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Solar Year is 365.2425 Days Long

Feb. 27, 2024 - February 29, also known as Leap Day, is a date that occurs only during leap years, which happen roughly every four years. This additional day is added to the calendar in order to synchronize it with the solar year, which is approximately 365.2425 days long. Without this adjustment, the calendar would slowly drift out of sync with the seasons over time.

Here are some historical facts and interesting tidbits about February 29:

The concept of leap years and Leap Day dates back to ancient civilizations. The Egyptians, Romans, and Greeks all had methods of adjusting their calendars to account for the discrepancy between the lunar and solar years.

The Roman general Julius Caesar introduced the Julian calendar in 46 BCE, which included the addition of an extra day to February every four years.

100 but not by 400. This adjustment is to make the calendar more accurate, compensating for the fact that the solar year is slightly less than 365.25 days.

People born on February 29 are often called "leaplings" or "leapers." Since their birthday only occurs every four years, they usually celebrate on February 28 or March 1 during non-leap years.

In some cultures, Leap Day has been associated with various customs and superstitions. For example, in Scotland, it was considered unlucky for someone to be born on Leap Day. In Greece, it's believed to be unlucky to get married during a leap year, particularly on Leap Day itself.

Leap Day has some unique implications in legal systems, particularly regarding contracts, leases, and other time-sensitive agreements. Some jurisdictions have specific provisions to address how leap years are handled in legal contexts.

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A TINY SENIOR MOMENT

Part of maintaining a healthy lifestyle is staying connected. Connected to friends, family and community. The winter months can be particularly challenging for this. Short days, unfavourable weather conditions and weather-related ailments make it easy to find reasons to stay inside and isolate. Other personal factors beyond the weather can also contribute to isolation.

Healthy aging studies prove that older adults who have close connections and relationships not only live longer but cope better with health conditions and experience less depression. Having a satisfactory social network can improve health and increase longevity.

Technology gives us a way to stay connected. During Covid, the online streaming services Zoom and FaceTime experienced unprecedented growth as people jumped on the free software tool to connect with others. Book clubs, card groups, family events and other social groups took advantage to continue their get-togethers in an online format.

Thankfully those days are behind us but the relevance of the technology remains.

That's why we're excited that Tiny's 'Coffee and Connect' program for Adults 55+ is returning this Spring. Since its introduction in the Fall of 2021, the program has had many participants attend the sixweek, two-hour workshop to learn useful applications of cellphones and iPads. The classroom-based environment is relaxed, welcoming and inclusive.



A small team of expert and very patient instructors teach participants how to safely and effectively use functions on their devices that can assist and enhance everyday living. The instruction is interactive; while learning technology, the students are encouraged to provide feedback, ask questions and assist each other.

A wide variety of applications are taught throughout the six-week program. Topics range from the basics of turning on the device and using simple functions, to learning about internet browsing, email, e-shopping, anti-fraud tactics, social media, photo management, useful apps and much more. Each week's class has a basic framework for instruction and students are provided with handout notes. The lessons are very fluid with instructors responsive to participants' individual requirements and questions. All levels of experience are welcome – beginners and non-beginners alike. All that's needed is a good attitude and desire to learn. iPads are available on loan where required.

Participant feedback on the program has been very positive. A woman who attended the program three different times found it extremely useful for her and her husband. She commented that the learning environment was "great...the room is large and bright and the visual aids very helpful...the instructors went at our speed." She also added that the information they learned "gave them the confidence to use their phones more on their own...I think that everyone should take the program."

The first six-week session begins Tuesday April 9 from 9:30-11:30am.

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Warden Statement on the 2026 Provincial Recycling Change

Midhurst/February 27, 2024 - As we've been sharing with our residents over the past year, the Provincial Government has moved to make producers of recyclable products (paper products and plastic packaging) fully responsible for the costs associated with the lifecycle of recyclable products (collection, hauling, processing and marketing).

The County will continue to collect garbage and organics long-term, and run landfill programs, although fees will be required for recycling drop-off at our sites as of 2026.

