To the Editor

The Elmvale Community Church was host to an important event on March 2, 2024. The speaker was Palestinian Christian Hammam Farah and his talk was headlined: 'Seeing our Palestinian Brothers & Sisters in Christ.'

The church was full, and people listened attentively as Farah recounted the history of Palestine, a land where the indigenous people have lived under occupation for more than 75 years. Unlike most present-day Gazans who are refugees, displaced from elsewhere in Palestine, Farah's family is from Gaza, they trace their ancestry back to the Canaanites.

Farah talked of the daily life experienced by relatives who remain in Palestine, subject to arbitrary acts of dispossession and brutality by the state. One account was of the death of his great aunt Elham Farah, 84, a well-loved music teacher who had taken refuge in Gaza's Holy Family Church last November. She left to check on her apartment and get some clean clothes. A sniper shot her in the leg and she is thought to have bled to death, though an additional detail had one audience member leaving the meeting in tears.

Now, the situation gets more dire by the day as Gazans dodge constant bombardment and search desperately for basic necessities - food, water, fuel.

Farah urged: it's time for the Canadian government to stop sending arms to Israel. It is indeed time, time for peace to come to the Holy

### Wye Marsh and Sainte-Marie on Tap to Co-host Sweetwater Harvest Festival for a Second Year

Mar. 11, 2024 - MIDLAND, ON: The Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre's Sweetwater Harvest Festival – the non-profit's biggest event of the year – will once again include a dynamic collaboration with neighbouring attraction Sainte-Marie among the Hurons.

"Maple syrup tasting is an iconic Ontario activity, and a springtime must," said Neil Lumsden, Minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport. "I encourage visitors and locals to plan a visit to the Sweetwater Harvest Festival, a family-friendly event that celebrates maple syrup season and offers crafts, good food and outdoor fun at two of Simcoe County's finest attractions."

The annual maple syrup-themed festival will take place March 23 to 24 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. with last admission at 2:30 p.m. Family-friendly activities will be on tap at both sites, including sugar shack demonstrations, maple taffy, an artisan market, and take-home crafts for kids.

"The Sweetwater Harvest Festival offers the opportunity to welcome the return of spring, and celebrate maple syrup - one of the season's sweetest offerings," says Kim Hacker, Executive Director, Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre. "There is nothing like smelling Bannock cooking over a wood fire, tasting maple taffy rolled on snow, and seeing the generations of families enjoying time together outdoors."

This is the second year that the Wye Marsh and

Sainte-Marie have worked together to co-host the Sweetwater Harvest Festival, but collaboration is nothing new for these two organizations that share an entrance off Highway 12, in Midland. They also work together to offer educational experiences throughout the year.

"We're delighted to partner with the Wye Marsh in celebrating the region's natural and cultural heritage," says Will Baird, General Manager, Huronia Historical Parks. "With an expanded list of activities at both locations, this event will offer opportunities for enjoyment for people of all ages."

Activities at the Wye Marsh will include trekking through the sugar bush, sugar shack demonstrations, maple taffy on ice, roasting bannock on a stick, a new syrup-tasting challenge, a kids zone full of activities, presentations by Indigenous knowledge keepers, a chance to learn about birds of prey and trumpeter swans, and of course, opportunities to purchase locally-made maple syrup.

Sainte-Marie among the Hurons will host more than 20 artisans at the Sweetwater Arts and Crafts Market in addition to offering indoor and outdoor scavenger hunts, cornbread in the cookhouse, opportunities to try on historical clothing, playing

Indigenous games, stories in the longhouse, tasting historic teas, as well as take-home crafts like corn husk dolls and clay pots.

Tickets for the Sweetwater Harvest Festival must be purchased online at WyeMarsh.com/Sweetwater but no advance purchase is necessary. Guests can save \$5 per ticket by purchasing admission before 4 p.m. on March 18.

2023 Income taxes are due April 30th, 2024. If you are an individual or a family with low to moderate income the Community Volunteer Income Tax Program hosted at the Elmvale Public Library, can help with filing.

