23 - 24 Canadiens of the Boston Pizza Hockey League in Midland Run the Table and go UNDEFEATED!



April 9, 2024 - I can clearly remember when I began playing organized hockey as a 6 year in 1965 in the North Toronto Hockey Association house league and immediately fell in love with the sport, a passion that has continued to this day. The hockey player of the family was certainly my late dad, Paul Kavanagh. A high school hockey star and, (wisely for that era) turning down tryout offers from the New York Rangers and the Boston Bruins in favour of a corporate career, captain of the varsity team at the University of Toronto. Never rising even to the "rep" level, I managed to play on several house league "select" teams as well as being an assistant captain for a couple of seasons. I was fortunate to be on several championship teams in house league, an intermural championship team in my final year of grad school at UBC, and actually quite a number of winning teams in the Chesswood Men's League in Toronto. But I have NEVER been on a team like the '23-'24

season. Legend has it that I was selected next to last in the draft which makes sense as who would want to select an unknown 64 year old player who just moved here that August? Humbly I would say that I managed to fit in pretty well with the calibre of this league, except perhaps for the championship game when because of a shortage of players I had to play the unfamiliar forward position. By definition, thanks to the draft, the team that drafted me, the Canadiens, was not a 'stacked' team. But I don't think that I have ever been with a group of players who were harder working, completely unselfish, and absolutely supportive of each other.

The Canadiens proceeded to go 18 - 0 in the regular season and 5 - 0 in the round robin playoffs leading to the championship game on Sunday April 7th!

The Bruins were our very worthy opponents in the final game. (Unfortunately we were missing a number of players - out of town, other commitments, etc). We scored the first goal after about 5 minutes but the Bruins scored on the very next shift. They then took a 2 -1 lead, we tied it, and then they went back ahead 3 -2 near the end of the first period. Despite a lot of back and forth action the Bruins continued to hold that same lead through much of the second (and final) period. 3 minutes and 45 seconds left in the game their best player (indeed one of the best players in the league) was awarded a penalty shot after being tripped on a breakaway! Pretty much the entire season was on the line here. Our goalie made the save! We managed to tie the game with under two minutes left and then went ahead with less a minute left! With their goalie pulled for an attacker we withstood some furious pressure before scoring into the empty net with 35 seconds left! Final score 5 - 3!

Truly a historic achievement! Hopefully I have a few more years of hockey left but this season was one for the ages. Great bunch of guys and lifelong memories. I would like to salute Andy Staffen and Boston Pizza on Heritage Drive for organizing and supporting this extraordinarily well-run hockey league for TWENTY YEARS. All the players owe Boston Pizza a tremendous debt of gratitude for providing the opportunity for such safe, friendly, and competitive hockey on Sunday mornings for all these years.

Dear Editor and Councillors of Springwater Township,

Some thoughts in reference to the discussion and subsequent endorsement of Simcoe County Council Resolution 2022-263 on April 3, 2024 by Springwater Council. The common thread throughout the Council meeting was that Public Libraries are "lacking in accountability" because they are not under the direct control of the Municipal government nor under the jurisdiction of the Integrity Commissioner.

What I find most intriguing is the failure to acknowledge that Police Services are also governed by a separate Act: The Police Services Act. A municipality's policing service is required to have an independent civilian governance board. Just like the Library Board. Neither the Ombudsman nor the Integrity Commissioner has jurisdiction over Police.

According to Springwater Township's 2024/2025 multi-year budget, approved by Council Dec. 6, 2023, the cost of Police Services (page 180) amounts to \$2,208,554. That figure is slightly double that of Library Services (page 174) at \$1,068,377. Yet there was no mention of any "lack of accountability" regarding police services. Why the double standard? After all both Boards are funded by the taxpayers through the municipality but neither are "directly accountable" to Municipal Council.

Police Services Boards and Public Library Boards were purposely set up as legally, independent Boards to protect basic human rights. In its declaration of principles the Police Services Act states the importance of safeguarding fundamental rights guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms and the Human Rights Code.

