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Wendat Mobile Crisis Workers Have a New Look

Feb. 8, 2024 - The North Simcoe Crisis Management and Response Team (CMART) is a program where an OPP Officer is partnered with a mental health crisis worker from Wendat Community Programs. The teams respond to individuals experiencing a mental health crisis in the community. The program operates Sunday to Friday from 9am-7pm. The program is accessed by calling 911. On average, the team assists 560 individuals and has over 1,000 contacts with these individuals annually. The program diverts visits to the hospital and ensures

that individuals in the community receive prompt assistance when experiencing a mental health crisis. Individuals also receive follow up and links to appropriate community programs and supports.

Wendat's Mobile Crisis Workers recently got some new gear including body armour, jackets and hats. All of these items clearly identify them as Crisis Workers. This was done to increase their personal safety while on job. It also identifies them so that the individuals they are visiting, police and other emergency service staff know who they are.

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Tiny Wants Three-month Septage Extension From Midland to Handle Biowaste

Feb. 12, 2024 - There was a bit of a stink when Midland dropped a bombshell in December that as a cost-measure savings for their aged wastewater treatment centre, they would be closing the lid on accepting septage from anyone but their own ratepayers on the system.

As the largest contributor to the plant with 59 per cent of all processed septage (in contrast to Midland's own 12 per cent), that put Tiny Township in a bind as per the March 6 deadline for closure.

A report was brought to the recent regular council meeting when public works director Tim Leitch provided an update and staff recommendation for a three-month extension to the neighbouring town.

"This is a big concern for Tiny, of course," Leitch said, explaining that while summer months allow for the spreading of septage onto fields from holding and septic tanks, residents requiring those tanks to be pumped during winter would be impacted by the decision. By contrast, as portable toilets and marine systems cannot be spread on fields, they would require processing at Barrie, Orillia or Collingwood treatment facilities along with a likely price increase as a result. "We had a chance to meet," Leitch continued, referencing the CAOs and mayors as well as his public works counterparts, "and we talked about this at a subsequent meeting... to go through some different options. thorough study on what type of options are available, what impacts this will have on the township, and also soliciting to see if we can continue the previous discussions of septage management for Tiny and for everybody in Ontario that has to deal with septic tanks – especially in rural areas," Leitch emphasized. Tiny staff had recommended in the report that their council send a formal request to Midland's council to request the three-month extension, stating that it was a time-sensitive matter due to the Midland's budget timeline. The request would also allow Tiny residents to continue at current rates until the fieldspreading season started.

Addressing council, Mayor Dave Evans said: "Midland has been very open to discussions and are very committed to helping us come up with a solution." He added, "I'm firmly in belief that it's a lot cheaper, first of all, than us building our own facility as we've seen in other municipalities; Tay being one of them."

His underlying motive, he stated, was if Tiny were to invest in the Midland wastewater treatment centre, then they would want to take an ownership position, use it as a revenue source, and manage it themselves, "and Midland is open to that." Council approved the recommendation for a threemonth extension to be asked of Midland council. The Midland wastewater treatment centre report for receiving septage can be viewed on the agenda page on the Township of Tiny website.

<u>Garden in Winter</u>

Right in the middle of February, the outside world can look pretty boring. No little shoots are coming up in the window box, so our spirits may tend to match winter's bleakness. One activity sure to give us a boost is to bring on the colours of spring by starting a garden. Now is the perfect time to start planting seeds indoors for a spring garden that will turn into summer's delight.

Are flowers your passion? If so, colours and varieties do matter, but you'll also need to think about what part of the season you'll want them to be at their best. If you want to grow vegetables, it's important to make sure you'll have enough time to care for them once they're in the soil and know when you'll want them to ripen. Many varieties of tomatoes and potatoes, for example, are ready to pick much earlier or later than others.

After a bit of thought about the "what," a quick trip to the local hardware store or a call to a garden supply expert may help with the "how." Vendors in our community can help give you a picture of which plants grow well locally. They'll also offer advice on growing systems, from simple trays with seeds and soil to huge systems aimed at starting plants to fill a large vegetable garden in spring.

If you'll be inside quite a lot and don't have outdoor space for a garden, maybe you'd like to grow some microgreens for the kitchen table. Microgreens are vegetable greens that are harvested just after the first set of true leaves has developed, when they are between one and three inches tall. They are known to be highly nutritious and can add sweetness or spiciness to foods, or offer colourful garnishes to soups, sandwiches and salads.

