#### Springwater Library Board Counters 'Misconceptions' at Council

By Wayne Doyle, Local Journalism Initiative Reporter March 21, 2024 - With its competency questioned and financial decisions challenged at almost every turn, members of the Springwater Library Board went on the offensive Wednesday night at the township's council meeting.

"Unfortunately, with inaccurate comments made at the council meeting on Feb. 21, 2024, regarding a motion to contract out library services, replacing library management, which is the CEO, and the competence of current library board, we wanted to make a delegation this evening to clear up some misconceptions," said Adrian Graham, chair of the Springwater Library Board.

"The library board feels it's necessary to clarify, on the public record, accurate information about how the Public Library Act works and the role of both the library board and township council," he added. "It should be noted that all of the information we're going to share this evening was provided to council members when they began their current term." Graham and library board vice-chair Jane Cocking were in council chambers to respond to Coun. Phil Fisher's stated intention to bring forward a motion asking for a report from staff regarding the potential for contracting out library services. Graham explained that, under the Provincial Libraries Act (PLA), township council has no legal authority to contract out library services for an existing library system. He said the PLA grants library boards the status of a completely independent corporation as soon as the library board is established by council bylaws.

"As such, library boards in Ontario are legal entities," Graham While library boards try to work in co-operation with municipal councils, he said library boards are tasked with providing independent governance in planning of the library system and are responsible for providing a comprehensive library service that reflects the community's unique needs.

The library board, Graham explained, is responsible for appointing a chief executive officer, who is an employee of the library board and reports to the board.

The CEO does not report to the municipality. Fisher floated the idea of contracting out library services at the Nov. 1, 2023 council meeting. With few details and no context for the request, Fisher's comment, at the time, started tongues wagging. Some residents thought Fisher was calling for a closure of the township's library, while others applauded his concern for taxpayers' money.

His motion never materialized, leaving many in the community wondering about the library's fate. Coun. Brad Thompson, who sits on the library board, made an attempt to get Fisher to update the status of his motion at the Jan. 17 council meeting, but was prevented from asking the question when it was challenged on a point of order by Coun. Anita Moore. At the Feb. 21 council meeting, Mayor Jennifer Coughlinadvised council that the point of order that she upheld at that meeting was, in fact, not in contravention and invited Thompson to ask Fisher his question. "Where do you currently stand on your motion to get information on contracting out our library services?" Thompson asked. "It's not that I have it in for the library," Fisher said at the time. "I just have to say, the board and the fiscal

On Wednesday night, Fisher doubled down. "My problem doesn't lie with the library; my problem lies with the fact that we, as a council, are not allowed, seemingly, to question the finances behind the library," he said. "Whether it's \$5,000 or \$50,000, it has to be accounted for. I always feel when myself or another member of council questions the budget or questions things that surround the library, it feels like we're told we're not allowed to ask.

managementiswell, it just doesn't make any sense to me."

"Yes, you are separate, but you still come to us for the budget," Fisher added.

Cocking said council is encouraged to ask questions they just have to go through the prescribed process.

"Coun. Thompson is the council representative on the library board," she said. "Members council should direct all questions and comments to Coun. Thompson, who will bring them to the next board meeting for discussion." Cocking said this process was deliberately developed under the PLA to avoid the "politicization" of library matters and to respect both the library and its board as independent legal entities.

"The system is designed to develop a collegial and respectful relationship between council and the library board," she said. When it comes to the board's competency, Cocking said the education and experience of board members was "quite significant and extensive" in the areas of strategic planning, finance, governance and policy.

Gillian Reynolds is the library's Tiny Township representative. She was Tiny's Community Volunteer in 2014, is former president of the Tiny Lions Club and is the bookkeeper for Reynold's Electric.

#### Four in Five Canadians Read Newspaper Content Each Week

March 21, 2024 - Despite the digital shift in media consumption, Canadian adults continue to engage with newspaper content, whether in print or digital format, on a weekly basis.

Research conducted at the end of 2023 finds that 81% of Canadians report reading a newspaper on one of four platforms over the course of a week. Nearly a quarter of the population (22%) use all four print and digital platforms to access news and stay informed, highlighting the integration of traditional and digital news consumption habits.

Newspapers continue to adapt and cater to the

varied reader preferences in today's digital age by providing content on various platforms. Newspaper access on smartphones has become the number one platform at all times of day, appealing to Canadians' desire to stay informed on the go, 24/7. However, readers are choosing any number of platforms to read newspaper content – it is no longer about just a single way to reach readers.