I speak for County Council and our staff, when we share that this is a great thing. If producers bear the full costs, it will hopefully lead to a reduction in the amount of packaging, plastics, and cardboard that we encounter each day.

For this we commend the Provincial Government for their actions. However, as a County Council, we have seen gaps in the program that will potentially leave many of our small local businesses, non-profit organizations and those that we refer to as the Industrial, Commercial and Institutional (IC&I) sector, without convenient recycling options as of January 1, 2026.

Currently, and until January 1, 2026, the County collects curbside recycling from these business, non-profit or IC&I locations, such as family-owned businesses in our downtown cores. Through the legislation, we are not regulated nor mandated to collect any form of waste from the business sector, just residential units. However, this is a "valueadded" service that Council felt was important for our communities and to support local small businesses and downtown cores.

As of January 1, 2026, the consortium representing recycling producers are not planning to collect recycling from business locations as this is not a requirement stipulated through the Provincial Blue Box Regulation 391/21.

County Council believes this will not only impact businesses but could potentially have a negative impact on diversion and ultimately the environment.

We have evaluated initial costs to continue to provide the service at the County level; however, under the new regulations, the burden of the costs on our local taxpayers would be too significant, among other logistical challenges once the new program takes effect.

While it is important to emphasize that there is no impact until 2026, we continue to work with our partners at the Ontario Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks to ensure they are aware of this potential issue, and we are hopeful they will reconsider this decision and continue to provide our businesses with recycling collection long-term.

We will do what we can to support our businesses and will be connecting with BIAs, Chambers and other business organizations over the coming weeks. More details are available at www.simcoe. ca/2026recvclingchange.







Ontario Building New School in Oro-Medonte

Submitted by the Office of MPP Doug Downey Province's investment in innovative and modern learning spaces will ensure students have high quality education in a safe and healthy environment Feb. 23, 22024 - As part of the province's ongoing efforts to build and improve local schools, the Ontario government has provided the Simcoe County District School Board (SCDSB) with approval to award the tender for the new Oro-Medonte Elementary School and Community Centre. This is supported by an investment of nearly \$30 million, which includes \$8.5 million from the Township of Oro-Medonte for the community centre.

"For years, the people of Oro-Medonte have highlighted the need for a new school to serve the growing population of families moving to the area," said Doug Downey, MPP for Barrie—Springwater— Oro-Medonte. "This new school guarantees that children will receive high quality education right in their own community."

When the Oro-Medonte Elementary School and Community Centre was first announced in 2018, the school was originally approved for 357 students, with a Capital Priorities funding of \$8.5 million. Once completed, this project will deliver 570 spaces for elementary students, with up to \$23.8 million in Capital funding. This is an increase of 213 pupil spaces, and up to \$15.3 million in funding from the Ministry of Education. The Township of Oro-Medonte also increased their funding contribution from \$6.8 million to \$8.5 million.

Once completed, the Oro-Medonte Elementary School and Community Centre will include: a fullsize gymnasium with auditorium (shared space with SCDSB); a multi-purpose space (for the Township); and multi-purpose trails around the property.

Additionally, Ontario is taking action to ensure that school board capital assets are used effectively and efficiently to meet the needs of growing communities, support student learning and ensure value for taxpayer dollars. The Better Schools and Student Outcomes Act, 2023 empowers decisionmakers to build modern schools faster by better utilizing school capacity, reducing barriers for school boards to facilitate agreements for schools in multiuse buildings such as condo towers, and shortening planning time through design standardization when constructing, renovating, or making additions to schools.

"We are determined to build schools and expansions faster, part of our commitment to modernize schools in fast growing communities," said Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. "We are proud to deliver a new, state-of-the-art Oro-Medonte Elementary School and Community Centre for local families, along with increasing funding, staffing and a backto-basics focus on reading, writing and math skills to help ensure students graduate with confidence that they can succeed in good-paying careers."

"Your continued hard work and dedication toward this important initiative is very much appreciated. The Community Centre will provide a Township wide facility located within the geographic centre of Oro-Medonte, for all residents to enjoy. We look forward to the doors of this new community facility opening." The Oro-Medonte Elementary School and Community Centre will be located at 739 Horseshoe Valley Road.

