# **30<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL GOLF TOURNAMENT** RAISES <sup>\$</sup>13,600 FOR GRIEVING CHILDREN

September 10, 2024 - Golf enthusiasts and community supporters gathered for the highly anticipated Will Marshall Charity Golf Tournament on September 8, 2024, a fun event dedicated to raising funds for Seasons Centre for Grieving Children.

Originally the former owner of Orr Lake Golf Club (Tom Crowe) approached Will Marshall about running a golf tournament. A previous tournament event ended and Will stepped in to fill the gap in 1994. After seven years in 2001, Will decided to support a local charity, Seasons Centre for Grieving Children. He wanted to support a charity that received no public funding, supported children and families.

This year the tournament raised a little more than \$13,600 while the first year it raised \$1,500. Over the last 23 years Will Marshall Insurance has raised an

# Statement by David Evans, Mayor of the Township of Tiny, on the 2024 AMO Conference

(Tiny, Ontario) The following statement was issued by Mayor David Evans regarding the Township of Tiny's attendance at the 2024 AMO Conference: "Recently Council had the opportunity to attend the 2024 Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) Conference in Ottawa, held from August 18 - 21, 2024. Council was able to connect with other municipalities to share challenges and ideas on common issues many of us share. We also had two very successful delegations with two Ministers and their staff regarding settlement boundaries and septage management.

Delegation on Development of Settlement Areas with the Honourable Paul Calandra, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing This delegation focused on the Township of Tiny's advocacy to expand Township Settlement Area boundaries in controlled and sustainable ways and the provincial policies that constrain this.

Following our delegation, the Provincial Government announced the new Provincial Planning Statement that provides more flexibility for municipalities to make these changes, including the ability to consider Settlement Area boundary expansions at any time. We are hopeful to see these changes implemented in the County of Simcoe Official Plan as soon as possible to allow the township to address the demand for more land for housing for current and future residents.

Delegation on Septage Management in the Township of Tiny and Simcoe North with the Honourable Kinga Surma, Minister of Infrastructure We were able to discuss septage management in Tiny with Minister Surma and her staff. Currently, the township relies on Ministry of Environmentapproved field spreading and neighbouring municipalities with wastewater treatment facilities. The Township of Tiny invited the Town of Midland to join our delegation, as septage was previously accepted by our neighbours. However, Midland's wastewater treatment facility requires upgrades to resume accepting septage from other municipalities. Minister Surma provided positive feedback and informed us of potential funding opportunities that the Township of Tiny will pursue, in collaboration with the Town of Midland, that address both treated and untreated sewage and eliminates the application of untreated sewage in Tiny".

# Midland's infrastructure wins and woes could mean 6% tax hike

Sept. 05, 2024 Before the municipal budget and even the draft budget are addressed later this year, there is the budget overlook through which Midland council had their first look into a projected 6% blended tax rate increase along with 4% water and 5% wastewater increases.

During the recent regular meeting of council, the 2025 budget outlook was presented from the corporate services and finance department, with keen looks toward what cuts could be made when the draft budget is presented later this year.

Initial questions from Coun. Catherine MacDonald included the reasoning behind OPP billing at an estimated \$190,000 (or 0.7%) tax rate increase, which CFO Lindsay Barron explained was due to the costs going up as did the town's costs. Another question regarded the revenue of parking, which was downplayed in expectation of a future report.

However, the biggest focus was laid upon last week's \$30.1 million funding injection by the province through the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund toward Midland's infrastructure, and how it would impact future growth. MacDonald asked Barron how the amount would alter the upcoming budget. Barron explained that although the \$30.1 million would go toward capital budget projects, as funded from water and wastewater user-based rates, modelling on the finances that typically take place in autumn hadn't been calculated as of yet.

Coun. Bill Meridis took the projected 6% blended tax rate to task through the listed budget drivers, acknowledging that elements couldn't be controlled by council such as labour and benefits (\$400,000) or the phase-in of firefighting staff (\$115,000).

Directly into the asset management was a listed 3% (\$810,000) increase to capital reserves; on further scrutiny from Meridis, Barron shared that the previous two years had achieved roughly 2.6% toward the annual contribution to infrastructure.