Township of Tiny's Community Garden is located at the south-east corner of Perkinsfield Park, 43 County Road 93. If you plant your seeds now, you should know whether you'll want to apply for space in the Community Garden by the time applications open at the end of March. The garden offers 28 four by eight-foot plots that community members can rent, at minimal cost, May to October, to plant and care for vegetables, flowers and herbs. If you'd like to participate, but don't have the time to look after a garden yourself, there are opportunities to help out as a volunteer, or to make donations of tools, seeds and seedlings. Local Mayors Get 'Fairly Non-committal' Response to Aggregate Concerns

Feb. 9, 2024 - Tiny Mayor David Evans says north Simcoe municipalities have no plans to abandon their hopes for better water protection when it comes to aggregates.

"I know this is an ongoing issue, the control of aggregate extraction and the impact that it has on our water in North Simcoe," said Tiny Mayor Dave Evans at a recent committee of the whole meeting.

He spoke in response to a late-January return correspondence to the five municipalities from Natural Resources and Forestry Minister Graydon Smith, who assured the group that their comments were being considered regarding the Environmental Registry of Ontario post, adding that ministry staff will continue to review received feedback.

Evans urged interested residents to look at the ministry response included in the meeting agenda.

"The letter itself, you'll see, is fairly non-committal at best," he noted.

"We are still following (and) monitoring this issue," Evans reinforced. "We meet four times a year and it's always on our agenda, so it's something that we'll continue to push, and make sure that (we will) minimize any impacts that it may have on our water moving forward."

Prior to a mid-year deadline for comments on the changes to the Aggregate Resources Act, the mayors of Tiny, Tay and Springwater townships along with Midland and Penetanguishene submitted a letter explaining their five concerns toward proposed policy amendments.

In the letter, the joint mayors wrote: "We believe that the expansion of self-filing activities and the new policy on amendments to existing aggregate approvals may have significant implications for various aspects that we hold dear."

concerns included hydro-geological Those protections and management of the local "exceptional groundwater resources", the impact of increased truck traffic and that toll on infrastructure, noise issues, monitoring and enforcement of site operations, and impacts to natural heritage features and ecology.

In August, Tiny council directed staff to prepare a report for a future meeting which explored the implications of the legislative changes regarding changing of approvals under the Aggregate Resources Act and supporting policy.



Town of Midland News Midland Council Approves 2024 Budget

(February 6, 2024, Midland ON) On Thursday, February 1, 2024, Midland Council approved the Town's 2024 Operating and Capital Budgets with some amendments after three full days of review with Town administration, and agencies, boards, and commissions.

"Over three days last week Council undertook a thorough review and reduction of the proposed 2024 Budget to offer some much-needed financial relief to our taxpayers," said Town of Midland Mayor Bill Gordon. "After a line-by-line review of the proposed capital budget and service increases, we asked staff to identify any discretionary projects that could be delayed or deferred without significantly impacting the services and programs that our residents depend on. I congratulate staff and Council for their diligent work to get us to this point."

The approved 2024 Budget will result in a 4.6% levy increase, or a 3.99% blended rate, and includes:

- Estimated County and Education rates.
- 0.8% increase to the sustainable capital levy.
- 5% increase in Water Rate equaling a \$1.80 increase per month for a typical user.
- 4% increase in Wastewater Rate equaling a \$1.60 increase per month for a typical user.

The 2024 blended rate equates to a \$5.28 increase per month per \$100,000 of property assessment to support municipal, County and school board services.

The 2024 budget includes critical capital investment in infrastructure including wastewater treatment, road and storm sewer improvements, streetlighting, sidewalk rehabilitation, a new pedestrian crossing, and Harbour improvements.

Other projects highlighted in the Town's approved 2024 Budget include:

- Hiring of four new Firefighter positions.
- · Purchase of two new Fire Services Pumper Trucks.

• Feasibility Study for a Joint Fire Service with Penetanguishene.

• Weekend Transit Service to Balm Beach (pilot project for Summer 2024).

• New Accessible Transit van.

• Underground infrastructure to prepare for the realignment of Vindin and Harbourview.

• Numerous park improvements including the Little Lake Park Rotary Stage roof addition.

• Dock replacement and non-resident permit fee for boat launch at Pete Pettersen Park.

 Other studies including Waterfront Master Plan and Housing Needs Assessment.

· Continued support to various community organizations and events including the 2024 Community Grant Program.

Springwater Councillors Bite Back After Exclusion From ROMA dinner Dinner snub drives wedge between township politicians; councillor asks mayor to end 'high school nonsense'

Things got a little heated around the Springwater council table Wednesday night when talked turned to dinner plans ... or lack thereof.

During the municipal notes portion of township's bi-weekly council meetings, every councillor normally takes a few minutes to tout their ward's gold-star efforts — maybe an upcoming public event organized by a local service club, or a successful venture by a local resident.

Last night's session started as expected.