Totum Research managed the research on behalf of News Media Canada. Online interviews were conducted with 2621 Canadian adults in November 2023.





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

A quick review of Mr. Lau's online presences reveals his partisan purpose.

Thankfully Linda Belcourt addressed one component of the "disaster" in her March 12 Editorial: political leaders determined that the Elmvale and Wasaga Beach area did not need the funding, hence the cause for higher fees. That is a important story that needs to be told in detail to the community so that citizens can think critically and ask questions of politicians as to why they prevented affordable daycare in Elmvale.

Matthew Lau did not address that Early Childhood Educators' low wages reflects the undervaluing of their work and is a deterrent to becoming an ECE. Some daycare centres simply cannot find adequate staff.

An Open Letter to Council regarding March 20, 2024 Council Meeting:

I attended the Mar. 21/24 Council and was dismayed by the reaction some members of Council had to the presentation by the Library Board Chair and Vice-Chair. This presentation was a direct result of the criticism one member of Council expressed about the management of the Library (Board and CEO). Those comments were made at the Feb. 21/24 Council Meeting.

The fact that these unwarranted comments were made in public session is unconscionable. As a past member of the Library Board, I am appalled at this Council's refusal to acknowledge provincial legislation, to listen to explanations of the process under which the Library operates, to disregard their own procedures (about holding discussions of personnel matters in closed session) and the utter distain for volunteers (Councillor Fisher asked how the Library Board could consider themselves volunteers since they receive an honorarium)

All appointees to Springwater Council committees receive an honorarium, as do our local appointees to other service providers (such as the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority), including our 'volunteer' firefighters. Library Board members cannot claim mileage to meetings, nor incur any other expenses without the prior approval of the Board - the Library Board's \$40 per meeting honorarium falls well below minimum wage just for time spent at a monthly meeting, let alone anytime spent on other Board business. The amount of the honorarium has not been changed since 1990, to the best of my knowledge.

The comment Councillor Fisher then made about the CEO's credit card expenditure at the Royal York Hotel was another cheap shot. When the Library received credit card privileges from the Township, it was so that members were not out-of-pocket for expenses incurred while on Library business.

The bill in question was for accommodations and parking for attending the recent Ontario Library Association annual conference. The bill would have been significantly larger had reservations been made at the hotel attached to the conference venue. I notice in the same cheque and credit card register that there were many similar expenses for Township staff attending other conferences, yet no disparaging comments were made about those costs.

The Board's agendas and minutes are available on the Library website. The reporting in the minutes echoes Council's standard. As such, there is no verbatim recording of individual conversation, nor withholding of pertinent information. In the case of requested revisions by the board, there would be a recording of amendments to motions. There are no 'shadow meetings' as Councillor Fisher suggested.

The only direct question asked after the presentation was for Township staff to review the Public Libraries Act with regard to contracting out of library services.

My questions for Council are:

Will there be an apology to the Library Board and CEO for the slanderous comments made by Councillor Fisher on Mar. 20/24?


Will there be any discipline for the comments he also made at the Feb. 21/24 meeting?

Will Council review their protocol for moving into Closed Session? It is my understanding that Council meets in Closed Session to review real estate issues, to be updated on contract negotiations, or where comments are made about identifiable personnel. Who at Council – the Mayor, the CAO or the Clerk, has the authority to 'kill the microphone' when such comments are made in public session?

Will Council review their protocol for interacting with their Service Agencies? With a new Police Services Board coming into effect, it seems an opportune time to re-examine what authority Council may or may not have with those Service Agencies in budget deliberations and personnel

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### Town of Midland Council Weighs Various Options, Costs for New-look Yonge Street



"We need some kind of delineation for the cyclists and we can't just have paint," says Midland mayor as council seeks further options on major Yonge Street project

March 21, 2024 - The west side of Yonge Street is getting prepared for an overhaul as the next major project in Midland, and how its surface gets painted was the topic at the recent committee of the whole

A public meeting was held in October for residents to learn more and complete a survey for their suggestions regarding travel lanes, turning lanes, cycling lanes, and/or a multi-use trail among other options.

