

The 1st Annual Women's International day was the brainchild of Cathy Tait of the SGB Chamber who contacted Lois Irvine of North Simcoe Community Futures Development Corporation to immobilize the movement for the local community. They wanted a local initiative to recognize the day and realized there was a hole for this kind of event. It was a great success so the planning began for the 2nd Annual event.

International Women's Day has its roots in the early 20th century labor and women's rights movements. The first National Women's Day was observed in the United States in 1909, following a declaration by the Socialist Party of America. In 1910, at the International Socialist Women's Conference in Copenhagen, German activist Clara Zetkin proposed the idea of an international day to advocate for women's rights, which was embraced by various countries. The first official International Women's Day was celebrated in 1911 in Austria, Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland.

Over the years, IWD has gained global recognition, and in 1977, the United Nations officially marked March 8th as a day for women's rights and world peace. Since then, governments, organizations, and individuals worldwide have used this day to highlight gender-based issues, promote women's achievements, and push for systemic change.

While significant progress has been made in the fight for gender equality, challenges remain. Women continue to face barriers in employment, education, healthcare, and political representation. Issues such as the gender pay gap, gender-based violence, and lack of access to leadership roles persist in many parts of the world.

International Women's Day serves as a reminder that achieving true gender equality requires effort from everyone.

March 24, 2025 - Do you like bacon? It's so good!

to hang it up?" my friend asked. You'd think a little hobby farm would have chains around. We do not. The boys ran up to the shop, grabbed a couple ratchet straps and before you could say, "Where's the meat?", we had one of the pigs hanging from the tractor forks and ready to go. Being the rookies that we are we lacked the necessary scale to see just how much Peppa 1 and Peppa 2 actually weighed. Lucky for us our friends had some fancy calculations to determine the pig's approximate weight. Roughly 250 lbs each. The tractor is a bit big to get in the shop. I thought one strong guy (my friend) and one weak guy (myself) would be able to hang the meat inside for processing but I was incorrect. Have you ever tried to lift an unwieldy, slippery mass of meat up a stepladder? We failed. My son brought the tractor and forks in but of course the mast was too tall and would hit the ceiling. He tilted the forks up at a very inconvenient angle so we could get the meat on the forks plus the two of us on the forks twisting and straining to lift. But we accomplished the mission! Meat was hanging! We could now channel our inner Rocky and start boxing with the meat just like in the movie.

Day one as a butcher was quite a success. Tune in next time to hear about day two where we learned all about fat. Pigs have a lot of it in case you were unaware. The kids got a first-hand account of how meat gets to our table and our learning brains were full of anatomical animal knowledge. If you don't have animals of your own maybe you could take your kids on a field trip to a butcher and see how things are done. Time flies! Make every moment count! Even the heavy ones.

But have you ever made your own? We are about to. You may recall that our family became the proud owners of a pair of piglets about eight months ago. "Oro-Medonte council is of the view that the proposed revised approach will provide a more productive and efficient path forward, ensuring the City of Barrie's boundary adjustment request will be determined and closed within a sixmonth timeframe, or sooner," Greenlaw wrote in the letter. As part of the process, Oro-Medonte is proposing: all parties be present at all sessions; the sessions be livestreamed; all sessions have an agenda; all sessions are open to the public; and that members of the public have the opportunity to observe the meetings and provide deputations or presentations.

discussion process and find a conclusion within a six-month timeframe.

At Wednesday night's council meeting, Springwater council declined to go that far, opting to receive the letter for information only. "I thought it was a very thought-out motion, very detailed," said Springwater Coun. Danielle Alexander. "It's an attempt to add structure to a

process which, unfortunately, I don't think has a lot of structure, in that any structure we seem to set up, Barrie goes its own way with.

"It's a lot to unpack, and I'm not suggesting we do anything other than receive it tonight, but I do think there's a lot of food for thought on how we move forward," she added.

Signed by Oro-Medonte Mayor Randy Greenlaw, the letter advised Springwater Township that Oro-Medonte council unanimously passed a motion tabled by Deputy Mayor Peter Lavoie at the Feb. 25

Alexander said she was in full support of the process being transparent and open.

She said public consultation, open meetings and full transparency to all residents of Springwater, Oro-Medonte and Barrie is vitally important to the process.

"It's so everyone knows exactly what's going on," Alexander said.

Springwater Coun. Phil Fisher echoed Alexander's opinions. He also commended ground with whatever next steps it decides to take.

She sought clarity from Doug Herron, the township's chief administrative officer.

"The terms of reference we currently have in play provides that the township would act in confidence in those discussions," Herron told council. "The motion that is before us, as presented from the council of Oro-Medonte, is suggesting we take a completely 180-degree reversal and open it up to the public."

Coun. Brad Thompson was the only one on council who opposed the Oro-Medonte request. "I don't see a lot of value in joining with Oro-Medonte in their concerns," he said. "I see our issues as similar but different. After a year-anda-half in, I don't see any progress. We should be dealing directly with the City of Barrie.

"I'm still of the opinion that we should go this on our own."