The Ontario Public Libraries Act asserts that the core responsibility of public libraries and their Boards is to safeguard and facilitate access to constitutionally protected expressions of knowledge, ideas and opinion. That is why no fee can be imposed for admission to the library or use of materials. The access to information must be equal and universal.

Both of these Boards serve an equally essential function in our democracy. Do you councillors who voted to support Simcoe County Resolution 2022-263 doubt that public libraries are of equal value to police services? I can state unequivocally that the public's free access to information is just as important as our policing system. You see, there cannot be justice without free access to information. I know this firsthand; I spent twenty five years assisting my husband as a researcher. He, recently retired, was a senior criminal defence lawyer.


Now, answer me this: does Ontarians right to free access to information and intellectual freedom deserve less protection from political interfere than the police?

Our past leaders had the wisdom and the foresight to put in place checks and balances to safeguard human rights from political interference. They had learned, through great cost and sacrifice, what can occur when a government threatens the rights of its own citizens and the peoples beyond its border. Unfortunately, it appears that the lessons of the past are being ignored.

The ill-conceived Simcoe County Resolution 2022-263 is nothing less than an attempt to undermine the fundamental human rights of the citizens that you swore to serve.

Deputy Warden/Mayor Jennifer Coughlin; I would like to say that it took courage and depth of character to take a stand in an open forum on public record and admit that you were wrong to support Simcoe County Resolution 2022-263. To put public interest ahead of your own ego is the sign of a true leader. I salute you.

Elmvale is desperate to get a doctor in town. The article on the next page explains this. A part of the issue with the recent doctor who was going to set up practise is the funding structure of the Ontario Government. There is a shortage of doctors. Many rural areas are experiencing the same frustration. The two main ways for a Family Medicine Doctor to get paid is 1. Fee for Service and 2. Family Health Organization. Note there are other models as listed below.

You may need a medical degree to understand that chart and the other methods but I will attempt to simplify the concept. I am not a medical expert but this is my interruption of the information.

Fee for Service is not the best health care as it limits the time a doctor can see a patient and tends to lend to 'one medical issue per appointment'. It is like speed dating but concerns your health care. It does not take total health care to the best level.

Family Health Organization (FHO) does require a whole team of health professionals and that includes three doctors. The big problem is that rural towns do not have the population to support three doctors. It is my opinion that there is no current solution. We need to make noise and let our elected officials know that this issue matters to us and we will bear a tax increase for our health care. That is what is really comes down to ... money. Health Care is not "Free'.

In the article on the next page it is quoted "According to Jensen, the Ontario government received an overwhelming number of applications in its Expression of Interest that closed in 2023." Does that mean there is an overwhelming amount of health professionals that want to setup a practice and can't. There is also an overwhelming number of people without a Doctor. It only makes sences to put our tax dollars in to fixing this unending circle of frustration. Matt Garwood and Mayor Coughlin have both communicated to me that they are working hard to do what they can at municipal level. The responsibility is the Provincial Government.

Province Denies Application for New Family Doctor in Elmvale

Apr 21, 2024 - Working quietly behind the scenes for a couple of months, Springwater Township officials were hoping to announce the arrival of a new doctor in Elmvale at Wednesday's (April 17th) council meeting.

Those plans were scuttled at the last minute when the Ministry of Health denied Dr. Heidi Deboer's application to establish a new family medical practice within the Springwater Health Services Centre at 35 Queen St. West in Elmvale.

"During the notices of motion, the CAO (Jeff Schmidt, chief administrative officer) and I received an email regarding the lease agreement for 35 Queen St. West," said Renee Ainsworth, Springwater Township's clerk, moments before Wednesday's meeting wrapped up. "Unfortunately, the doctor received information from the Ministry of Health where the application has not been approved."

BarrieToday tried multiple times to reach Deboer for comment but was unsuccessful.

Springwater Township Mayor Jennifer Coughlin was not happy with the decision.

"We are disappointed by the Ministry of Health's decision to deny Dr. Deboer's application for a medical office in Elmvale despite the township's efforts to prepare a suitable space," Coughlin said in an email to BarrieToday. "This denial indicates that the ministry is unwilling to be an equal partner in providing the healthcare services our residents require, particularly in underserviced areas."