- 1) IN PERSON: Our volunteers can meet with you to complete your tax return. Call the library to book your appointment, (705) 322-
- 2) DROP OFF: We also offer drop off and pick up service through the library. Enclose your documents and contact information in a sealed envelope labelled INCOME TAXES and drop off at the main desk.
- 3) BY PHONE: We are able to help those who are unable to access the library. Call the library (705) 322- 1482 and ask for a volunteer to contact you directly.

The Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP) is a collaborative partnership between the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA), the Elmvale Public Library, and volunteers.

### Springwater Votes to Resume Talks With Barrie, But Only On Servicing

Mar. 7, 2024 - Barrie Mayor Alex Nuttall should be expecting a call any day now from Springwater Mayor Jennifer Coughlin.

Springwater Township council decided at Wednesday night's meeting to reverse a Nov. 15, 2023 council decision to "terminate discussions" with Barrie regarding the city's proposal for municipal boundary adjustments and cross-border servicing. Well, sort of.

Springwater council voted to hold talks with the Barrie officials, but only regarding cross-border servicing.

There will be no talk of boundary adjustments.

Coun. Brad Thompson tabled a reconsideration of the previous resolution from November relating to Barrie's boundary adjustment proposal.

"I am seeking the reconsideration in order to get our mayor, deputy mayor and CAO back to the table," Thompson said. "Since our Nov. 15 resolution terminating talks, there has been a lot of chatter about this from the City of Barrie and media outlets. "I don't think it's beneficial or productive for our

"I don't think it's beneficial or productive for our residents and our community to not be in the room when the future of Springwater is being discussed and really feel it prudent we reconsider this," he added.

Coun. Matt Garwood seconded the motion.

Council voted after clarifying the wording and what portions of the original Nov. 15 decision have been carried out. That includes that the mayor, deputy mayor and chief administrative officer have commenced discussions with officials from Simcoe County and Oro-Medonte Township regarding potential cross-border servicing partnerships, a letter be sent to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing advising it of the township's termination of discussions with the City of Barrie and a delegation request be submitted to the Rural Ontario Municipalities Association (ROMA) conference, but not approved and was not heard.

In a recorded vote, Thompson, Garwood and Coun. Anita Moore, along with Coughlin, voted in favour of the reconsideration. Deputy Mayor George Cabral, Coun. Phil Fisher and Coun. Danielle Alexander voted against.

With the reconsideration carried, the township's clerk recommended the motion, now in its entirety, be divided to handle the items that have been dealt with, remove those, vote on those and then keep the remainder of the motion that council would like to debate.

Coughlin then recommended council separate the two issues: cross-border servicing and Barrie's boundary adjustment request.

"I don't see how you can separate the two as they are one," said Thompson. "My perspective of how this occurred is, in the prepared statements, I think Deputy Mayor Cabral alluded to the fact that we started the discussion with the City of Barrie by going forward and asking them for cross-border servicing.

"The city came back to us and said we'd be willing to do it, but this is how we see it. The two topics are so intertwined I don't see how they can be separated. I would just like you in the room listening and having an ear to the ground," added Thompson, directing his comment toward Coughlin.

Fisher voted against the reconsideration and said he's not interested in shifting the municipality's border and he was under the impression Barrie didn't want to offer Springwater cross-border servicing.

"I think that was made clear, so I'm a little confused that we would want to go back and have a conversation with them when it's been communicated to us that they're not interested," Fisher said.

Alexander was on the same page as Fisher.

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"I do not feel Barrie has ever come to the table to negotiate in good faith," she said. "They came with an ask, that's what they wanted. The conversation with Mayor Nuttall about cross-border servicing was that he was not really interested in it. It was a take it or leave it, a little bit of an attitude.

"That's not a partner in my mind, it's not what I am prepared to negotiate with because I don't think he's interested in negotiating with us. I think his proposal benefits Mayor Nuttall and the City of Barrie and not the residents of Springwater," Alexander added.

Moore said she supported Thompson's reconsideration motion, but wanted to see the cross-bordering servicing issue separated from the boundary expansion issue.

