 p.m. at the same location. Hatha yoga postures and flow sequences from start to finish are used to provide a robust workout for health, increasing strength, stamina and flexibility. But again, accommodations are made to suit individual needs and fitness levels.

The Master Plan

The Township of Springwater is undertaking a Water and Wastewater Master Plan to evaluate current and future servicing needs. The intent is to capture servicing needs of all the communities across the Township, recognizing each community has its own, specific priorities, and to develop alternative solutions addressing these needs. The Master Plan will align with the Township's Official Plan and its mission of supporting development in designated areas, maintaining community characteristics, and preserving natural heritage.

The Process

This Plan will be completed in accordance with the Master Plan modified Approach #2 process as identified in the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) document (amended 2023). The Plan will evaluate alternative solutions and recommend preferred solutions in consultation with the public, Indigenous communities, and agencies. At the conclusion of the Plan, the process will be documented in a report, prepared for public review.

How to Get Involved

Public consultation is a key component of the Class EA process and the Township wants to ensure that anyone interested has the opportunity to get involved and provide input. Public Information Centres are planned for future stages of the Plan to inform the public about the steps involved in this work and to gather feedback on the alternative solutions being considered. Information about future Public Information Centres will be posted on the Township's website / social media channels and in the local newspaper.

Town of Penetanguishene is investing \$851,171

Nov. 28, 2023 - Penetanguishene - The Town of Penetanguishene is investing \$851,171 from the federal government's Canada Community-Building Fund (CCBF) into infrastructure projects throughout the Town. This permanent source of funding allows municipalities to invest in priority projects with a real, local impact.

The funding will be invested in local roads projects, including the resurfacing of Robert Street East and West, the reconstruction of Harriet Street between Edward Street and Jeffery Street, an extension of Thompsons Road West, and the improvement of Robert Street East and Fuller Avenue intersection.

The funding amount allocated to each project has been outlined below:

- \$221, 525 for rehabilitation of Robert Street
- \$156,589 for Harriet Street Reconstruction (between Edward Street and Jeffery Street)
- \$258,334 for intersection improvements on Robert Street East and Fuller Avenue
- \$214,723 for Thompsons Road West extension improvements

"The impact of the \$851,171 provided through the Canada Community-Building Fund cannot be overstated," said Doug Rawson, Mayor of the Town of Penetanguishene. "The cost of maintaining and improving our community infrastructure is a significant challenge for a small town like ours. We are grateful for the support of the federal government and their commitment to helping communities like ours thrive and prosper."

In Ontario, the CCBF is administered to all municipalities, excluding the City of Toronto, by the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO). It's distributed twice a year, on a per-capita basis, to be invested across 18 project categories for local infrastructure initiatives.

Keeping Kids Active is Important as the Days Get Shorter

SIMCOE MUSKOKA – Do colder mornings and darker afternoons have you and your kids wishing you could hibernate until spring? The Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU) encourages families with kids and teens to stay physically active and to continue with their active school travel routines even when it is cold and snowy.

According to the 2022 ParticipACTION Report Card on Physical Activity for Children and Youth, only 28 percent of kids aged 5 to 17 years are getting the recommended minimum of 60 minutes a day of moderate to vigorous physical activity, such as brisk walking, wheeling and playing sports.

Making time to walk or wheel to and from school is one of the easiest ways for school-aged children to get regular daily physical activity. Being physically active is linked with better overall health for everyone and is important every day of the year. Children and youth who participate in higher levels of physical activity have improved physical and mental health as well as greater

mental, emotional and social well-being. Children and youth who are physically active benefit from greater self-esteem, lower levels of anxiety and depression, and are better able to learn when in school.

To keep the journey to school enjoyable during the colder months, prepare by checking the weather forecast and dressing accordingly. Dressing for the weather helps to preserve body heat and keeps you comfortable. A wind/waterproof jacket and snowpants will help kids stay warm and dry when playing outside. When temperatures are colder, add a fleece or wool sweater mid-layer for extra comfort and protection. Top it off with a hat, gloves or mittens (including an extra set for when the first set gets wet), and a tube-shaped neck warmer or a scarf to cover exposed skin. Finally, a pair of winter boots with good treads will keep feet warm and offer stability that can help prevent slips and falls on ice or in slushy and snowy conditions. Check out what boots have the best slip to get in some extra movement.