Matt Garwood, Ward 1 councillor for Springwater Township, said the lack of healthcare services close to home is a topic residents in the region hear far too often.

"I echo residents' frustration with the Ministry of

By Wayne Doyle, Local Journalism Initiative Health's decision not to permit a physician's office opening at the Springwater Health Service Centre in Elmvale," Garwood said. "Springwater has made the commitment to being a partner, I hope the province will work alongside council and staff to resolve this matter and bring additional medical services to Elmvale."

BarrieToday reached out to the Minister of Health, Syliva Jones, to find out why Deboer's application was denied.

"Our government recognizes a key part of our plan to connect Ontarians to the care they need, when they need it is expanding access to primary care," said Hannah Jensen, a spokesperson for Jones, in an email to BarrieToday. "That is why we are investing an initial \$90 million, triple our initial commitment, to launch the largest expansion of interprofessional primary care teams since they were established in Ontario, to bring primary care to communities that need it most.

"This includes investing over \$6 million to teams in Simcoe County to connect over 23,500 people in the region to primary care," Jensen added.

According to Jensen, the Ontario government received an overwhelming number of applications in its Expression of Interest that closed in 2023.

"Ontario Health and the Ministry of Health worked to extensively review applications and determine which proposals were ready to begin connecting more Ontarians to care immediately." she said.

Jensen said the government encourages all unsuccessful applicants to continue to work with their Ontario Health region and the Ministry of Health on innovative action they can take to make it easier to access care in their community.

"We recognize that there is more work to do, and while these teams begin to connect hundreds of

thousands of Ontarians, we remain dedicated to implementing our Your Health plan to further ensure everyone that wants a primary care provider can connect to one," she said.

BarrieToday sent a follow-up request to Jensen asking specifically why Deboer's application was denied?

BarrieToday also asked Jensen to speak directly to the concerns of residents of Elmvale and Springwater Township who were expecting a new family physician to open shop today and won't because Deboer's application was denied?

We received no response to our follow-up questions. According to a report for council prepared by Ainsworth, the township had been working on drafting a lease agreement for the Queen Street space since January.

Council felt having an agreement ready would expedite potential opportunities.

The draft lease agreement was reviewed by council during closed sessions that took place on Feb. 7 and Feb. 21.

Around the same time, the township was approached by Deboer, who was looking to relocate to the Elmvale area.

Deboer currently has a practice in Barrie.

Deboer's proposal was presented to council in closed session during a Feb. 7 special meeting. Lease negotiations also took place in closed session, during special meetings on Feb. 21 and Mar. 20.

Under the terms of the agreement, the township would have covered the cost of rent, telephone/fax and internet services as well as hydro, heat and water. According to Ainsworth's report, those provisions are also provided to LifeLabs and South Georgian Bay Community Health Centre, as part of their lease agreements.



Town of Midland Council Meeting Highlights

Regular Meeting - April 10, 2024

April 16, 2024 - Request to Waive Fees - Georgian Bay Cancer Support Centre

Council received a letter from the Georgian Bay Cancer Support Centre requesting to waive fees to rent the Pickleball courts at Tiffin Park for their upcoming Butter Tart Classic Pickleball Tournament June 7, 8 and 9. Council approved waiving the fee of \$648.02.

Request for Exemption to Alcohol Policy -Midland Lawn Bowling Club

Council received a letter from the Midland Lawn Bowling Club to obtain a special permit to offer the sale of alcohol at their Annual Sandy Mason & Friends Lawn Bowling Charity Day on July 20. Council approved the request.

2023 Year-End Tax Arrears and Tax Adjustments Council approved the 2023 year-end tax adjustments presented in a financial staff report. This annual staff report provides an overview of outstanding property tax accounts and includes tax adjustments for the previous year. Read the staff report. development applications. The new provincial tool^{*} and Town procedure were developed as a result of the More Homes for Everyone Act, 2022 in response to the housing crisis in Ontario. Read the staff report.

Council approved a new Town policy that will help to make access to Town records more available to the public. Depending on the nature of information requested, some requests will still require the public to submit a Freedom of Information request. Read the staff report and policy.