Environment and infrastructure staff brought a report to this week's council meeting, recommending an option that would incorporate a buffer of flexible bollards from CR-93 to King Street between vehicle lanes and the cyclists and pedestrians, maintaining the single lanes for vehicles with a central turning

Mundy's Bay Public School is located on Yonge Street between Sixth and Seventh Street. Their response through their Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit-led On the Move committee was for the second option, aligning with the staff recommendation.

Mayor Bill Gordon thanked staff for the report, but said there was a missed option not provided to residents: a return to the way things were.

"The ironic thing is that what most people wanted, of the options presented to them, of course, was status quo," said Gordon. "As it turns out though, that doesn't work with the MTO. It kind of did before when we winged it, but we can't now and we need some kind of delineation for the cyclists and we can't just have paint."

His suggested amendment to the report recommendations was to send the report back for staff to explore the cost to have four lanes - two lanes in either direction – and keep children under 12 legally on the sidewalks while adult cyclists use

"The rationale here is, we only have two main eastwest corridors; there's Hugel Avenue and there's Yonge Street," said Gordon. "Yonge is our truck route, it is our main arterial road... through our town."

He added that the parallel Hugel Avenue had two lanes of traffic with painted delineation for cyclists, and although steeper, would be accessible for those wanting a cycling challenge.

As Gordon was amending the motion for increased options, Coun. Jamie-Lee Ball also sought a further amendment. Redesign options of the intersection at Fourth Street – a street cited as a hazardous speeding zone by residents – were explored but with proposed multi-use lanes ceasing at that intersection; Ball requested staff to look into extending those lanes from CR-93 to King Street.

Providing a cost-analysis for the project was engineering manager Mitch Sobil, who shared that the estimated base cost for the reconstruction project would be \$8.5 million, covering option one of status

The staff and school recommended second option for flexible bollards would be an additional \$500,000; a third option to create a multi-use trail from CR-93 to Eighth Street would raise the cost another \$500,000 to \$9.5 million; and Ball's suggested amendment option for full extension would be around the \$11 million range or more, according to Sobil.

Coun. Catherine MacDonald asked if four lanes were a feasible option, to which Sobil confirmed was possible but due to the narrow width of Yonge Street it would be a challenge due to constraints and existing utilities.

As Gordon asked if staff could bring back a report which would address not only the amended options but also consideration for anticipated population growth along the corridor, Sobil replied that a Yonge Street road diet report from 2017 had made those calculations and that the town was in line with the report through to 2041.

While Gordon expressed assurance that reexamining painted lines wouldn't be a great impact on the project's cost or timeline, Sobil responded with caution that reconstruction could potentially be delayed as staff revisit further options.

The motion was split in two parts, with Gordon and Ball's amendments approved as the first half.

Regarding Fourth Street, residents had previously asked council to consider making it a one-way route to decrease traffic issues. As part of the report, staff had explored options but recommended upgrading to a permanent signal at the intersection of Yonge Street and removing its pedestrian crossing option, but otherwise leave the street as is. Gordon commented that it wasn't a slight against resident concerns but that the traffic data didn't align with their claims of speeding.

Information on the Yonge Street project, timelines, scope, and reports are available on the construction page of the town website.

The Yonge St. reconstruction bike lanes report, including options and survey results, is available in the council agenda on the town of Midland website.




#### St. Patrick's Day Pub



#### Ontario Connecting More **People to Primary Care Teams** across Simcoe County.

March 22, 2024 - Barrie- The Ontario government is investing \$2,842,641 to connect more people to primary care teams across Simcoe County. This is part of Ontario's \$110 million investment to connect up to 328,000 people to primary care teams, bringing the province one step closer to connecting everyone in Ontario to primary care.

"This funding continues to ensure that everyone, no matter where they live, will have access to the world class healthcare Ontarians expect," said Doug Downey, MPP for Barrie - Springwater - Oro-Medonte. "Expanding access to primary care teams helps connect patients and their families with the services they need all at once. primary care teams in Simcoe County.

"Our government is making record investments to ensure that the residents in Barrie and Innisfil that want to have a primary care provider can connect to one," said Andrea Khanjin, MPP for Barrie-Innisfil. "I am thrilled that Innisfil will be receiving \$1,440,600 for a Nurse Practitioner Led Clinic which will be working with existing community partners including pharmacies, Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit, radiology centres, CMHA, BANAC, and other community service partners to provide comprehensive primary care services to the unattached, patients with chronic diseases, those with mental health or addiction issues, the elderly, young families, socioeconomically disadvantaged groups, indigenous persons, racialized or francophone communities."