Later in the meeting, Meridis attempted to introduce a 2.5% tax rate increase target for staff to aim for in the draft budget, but was met with full opposition by the rest of council who provided comments that staff would do their best regardless and that council would be the ones ultimately adding or subtracting when it came time; his notice of motion was defeated.

As Mayor Bill Gordon shared his thoughts on the matter, his comments reflected the disruptive water main break and boiled water advisory which had impacted the town and local factories the week prior, and how aging infrastructure was being handled by municipalities across the province.

"When we look at things like the water main collapse that we had that drained the entire water tower in like an hour and a half," said Gordon, "that pipe is still sitting there half-patched, and it could break another 15 or 20 feet down the way; it's just the same old pipe. So that thing's going to need relining or whatever hocus-pocus the engineers come up with for this.

"This injection of \$30.1 million which is an absolute record for a community our size – Mississaugas and Bramptons, places like that, and Midland got the same amount of money – it really is an amazing injection of cash for projects that we otherwise (would have difficulty to initiate)," said Gordon.

Gordon reiterated explosive growth as the primary focus for council to keep in mind as "the north star", for which the infrastructure grant would allow 3,000 homes to be built in addition to the estimated 4,000-to-5,000 homes already in the development process.

"This is our way out of this financial hole we're in where our costs have gone up, with everyone else at the same pace, and we haven't been able to spread those costs around to more people because we've been a low-growth/no-growth/stagnated-growth community for decades.

"We're on the cusp of being, with this one grant, increasing our tax base by 15 per cent," Gordon said. He additionally called a 2.5-to-3 per cent increase "just unrealistic to expect" but added: "I am hopeful that when we get our draft, that it's going to look a little different than this."

As a final note, Gordon implored residents to take the 2025 budget survey to provide views and suggestions on the municipality's needs and priorities.

# MRI funding a county issue, warns Rawson of 'a slippery slope'

Aug 26, 2024 - It has been often said that there is only one taxpayer when considering where and how municipal tax dollars go, and funding the upcoming MRI machine at Georgian Bay General Hospital prompted such a discussion at the recent Penetanguishene committee of the whole meeting. In July, ground was broken at Georgian Bay General Hospital in anticipation for an expansion to its facility that would house a new magnetic resonance imaging unit, anticipated to open in early 2025. Coun. Dan La Rose provided a Simcoe County council update to Penetanguishene committee of the whole recently, whereupon he informed members about a \$1.2 million allocation provided by the county toward the MRI. "We got a tour of what was going on and they said they would be open for business in February, taking the first patient," said La Rose. "The only bad part about it was they said they had 4,000 people registered." A finance and corporate services report later in the meeting addressed funding options for the MRI addition, with a recommendation that Penetanguishene council do nothing; the rationale being that the County of Simcoe Hospital Alliance provided funding to hospitals through a regional approach more beneficial than through upper or lower tier funding.

she would support an option to provide a \$25,000 pledge to the MRI machine, and asking staff if they had explored neighbouring municipalities having put lower-tier contributions to the project. "To not do anything is really a hard one to swallow," said Marchand, relating an anecdote of a family member relying on the hospital during her time as a board member. "It really takes a village and community to responsibility paying – the town residents shouldn't be paying for policing costs at the jail. "We've been paying north of a million dollars over the past few years for that institution that's not our responsibility; I don't know why we're allowing them to get away with that," Rawson said.

Also supporting the staff option to do nothing was Coun. Bill Waters with reasons coming from seeing a nearby soup kitchen visited by "hundreds of people going in there every Tuesday and Thursday". "We have a lot of people in this town that are struggling financially, and I don't think it's fair that we ask them to mandatorily have to give up money for an MRI," said Waters, who added that private donations would be better suited to pay for the project. "We have people in this town that are earning upwards \$100,000 to \$400,000; they can afford to give it," Waters said. "We shouldn't be asking the guy that's making \$20,000 a year to have to pony up on his tax bill for it." Conluding the remarks was Coun. George Vadeboncoeur, providing history that mechanisms were put into place years ago for the county levy to allocate funds rather than having regional health facilities make multiple municipal requests for capital contributions. With that, the committee of the whole approved the staff recommendation to let MRI funding be handled through the upper tier County of Simcoe Hospital Alliance. The GBGH MRI funding options report can be located on the agenda page of the Town of Penetanguishene website.

Coun. Suzanne Marchand raised issue with the report recommendation to do nothing, stating

have these kinds of services, and this is not a light and small project."