By-Law Review and Prioritization

Council directed staff to review and update existing, or develop new municipal by-laws for the Town of Midland. A staff report provided a list of active bylaws and a list of priority by-laws that will be either updated or created prior to the end of the Council term in 2026. Read the staff report.

Midland Meets with Stakeholders to review NSSRC Funding Options

(April 18, 2024, Midland ON) The Town of Midland hosted a workshop with members of local stakeholder groups on April 15th to discuss funding options for the North Simcoe Sports and Recreation Centre. The workshop, led by an unbiased consultant, resulted in an open and en-gaging session for all. Participants collaborated to brainstorm ideas and explored options to re-duce the financial burden on Midland taxpayers to assist with the deficit to operate the NSSRC.

[°]I'm pleased to say that the Town and our community partners came together for an excellent discussion and I'm confident we'll find a way forward with an affordable outcome for operating the NSSRC

in a sustainable way that benefits our entire North Simcoe community," said Mayor Bill Gordon.

The working group included representatives from various NSSRC user organizations and two neighbouring municipalities, with regrets from Tay and Tiny Townships: Askennonia Seniors Centre, Boys and Girls Club, Midland and Penetanguishene Ball Hockey Association, Midland Lacrosse, Midland Minor Hockey Association (MMHA), North Simcoe Girls Hockey Association (NSGHA), Penetanguishene and Midland Basketball League (PMBL), Town of Penetanguishene, and Township of Springwater.

The working group discussed potential strategies to a

meeting Council's directive to raise \$55,000 in other revenues beyond the general tax levy and the current user fee structure. The group agreed upon several guiding principles for the revenue model including:

• Remaining accessible and affordable to North Simcoe.

• Keeping kids involved in sport.

• Enhancing quality of life and community for North Simcoe.

• Maintaining the importance that the NSSRC is for regional programs.

• Maintaining sports groups utilizing the NSSRC. Staff will return to Council on May 22, 2024, with a report.

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Anten Mills Development Proposal Creates 'Safety Concern'

While generally in favour of a development proposal for Anten Mills, some members of Springwater Township council had concerns about how safe it would be for future residents to get in and out of the development.

Located at 1084 Coughlin Rd., the proposal includes 41 residential lots, one neighbourhood parkette, a stormwater management block, two environmental protection blocks, and two new internal municipal roads accessed via Coughlin Road.

Future residents would have to access and leave the development via the intersection at Coughlin Road and Horseshoe Valley Road.

According to two members of council, that's not an easy task.

"I am very familiar with the property, as everybody is well aware," said Springwater Mayor Jennifer Coughlin, who lives on Coughlin Road, just east of where the development is planned. "As it stands today, turning left off of Coughlin onto Horseshoe Valley Road is basically grip the steering wheel and give 'er.

"It's a safety concern that I do have," she added. "I'm supportive of this, it's always been a part of the settlement area, but that intersection..."

Coun. Danielle Alexander had the same worries.

"I'm not a traffic study expert," she said. "However, living close to that area and often making that turn, from Coughlin Road onto Horseshoe Valley (Road), I would worry with that number of houses going in and making that turn safely."

James Hunter, an associate with Innovative Planning Solutions, acting on behalf of the property owner Joseph Bubel, told council Wednesday night that a traffic impact study done by Tatham Engineering concluded the intersection was safe.

"Tatham reviewed the provincial guidelines for sight lines, turning radiuses and speed limits," Hunter told council. "According to the standards, it's a safe intersection for turning."

The intersection in question sits about 100 metres east of the crest of a hill that rises 36 metres, according to Google's topographic map of the region. The speed limit on Horseshoe Valley Road travelling east to the intersection is reduced to 60 kilometres per hour about 500 to 600 metres before the crest.

Observing traffic at 8:30 a.m. on Friday, it takes between six and seven seconds for a vehicle to travel from the crest of the hill to the intersection. A vehicle travelling 60 km/h moves at 17 metres per second.

Various technical reports say it takes drivers approximately 1.5 seconds to see a hazard and recognize it, called perception time.

Next, it takes a driver approximately one second to physically react, take their foot off the accelerator and put it on the brakes, called reaction time.