Coun. Matt Garwood kicked things off by giving a shout-out to Elmvale curler Tye McCutcheon, who is part of an under-18 curling team competing in the national championship in Ottawa.

He followed that up with information about the Saginaw Spirit practising in Elmvale on Wednesday, Feb. 14. Garwood wrapped up by announcing a St. Patrick's Day dance will be held on March 16 at the Elmvale Community Hall.

When he finished, you could feel a change in the air.

Coun. Anita Moore began to recount her experience at the Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) conference, which was held Jan. 21-23 in Toronto.

She said she received a call on the Monday evening (Jan. 22) of the conference from a councillor from a neighbouring township who wanted to know why she didn't attend a specific sponsored dinner. Moore said she knew nothing about it.

While she didn't name the sponsor, Moore said they represent "one of the largest and longeststanding service partner relationships we have in this township."

"So, that was strange," she said.

Moore made some calls and discovered the invitation - which was extended to all of council, she said went through the mayor, who was requested to call back with the numbers of who would be attending.

"She (the mayor) returned the call to say three would be in attendance, inferring that all seven had been invited, but only three would be attending," Moore said.

According to Moore, she ran into the sponsor at some point after the dinner was held and the sponsor wondered why she and other members of council Deputy Mayor George Cabral as well as Councillors Danielle Alexander and Phil Fisher — were not at the dinner. She said she told the sponsor she wasn't invited and didn't know anything about it.

Moore said the interaction was "a very awkward moment for both of us."

She called it embarrassing for everyone and then questioned the mayor's integrity.

"It begs the question, what other information has deliberately been kept from council," she asked the mayor directly. "The withholding of information affects trust and relationships and can relationships.

"The act of keeping secrets raises questions about honesty, transparency and the potential harm caused by withholding the truth not just for council members, but for the township's accountability and public image," Moore added.

The councillor finished with a three-point question to the mayor.

"First, should I bring a motion forward that says the mayor be directed to disseminate all information as requested to do so, to all members of council, by anyone that so requests?" she asked.

"Seems like a no-brainer," said Moore, answering her own question.

"Number two, no council members will attend said conferences or sponsored events in the future. And number three, that the mayor commits to ending this high school nonsense now."

Mayor Jennifer Coughlin, obviously caught off guard by Moore's comments, responded directly.

"I spent the conference learning and networking with stakeholders and politicians from across the county and the province," Coughlin said. "I was invited into conversations, to many meals, hospitality suites and many delegations with provincial ministers as deputy warden of the county, vice chair of TAPMO (Top Aggregate Producing Municipalities of Ontario) and only one delegation with the minister as the mayor of Springwater Township, to which you were invited and declined to attend."

Coughlin said that over the past 16 months, since the current council was elected, she has extended many invitations and sent many emails to members of council.

She said she's received no response to most of them. "As mayor, I will continue to use my discretion and, just as I have ended every email to you, please feel free to reach out to me with any concerns or questions," Coughlin said.

"And now, I would prefer to get back to relative municipal business," she added.

Coughlin also expressed a desire to stop "the high school nonsense."

But Moore wouldn't let it go.

"You didn't answer my question," she said. "Why would you do that?"

Coughlin replied: "I believe that when I did show up the Wednesday before that (ROMA) I was very clear why. I do believe there is a division amongst this council and I think that division is not created by one person — the division is the responsibility of seven people at this table.

"There have been numerous opportunities for council to become involved and engaged and those opportunities were not taken," Coughlin added. "So no, I did not extend the invitation."

Coun. Phil Fisher picked up where Moore left off. "I'm concerned over the non-transparent and divisive pattern of behaviour on the part of our mayor

and other members of council," he said. "I've often felt that as chair, our mayor has favoured certain members of council."

Fisher noted that he and Coun. Alexander were not invited to tour schools in their wards, but Coun. Garwood was invited to tour one in his ward.

Fisher said he dismissed these incidents in the past, but felt the need to speak up about not being invited to dinner.

"The decision to exclude and hide an invitation from council members that was extended to us from a major firm that Springwater uses as a consultant on a regular basis shows incredibly poor judgment in my eyes," he said.

"This could have caused irreparable damage to the relationship the municipality and councillors have with this particular firm," Fisher added. "This particular firm may have felt members of council from Springwater were apathetic toward the valuable work they do for us."

Coughlin responded directly to Fisher.

"The invitations to the school were given to me by Trustee (Liz) Grummett and I was not asked to invite anyone else," Couglin said. "The invitation to Coun. Garwood did not go through me. That was an assumption on your part."

Garwood, now brought in off the sidelines when his name was mentioned by Fisher, tried to maintain his composure.