The December Meteor Shower

The annual Geminid meteor shower will peak on the night of Dec 13 into the morning of the 14th. This shower will produce up to 120 meteors per hour with some bright fireballs. Annual meteor showers are produced when Earth crosses debris fields from comets as we orbit the sun, this is why various showers occur at the same time each year. In the case of the Geminids, Earth will encounter tiny sand-sized particles from the asteroid 3200 Phaethon with some gravel size pieces producing bright dramatic fireballs that will light up the sky as well as the ground. The meteors will harmlessly vaporize some 80 kilometres above the ground at a slow 35 km/ sec compared to the Perseids in August at twice that speed. A few meteors can be seen start-

ing at about 7 pm locally when the constellation is low in the northeast. Greater numbers will be seen as the constellation rises higher throughout the night. The moon will not interfere this year. This is a must-see event. Known as "The Backyard Astronomer", Gary Boyle is an astronomy educator, guest speaker, monthly columnist for the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada as well as a STEM educator. He has been interviewed on more than 55 Canadian radio stations as well as various television stations across Canada and the U.S. In recognition of his public outreach in astronomy, the International Astronomical Union has honoured him with the naming of Asteroid (22406) Garyboyle. Reminder: Waste Collection Schedule Changes Take Effect Week of December 4 for Households in Zone 2

Dec. 1, 2023 – Residents are reminded to check the Simcoe County Collects app, visit simcoe. ca/collectionschange, or check other direct communications provided as the County's curbside waste collection schedule adjusts to new Zones starting the week of December 4, 2023.

Households in Zone 2 only skip a garbage collection week during the week of December 4, and receive two consecutive weeks of recycling collection. There are no impacts to households in Zone 1, and waste collection days of the week stay the same.

The best way to find out if your household is impacted is to download or check the Simcoe County Collects app. Alerts will be sent to all app subscribers throughout the week.

- Week of November 27 Recycling and Organics Collection
- Week of December 4 Recycling and Organics Collection
- Week of December 11 Garbage and Organics Collection (one additional untagged garbage bag permitted)

How do you determine your Zone?

- The Simcoe County Collects app is updated with new zone information. The App is a helpful and convenient tool for all County of Simcoe Waste programs. App reminders and notifications will also be sent during your collection week. Simply download the app and enter your address and you will receive your upcoming schedule indicating what carts to put out on which dates
- All known addresses in Zone 2 received a direct mailer in early November notifying them of the collection week rotation (note that mailers may have been sent to your landlord if you rent/ lease)
- The County's Waste Collection Calendar was mailed in November to all County households and includes the new Zone information

Helpful Tip:

Households may wish to place out all three carts (2 feet apart from each other) during the week of December 4. Our collection vehicles will collect only the correct carts for your Zone that week; this will assist residents in identifying their proper rotation going forward. Organics carts will continue to be collected weekly; however, residents in Zone 2 will notice that their recycling and garbage carts will switch weeks moving forward.

NEW Producer Responsibility legislation, Circular Materials Ontario (CMO), the organization acting on behalf of producers to set up the new blue cart collection system in Simcoe County, has contracted their own transfer facility to transfer blue cart recycling material only. This means that the County's cart collection trucks will be required to visit two different drop off/transfer locations, one for recycling (managed by CMO) and one for organics (managed by the County). To avoid larger impacts to collections cycles, the County has introduced new zones and altered the cart collection set out rotation for Zone 2 households (as noted above). Moving to standardized Zones will also provide greater consistency for residents and streamlined communications for all waste collection programs.

Local Environmentalist Wins Award for Forest Stewardship

Nov. 27, 2023 - The Huronia Woodlot Owners Association recently held their 43rd White Pine Award meeting, and the 2023 recipient is Oro-Medonte resident Sandy Agnew.

Agnew is a Certified Engineering Technician, a graduate of Niagara College's Ecosystem Restoration program and a Managed Forest Plan Approver. He has been involved in ecological restoration for over 35 years with such groups as Black Creek Project of Toronto, Trout Unlimited Canada and the Severn Sound Environmental Association.

He is a former councilor in Oro-Medonte Township and former member of the Lake Simcoe and Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authorities boards and the Couchiching Conservancy land

Sandy holds memberships and has held Board positions in numerous environmental groups including the Ontario Society for Ecological Restoration,

the Ontario Woodlot Association (Huronia Chapter), Forests Ontario and Ontario Nature.

Upon accepting his award, Agnew responded that he has known many of the earlier recipients and has always held them up as "stewardship heroes" and is very proud to be acknowledged in this manner.

The White Pine Award is given to a deserving person to recognise and celebrate their dedication to good forestry practices. Sandy Agnew has written 124 Forest Management Plans for woodlot owners through the Ontario Managed Forest Tax Incentive Program (MFTIP), and has operated his own habitat restoration company called EcoMedic.

The guest speaker for this meeting was David Hawke, a well-known naturalist and writer, who spoke of the lumbering history of The Copeland Forest. From 1792 to 1978 this 4,400-acre tract of forested land was at the forefront of lumber production. A series of family dynasties were both made rich and devastated by the ebb and flow of lumber demands around both World Wars.

In 1978 the sole surviving member, John Copeland, sold the property to the Ontario Government to be used as a Resources Management Area.