This means the total driver reaction time, on average, is 2.5 seconds.

However, distractions and driver inexperience can greatly increase a driver's reaction time.

Notice of Passing of By-law Extending Interim Control By-law 23-044

Date: April 25, 2024

TAKE NOTICE that the Council for the Corporation of the Township of Tiny passed By-law 24-027 on the 8th day of April, 2024 pursuant to Section 38(2) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.13 as amended.

This By-law applies to all properties within the Limited Service Residential (LSR), Shoreline Residential (SR), Greenlands (GL) and Open Space One (OS1) Zones in the Township of Tiny and within 30 metres of the Georgian Bay 178-metre contour.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

THE PURPOSE of the By-law is to amend Interim Control By-law 23-044, as amended, to extend the period of time during which it will be in effect. Section 5 of By-law 23-044, as amended, is further amended to specify that By-law 23-044 shall remain in effect for a period of two (2) years from the date of its enactment. By-law 23-044 was passed May 29, 2023 to provide the Township with the opportunity to undertake a study to review its land use planning policies pertaining to retaining walls, fences, landscaping and structures in proximity to the 178 metre contour elevation of the Georgian Bay Shoreline; and to ensure that any retaining walls, fences, landscaping and structures are appropriately sited and regulated once the study has been completed.

A vehicle that crests the hill will travel about 43 metres prior to the brakes being applied.

Once applied, a vehicle travelling 60 km/h requires 43 metres to come to a stop, on drive pavement, under ideal conditions.

Technically, it appears, there are about 14 metres of grace under ideal conditions.

Those 14 metres disappear if a driver is going 10 km/h above the posted limit, as 70 km/h requires about 100 metres to come to a complete stop.

"I don't see an easy solution to an intersection at the top of the hill that will get busier and busier," the mayor said.

The proposed development consists of approximately 142 acres, with approximately 400 metres of frontage on Coughlin Road and 810 metres of frontage on Horseshoe Valley Road West.

Currently, the land is designated as rural, natural heritage, constraint and hazard land. Additionally, the land is zoned agricultural and environmental protection within the township's zoning bylaw.

The Official Plan amendment seeks to redesignate the land from rural and natural heritage to urban residential and open space to permit residential uses and establish the limits of the abutting natural heritage and constraint land.

The zoning bylaw amendment proposes to rezone the land from the agricultural and environmental protection zones to residential one, open space and revise the limits of the environmental protection zone.

The development is proposed to be serviced by extension of the municipal water system and individual private septic systems.

Township staff will now prepare a recommendation report for council's decision.

Penetanguishene Council Report

Regular Council meeting followed at 7pm, were in the open forum 1 resident participated, bring up concerns regarding traffic calming proposals on 3 local streets. Some of the concerns were that the owner of a vehicle not the drive would receive a fine, the privacy of individuals as their photo and information could be compromised by government overreach. Also, this was not what was promised, more police presence in the community.

Council held a public meeting regarding the draft affordable and sustainable community improvement plan. One individual, provide a concern that the CIP did not include people with disabilities and behavior issues, this concern was noted by council.

Council approved that staff report back with recommendations on the results of the public meeting on the draft affordable and sustainable community

THE EFFECT of By-law 24-027 is that By-law 23-044, as amended, is in effect until May 29, 2025 in order to allow for the completion of the associated study.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal the extension of an interim control bylaw to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT). A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

A notice of appeal setting out the reasons for the appeal, accompanied by payment by certified cheque or money order, made payable to the Ontario Minister of Finance, must be filed with the Clerk of the Township of Tiny by **no later than May 28, 2024.**



Do you remember when your tenth baby was born? I'm gonna go out on a limb here and guess that for most of you that's a solid, "Nope." Maybe your great-grandparents remember their tenth. I remember ours. It was last week. After all, spring is in the air! Birds are laying eggs, baby bunnies are hopping around and my patient wife is delivering babies. At least one baby, anyways. She got in on the spring action by transitioning our seventh daughter, Juniper, from breathing water to breathing air.