"The invite that I attended a school visit in Elmvale came from a teacher at that school that is a resident in the ward that I was elected," Garwood said. "That same invite was returned this year and I'm going there next month.

"Again, if you'd like, I can send you an email and let you know," he said directly to Fisher.

Deputy Mayor George Cabral said he was "a little bit miffed" about not knowing about the dinner, but it wasn't the first time it's happened, he said.

"I can't recall being invited or apprised of a dinner at ROMA last year," Cabral said. "I'm disappointed because it seems like there might be a pattern here."

Cabral also agreed that there may be a sense of favouritism on council.

"I'd have to say, from looking outside in, certain members of council got a room on Saturday night without asking for it yet other members who registered didn't get a room Saturday night," he said. "I'm disappointed and disillusioned."

Coun. Alexander said she was also disappointed.

"I feel by not extending the invite and deliberately choosing whom the invite was going to go to, it showed a lack of leadership," Alexander said. "As mayor, you're supposed to act as a leader.

"I understand there's divisiveness sometimes, but actions like this just make that divisiveness worse and it does not move us forward in a productive manner," the councillor added.

Springwater Township council will meet again on Feb. 24 at 6:30 p.m.

Pharmacists are now able to assess and prescribe for uncomplicated urinary tract infections (UTI) in women. Women are more likely to get urinary tract infections than men because they have a shorter urethra that's closer to the rectum. This allows bacteria easier access to a woman's urinary tract. Sexual intercourse increases the risk for UTIs because bacteria are spread upward into the bladder. Using diaphragms and spermicides can also increase the risk for UTIs. Women who are pregnant or have diabetes have higher rates of UTIs. In seniors, UTIs are often due to problems with incomplete bladder emptying or bowel incontinence.

Common UTI symptoms may include pain or burning during urination, frequent desire to urinate often, urgently and immediately, unusual discharge from the urethra, urine that looks cloudy or smells foul, pressure in the lower pelvis, fever with or without chills, bedwetting in a person who has normally been dry at night, nausea and vomiting. Some of these symptoms are considered red flags and require referral.

PURCHASE A HOUSE

The Canadian government created a new account type in 2023 for residents to save to purchase their first Home. First Home Savings Account FHSA, can be setup at most financial institution.

FHSA are the best way to save for a home as it combines the advantages of a RRSP; your contributions are tax deductible and the advantages of a TFSA redemptions to purchase or build a house are not taxed.

FHSA basics

- Annual contribution limit: \$8,000
- Lifetime contribution limit: \$40,000
- Maximum participation period: 15 years (or to age 71)
- Tax payable on qualifying withdrawals: \$0

Do you qualify for the FHSA?

Yes, if you:

- Are a Canadian resident and you have a social insurance number?
- Are of legal age in your province of residenceAre under age 71
- Have not lived in a qualifying home in Canada that you or your spouse owned at any time in the year that the FHSA account was opened or at any time in the preceding four years.

An advisor can help you find the strategy that works best for you.

Transfers from a RRSP to a FHSA are allowed. It is important to complete a direct transfer, not withdraw the funds and reinvest in a FHSA. Direct transfer will make sure there is no tax to report on the withdrawal of funds from your RRSP.

If you decide to not use the funds in your FHSA to purchase or build a home, you can transfer the funds to a RRSP without having to pay taxes.

A FHSA allows you to contribute up to \$40,000 and can be combined with a Home Buyers Plan which allows you to use up to \$35,000 from your RRSP to purchase or build a home.

If you plan on starting a savings program to purchase a home, you should be talking to an advisor about opening a First Time Home Savings Account.

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Ontario Protecting People from the High Costs of a Provincial Carbon Tax

Province ensuring people have a say while continuing calls to scrap the federal carbon tax By Premier's Office

Feb. 13, 2024 - MISSISSAUGA — The Ontario government is keeping costs down for people by introducing legislation that, if passed, would give Ontario voters a direct say over a new provincial carbon tax, cap-and-trade system or other carbon pricing program. This proposed legislation would protect people and businesses from the high cost of a provincial carbon tax by requiring the government to first obtain the consent of Ontario voters through a referendum before implementing a new provincial carbon pricing program.

"With the Bank of Canada's high interest rates and the cost of living still so high, it's never been more important to keep costs down for people and businesses," said Premier Doug Ford. "I've always said, the carbon tax is the worst tax. It increases the cost of everything. We need to protect Ontario workers and families from the high cost of a carbon tax and we urge the federal government to do the same."

The Ontario government continues to urge the federal government to apply the same carve out on home heating that was provided to Atlantic Canadian provinces or to eliminate the federal carbon tax entirely.