Director of finance/treasurer Carrie Robillard explained staff had not looked into funding by other municipalities because there were "no parameters within the town policies for me to recommend anything other than that (the staff recommendation); really it is definitely a council decision."

Mayor Doug Rawson cautioned that having Penetanguishene residents fund the project through municipal tax dollars could be "a slippery slope", as Simcoe County was in charge of funding allocation. "I think it's important that we let them lead that charge," said Rawson. "My other concern here is... about encroachment of responsibility," he added before offering insight on how the town would be delegating at the 2024 Association of Municipalities of Ontario conference regarding policing costs for the Central North Correctional Centre, and its cost put upon the Penetanguishene taxpayer. "We're probably going to be in about our seventh delegation asking for the province to make us whole for our policing costs at the superjail," Rawson stated. "I would argue, and we all would agree, that's not our

# Tay Township's Inaugural Mayor's Charity Golf Tournament 'Tee Off With Tay' raises \$68,000

Tay, Ontario – The community came together in full force for the inaugural Mayor's Charity Golf Tournament, "Tee Off With Tay," held on Friday, August 16, 2024, at the Midland Golf & Country Club. The event proved to be a tremendous success, raising \$68,000 to support vital community initiatives.

Proceeds from the tournament will go towards multiple community initiatives, including:

# PAID 'VOLUNTEER' FIREFIGHTER DROUGHT **CREATING ANGST LOCALLY**

Sep 03, 2024 In Tiny Township, just one applicant has put their name in to become a volunteer firefighter according to the municipal fire department; Tay Township has just three applicants.

The comment and request for more applicants came during a promotion for the upcoming information sessions of five North Simcoe fire departments at the recent Tiny Township council meeting. At 7 p.m. Wednesday at the Wyevale fire station, located at 817 County Road 6 South, the first of two joint information sessions will be held to provide interested members of the community an opportunity to learn more about what it takes to become a volunteer firefighter. According to Tiny Township emergency services director/fire chief Dave Flewelling, "Tay could use in the range of 12 new hires and we in Tiny could hire 18 currently." "We train new hires from the ground up. New hires will finish their training with the same certifications as a career firefighter. Great people, a sense of pride and fun serving your community." From the recent council meeting, Mayor Dave Evans gave high praise for those dedicating their time to help out their fellow residents. "We applaud and commend the efforts another reason why he continued to perform the of these over-100 volunteers that we have in our township, that take time from their regular schedules at the worst time," said Evans. "The role that these people play in our community - men and women - is essential, integral, and is the ultimate form of giving." Coun. Steffen Walma, a member of the Tiny Township fire department, extended appreciation for the praise on behalf of the department. "Currently in Tiny Township, we have one application to become a new firefighter within the township," Walma stated. "We always struggle with recruitment; retentions are issues with (personnel at) new volunteer fire departments. Some of it is because it is a big commitment but some of it is also, I think, a lack of knowledge of what the position is and entails. "When I started, I knew zero – absolutely nothing - about firefighting. Tiny Township fire department will train you from the ground up. As long as you have a high school degree (and live within 15 minutes of a fire hall), we want you," Walma said. In his pitch, Walma noted that probationary firefighters are compensated at approximately \$16-per-hour with first-class firefighters compensated for \$22-per-hour, although there are no regular hours. He added that the social aspect of making life-long friends was

volunteer position. "If you have even thought about it remotely for a second, please reach out," said Walma.

While there was a comment from Evans that age could be a concern, Walma humourously countered: "You made the comment that your firefighting days may be done, but we want people on the trucks until they're 65; so you could still come out." The second information session will be held at the Midland fire hall at 550 Bayshore Drive on Saturday, September 14 at 9 a.m. North Simcoe's five fire departments include Midland, Penetanguishene, and the townships of Georgian Bay, Tay and Tiny. Application deadlines for the volunteer positions will conclude at 4 p.m. on September 27.

On October 10 at 7 p.m., an aptitude appraisal is scheduled to be conducted at the Tay Township Station 2, located at 2201 Old Fort Road. A physical testing by appointment will occur on October 26 at the Tiny Township Station 2 in Wyevale at 817 County Road 6 South. "This investment in the expansion of post-stroke rehabilitation is one more way we are connecting people to the care they need, to get more people back to doing what matters most to them."