"We have some incredible projects that could be made so much easier for those applicants if discussion for cross-border serving could take place," she said.

Cabral said he talked with Thompson earlier in the day and told him that he would not support reconsideration.

Cabral had submitted a notice of motion on last night's agenda dealing with the same topic. He said his motion would have better prepared council going forward if a reconsideration was to take place.

"You knew full well on looking at the agenda there was something on there that was directly specific to us moving forward with looking at some of those other options," Cabral said to Thompson. "What we just did was premature. I think we could have waited."

Cabral called Thompson's motion for reconsideration "an error in judgment," earning him a point of order and admonishment from the mayor.

"In our code of conduct, we're not permitted to speak to members in that way," Coughlin told Cabral.

Thompson said because Springwater is not at the table, council hasn't been able to share with the public the compensation package the city has put together.

"Mayor Nuttall has been very clear about his plan; he calls it the largest compensation package in the history of the province," Thompson said. "He's promising our taxpayers a 10 per cent revenue share of any new taxes created through this proposal plus \$8 million in new taxes to us — a 30 per cent increase to our revenues and our bottom line.

"I'd like him to be accountable to those numbers and explain to us how he plans to make that happen," the councillor added. "We have a responsibility to our residents and our taxpayers to at least be at the table and listen."

Garwood fully supported Thompson's motion.

"Being at the table does not mean we are agreeing to a boundary adjustment, being at the table does not mean we are agreeing to cross-border servicing," Garwood said. "It's just being at the table."

BarrieToday reached out to Nuttall for his reaction, but he is recovering from surgery and was unable to respond.

Barrie's chief administrative officer, Michael Prowse, responded on the mayor's behalf.

"The city is always open to having discussions on shared interests with our neighbours," Prowse responded via email. "As of now, we have not heard directly from Springwater Township on their desire to resume talks, but we will not be negotiating in the media."

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## Tracing the Legacy: Orr Lake Dance Hall and Golf Course

Mar. 11, 2024 - The Orr Lake community lost



an influential part of their history this week, with the passing of Tom Crowe. Clarence Crowe, Tom's father, opened a dance hall in Orr Lake in 1928. Tom along with his wife Goldie took over the original Orr Lake Dancehall from his parents back in the

1950's. Tom played in the band at the dance hall having fun on the keyboard and quickly changing to the trumpet while Al Beardsall sang and set rhythm on bass guitar. Larry Ruth played guitar and sang harmony. So many fun memories for local folks in Elmvale and North Simcoe were created. They knew where to hide the drinks if the police showed up. Tom made sure of that.

With the aging population, dance participation slowly declined. Tom decided to leave his job at the TD Bank and expanded his business into the golfing industry and had a dream of creating a golf course. He built the first 9 holes at Orr Lake with his family and some local help. He opened on August 1st, 1967. Over the years Tom continued to improve and expand the layout through input from the golfers at Orr Lake. He knew people and had great respect for locals. When he wanted to build a new tee, a new pond or bunker, it would be created with the input from the members. The success of his business was built on great customer service.

Tom's favourite activity and love was always music and he loved playing at the dances. Although he designed and built Orr Lake Golf Club, he never played the game of golf. That being said, he was very passionate about the work on the course and enjoyed spending time with the customers of both the golf course and the dances. After raising 5 kids with his wife Goldie, and later into his life, Tom made the bold decision to build the 2nd 9 holes with his son Greg. Right up until the day he sold, at the age of 72, he continued to work at the golf course with his wife Goldie, son Greg and his daughter Denise.

Lou Belcourt, long time member and friend of Tom said, "I have over the years, been a member of several local golf courses including Horseshoe Valley. As a member, Orr lake was my favorite. This was primarily due to Tom. He always made playing there a pleasurable experience and he developed a friendship with me and my friends that lasted a lifetime. Monday members men's night plus tournaments were memorable events that he personally was involved in and he loved teasing some members as foils in a humourous manner. Whenever I met Tom in our latter years the conversation always reverted to fun days at the Orr Lake Golf Course. These past memories are special to me and eclipse any memories I have of my playing days elsewhere." Brian Belcourt mentioned, "As a resident for 60

years in the Elmvale area, I cannot count how many times I have heard stories about experience and good times local residents have had at the Orr lake dance hall, and golf course. A big thank you is owed to the Crowe family for supply the facility for these memoirs."