Two of my teen daughters are reading a book with me, "Meet Me In The Middle: 10 Critical Conversations You Need To Have With Your Daughter". I think the author was joking when he wrote this line: "Unless you are daughter #7 in a family of 12, your dad doesn't have much experience parenting teenage girls." I told him in an email, "We just had daughter #7 in our family of 12 last week!" By the time baby Juniper is a teenager I will have experienced parenting 6 teenage girls. What could possibly go wrong?

I've had a silent chuckle at the hospital with our last few babies. The nurses always come in babbling after baby's born about bathing babies, breast-feeding babies, and bilirubin. (For a long time I wondered who Billy Ruben was and why we had to check if babies had him. Ask a new mom if you don't know what I'm talking about.) My patient wife has bathed and breast-fed more babies than most women in Canada but she listens quietly with a smile as the well-meaning nurses explain all the do's and dont's of a new baby. I could not let such a thing happen. Somehow I convinced her to use the name, Jacinth, which may or not be an actual name but it's a precious stone and a slight nod to Juniper's dad, yours truly.

So baby Juniper is almost two weeks old now. Everyone is happy and healthy. There's roughly 19 hands reaching for her every time she cries so she's well taken care of. Time flies! Make every moment count! Even the many-daughtered ones.

Brian Millett's Legacy Lives On in Cancer Patients Across the Region During Cancer Awareness Month

Soon after Brian Millett was diagnosed with cancer he realized how fortunate he was. Not because of the diagnosis of course, though his cancer would go on to be treated successfully. But because he could afford to travel from his home in rural Port Severn to Sunnybrook Hospital where his treatment would take place.

Brian's story is not unique. He made the roughly 300-kilometre return trip to Toronto five days a week for over a month. It was long days of travel at a time when he felt at his worst. It was the only option. It's a similar trip to the one that thousands of others have made since. Sadly, it's one that not everyone can afford.

In 2019, Brian and his wife, Anita decided to do something significant to make sure that distance didn't get in the way of others accessing cancer treatment. On their 60th wedding anniversary, they took the money they had set aside for a trip, and created the GAP (Gas, Accommodations, and Parking) Fund with the Georgian Bay Cancer Support Centre, and it has helped countless people since.

The fund is available to support individuals who are fighting cancer with the cost of transportation to out of town appointments, hospital parking, and, in many cases, even overnight accommodations near the hospital.

"We know what it's like facing those costs to get treatments," noted Brian. "We set up this fund to help other people."

These costs, which Brian understood all to well, can add up to thousands of dollars. For most people living in North Simcoe and South Georgian Bay, a cancer diagnosis means regular treatment in either Barrie or Toronto. It may be a visit to RVH every few months, followed by regular follow-up or, like in Brian's case, it may be daily radiation for weeks at a time, along with a range of other treatments over months or even years. All this while likely not receiving regular income outside of a pension or employment insurance, if anything at all.

Sadly, on June 26 of last year, and unrelated to his previous fight with cancer, Brian passed away. Now, almost a year after his passing, his legacy grows. The Georgian Bay Cancer Support Centre's Board of Directors recently passed a motion to officially dedicate the fund as The Brian and Anita Millett GAP Fund. Thanks to the generosity of Brian and Anita's daughter, Donna, her husband Conrad, and Anita herself, all donations made toward the fund beginning in April will be matched, up to \$21,000.

On March 16th, 2024, the Liberal government tabled their Federal Budget in the House of Commons.

Ahead of the 2024 Budget, my Conservative colleagues and I proposed three simple directives to fix the budget:

1. Axe the Tax on Farmers and Food: Immediately pass Bill C-234 in its original form to alleviate financial strain on farmers and the food industry.

2. Build Homes, Not Bureaucracy: Ensure that cities permit 15% more home building each year as a condition for receiving federal infrastructure funding.

3. Cap Spending: Introduce a dollar-for-dollar rule, requiring the government to find a dollar in savings for every new dollar of spending.

Unfortunately, the Liberal government ignored Conservative calls to cap spending and this year's budget will include nearly \$40 billion in new inflationary spending. To make matters worse, this year, Canada will pay \$54.1 billion in interest on the Liberal government's debt. This is more money than the government is sending the provinces for health care.