"We made a promise to fight the federal carbon tax and our government will continue to lead by example, giving Ontarians certainty that carbon pricing on the backs of taxpayers is not the way forward," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "Any new provincial carbon tax is unacceptable for Ontario residents who are seeing their hard-earned dollars stretched further than ever."

This measure is part of upcoming legislation that will kick off the spring sitting of the legislature on February 20, 2024. The Get It Done Act will include a host of measures that, if passed, would build on the government's commitments to date to streamline approvals for major infrastructure projects and housing, keep costs down for people and businesses and support economic growth for longterm prosperity.

Springwater Mayor and Councillors Focus on Long Term Care Issues





After eight years of this Liberal government, many people will wake up, and one of the first things they'll do is look out of the window. Not to check the weather, but to check if their car is still sitting in their driveway.

Car thefts are up 34 per cent across Canada. A vehicle is stolen every six minutes in Canada, at an estimated cost of one billion dollars a year.

This is having real consequences on the finances of Canadians – Insurance companies have raised rates across the board, especially for cars that are most often stolen sometimes by 25 to 50 per cent over the last two years.

Unfortunately, after eight years in power this government has not done a single thing to crack down on car theft in Canada. In fact, they've made life easier for the criminals who steal cars from hardworking Canadians and the overseas organized crime syndicates that profit from their actions by ensuring that they face zero repercussions for their actions.

This is happening because the Liberal government's dangerous catch-and-release policies have led to increased crime in our communities. Bill C-75 allows repeat offenders to be released on bail within hours of arrest, who then often go and promptly re-offend. Police are powerless to stop career car thieves. After offenders have been convicted, Trudeau's Bill C-5 allows house arrest for these criminals, even those with a long rap sheet. This means that they can just walk out their front door, and be on the streets again immediately, stealing cars and terrorizing our neighbourhoods.

A Conservative government will go after the real criminals by restoring jail, not bail, increasing mandatory jail time and ending house arrest for car thieves, while also increasing sentences for gangassociated car thieves. We will:

• Increase the mandatory prison time from six months to three years for a third offence of motor vehicle theft.

• Remove eligibility for house arrest if convicted of motor vehicle theft by way of indictment.

• Create a new, specific aggravating factor where the offence of motor vehicle theft is committed for the benefit of organized crime.

• Repeal catch-and-release rules in Trudeau's Bill C-75 to ensure that repeat offenders get jail, not bail.





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Annie's Journal by Annie Warner Donnelly

A tractor arrived today. It's plowing the field where just last week men, with large machetelike knives, were cutting maize stalks off at ground level. This was step one in harvesting this year's first crop. It wasn't an easy step because other plants had grown

together with the maize. The tractor is plowing everything under now.

Helena Gambarage, known in her culture as Mama Robert (so named in recognition of her first bornchild, a son named Robert) is the matriarch of the family on whose property I live. She is 72 years old as she takes part in the current harvest.

As the men cut down stalk after stalk, they threw them into piles scattered across the field. You get a sense of this in the picture of Mama Robert in the middle of such a pile. Just behind her are the ears of maize she broke off the stalks and husked; she carried them back to her home.



Some stalks were burned in the field. The fires were carefully tended; there isn't a fire department here.

Some stalks were thrown into the centre gully the rains have created in the road that borders this property. I watched the first cows who discovered this banquet race each other into its midst.

In the second picture you will see the results of a machine that arrived on the back of a motorcycle. It's amazing what folks carry on the back of motorcycles here!

The maize ears were placed in the machine's hopper which quickly spit the cobs out in one direction and the kernels out in another. Once the kernels are dried, they will be milled into flour. The flour will be used to make a delicious porridge called uji (oo-gee). A more solid version, similar to polenta, is called ugali (oo-gal-ee). Ugali is considered Tanzania's national dish. I eat it often here!

The rain came not long after the second picture was taken. Mama Robert, attuned to the changes in weather here, had all the kernels safely stored until the next sunny day when they will be spread out to dry.

The way Mama Robert lives her life is an inspiration to me. She is the first one up in the morning often while it is still dark. One morning I was up that early too and through the crack between my door and its frame, I could see a fire in the yard. Mama Robert was burning the crowd of ants who were determined to gain entry to my home. How she knew that was happening in the dark is a mystery to me!

We still struggle to communicate with words, but we absolutely speak the universal language of love – that's the third picture. Her husband died in 2021 and all the love she shared with him she now shares with others. I'm grateful she shares her love with me. God is love. Let's remember that His love can change the world if only we will let it. Amen.