Interprofessional primary care teams connect people to a range of health professionals that work together under one roof, including doctors, nurse practitioners, registered and practical nurses, physiotherapists, social workers and dietitians, among others. Timely access to primary care helps people stay healthier for longer with faster diagnosis and treatment, as well as more consistent support managing their day-today health while relieving pressures on emergency departments and walk-in clinics.

"Our government is making record investments to ensure that everyone that wants to have a primary care provider can connect to one," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "While there is more work to do, giving hundreds of thousands of more Ontarians the opportunity to connect to primary care brings us that much closer to this goal."

## Awenda, Giants Tomb Set to **Expand Over Next Three Years**

March 12, 2024 - Awenda Provincial Park will soon get a little bigger as part of the federal government's \$10 million commitment to support expansion of Ontario's protected areas.

Through the federal Enhanced Nature Legacy programandpartnershipwith the Nature Conservancy of Canada and the Ontario Land Trust Alliance, the investment would see the addition of new or expansion of existing, protected areas including provincial parks and conservation reserves across Ontario. For Awenda, that would mean a boundary expansion of approximately 265 acres (nearly 110 hectares) to be added to the park, including the mainland portion of Awenda as well as parcels of Giants Tomb Island. Established in 1975, the park currently occupies an area of 7,203 acres (2,915 hectares). "I'm very excited that the boundaries are going to be expanded at Awenda Provincial Park," Simcoe North MPP Jill Dunlop told MidlandToday. "It's a great collaboration between the federal and provincial governments coming together to ensure funds for nature and conservation. Across the province, up to 170,000 hectares (or more than 420,000 acres) has been protected by the Enhanced Nature Legacy program with the goal to protect 30 per cent of land and water in Canada by 2030, as noted by Minister Andrea Khanjin of Environment, Conservation and Parks. "The County of Simcoe already has a lot of great nature trails," said Khanjin, adding that Ontario was blessed with a large number of provincial parks. "What's better than expanding more recreational opportunities for people who love to live here and to come visit?" Adam van Koeverden, parliamentary secretary to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Steven Guilbeault, added: "It's a team sport, we can't do it alone. We certainly do need provincial and

recreation, and it's also important for species-at-risk." Shortly after the presentation, the politicians, scientists, dignitaries and their families took a short hike through Awenda Park led by natural heritage education coordinator Tim Tully, who explained the geographic and historic context of the lands to the visiting entourage.

#### Askennonia Senior Centre Highlights the Impact of a \$25,800 Grant

Midland, ON – On Friday, the team at Askennonia Senior Centre spoke to the impact of the \$25,800 Resilient Communities Fund grant from the provincial government's Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF). The year-long grant, awarded last spring, has helped the group continue delivering a wide range of activities for local seniors for the community at the North Simcoe Sports and Recreation Centre.

"This grant from our government through OTF, totalling \$25,800, has significantly strengthened the Askennonia Senior Centre's capacity to support our elderly community," said Jill Dunlop, MPP for Simcoe

North. "With new appliances, essential kitchenware, and assistance with transportation costs, we are fortifying connections, combating isolation, and ensuring the well-being of our cherished seniors."

Funds from the grant were used to purchase and install a new, lockable refrigerator and stand-up freezer to prevent the loss of food. The grant has also enabled the Askennonia Senior Centre to buy catering carts, new soup and salad bowls, coffee urns, make needed repairs to damaged cupboards, and to help with some administrative costs as well as helping lower income seniors with transportation costs so that they can remain connected with activities and friends, combatting loneliness and isolation.

"These items allowed us to return to our fundraising events in the post-COVID landscape, confident that the equipment and utensils we use and the food we served was safe," said Judy Contin, Executive Director of Askennonia. "Access to programing and events gives local seniors an opportunity to socialize, to learn and to be engaged members of their communities. The Resilient Communities Fund grant was important to our financial recovery after

the pandemic, as we returned to our fundraising goal of over \$100,000/year."

Askennonia Senior Centre has been supporting local seniors since 1987 and in 2023 saw its largest membership ever, registering 1,435 individuals. They offer over 60 weekly programs and many seasonal parties and events throughout the year, including a St Patrick's Day Party and Spring Fashion Show.

A Public Information Centre (PIC) for a Minister's Zoning Order application will be held virtually on Tuesday April 30, 2024, at 6:30 p.m. via Microsoft Teams (link included below).