Every day, I hear from residents in our community who are struggling to make ends meet throughout this affordability crisis. Much of this is made worse by the Liberal government's punitive carbon tax, which further drives up the cost of gas, home heating, and groceries.

Conservatives were clear - we would not support the Liberal government's budget if it did not axe the tax, build the homes, and fix the budget. That is why my Conservative colleagues and I will be voting against this inflationary budget, which does nothing to bring down costs for Canadians who are struggling.



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


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Revolution Repair and Performance U13 LL2 Finish Their Season Off Strong

Elmvale Cat Rescue and Feline Fix Need Your Empties

Apr. 19, 2024 - The Communication Officer for the non-profit cat rescue called Feline Fix Barrie. Their mandate is to reduce the community cat population through spaying and neutering feral cats.

The Elmvale Cat Rescue was struggling to get their colony fixed to prevent more kittens from being born. Feline Fix offered help and, since Sept. 20, 2023, they have trapped 30 adults and 17 kittens. There are still two adults left to get, and they are very smart. Two cats have already found their forever homes, and there are 13 cats in foster care being socialized so that they, too, can find their forever homes.

The expense of the above work is huge. It was necessary, though, or that colony would have exploded because the Elmvale Cat Rescue couldn't afford to fix any of the cats. Feline Fix Barrie does a lot of fundraising, but we still have a very large bill for this colony left to pay.

They hope to hold an "empties" drive in Elmvale town to raise some money, plus we will be a vendor at the Elmvale Maple Syrup Festival later this month. They sell vegan leather wallets/purses, as well as funky socks and some items made by volunteers. All monies raised will go toward paying down the bill last, very smart kitties.

for the Elmvale spays/neuters and other surgeries. A number of the cats have required dental surgeries.

When the community learns about the number of cats that have been taken out of the colony and the number that remain but that have been fixed, perhaps they will consider dropping off empties, visiting us at the Maple Syrup Festival, and/or making a donation to Feline Fix Barrie to help them with the bill.

The colony is located behind the Corner Cut Salon owned by Janice Minnings.

Local residents Dar McLean (main colony feeder) and Linda Wasitis (wanted to help the colony and joined our rescue) have been helping us:

• Dar made a quilt, a Christmas wall hanging and a door welcome snowman that we raffled off to raise funds. Finally, Dar offered to foster the last cat that was trapped, a huge help because it is hard to find someone willing to foster a scared cat.

• Dar and Linda helped trap the cats and transport them to Barrie for vetting.

Our main trapper from our rescue is Kelly Collard. We have tried trapping the final two grey cats with two types of traps - neither worked. We have set up a 4 x 8 ft. trap that Feline Fix made years ago to get a sick feral. We are hoping this will work to get the

EMBRACE THE FRESHNESS OF SPRING WITH VIBRANT BEET BORSCHT!

As we bid farewell to heavy winter fare, now is the perfect time to infuse your meals with fresh, seasonal flavours. Laden with the nutrient-rich beets, carrots and cabbage, this soup not

only awakens the taste buds, but also nourishes the body. Served hot or cold and with a generous dollop of sour cream or Greek yogurt, this spring- inspired recipe is delish, flavourful and nutritious.

INGREDIENTS

• 1 large onion, finely chopped

• 2 cloves garlic, minced or ½ teaspoon (2.5 ml) garlic powder

- 1 ½ tablespoons (23 ml) olive oil
- 6 medium sized beets, peeled and grated
- 3 medium carrots, peeled and grated
- 1 ½ cups (375 ml) shredded cabbage
- 4 cups (1000ml) vegetable broth
- 3 cups (750 ml) water
- 3 tablespoons (45 ml) tomato paste
- 2 ¹/₂ tablespoons (38 ml) apple cider or rice vinegar

The Ardagh Bluffs protected area is found between Ardagh Road and Mapleview Drive. Parking is located at the Peggy Hill Community Centre, or if you are lucky enough to have a friend who lives nearby, there are several access points located at the end of the cul-de-sacs. The seven main trails are well marked and easy to follow and maintained by the city, with several side trails as well. I had no idea of our route, as I was following and not leading, a rarity to me. A nice change, as usually I am on my own in new areas and need to stay alert for trail changes and directions.