HEALTHY DATE SQUARES - A RETRO SWEET THAT PACKS A NUTRITIONAL PUNCH Feb. 11, 2024 - Date squares have been a Canadian favourite

have been a Canadian favourite since the 1920s for good reason. Delicious as a dessert or a snack, date squares get most of their

sweetness from the Medjool dates and not from added sugar. A perfect treat when feeling that afternoon slump or after a vigorous workout, these homemade date squares are easy to prepare and far less expensive than store-bought granola and energy bars. They even freeze well, so double or triple the recipe to have a handy supply for weeks to come.




Ingredients:

Base Layer & Topping

- 1 cup (250 ml) pecans, walnuts or almonds
- 1 cup (250 ml) unsweetened, shredded coconut
- 1 ½ cup (375 ml) oats
- 1 teaspoon (5 ml) baking soda
- 1/3 cup (83 ml) coconut oil or melted butter
- 1/3 cup (83 ml) of soaked dates, chopped
- ¹/₂ teaspoon (2.5 ml) cinnamon
- ¹/₄ teaspoon (1.25 ml) nutmeg
- ¹/₂ teaspoon (2.5 ml) salt



Feb.3, 2024 - I was curious about a trail near the Big Chute marine railway station. At this time of the year the tourist area is closed but the huge metal carriage system is easily visible. As is the massive volume of water flowing through the chutes down into the lake.



Middle Layer

- 2 cups (500 ml) soaked dates
- ¹/₄ cup (63 ml) water from the soaked dates
- 1 teaspoon (5 ml) vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) cocoa powder, optional

• 1 tablespoon (15 ml) instant coffee granules, optional

- 1 ½ teaspoon (7.5 ml) lemon or lime juice
- 1/3 teaspoon (1.7 ml) salt

Instructions:

1. Soak 2 1/3 cups (583 ml) of pitted dates in boiled water for 20-30 minutes. Drain and reserve the date water.

2. Preheat the oven to 350 F (177 C). Grease or spray with cooking spray a 9 x 9 inch (23 x 23 cm) square pan.

3. To prepare the Base Layer & Topping, crush the nuts in a food processer or with a clean mallet or hammer. In the food processor or a medium size bowl combine the nuts with the coconut, oats, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, salt, coconut oil or melted butter and 1/3 cup (83 ml) soaked dates. Pulse several times in the food processor until a crumbly dough is formed. Alternatively, use your hands in the mixing bowl and knead to create a crumbly dough.

4. Divide the crumbly dough by measuring 1 cup (250 ml) into a separate bowl to be used for the topping. The remainder of the dough can be used for the base by pressing an even layer with your hands onto the bottom of the square pan. Put the square pan in the fridge for 5-10 minutes to harden this base layer.

5. To prepare the Middle Layer, put the remaining 2 cups (500 ml) of dates and the date water, vanilla extract, cocoa powder, coffee granules, lemon or lime juice and salt in the food processor and pulse several times until a paste is formed. If you do not have a food processor, use your hands to make a paste with

months. Today there are no boats, and the walkways are covered in ice and snow. I was never able to find the trail head and will have to come back in the summer to see if I can find the loop trail. Instead, I headed back to one of my favorite trails, the McCrae Lake trail off Crooked Bay Road and highway 400. It can be confusing to people new to this trail system. You would assume the trail starts near the signs regarding bear management. However, this route is a very short hike to the local inlet and what in summer is the canoe launch. Today there are parallel lines leading across the lake where a person has schussed across the thin ice. Not for me, as I have a terror of being on ice and falling through. Instead, I headed up the main trail, which starts in the west end of the parking area. The trail is an upland hike, full of mud and ice, but easily managed with my poles and boots. At the top of the climb the trail then dips down into a small gorge and back up again. Thank God for my poles, as the trail is icy and slippery, and those poles provide support from an unexpected face plant.

This is a real outback trail and needs to be treated as such. There is an app called Three Words, which is vital for anyone who uses these back country trails, just in case things go wrong. The trail is easy enough to follow, with bright red blazes. It travels up and down and around the Canadian Shield, with areas where you will have to clamber up the pink quartz rock. Eventually the trail leads out to the Eagles Nest, which is a high cliff overlooking the lake. The view is stunning, and here is where most people make camp for the night. However, for the more adventurous, the trail less used heads farther north, through scrub and areas with little trail markers, and towards the waterfall. This is a difficult trail in the all of the ingredients for the middle layer. If the paste is too thick, add a little more of the date water until the consistency is sticky, but not runny.


6. Take the pan out of the fridge. Spread the middle layer on top of the base layer. Then, sprinkle the remaining crumbly dough on top of the middle layer.7. Bake in the oven for 25-30 minutes until golden brown. Cool completely before slicing into squares. Enjoy!

DID YOU KNOW?