This funding is part of an additional \$15 million the Ontario government is investing to help health service providers across the province expand their CSR services and connect an additional 1,400 people to the care they need.

# The Town of Penetanguishene is excited to announce the introduction of the All-Terrain Vehicles (ATVs) and Off-Road Vehicles (ORVs) Pilot Program starting September 1, 2024, until September 30, 2025.

Submitted by Town of Penetanguishene Aug. 28, 2024 - This Pilot Program is a community idea that Council approved based on results from several public surveys and consultations which highlighted a strong support from our local residents.

"This initiative is another way that we are showing our community that we are following our strategic plan specifically by continuing to think regionally and work with neighbouring communities to provide shared active lifestyles and tourism opportunities," said Mayor Rawson. "The consultations and surveys were just one way we heard from the public that they were in support of this project, and we are thrilled to have it launch this year."

All ATV and ORV users are responsible for reading and understanding the approved bylaw to ensure they are familiar with the rules and regulations. A few key points have been outlined below.

• This Pilot Program will be effective from September 1, 2024, to September 30, 2025.

• All licensed ATVs and ORVs are allowed on all municipal roads only in the Town of Penetanguishene.

• Users are required to follow the Highway Traffic Act and the Off-Road Vehicles Act and related Regulations that will be enforced by the OPP. Users are reminded that speed regulations are reduced for ATV and ORV operators

• ATVs and ORVs are not permitted in any Town or County parks and/or trails.

ATVs and ORVs are a popular way to explore the great outdoors, but they also come with inherent risks. To ensure a safe and enjoyable experience, we encourage everyone to follow these

1. Wear Proper Gear: Always wear a DOTapproved helmet, along with goggles, gloves, long sleeves, and sturdy footwear. Proper gear can significantly reduce the risk of injury in the event of an accident.

2. Know Your Vehicle: Familiarize yourself with your ATVs and ORVs controls and handling characteristics. Read the manufacturer's manual and understand how to operate your vehicle safely. 3. Ride Sober: Never operate an ATV or ORV under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Impairment dramatically increases the risk of accidents and injuries.

By prioritizing safety and responsible riding practices, we can enjoy the thrill of adventures while minimizing the risk of accidents. Let's make this Pilot Program safe and fun for everyone, understanding that if we are not good stewards the Pilot Program will risk not being permanent.

Over the summer, I've heard from countless residents who are concerned about the nation-wide shortage of doctors, nurses, and other healthcare professionals and the lack of access to primary care.

The Liberal government promised to hire 7,500 new doctors and nurses, but the results speak for themselves. Canadians are spending more time in emergency wait rooms than ever before.

Wait times for specialist treatment have surged to the longest in nearly 30 years and the Liberal government is now spending more on interest payments for the national debt than on health care transfers.

## August 26/24

Here we are, in beautiful Ireland, driving through heavy traffic with crazy and reckless drivers veering across lanes, and tall skyscrapers popping up everywhere. Oh, wait, that was driving in Toronto! Instead, our drive through Dublin was relaxing, with our driver making sure to take the scenic route to point out the Dublin Zoo and fantastic Pheonix gardens. Before you ask, yes, it was a flat rate, so those great detours did not cost more. Our driver was obviously proud of his city, and with good reason. After checking in at our hotel we went back to see more of those impressively large Pheonix gardens, being the largest enclosed city park in Europe at 1,750 acres. This is a stunning park, with paved walking trails, ponds, sports fields, the president's residence and even an obelisk. I would come back just to see more of this park.

My mom and I had an early start the next day for the first train section of our trip. I was happily surprised to find out that our hotel offered a bagged breakfast of juice, muffin, banana and other items to those travellers leaving early. A short walk to the local train station to find our guide, and there we were, travelling across the south of Ireland in a train, and it is exactly like the photos, with bright green fields, green forests and green sheep. Ok, maybe the sheep were white, but everything else is a vibrant green. Once in Cork we transferred to a coach and headed out to the historic Blarney Castle, and yes, the Blarney Stone, which is found after climbing one hundred small and slippery rock stairs to the top of the castle, and leaning over, backwards, over a long drop to kiss that same stone. Well hell no! I did climb those stairs, assumed the position, but when told to tilt my head back and lean down into that abyss, nope. Shout out to my 75-year-old mom who has no fear of heights and gave that Blarney Stone a big old smooch!