The Gift of Education

It's the holiday season and there is one type of gift that will carry a young person through their entire life. It is the gift of education. When high school ends, and young adults look forward to entering a post-secondary institution, the costs of tuition may be surprising. Tuition alone can range \$3000-\$4000 a semester, before one factors in housing, food, and transportation.

To get ahead of these looming expenses, it's best to start early to save for post-secondary education. A parent, grandparent, or guardian can make contributions to a Registered Education Savings Plan "RESP" for a child(ren). The contributions can be made monthly, annually or on an ad hoc basis. From birth to 12 months of age, a child has accumulated \$2500 worth of contribution room and has a lifetime contribution limit of \$50,000. Each year that \$2500 is contributed, an education grant of \$500 is automatically available and applied for. This grant is a 20% increase on the contributions made by their adult loved one before being invested. If the contributor can't financially make the entire \$2500 amount, any contribution that they do make will receive a 20% grant on their contribution. It's a win-win for the future student.

We recommend a monthly contribution for any savings plan. This is partially because it's often easier on the budget for working adults and pensioners. We also believe that the best opportunities come from dollar cost averaging. Dollar cost averaging is just buying an investment on a regular consistent basis, often monthly, allowing the saver to take advantage of the ups and downs of the markets. If someone saved monthly in 2022, they would have picked up great investments at a discount price and then as prices picked up in 2023, they got them at a great price which is advantageous for long term wealth accumulation.

Few are aware that when the student redeems money from their RESP, it is considered taxable income to them. This is generally not a concern because few students earn enough income to pay income tax at all even between part-time jobs and redemptions from the RESP.

Nov 30/23 - We are so lucky to have an abundance of trails in Simcoe County in which to walk, bike and hike. Some of these trails are little more than squirrel trails, while others are well maintained, giving residents of all fitness levels the

opportunity to get outside and enjoy the late fall weather. Today was unexpectedly mild and I decided to take the beagle with me for an enjoyable trek. We headed off to Penetanguishene and the northern terminus of the 23 km Tiny Rail Trail. There is a nice parking area off Robert Street and Overhead Bridge Road and the trail here is sometimes called Thirteen Bridges. The railway used to cross over the meandering Copeland Creek multiple times, hence the name. An interesting tidbit; before the train ran through here it was a stage coach route, with a tavern every two kilometers. Well, I'm sure if those taverns were still here there would be no problem getting people out on the trail, though we might need those stagecoaches to taxi the unsteady crowds home! As you leave the parking area you do need to clamber down an icy incline to the trail itself. To the left is a large culvert under the road and if you follow the trail east you will end up at the beautiful Penetang waterfront. To the west is the route out of town along the rail trail. For some reason this trail is rated moderate, but I would consider this easy. It is a mixture of pavement and crushed gravel, and while there is numerous small and steep hills, they are not difficult to climb. There is always the opportunity to stand on the numerous bridges over the shallow creek and watch the gentle water flow by, or follow the multiple side trails off through the leafless trees. The main trail is much less used once you leave the forest and bridges behind, and enter an area of marsh and scrub. I could hear the rat-a-tat-tat of a pileated woodpecker not far away, as well as the chitter of a red squirrel chastising me for bringing a nosy beagle into his neighborhood. Now Mr. B is typical for the hound and beagle breed, as his nose leads the way, though never in a straight line. Several times I almost lost my footing on the icy trail, as Mr. B attempted to cloths line me at the knees with his long leash, when he would abruptly change direction to follow another enticing odor. Beagles also enjoy to run at top speed only to come to a sudden stop at some random tuft of grass which has me skidding to a stop before tumbling over his back. There was a lot of twirling and side stepping on my behalf to prevent a hard landing on my ample bottom. The trail continues south towards Elmvale, crossing multiple side roads. It is an easy trek, with views out and across dry fields, thick woods and a golf course now silent under the snow. Except for the section of trail near the bridges, I had no contact with other people. That would be a different story in the summer, as this is a very popular route for cyclists. For now though, the Mr. and I get to enjoy our solitude while on an easy local trail, and the Mr. gets his share of chasing new scents. While not a remote trail, still an enjoyable trek.

Homemade Hot Chocolate – Easy to Make and Ready in Minutes

Dec. 2, 2023 - There is nothing like a hot cup of steaming cocoa on a cold weather day and guess what? This recipe uses pantry sta-

ples and is almost as easy to prepare as those readymade store-bought packets. Another bonus when you choose to make your own is that you can customize your cuppa to suit your specific dietary preferences and tolerances. Go ahead and use lower fat or dairy free milk as the base or if you like the rich flavour of dark chocolate, add more cocoa powder to your brew. Play around with this recipe until you've created your perfect rendition to share with family and friends. Here's to chocolate love!