Despite the natural sugar in dates, they have a relatively low glycemic index due to their fibre content. This means that dates are digested more slowly, leading to a gradual rise in blood sugar as opposed to a fast spike that a glass of juice would cause. Dates are a good source of potassium, iron and magnesium. So very nutritious, they also contain several B vitamins and a high concentration of the antioxidants called polyphenols.




warm summer months; at this time of the year the trail is difficult to find and is icy and challenging. I only made it a mere 5 km round trip before deciding to head back to my car.

Feb. 11, 2024 - We remember the bad times, the bad news, and

the bad people who have affected our lives by what they have done. Every day, television and newspapers scream out tragedies, horrific devastation, and suffering. Our minds are automatically drawn to such events.

But what about the good times, the good news, and the good people who have affected our lives and the lives of others by their good deeds and actions — the unsung heroes whom we don't hear about — people who changed the world for good?

Let us think, for example, about the fire fighters, the search and rescue personnel, and the police, the heroic men and women who risk and sometimes sacrifice their lives, so that we can live in safety and peace.

After the United States Congress passed the Fugitive Slave Act in 1850, making it illegal to assist black slaves escaping to their freedom, a secret network of black and white abolitionists helped African-Americans escape from enslavement in the American south to free northern states or to Canada. Hundreds of people risked their lives and made tremendous sacrifices as genuine heroes of what became known as the Underground Railroad, the largest anti-slavery freedom movement in North America, which brought between 30,000 and 40,000 fugitives to freedom.

The four-day Battle of Vimy Ridge in the First World War helped to define Canada as an independent country, rather than a British colony. The 97,184 brave soldiers of all four divisions of the Canadian Corps, which fought together for the first time, suffered 10,602 casualties — 3,598 killed and 7,004 wounded — but their heroic sacrifice marked a significant Allied advance in the war, hastening its end.

There are many other people who have sacrificed themselves in order to bring about much-needed changes in this world. Their sacrifices, though, are nothing compared to the greatest sacrifice of all time: God the Father sacrificed His Son Jesus to suffer and die on the cross for the sins of the whole world.

For all of us.

For you and me.

To receive the forgiveness that He died to purchase for us, all we have to do is to believe. "But my faith isn't strong enough," you say. The Bible says:

Romans 10:9-10 – If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved. (NIV 2011)

Let's make sure that the praises of our risen Hero are sung tomorrow!

Prayer: Lord God, thank You for moving within the hearts of unsung heroes. Continue to move within each and every one of us so that we may give compassion to those who need compassion, bring peace to those who are in turmoil, render aid to those in need, and share the good news of forgiveness and eternal life that You offer as a free gift to all people.

Worrying What Others Think

Feb. 11, 2024 - Caring too much what others think of you is a common experience for many. It is natural, though not always healthy, to desire validation and approval from others. When this concern becomes excessive, it can negatively impact or wellbeing and hinder our personal growth.

Self-Help Strategies for Depression

Feb. 4, 2024 - Dealing with depression can be very challenging. It is important to seek professional help. A doctor or psychiatrist can prescribe medication and a registered psychologist can provide therapy. We know that medication and therapy can work better than either one alone.

Some do not want to take medication. Others have been on many different ones, with no substantial improvement. Yes, we have the doctor and the therapist. There is a third person who can make a tremendous difference. That is the depressed individual.

There are things they can do to manage the depressive symptoms. Engaging in physical activity can have a positive impact on mood. Even a brief walk or light stretching can help. Getting outside in the fresh air and sunshine is better than crawling into bed or focusing on how bad you feel.

It is important to maintain a healthy lifestyle. Eating a balanced diet, getting enough sleep, and avoiding alcohol or drug use can support your overall wellbeing. Practice mindfulness and relaxation techniques. Meditation, deep breathing, and progressive muscle relaxation can help reduce stress and improve your mood.

Build a support system. Connecting with friends, family or support groups can be a source of encouragement and understanding. Challenge negative thoughts. Often it is one's own pattern of negative thinking that contributes to depression.

Educate yourself. Learning about depression and understanding its mechanisms can help you feel more in control and less alone in your struggle. There is a wealth of information on the internet.

Set goals for the suggestions above. Follow through, even if you do not feel like it. If your car will not run and you want to use it, if you do not do the maintenance, it will never run. Think of your body/mind this way. If you do nothing, nothing will improve.

Yes, I know it can be hard to make the effort. I think of depression like hypothermia. You walk through the snow and become exhausted. You just want a rest from all the struggle and would like to just lie down in the snow and sleep. You cannot do this, hoping someone will come along and rescue you. You must keep going.

Self-help strategies are beneficial, but it is crucial to seek the guidance of a mental health professional. Therapy and medication, if necessary, can be important components of treatment. Even if you do both, it is still important to utilize the self-help strategies. If the doctor, the therapist, and you do all you can, there is a better chance of success.