There is no room here for me to describe our entire trip, as we saw and experienced so much. We traveled

around the Ring of Kerry, along narrow roads looking down on picturesque seaside villages and through the Killarney National Park which I would love to see more of. We also toured Limerick, Bunratty Castle and stood atop the famous Cliffs of Moher. At just over 700 feet, these magnificent cliffs look out over the Atlantic Ocean and are comprised of layers of silt and sandstone. Yes, my readers, I walked along those cliffs and for some reason felt no fear. There is a chest high wall, lined with wildflowers and grass and a wind that would sweep you away if you let it. From here we traveled to Galway and out to one of my favourite areas, the Aran Islands. This is a land of stone walls, rocks and no trees, yet for all its barrenness this is a wild and beautiful area and has the bonus of less tourists. There is a peace here, in the

While I loved the Aran Island, the area of Ireland that captivated my heart was Connemara, an area of mountains, lochs and forests. Kylemore Abbey is a nineteenth-century castle now run by Benedictine nuns who offer a fabulous array of pottery and food items. The castle is nestled down between grey green mountains and on the banks of a still and dark loch. Waterfalls

cascade down the granite cliff faces and tumble across black rocks towards that dark loch. All along the west coast of Ireland are hiking trials including many multiday hikes. Bucket list indeed.

Our final destination was through Belfast and northward to the Giants Causeway. There are no photos that do this site justification. There is a stunning vista out and over the rugged coastline, as waves crash against the black rocks and the unusual rock formations that make this area Irelands only World Heritage Site. A truly stunning area but one that is also heavy with tourists. On the train back to Dublin, a spectacular rainbow appeared out the train window. A lovely way to end our trip.

- ¼ cup (63 ml) vegetable oil or melted coconut oil
- 2 teaspoons (10 ml) vanilla extract
- 2/3 cup (167 ml) maple syrup or packed brown sugar
- 2/3 cup (167 ml) cocoa powder
- 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoons (7.5 ml) baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon (1.25 ml) salt
- 2/3 cup (167 ml) dark or semi-sweet chocolate chips

# INSTRUCTIONS

1. Preheat the oven to 350 F (180 C).

2. Lightly grease or line an 8 x 8 inch (20 x 20 cm) square pan with parchment paper.

3. If using the flaxseed egg substitute, combine the ground flaxseed and water in a small bowl and let sit for 10 minutes).

4. Combine in a blender or food processor until smooth the black beans, eggs or flaxseed egg substitute, oil, vanilla extract, maple syrup or brown sugar, cocoa powder, baking powder and salt.

5. Pour the batter into the greased or lined square pan.

6. Sprinkle the chocolate chips evenly on top of the batter.

7. Bake the brownies for 25-30 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean from the centre of the pan.8. Let cool and cut into squares.

• ATVs and ORVs are not permitted in any Town or County parks and/or trails.

# *'Fantastic idea':* Anten Mills hall could be in line for makeover

Sep 06, 2024 - While the members of Springwater Township council agree that the Anten Mills Community Centre is historically and culturally important, they remain divided on how best to deal with its inevitable restoration.

At Wednesday night's council meeting, Coun. Matt Garwood, a member of the cultural and heritage committee, presented a proposal from the committee that requests the township receive for information a request for restoration of designated heritage attributes at the centre, located in the heart of the community 15 minutes north of Barrie. "The request is seeking a few key items, including inspecting the bell tower and making it workable, restoring the ceiling, installing replica lighting in the space and focusing on the flooring as well, moving forward, to bring the space back to the period it was created," Garwood said. "The goal here is to showcase and highlight what made this, the Anten Mills Community Centre, a heritage property. "I think it's a fantastic idea, one that I supported at our committee and one that I'm happy to speak to today," he added.

According to Garwood, there are three stages to the plan. The first stage is to research the costs associated with the restoration. The second stage is to conduct the necessary reviews and assessments and report back to council with options and total costs associated with restoring the centre. Stage three would be the approval of the project and moving forward with the project itself. "I definitely think it's our responsibility to maintain these buildings within our municipality," said Coun. Phil Fisher. "Particularly those that are designated heritage buildings."