At 7:30 in the community centre, the Anten Mills Community Recreation Association will be holding the required General Annual Meeting. This is the opportunity for our community to come and discuss the recreation and social activities that happen in the village. Did you enjoy the Easter Eggstravaganza? How about the Christmas in the Village weekend? Knotty Knitters or Thursday night euchre? Want to play pickleball or corn hole? Do you remember the Family Fun Day or the summer movie nights? These are all events that the Anten Mills CRA runs through the volunteers like you who step forward. At the meeting volunteers will also step up to conduct the duties required by the municipality and the more who participate the easier it is. Be part of the future activities of the community and attend the meeting and learn more about the successes and what has been planned for the upcoming year. 7:30 PM at the community centre, no one is too young or too old to be part so see you there.

Back to May flowers for a moment. The anniversary garden planted in 2021 has bloomed and grown greatly since being planted. The gardens were purposely left with the stalks and stems and leaves over the fall to permit the insects that hibernate in them the opportunity to overwinter. The garden is a community project and is not looked after by the township. The gardens need to be cleaned up now and your participation is appreciated. If you are not sure and would like some direction, feel free to reach out to the CRA members or myself and let's get the garden looking great for the coming year.

May is also No Mow month. The purpose is to again allow the insects who are hibernating the opportunity

to get some nourishment as they wake up from the winter. There are some mixed reviews as to whether it is actually worthwhile but the anniversary garden certainly is helpful due to the native plants that are planted.

There are a couple of developments that the community might take an interest in. First, if you have traveled down Wilson you may have noticed poles installed in the new subdivision where work on houses has not begun. The poles are apparently for temporary hydro service so when construction begins, there is hydro. Next on the list is along Nursery Road. At the Council meeting last week there was a request from the developer for an extension to the draft plan approval. This is an addition to the industrial subdivision that is accessible from County Road 27 and is known as the Bertram Industrial Parkway area. The plan was approved in 2019 and calls for 8 more industrial lots as well as the interior road coming out onto Nursery Road. The third and last development was the public meeting for a new residential subdivision along Coughlin Road and Horseshoe Valley Road. The proposal is for 42 new residential lots of varying sizes along with a parkett and stormwater management pond. There are two internal roads both existing onto Coughlin Road and the area will be serviced by the municipal water system. Media reports indicate that there are concerns about the intersection of Coughlin and Horseshoe due to sightlines and the number of vehicles that would be turning onto Horseshoe. Traffic engineering information apparently has been applied indicating that the intersection would be safe as is. As circulation of the public meeting is determined by distance, most in the community would not be aware of this proposal. A report from the planning department will be forthcoming. For details on the industrial subdivision or the Coughlin Road development, they can be seen on the Township of Springwater website under agendas for April 17.

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Classic Car Totaled During Impaired Driving Incident

Apr. 23, 2024 - (TINY TOWNSHIP, ON) A driver is facing impaired charges after the classic car they were operating left the roadway and struck a group of trees in Tiny Township last evening.



Township of Tiny Issues Reminder About Waterfront Structures/Boat Lifts

Submitted by Township of Tiny April 15, 2024 - The Township of Tiny would like to remind the public that waterfront structures such as boat lifts on the lakebed are regulated under Provincial law and are not permitted in front of any municipally owned properties.

The placement of waterfront structures on the lakebed is regulated by the Public Lands Act (PLA) and by Ontario Regulation 161/17 (O.Reg. 161/17) of the PLA. O. Reg 161/17 of the PLA speaks to persons who are permitted to occupy Crown land without having occupational authority. In general, boat lifts and other waterfront structures can be placed in the water provided they meet certain requirements; one of which is the person must own or occupy the waterfront property or have permission from the waterfront property owner. The Township of Tiny will not permit or authorize any boat lifts or other in water structures installed in front of any municipally owned properties which includes but is not limited to properties, beaches, road allowances or access

If the boat lifts are fronting municipal owned beaches and the municipally has not given permission for these structures, then these may be considered unauthorized

occupations under O. Reg. 161/17 and will be removed at the owner's expense.