Quick Facts:

• Since 2018, the Ontario government has invested over \$2.2 billion in capital projects in education, including 100 new schools, 88 additions and renovations to existing facilities and nearly 6,500 new licensed child care spaces.

• For the 2023-24 school year, the province is providing school boards with approximately \$1.4 billion in funding to revitalize and renew aged building systems and components.

In June, Ontario passed the Better Schools and Student Outcomes Act, 2023 that will ensure the public education system focuses on what matters most: teaching important life-long skills such as reading, writing and math; improving accountability and transparency for parents and families; maximizing capital assets of boards to support building modern schools faster and better utilizing current school capacity.
In March 2022, Ontario secured a six-year, \$13.2 billion agreement with the federal government that will lower child care fees for families to an average of \$10 a day for children under the age of six. Ontario aims to reach that target by September 2025.





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Life Insurance Estate Planning

Feb. 26, 2024 - Life insurance can be useful in planning your estate. There are no inheritance taxes in Canada, but when you die your estate executor must file a final tax return. Normally at this time, all accrued gains on assets like stocks and real estate, and the proceeds of all registered plans (RSPs, RRIFs, LIFs, and certain pensions) become taxable all at once. On large estates the result could be a tax bill close to half the total value of the estate.

Various strategies can be used to reduce the impact of this inevitable tax bill, including life insurance. For example, say you own a cottage and want to leave it to your children. Accrued gains on the property may give rise to such a large tax bill that they are forced to sell it. Tax-free life insurance proceeds could be used to cover the taxes instead, so your children can keep the cottage.

If you want to divide your estate equally between three children, but it consists of a \$200,000 house and a \$200,000 RRSP. Rather than selling the house to accommodate a three-way split, life insurance can be used to pay all taxes and provide another \$200,000 bequest. Business assets can also be preserved using life insurance

Death Trap Review

Feb. 27, 2024 - Huronia Players (HP) brings Deathtrap to its stage; a play that twists and turns and refers to itself in an unusual way. On opening night, the audience was both on the edge of their seats and blown back in their chairs with a couple surprises and an unpredictable ending.

Written and taking place in 1978. The play made it to the big screen in 1982 with such big names as Michael Cane, Christopher Reeves, and Dyan Cannon. Do yourself a favour and wait to watch the movie until after you've seen it live!

A murder/suspense playwright gets hold of the first draft of a younger, new writer's script and wants it for himself, and his wife is worried he'll do anything to get it.

The characters in the Huronia Players' take on the Ira Levin hit are Sidney Bruhl, a nearly washed up playwright looking for his next big hit after an 18year lull, played by Martin Buote who made his way to the Midland area from the GTA and its theatres. He had once, thirty years prior, played the secondary lead character Clifford Anderson, Sidney's apparent victim of envy, played by Rob Walker in his 8th role with "the Players".

Filling out the 5-person cast are Natalie Brunelle as Myra Bruhl, a devoted wife of 11 years and supporter of her husband but who's in somewhat poor health. Natalie has been involved with HP since 2018, and the theatre in general for much of her life; Kristine Mannion as Helga ten Dorp, a Dutch psychic who

not only nearly foils the plot but adds a few good laughs along the way.

Kristine made her directorial debut in HP's last season with Stag and Doe, a Canadian playwright's take on the Rom-Com format; And, last, but not least, Christoph Lorenz as Porter Milgrim, Sidney's accountant and friend who unwittingly sets the lead character on a downward spiral. Christoph has "tread the boards" of HP's theatre for the fifth time now.

The set was designed and built by husband and wife team Steven and Maggie Killing, who recently were honoured with Huronia Players' Lifetime award (20 consecutive years of service), along with several other committed volunteers. It was adorned by their son Jonathan Killing with several hand-made weapons that would fool even the most knowledgeable connoisseur.