The purpose of the MZO request is to zone the lands to permit the development of a proposed plan of subdivision consisting of 406 lots for single detached dwellings.



The windows of the college buildings, nestled under a canopy of tall, green, broad-leafed trees, are open to the sound of the waves that hug the coastline of the town. The Indian Ocean tides go in and out as students come from inside and outside of Tanzania to develop the artistic gifts that God has given them. My last week was filled with important assignments and late nights to complete them. March 16 arrived and with it, Graduation Day. I couldn't resist sending a picture of me receiving my Year Two Certificate.



Technically, it was my first year, but when they

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#### City of Barrie Nixes Springwater's Cross-border Servicing Request

March 21, 2024 - The City of Barrie has sent Springwater Township packing.

As Springwater has "nothing to offer" Barrie in exchange for access to its water and wastewater services, the city has told the township it's not interested in talking.

At Wednesday night's township council meeting, Springwater Mayor Jennifer Coughlin told council members that township officials had a meeting with Barrie Mayor Alex Nuttall to discuss the possibility of a partnership and were rebuffed.

"It was made very clear that we have nothing to offer if not land," Coughlin said. "They are not looking for a fee-for-service or 'a la carte' service to their pipes, their treatment facility and their water.

"If we're not talking about boundary adjustment, the conversation with Barrie no longer exists," she added. "That was made very clear to us in an email and that was the intention of the email, so that it wasn't my interpretation or our interpretation of the meeting. That was provided to us directly from the City of Barrie."

Nuttall provided BarrieToday with a copy of the email that was sent to Springwater Township councillors Wednesday, just before noon.

"The City of Barrie continues to be open to a crossborder agreement that delivers more industrial supply to Barrie and empowers Springwater to raise \$8 million annually in new taxation. This has been the case since we sat down to discuss with mayor and deputy mayor and continues to be the case," the email reads.

"I would encourage you to make a serious effort of engagement with Barrie, rather than one that merely takes the billions of dollars of Barrie infrastructure, paid for by hard-working Barrie residents and planned out by top-tier Barrie staff, and gives it to

neighbouring municipalities," the email continues. "Therefore, we will not be providing any services across the boundary to Springwater without the conveyance of industrial supply to Barrie.

"Additionally, if the City of Barrie is going to take the approach of Springwater council to industrial supply seriously, we would need to understand what lands Springwater is designating for industrial purposes that are in close proximity to the municipal boundaries," the message states.

Nuttall closed his message on an optimistic note.

"I prefer to find a local solution that benefits both municipalities as was proposed and was being negotiated prior to the ending of talks between Barrie and Springwater," the email says. "This approach will without a doubt, deliver jobs and prosperity in a more meaningful way for residents of our area."

Two weeks ago, Springwater council opted to reverse a Nov. 15, 2023 decision to "terminate discussions" with Barrie regarding the city's proposal for municipal boundary adjustments and cross-border servicing.

Springwater council voted to hold talks with the Barrie officials, but only regarding cross-border servicing. Council demanded there be no discussion with Barrie about boundary expansion.

The decision divided Springwater council.

Coun. Brad Thompson tabled the reconsideration of the previous resolution from November.

"I am seeking the reconsideration in order to get our mayor, deputy mayor and CAO back to the table," Thompson said.

"I don't think it's beneficial or productive for our residents and our community to not be in the room when the future of Springwater is being discussed and really feel it prudent we reconsider this," he added.

In a recorded vote, Coun. Matt Garwood, Coun. Anita Moore and Thompson, along with Coughlin,

voted in favour of the reconsideration. Deputy Mayor George Cabral, Coun. Phil Fisher and Coun. Danielle Alexander voted against it.

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Moore said she supported Thompson's reconsideration motion, but wanted to see the cross-bordering servicing issue separated from the boundary expansion issue.

"We have some incredible projects that could be made so much easier for those applicants if discussion for cross-border servicing could take place," she said.

"I don't see how you can separate the two as they are one," said Thompson. "My perspective of how this occurred is, in the prepared statements, I think Deputy Mayor Cabral alluded to the fact that we started the discussion with the City of Barrie by going forward and asking them for cross-border servicing.

"The city came back to us and said we'd be willing to do it, but this is how we see it. The two topics are so intertwined I don't see how they can be separated," Thompson added.

It appears they can't.

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
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#### **Negativity in Our Nation**