Be patient with yourself while navigating this challenging time. You do not have to go through this alone, and seeking help is a sign of strength. If you are feeling very overwhelmed, please do not hesitate to reach out to a mental health professional for support. We genuinely care.

Keep Sexy Safe This Valentine's Day

Feb. 12, 2024 - SIMCOE MUSKOKA – Feeling in the mood this Valentine's Day? Sex is a normal and healthy part of our lives and the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit is reminding the public that when they choose to have sex, it's important to be prepared and aware of the possible infections you may encounter.

STIs are infectious diseases that spread from one person to another through any type of sexual contact. Anyone can get a STI as these infections don't discriminate on number of sexual partners, age, ethnicity, gender or sexual orientation. However, STIs are preventable and you can protect yourself by talking about safer sex practices with every sexual partner so that you can protect one another. Ensuring that you are up to date with vaccinations against hepatitis B and human papillomavirus (HPV), and by using condoms and/or oral dams when being sexually active.

Many STIs including syphilis, HIV, chlamydia

and gonorrhea don't show any obvious signs or symptoms in the early stages, so it's important to take precautions and get tested regularly to protect yourself and your partner. Early detection of an STI can help reduce or avoid health complications and can help to reduce the spread of STIs to others.

Using substances, including alcohol, cannabis and opioids, can increase your risk of contracting STIs, as substance use can impair your judgment and lead to risky sexual behaviour, including unprotected sex and multiple partners.

Free condoms are available at each health unit office. Individuals can access these discretely between 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. from Monday to Friday, excluding holidays. Road Closure for Collision Investigation in Tiny Township

One Male Deceased Following Collision

(TINY TOWNSHIP, ON) On February 6, 2024 at about 3:30 a.m., members of the Sothern Georgian Bay detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police(OPP) received a call from a passing motorist regarding a vehicle in the ditch on Concession Road 9 West, west of Simcoe Road 6 in Tiny Township. OPP Make Arrest in Sunday Morning Mischief Rampage

(Feb. 5., 2024 - MIDLAND, ON)- Scott Barry SYLVESTER 36 years of no fixed address Midland, was arrested on February 4, 2024 shortly after 7:00 a.m. by members of the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment in relation to a series of reported mischief related events in the Manly Street and Galloway Boulevard area of Midland.

Officers responded after the OPP Communication Center received calls from community remembers reporting that an individual on foot was throwing wooden objects and rocks at homes and vehicles in the Manly Street and Galloway Boulevard area.

Youth in Custody Facing Aggravated Assault Charge in Midland

(Feb. 4, 2024 - MIDLAND, ON) A youth is in custody after an early morning incident which resulted in a victim being transported to a Torontoarea hospital.

Just after 2:00 a.m. on February 4, 2024, members of the Southern Georgian Bay detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police(OPP) attended a residence on Marshall Road in the Town of Midland after receiving a panicked 911 call. On arrival, officers entered the residence and located a 49-year-old male who was suffering from significant wounds. The victim was treated at the scene by Simcoe County Paramedics and members of the Midland Fire Service. He was transported to a local hospital and was then taken to a Toronto-area hospital for treatment of serious, but non-life threatening injuries, believed to be caused by an edged weapon.

Officers arrested a youth at the residence and there is no danger to the safety of the public. The youth, who will not be named due to provisions of the Youth Criminal Justice Act, was held for a bail hearing before the Ontario Court of Justice for the Criminal Code offence of Aggravated Assault.

OPP Investigation Removes Fentanyl from North Simcoe Communities

Two Non-Residents Charged

(Feb. 1, 2024 - MIDLAND, ON) - As a result of an ongoing police investigation, members of the OPP Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) from Southern Georgian Bay and Orillia Detachments of the Ontario Provincial Police removed a quantity of suspected fentanyl from North Simcoe communities after arresting two individuals at approximately 1:30 p.m. January 31, 2024.

Officers conducted a traffic stop on Highway 93 in Springwater Township resulting in the seizure and the arrest of the two occupants of the vehicle.

The driver of the vehicle, Jahiem BILLY, 22 years of North York as a result of this investigation is charged with the following offences contrary to the Controlled Drug and Substances Act.

Possession of a Schedule I substance for the

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purpose of Trafficking-Opioid (other than heroin)

Trafficking in Schedule I substance - Opioid (other than heroin)

The accused was released from custody to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice on March 7, 2024.

The passenger in the vehicle, Sherquan REMY, 20 years of Toronto has been charged with the following offences contrary to the Controlled Drug and Substances Act.

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
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Joe was born in Guelph ON. September 19th, 1947, to the late Joseph and Gertrude (Graysley) Woods.