Fisher said he liked Garwood's approach. "Going out and looking at costs first and then bringing it back, I do like that," Fisher said. "If we're looking at an itemized cost list of what it would be, I would definitely think that that's a very smart approach and allows us, as a council, to pick and choose, maybe get our best deal in terms of maintaining it."

While Deputy Mayor George Cabral is not opposed to having work done on the Anten Mills Community Centre — he thinks all of the heritage properties should be reviewed for potential repairs — he did express concerns about doing restoration work on a building that received its heritage designation only three years ago and the impact a working bell tower would have on the community. "The one piece I question is restoring things that weren't already there in the initial period when it was designated as a heritage building," Cabral said. "However, I also have to wonder whether or not everybody in Anten Mills would be wanting a bell ringing in the bell tower if it was actually made operational. "I could be 100 per cent wrong and they might love the idea," he added.

While she said she couldn't speak for everybody in Anten Mills, Springwater Mayor Jennifer Coughlin, who lives across the road from the community centre, said she would look forward to hearing the bell chime. "It's something uniquely special to Anten Mills," Coughlin said. "And I think there are a lot of generational families in the area, but also a lot of new families, who gather there." A recent trip to Europe has reinforced her commitment to heritage and culture and the value it holds. "The attention and dedication that the European cities pay to holding on to what was and making sure that's available to generations to come was an overwhelming experience," she said. "I think investing in our heritage and our culture, opportunities that however they come to us, I think that we need to embrace them," the mayor added. "I think doing the due diligence, as Coun. Garwood pointed out, step-by-step, and not just jumping right to the final, is a good first step. "I think, building by building, I'm hopeful that we can restore and enhance our heritage through our buildings." Garwood offered an amendment to the original motion. "The motion now before council be amended as follows: and that council direct staff to obtain quotes from qualified contractors to undertake the proposed works and report back to council prior to the 2025 budget deliberations." The amendment was seconded by Coun. Brad Thompson and was carried. The main motion, as amended, was also carried.

#### Traffic Stop Leads OPP to Drugs and Weapons Seizure in Midland, Midland Resident Charged

Seizure in Midland, Midland Resident Charged (MIDLAND,ON) - A traffic stop by police of a speeding Dodge Dart on Yonge Street, Midland has resulted in the seizure of a considerable amount of street drugs, Canadian currency and weapons resulting in criminal charges for a Midland resident. Two members of the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment conducted the vehicle stop at approximately 8:16 p.m. August 28, 2024 resulting in the officers entering into a Highway Traffic Act investigation. During the course of this investigation, the officers entered into Controlled Drug and Substances Act (CDSA) investigation resulting the seizure of substances that appear to be Methamphetamine, Oxycodone, Heroin, Psilocybin and Cocaine along with drug paraphernalia. Also seized was a imitation .45 caliber BB pistol during this investigation. (see attached photograph)

Midland Residential Fire Claims Life of Homeowner



(MIDLAND, ON) - An early morning fire on Barnett Avenue, Midland has claimed the life of a Midland resident. Members of the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment responded at approximately 6:27 a.m. September 1, 2024 along with Midland Fire Service and County of Simcoe Paramedics after neighbours noticed a fire at a nearby home and forced in the front door and called 911.

A 39 year old male who was later confirmed to be the resident of the home was located in the area of attached garage to the single story detached bungalow and was triaged and transported to an area hospital by paramedics where he was pronounced deceased by medical staff.

Although there are no signs of foul play, the ongoing investigation is being conducted by officials from The Office of the Fire Marshal (OFM) and a post mortem will be conducted by the Office of the Chief Coroner and the Ontario Forensic Pathology Service. at a future date, all in an effort to determine the cause of the fire and death.

# PEDESTRIAN INJURED IN FAIL TO REMAIN COLLISION

(Wasaga Beach, ON) - A motor vehicle collision that took place on 68th Street North near Shore Lane in the Town of Wasaga Beach, in the morning hours of September 1st 2024. At approximately 5:30 a.m. a group of pedestrians were walking on 68th Street North when a southbound black pick-up truck struck one of the pedestrians before fleeing the scene. The pedestrian, a 57-year-old male from Wasaga Beach, suffered serious injuries and has been airlifted by Air Orange to a Toronto area hospital for treatment. Investigators believe that the involved vehicle may be a black Dodge RAM with front-end damage possibly including a broken window.