So, continue to enjoy your occasional hot chocolate or one or two pieces of dark chocolate daily as it is unlikely to pose a health risk. If you treat dark chocolate as the candy it is and consume it only in modera-

Did You Know?

Dark chocolate has a well-established reputation for being good for your health, but a Consumer Reports study that came out in December 2022 tested 28 dark chocolate bars for traces of lead and cadmium and found that either or both of these heavy metals were present in all of the chocolate bars including some that are sold in Canada (https://www.consumerreports.org/health/food-safety/lead-and-cadmium-in-dark-chocolate).

Heavy metals can cause a variety of health problems and is frequently found in food according to Health Canada. The higher the quantity of heavy metal exposure, the greater the risk to individuals. While it is important for the consumer to be aware of this research, there is no need to panic. The bottom line is that although dark chocolate has lost some of its halo effect, Health Canada reassures us that chocolate "contributes marginally" to the overall dietary exposure of lead and cadmium and that the consumption of chocolate by Canadians does not represent a health concern.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup (250 ml) milk of choice (cow's, almond, soy, or oat)
- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) unsweetened cocoa powder
- 2 teaspoons (10 ml) pure maple syrup or to taste
- \bullet 1 ½ tablespoons (23 ml) dark or milk chocolate chips
- 1/3 teaspoon (1.7 ml) pure vanilla extract
- Pinch of salt
- Shaved chocolate or whipped cream or whipping non-dairy topping for garnish

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. In a small pot, heat the milk of choice while stirring on medium heat until just simmering.
- 2. Add the cocoa powder, maple syrup, chocolate chips, vanilla extract and pinch of salt. Stir constantly until heated through.
- 3. Once heated through, pour into a mug and add the toppings choice.

Tears fill our eyes. It's hard to breathe. Who can we trust?


Jesus, we ask for faith, faith to believe.

OPP Arrest Scarborough Individual in Tay Township Sex Assault Investigation

(TAY TOWNSHIP, ON.) - A report of a sex assault made to the OPP Communications Centre on September 18, 2023, has resulted in a number of sex related offences being laid upon an individual from Scarborough by OPP investigators. Crime Unit officers from the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment, conducted an in depth investigation resulting in an arrest at a Vaughan, Ontario address on November 29, 2023.

NORTHEY, Mary Jill

A valued member of our musical community has passed away suddenly at home on Sept 13 at the age of 67.

A native of Oshawa, Ontario, Jill Northey spent most of her life in the world of music. A graduate of McGill University, University of Toronto, the Royal Conservatory (voice and piano), with graduate work at the Royal Academy (London) and Westminster Choir College (Princeton), she studied with such world-renowned musicians as Alexander Brott, Vivian Langrish, Margaret Hillis, Eric Ericson, Wayne Ridell, Elizabeth Dawson and Jean MacPhail. Her performing and teaching careers took her from Montreal to London, England, to Abu Dhabi (U.A.E.) and back to Canada where she sang under Elmer Iseler in the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir and taught choral conducting at the University of Western Ontario.

An accomplished musician and educator, Jill taught music as a private teacher as well as in public and private schools around the world. She had extensive choral experience as a singer and a director of ensembles including directing several choirs all based in the Huronia area: the Huronia Choristers, the Huronia Children's Chorus and Serenata. In 1992, as Director of Serenata, she was awarded the Canada 125 medal for outstanding contribution to the cultural life of the Huronia area. As a teacher, Jill dedicated much of her career to developing the skills of many young musicians, several of whom moved on to successful university training (in music and related fields) and interesting, vital careers.

In addition to her passion for music, Jill had a deep love of travel, adventure and the exotic which she fondly shared with her two nieces Madeleine and Simone. She regaled them with stories of her travels abroad including Europe, Australia and Turkey, making her own Turkish coffee or how in 1985, she obtained her pilot's licence at the Oshawa Flying Club. Summer visits included trips to the Bowmanville zoo to see the "movie star" inhabitants and an elephant ride.

Her exuberant sense of mischief and joy would occasionally burst forth in a few quick toe taps or a jig. When visiting her sister in Ottawa Jill was always game to watch an old musical, a Hitchcock thriller or Mr. Bean.

With an active imagination and curious mind, Jill's interests went well beyond music. They included gardening, homemade preserves, pickleball and her most recent passion, ping pong which gave rise to the Annual Summer Cottage Ping-Pong Tournament with her cousin Norah and the installation of a ping-pong table in Jill's living room.

Most of all, Jill loved her students and her cats Henry, Alice, Genny and Bella, who were often an integral and wildly entertaining part of her music lessons. They even became the subject of stories, art and poetry.

Despite failing health, Jill made every effort to support her parents, Donald Alexander Northey of Fenelon Falls, ON and Winifred Florence (Sheppard) Northey of Lark Harbour, NL whom she loved deeply. She remained a dedicated and vigilant daughter throughout their final years.