The light and sound effects easily met the level of quality acting, design and directing; the latter of which was by relatively newcomer Stephen Bainborough. Stephen studied theatre in college the same year Deathtrap was written, and went on to teach drama at Bradford and District Secondary School – all the while honing his craft both on stage and in the director's chair. Most recently starring in The Old Man and The Old Moon, a mixed-media musical, Mr. Bainborough made his HP-directorial debut with Deathtrap. Tuna Noodle Casserole Done Healthy

Tuna noodle casserole is a classic dish from the 1950s that is still kicking around today. Like chilli and meatloaf, there are so

many different versions to be enjoyed and everyone has their favourite. Traditionally made with canned cream of mushroom soup, this take on the retro dish is healthier, but equally satisfying. Copy the recipe to a T or play around with the ingredients and create your own family favourite. Enjoy!

INGREDIENTS

• 12 ounces (336 grams) dried pasta or 6 cups (1500 ml) cooked pasta of choice

- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) olive oil
- 1 large white onion, diced

• 1 ½ -2 cups (375-500 ml) sliced mushrooms of choice

- 1 ½ teaspoon (7.5 ml) dried thyme
- 1 teaspoon (5 ml) garlic powder
- ¹/₄ cup (63 ml) white or whole wheat flour
- 2 cups (500 ml) chicken or vegetable broth
- 2 cups (500 ml) milk (dairy, almond, soy or oat)
- 2 cups (500 ml) frozen peas
- 3 or 4 cans (170 grams) tuna, drained
- 1 cup (250 ml) grated parmesan cheese, divided
- 1 cup (250 ml) shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 ½ cups (250 ml) panko or regular breadcrumbs
- ³/₄ cup (188 ml) sliced green olives, optional
- Salt and pepper to taste



INSTRUCTIONS

1. Preheat oven to 375 F (190 C). Spray a large casserole dish with non-stick cooking spray or grease with olive oil.

2. Cook the pasta, drain and set aside.

3. In a large frying pan, heat the oil on medium heat. Add the mushrooms, onions, thyme, and garlic powder. Sauté for 4-6 minutes until the mushrooms are tender and the onions are translucent.

4. Sprinkle the flour over the vegetables and continue to cook for 2-3 minutes.

5. Whisk in the broth and milk for 2-3 minutes until smooth and thickened.

6. Reduce the heat to low and add the peas, tuna, pasta, olives, cheddar cheese and half of the parmesan cheese, Stir gently, until combined and heated through.

7. Add salt and pepper to taste.

8. Pour the mixture into the prepared casserole dish.

Feb. 22, 2024 - I needed to enjoy the suns warmth today, as the forecast calls for some seriously cold weather this weekend. I headed out to a large network of trails, which covers multiple concessions near Orillia. The Stachen Forest tract off Bass Lake Road and

line seven boast a fantastic number of trails. I have been coming out here for over a decade and I have only trekked a small portion. The main parking area is a great starting point, as you can head into the main trial or cross the road and head into another concession.

The main route is packed down by hikers, snowshoers and fat bike riders. At this time of year there is one main trail to follow, an easy three km hike through mixed forest. The only sounds were the whisper of brown oak leaves tenaciously clinging to the bare limbs above my head. Underfoot, the soft white snow was only marred by the occasional pinecone, or dog poop. Sigh. This loop trail heads up and down many easy hills until it comes out onto the cleared area for the hydro lines. My lord, the bright sun makes me regret the hat and coat, as I am sweating and worrying about getting a sunburn. Once past this open area I am thrown back into the much cooler area of bare trees, and happy to have my coat, though I did ditch my hat and mitts into my pockets. Luckily today I avoided any wardrobe mishaps and neither exposed myself or risk exposure! The trail continues through the silent forest, and although I expected to meet people out on this beautiful day, I happily had the trail to myself. If you are feeling adventurous you can strike out on your own on through the soft snow that remains deep in the forest. There are several trails that head out deeper in the forest, which are marked by different



colors and can be quite lengthy depending on the route you take. There are also the tracks of at least one skier schussing off the beaten path. The path I am on takes a neat little route through the remains of an old abandoned building. All that remains is the cold concrete walls that rise to just above your head and cast deep shadows on the ground. The trail continues through gentle hills of beech and oak and bring you back to the parking area.