Many golfers and dancers remember the great times that were had due to the bright personality of this great man that will be missed by family and friends.

### **DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT PLAN**

The proposed Affordable and Sustainable Housing Community Improvement Plan provides for financial incentives for the creation of affordable housing and sustainable housing in the Town. The proposed Community Improvement would apply to the entire municipality. Here are some details of the proposed incentive programs:

### Tax Increment Equivalent Grant (TIEG) Program

The purpose of this program is to increase the overall number of purpose-built rental housing units throughout the Town by providing a grant that reduces the property tax increase that typically results from development and/or redevelopment projects.

### **Surplus Land Program**

This program is to identify and prioritize the utilization of surplus municipal lands for developments that include the provision of affordable housing, and for lands where residential development is unfeasible, to prioritize the sale of the land to fund the reserve fund used to fund the Town's CIP Programs.

### Planning and Building Permit Fee Program

The purpose of this program is to promote the development of purpose-built rental housing and sustainable housing by offsetting the costs associated with fees for planning and building applications.

### Renovations for Rental Housing Program

The grant may cover eligible project costs up to a maximum of \$15,000 in funding for the repair or renovation of existing rental housing.

### Affordable and Sustainable Housing Feasibility Study Program

The purpose of this grant is to support housing providers to evaluate the feasibility of developing affordable and/or sustainable housing units and/or projects. In both cases, a grant equal to 50% of the cost of studies or plans up to a maximum of \$20,000 in funding will be available.

### Additional Dwelling Unit Program


The purpose of this program is to provide financial assistance to offset the construction costs associated with renovating an existing dwelling or accessory building to include a new Additional Dwelling Unit within the principal dwelling or an existing accessory building. The grant may cover eligible project costs up to a maximum of \$10,000 per unit or \$20,000 per property for the construction.





### **Ontario Supporting Victims** of Gun and Gang Violence in **Simcoe County**

March 12, 2024 - BARRIE — The Ontario government is investing over \$1.4 million in communities across the province to help support young victims, witnesses and survivors of gun and gang violence, including human trafficking, and their families. The funding, through the Grant to Support Child Victims of Gun and Gang Violence, includes \$122,872 for the Child and Youth Advocacy Centre of Simcoe Muskoka.

"Community organizations do important, impactful work helping young victims of crime when and where they need it most," said MPP for Barrie - Springater - Oro-Medonte and Ontario's Attorney General Doug Downey. "Today's investment is part of our government's ongoing work to support victims of crime, empower communities, and increase awareness of gun and gang violence. Ontario is honoured to support the dedication and commitment of these local individuals and organizations through this grant program."

The grants provide organizations with up to \$150,000 for initiatives that:

- Expand supports including counselling and safety planning services for child victims of gun and gang violence and those impacted by human trafficking.

- Deliver specialized training to staff who support child victims of gun and gang violence.
- Support community coordination partnerships with stakeholders.

### The Disastrous Rollout of the Liberals' \$10-a-Day Childcare

March 12, 2024 - In 2021 Ottawa announced plans for a nationwide \$10-a-day childcare at a cost of \$30 billion over five years. Three years in, how is it going? Not well.

From the outset, skeptics predicted shortages, reduced parental choice, the destruction of privatesector operations, and a significant discrepancy between projected spending and the actual cost of providing childcare at a fraction of its true value. The evidence from coast to coast shows all this now coming to pass.

Let's begin in British Columbia. Vancouver estimates it is short 15,000 childcare spaces; a senior planner told city council last November that "it's a desert everywhere" when it comes to childcare. Elsewhere in B.C., local media in Langley Township, one of the province's fastest-growing suburban communities, report there is a "desperate childcare shortage;" in Okanagan Valley, the state of childcare has reportedly "reached a crisis point."