9. In a small bowl, combine the remaining parmesan cheese with the breadcrumbs.

10. Sprinkle the breadcrumb mixture on top of the casserole.

11. Bake for 30-40 minutes until the topping is golden brown and the casserole is bubbling.

Did You Know?

Canned tuna is versatile, easy on the wallet and it has a longer shelf life than its fresh or frozen counterparts. Tuna is a great source of protein and contains omega-3 fatty acids that are beneficial for heart health. Tuna is also a good source of vitamin D and calcium, B12 and selenium. While there is some concern regarding the mercury content in certain fish species, take note that the risk is small. To be on the safe side, Health Canada has recommended that we limit our intake of tuna, shark, swordfish, escolar, marlin and orange roughy to a maximum of 150 grams per week. Being aware of these recommendations and eating a variety of fish is great way to reap the health benefits without the concern of too much mercury.

This group of farmers grows crops and donates the money to the Canadian Food Grains Bank of Canada which helps to alleviate poverty around the world. The group this year included David Spring who planted the beans, Roger Spence who secured the seed from Pioneer, Dekalb and Syngenta and acquired and applied the crop protection from Bayer and Monsanto, fertilizer from Holmes Agro Langcrest farms who harvested and helped truck the beans to Addis Grain who trucked the beans as well as stored them for the group. A special thanks to the Kaptyen family for contributing crops to this project.

County of Simcoe Expands Open Data Portal

Midhurst/February 13, 2024 – The County of Simcoe has once again expanded its open data portal, easily accessed at open.simcoe.ca, allowing users to better understand the effectiveness of services and supports that are provided to newcomers in our region.

"We are incredibly thankful to the newcomers who have chosen to call Simcoe County 'home' over the years and this tool allows us to better support them when we make investments across the region," said Warden Basil Clarke. "The information gathered on this site enables us to make data-driven decisions and track the outcomes of the programs that we are building up in our communities. It allows us to ensure that the choices we make in Council not only benefit newcomers but help them thrive in Simcoe County."

This new tool builds up the social service offerings available on this site, which already includes homelessness and shelter data, a census tool,

expanding data available to residents, researchers, and decision-makers across the region.

This data helps to support evidence-based policy making at a county and local level and showcases our immigrant population and pathways, as well as local demographics, including education, training, and skills. It allows users to see how immigrants are helping our local labour market thrive and expand across the region. The tool also highlights longterm trends in the local labour market, immigrant incomes, immigrant mobility and migration trends. Longitudinal immigration data provides insights into the performance and local impacts of

immigration programs and supports actions in the 2023 Community Settlement Strategy.

County staff developed this tool, which emulates a dashboard created by the Community Data Program. The County's dashboard publishes Simcoe County specific data in a free, user-friendly format, enhancing the availability of this key information. The tool combines local information from the federal Council was elected to represent you and all residents of the township so this is an important chance to voice your questions and concerns.

Have you used our Springwater Library? Do you know that they offer numerous resources other than books? The library is looking for your input on how they move forward in the future and have a survey which they want you to participate in. Check it out on the Springwater Library website and get your thoughts known.

Those who live along Horseshoe Valley Road may have noticed that the gravel hauler trucks have reduced their numbers greatly. They at the present time don't seem to be travelling from the Edenvale airport to the other side of Orillia to pick up a load to go back to Toronto. It is interesting to see that in a one day blitz, Huronia West OPP laid over 100 charges against the drivers of these vehicles. According to the report, 93 commercial vehicle charges were laid along with 14 other traffic related violations. The report says "twelve drivers of truck tractors with semi-trailers hauling aggregate to the Edenvale airport faced charges for being overweight on tires, having defective tires, overweight axles, and expired plates." For several years residents along not only Horseshoe Valley Road but also George Johnston Road have endured the wrath of these vehicles as they disregarded speed limits through Anten Mills and Minesing. Unfortunately the company has a reported bad reputation and hopefully the OPP will continue their crackdown on these operators and traffic will be calmer along our roads.