Ontario is no better. Childcare centres "are at risk of closing," say media reports; it's estimated the childcare shortage could reach 220,000 spaces. According to the Toronto Star, the city "is set to fall well short of its target for new child care spaces by 2026." In rural Simcoe County, waiting lists for daycare are said to be "insane."

On the East Coast, CBC News reports activists and unions in Nova Scotia are complaining about a "severe shortage of spaces." Another CBC story from Newfoundland and Labrador says the childcare sector is - surprise! - short on federal and provincial government cash.

Statistics Canada data confirm the media reports of our national childcare crisis. The number of children aged 0 to 5 years in childcare across Canada fell by approximately 118,000 from 2019 to 2023, with an uptick in centre-based childcare attendance offset by a larger decline in home-based childcare provision. As a result, today more parents are looking after their kids at home than was the case in 2019. Such a decrease in childcare use nationally seems remarkable, given the billions being spent on increasing access to affordable childcare.

StatsCan also reports 46 percent of parents with children in childcare had trouble finding it in 2023 up significantly from 36 percent in 2019. Waiting lists have also exploded. The number of children under the age of 1 waiting for a space has grown from 38 percent in 2022 to 47 percent in 2023.

Three years into Ottawa's national childcare program - in big cities and small towns from coast to coast - it is an absolute disaster. Exactly as was predicted.

The key to understanding this unfolding crisis is the deliberate hostility the Trudeau government has shown for private sector childcare operators, which has severely exacerbated the problems inherent whenever government attempts to impose a centrally-



planned takeover of a sector or industry.

According to recently passed federal legislation, the Liberals' national childcare plan is meant to "facilitate access to early learning and child care programs and services ... provided by public and not for profit child care providers." In some provinces, the apparent goal is to get rid of all private-sector childcares. Yet entrepreneurs are best able to respond quickly to rising demand. They are also more efficient than unionized, non-profit operators.

Even in provinces where the private sector is tolerated, the funding arrangements required to participate in the \$10-a-day subsidy program have severely limited entrepreneurs' ability to recoup costs and make a profit. "It is virtually impossible for my centre to remain financially viable under the new agreement," says Christine Pasmore, the owner of a Grande Prairie, Alberta childcare centre, in an interview.

This government attack on entrepreneurs is also deeply ironic, given how loudly the federal Liberals proclaim their feminist credentials. The vast majority of private sector childcare owners now being forced out of business are women.

So how did Ottawa's grand experiment in national \$10-a-day childcare gone so wrong? Lowering the price in such dramatic fashion increased demand by a huge factor. Everyone loves a bargain, especially parents. But at the same time, the Trudeau government is trying to rid the childcare system of profit-making entrepreneurs for ideological reasons.

The inevitable result is chaos for parents. Canadian families must now suffer through a severe shortage of spaces and growing waiting lists as demand spikes. It is an outcome eerily similar to complaints about Canada's crisis-prone Medicare system.

Of course anyone even vaguely familiar with a government takeover of any industry could have seen this coming. The Soviet Union was never wellknown for efficiency, an ability to meet demand or for offering high-quality goods and services. Evidently, Trudeau's advisors forgot to inform him of this important fact.

If you "Make it, Bake it, or Grow it" in Springwater, you are eligible to become a vendor, either on o weekly or seasonal basis. The Market will run until Labour Day weekend.

WI members praised the BIA for promoting Elmvale, but lamented that there is no accommodation for visitors that are attracted to the village. Local businesses have also suffered from the lack of skiers and sledders visiting this winter. We were dismayed to learn that the BIA has no authority in 'policing' its members either to maintain their storefronts or to make them more accessible. There seems to be a growing number of residents using walkers, wheelchairs and baby strollers / carriages, yet only a handful of Queen St businesses have sidewalk-level access.

Crystal reminded us she is one of over 70 members of the Elmvale BIA, and that citizens are welcome to attend their monthly meetings.

So, how did Centre Flos WI members respond to our role call? We would like to see: more trees (particularly in new subdivisions); a dollar store; more accommodations for seniors (Construction of the Elms and an expansion to Sara Vista); a bank, or alt least greater access to the ATM; a general merchandise store (where does one buy underwear in Elmvale?); a general hardware store; a shelter/pavilion at the splash pad; maintenance of the parking lots (cracked/uneven access off Queen St to the Community Hall lot, and pot holes north off Stone St.); and a Council that supports Elmvale.



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Chocolate Espresso Cake - A Coffee and Chocolate Lovers Delight!



Mar. 11, 2024 - This flourless chocolate espresso cake is a dream for chocolate and coffee lovers alike. Using only a few high-quality ingredients, this recipe is easy to follow and comes together quickly. Ideally, make this cake a day ahead and refrigerate until serving with a garnish of fresh berries. Dense, decadent and delish. A perfect dessert for special occasions with friends or family.

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 cup (250 ml) dark or semi-sweet chocolate, chopped
- 1 cup (250 ml) unsalted butter, chopped
- 3 tablespoons (45 ml) instant-espresso powder or instant-coffee granules
- ½ cup (63 ml) granulated sugar
- ¼ teaspoon (1.25 ml) salt

### **NSTRUCTIONS**

- Preheat the oven to 350 F (177 C).

- In a saucepan on high heat, melt the butter, espresso or coffee, salt and sugar. Whisk frequently until all of the ingredients have dissolved.
- Turn the heat down to low, add the chocolate and vanilla extract and whisk until smooth.
- In a separate bowl, beat the eggs with a mixer on medium-high speed for 4-5 minutes. The eggs should almost triple in volume.
- Turn off the heat and gently add the beaten eggs to the chocolate mixture. Stir carefully until thoroughly combined.
- Transfer the batter into your prepared springform pan.
- Bake in the oven for 40-45 minutes until set. Be careful not to overcook. The centre of the cake may still look slightly wet.
- Cool the cake completely and refrigerate for

Mar. 10, 2024 - Many sources agree that Bagamoyo is the oldest town in Tanzania, however not all sources agree how the town got its name. Some say that, in Kiswahili, Bagamoyo (Bwaga-Moyo) means to lay down your heart. Some say that sailors called it Bagamoyo because, when they arrived on dry

land, they were grateful to lay down and rest after the perils of being at sea.

Some say that, in Kiswahili, Bagamoyo means take a load off your heart, in other words feel at ease by removing your burden. In the 19th century, porters carried heavy bundles for explorers and others as they travelled into the interior and back to the busy Bagamoyo port. At the end of their journey, they were glad to remove their heavy burdens thus taking a load off their hearts.

Here at Bagamoyo's TaSUBa College, I pass by the statue, depicted in the picture that accompanies this article, at least twice a day. This statue provides a clue to another interpretation of the name Bagamoyo.

In the 19th century, slave traders forcibly gathered people who lived in the interior of the country and loaded them onto ships anchored in the harbour. They would be sold as slaves in far off lands. Some say that Bagamoyo came to mean laying down your heart as you gave up all hope. I can't pass this statue without thinking about how cruel we can be to each other.

One day, as I was walking home in Mugeta, I was confronted by some students from a nearby high

school. One young man was particularly challenging. Why does Canada support racism? was one of his questions.

We know there are many events in our country's history that we aren't proud of, but in 2007 Thomas Allen Publishers, Toronto, published Karolyn Smardz Frost's book which tells a true story we can be proud of. The Globe and Mail wrote: Smardz Frost has combined solid academic research with a compelling story ... her portrait in words will forever hang with pride on the wall of history that documents the transition from slavery to emancipation, and the process by which African Americans became African Canadians.

From the Introduction: In 1985, archaeologists in downtown Toronto made a remarkable find. Beneath the old Sackville Street School playground were traces of a house, a shed, and a mysterious cellar. Municipal records revealed the original landowner had been "Thornton Blackburn, cabman, coloured". He and his wife were fugitive slaves from Kentucky who had settled in Toronto in 1834 and had gone on to become wealthy and successful businesspeople. The Thornton and Lucie Blackburn site became the first archaeological dig on an Underground Railroad site in Canada.