On a final note, there was a report last week that this week we might get to see some Aurora Borealis or Northern Lights as there were some significant solar flares on the sun. This column is prepared several days in advance of the publication and nothing has occurred yet. If you have a chance to get out at night and it's clear, maybe you can get to see some exciting skies.

Feb. 25, 2024 - Recently, I travelled over 1,200 km to Bagamoyo, Tanzania. Why? Because of the opportunity to attend a month-long Christian Music Worship Programme at the highly acclaimed TaSUBa College of Arts.

We, (Pastor Emmanuel Kisagoro who volunteered to drive my fellow student, Rashid Rubango, and myself) left Mugeta at 4:30 a.m. one morning expecting to arrive in Bagamoyo late that same evening. Travelling on the 401, it would have been a long day; in Tanzania it was definitely a two day drive!

The speed limit as we passed through villages was 30 km an hour; there were many, many villages! Police officers, who are stationed all along the major routes every day, seriously watch for speeders even using hidden cameras to determine if drivers have slowed to 30 km before they cross the line painted on the road or pass by the sign at the side of the road that marks the start of the slower speed. Offenders have photos of their vehicles, with a note of how many km they were over the speed limit, forwarded electronically to officers who are just up the road. When, up ahead, you see an officer step into your lane, you know you need to pull over.

There is a good reason for doing this. People of all ages, including children on their way to and from school, are walking on the side of the road, even in the high-speed areas. Once you've driven through the 30 km area, you can go at your own speed, yes, your own speed.

We drove on two lane, paved highways beside and through towering mountains; I never tire of looking at mountains! We saw monkeys at the side of the road as we drove through a conservation area. We passed by lush vegetation in areas that receive sufficient rainfall and vegetation in areas not so blessed. From place to place we saw maize in various stages of growth. And we talked! And talked! And talked! It was a wonderful trip!

TaSUBa College is everything it claims to be! I still find it hard to believe that here I am, a rural Canadian girl for most of my life, sitting in a classroom that is about twenty feet from the beach that hugs the Indian Ocean!

I'm studying music with professional musicians who spend time with their students and create study plans to match each student's ability. The landscape where I'm staying is filled with big, beautiful pink and white flowers, and tall, large leafed green trees. I walk to school and home. School begins at 6:30 am and finishes sometimes as late as 8:30 pm. And then there's homework!

TaSUBa (Taasisi ya Sanaa na Utamaduni Bagamoyo), established on November 2, 2007, is an East African Community (EAC) Centre of Excellence for visual and performing arts training. Its main functions and objectives are to develop, promote and impart knowledge of Tanzanian arts and culture to existing and future generations.

I'm grateful for the difference it is making in my life. Amen.

Feb. 26, 2024 - It's been an interesting journey for Hospice Huronia as they enter 30 years of caring for our community. The highlight of course was the opening of Tomkins House, a 5-bed Hospice Home where care of 350 patients and their families has taken place. It is the visiting volunteer program and grief & bereavement support that was the beginning of Hospice Huronia in 1994 and it's significant that this is the major growth area for the organization moving into the future.

"We learned many things during COVID including the fact that our community is hurting," said Debbie Kesheshian, Executive Director. "Feelings of isolation, loss of rituals such as celebrations of life, funerals and face-to-face good-byes has taken its toll. The need for our community programs including grief & bereavement support has skyrocketed and we are ready to care."

Kesheshian was made aware of an opportunity recently that caused the Board of Directors to make a very important decision for the future of the organization.

Donna Macfarlane, Chair of the Board explains, "Debbie had a strong relationship with our neighbours who own the beautiful, forested area surrounding Tomkins House. When she heard that they were selling the property, the Board sprung into action. Our greatest concern was losing the natural beauty surrounding our site and fear that it could be clear cut and paved over." Months of careful discussions and meetings took place with Hospice Huronia ultimately purchasing the property.

"This is an investment far greater than the opportunities of nature. This will lay the foundation of a future Community Hospice Centre where grief & bereavement groups can gather. Day Programs and Respite can be offered and where our community will know that loving arms will wrap around them during life's most challenging times." said Macfarlane.