The title of the book? I've Got a Home in Glory Land - A Lost Tale of the Underground Railroad. It won the Governor General's Literary Award in 2007.

May there never be another high school student in rural Tanzania, or anywhere else in the world, who feels compelled to ask the question, Why does Canada support racism? Amen

Mar. 4, 2024 - On the weekend of Feb 18th and 19th, 2024, the Elmvale Coyotes U8 Select Team travelled to Hamilton to take part in the Hamilton Steel U8 MD Future Stars Tournament. The U8 Select team was formed late in the season and its roster made up of 11 players selected from Elmvale's two U8 LL Teams. The select team was able to have a couple practices and host one game against the Oro Thunder U8 Tier 1 team prior to the weekend away in Hamilton.

The Coyotes went on to face Hamilton Huskies #2 in the second game of the tournament, with the nerves shaken out and their legs ready to skate it was a high scoring affair with Elmvale outscoring their big city opponent 9-5 in the second game. McNaughton made more big saves in the second game with Elmvale's goals being scored by Draper Temolder (2), Noah Antiquera, Reef Tschop McLaren (2), Landon Phillips and rounding out the scoring with a hat trick was Wyatt Coughlin (3). The coaches were impressed with the teams play and going 2-0 to open the tournament.

In game 3 and 4 the Coyotes would face their toughest challenge of the weekend from the Haldimand River Kings U8 MD teams. These two teams from an "A" centre were comprised of the 20 best players selected from Caladonia, Cayuga, Dunnville & Hagersville's four Minor Hockey Associations. In game 1 Elmvale was able to open the scoring of the game at 16:57, with some strong passing that resulted in a goal off the stick of Wyatt Coughling for his 5th of the tournament. Elmvale battled hard over the remainder of the game with Blake McNaughton making eleven (11) great saves, but the River Kings were able to sneak 3 pucks past the Coyotes goalie to take the game 3-1. In the second game Elmvale faced an even faster River Kings squad who got out to an early lead and didn't look back. The River Kings played hard and took the game 6-0, but the spotlight was once again on the Coyotes goalie who faced 22 shots and made 16 big saves in the tough loss.

In the final 2 games of the day the U8 Selects faced teams from another AA Centre the Richmond Hill Jaguars. The team was ready for two hard fought games to end the day in Hamilton. They hit the ice in the 5th game against the Jaguars and the play went up and down the ice, with both goalies making some big saves, but at the 20:11 mark Wyatt Coughlin opened the scoring for Elmvale with his 6th goal of the Tournament. Richmond Hill would answer back with 3 quick goals making the score 3-1 after 10 minutes. Strong Play continued from both teams and with 8 minutes remaining Austin Perreault responded for Elmvale with his first goal of the weekend to make the score 3-2 Richmond Hill. Richmond Hill went on to score another 2 goals to win the game 5-2. The game did feature some strong defensive play from Chase Culbert, Scott Haines, Noah Antiquera and Scott Popple, not mention another 12 saves by McNaughton in net.

The final match versus Richmond Hill it was a tight checking affair with both teams giving up no ground to the other. But finally at the 17:00 min mark Wyatt Coughlin opened the scoring for Elmvale with a breakaway goal getting past the Jaguars net minder for his 7th of the tournament. Not long after Noah Antiquera followed up with his own breakaway goal to make the score 2-0 for Elmvale on Antiquera's 2nd goal of the tournament. The game was fast paced with lots of shots being fired at both goalies. After a quick flurry of shots and strong play Richmond Hill took the lead with a 3-2 score. With 5:00 minutes remaining in the game Popple moved the puck up the boards and found Antiquera alone in front of the Jaguar net where he lifted the puck over the goalies left pad to tie the game at 3's. Elmvale skated hard in the last 5 minutes but couldn't' get one past the Jaguar's backstop and the game ended in a 3-3 tie.



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