Tiny Fire wants to remind everyone to keep the area around your home clear of combustible material while doing spring clean-up!

- 0-1.5 metres, keep your property clear of woody shrubs, trees, or tree branches, and landscape with non-combustible materials such as gravel, brick, or concrete, or soil.
- 1.5-10 metres, try to create a landscape that will not easily transfer fire to your home such as avoiding stacking wood, or having trailers, storage sheds, or other combustible structures in this zone.

GBGH Officially Opens New MRI!

March 21, 2025 - Georgian Bay General Hospital (GBGH) officially opened the highly anticipated Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) addition, marking a transformative milestone in healthcare services for the communities the hospital serves. Thanks to the generosity and dedication of the community, the Foundation achieved its \$4-million fundraising goal in less than two years, demonstrating an extraordinary commitment to enhancing local healthcare.

The event was held at GBGH with many GBGH team members, community partners, and donors in attendance to celebrate this significant achievement. The GBGH MRI is among one of the first of the 49 new MRI machined the Ontario government is adding across the province, to become operational. With the MRI now fully operational, GBGH is officially accepting referrals, and the MRI team is eager to begin delivering high-quality diagnostic imaging. 

'Super thing': Boisterous crowd cheers MRI grand opening at GBGH

By: Derek Howard, Local Journalism Initiative Reporter, Source: MidlandToday.ca, March 21, 2025 Georgian Bay General Hospital celebrated the grand opening of its new magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) equipment on Friday morning, announced as the first of 49 such machines for hospitals across the province.

"A brain aneurysm, for example, can be detected with an MRI in the smallest of millimetres," said GBGH president and CEO Matthew Lawson to MidlandToday.

"What that means is that we can detect things much faster in terms of individuals. And then with what we've proposed and what the Ministry is funding us, essentially we will have enough hours to operate." Thanks were extended throughout the newlyconstructed building, which GBGH board of directors Bernie Uhlich noted was just a dirt pile nine months ago. The hospital expansion of the MRI equipment, building concrete, and other materials were paid through a \$4 million campaign from donations by more than 1,800 individuals, businesses and organizations over the past two years.

"Our residents no longer have to travel to Orillia or Barrie for MRI services; they can do it in our community right here, close to home," said Simcoe North MPP Jill Dunlop, minister of Emergency Preparedness and Response.

Roughly 100 attendees consisting of staff, dignitaries, donors, volunteers and members of the public applauded loudly throughout the various speeches prior to being led to the MRI unit. Deputy Premier and Minister of Health Sylvia Jones said: "The province of Ontario, through your tax dollars, fund the operation of these MRIs but at the end of the day, it's community support and community engagement and donors that actually make it happen.

"This is the first MRI opening of the 49 that we have announced," Jones added to a swell of cheers. Georgian Bay Township Mayor Peter Koetsier called the achievement "terrific" for residents. "It increases our capacity and shortens our drive; it's fantastic."

Mayor Ted Walker of Tay Township echoed the comments. "It's close, and (reduces) patient transfers that have to be taken with a staff complement being assigned. It's a super thing to have in the area."



'Nationally' unique Midland Bay Landing project kicks off anew

Midland Bay Landing is on the cusp of a restart, and a 'kickoff' presentation at the recent Midland council meeting had several on the raised dias excited for community engagement.

During the committee of the whole meeting, consultants KPMG LLP shared a slideshow with buzzwords, targets and community engagements, pitching what could become of the 1.1-kilometre Georgian Bay waterfront brownfield site that had been a subject of contention throughout recent years.

Shawn Oakley, director of KPMG real estate advisory services, told council and attendees that the 40-acre waterfront development opportunity was "unique, not only within Simcoe, but within Ontario and probably nationally."

The presentation was Phase 1 of what was described by Mayor Bill Gordon last year as "an RFP for the RFP"; before the town would put the property out for a request for proposal, an earlier request for proposal would utilize KPMG to help focus, market, and attract large-scale developers to the project with a Phase 2 starting goal of April 2026. Oakley spoke to several draft items including site context, the procurement process work plan, a public engagement strategy, vision statement, and guiding

development principles.

Regarding building density at the site, Oakley noted that while town-homes could use up available greenspace, developers were keen to use higher buildings to provide more ground amenities for residents.

"There's a trade-off," said Oakley. "If you're looking to get the same amount of housing units, a lot of communities now are focusing on going higher and providing a lot more greenspace that the public can use and enjoy."

Announced during the meeting was that public engagement sessions would be taking place in two open houses at the North Simcoe Sports and Recreation Centre on April 15, from 2 to 4 p.m., and from 6 to 8 p.m. Also, a survey would be available on the Engaging Midland page of the town website, along with all other projects by the municipality.

Several on council expressed excitement over getting the public involved in discussions, with Gordon pointing to the publicly available documents on the website.

Following the meeting, Gordon spoke to

"In many ways, it's the same concept. We don't want to have something that's single-use down there," said Gordon. "We want to have something amazing.

"The reset is an opportunity to go back to market with fresh community input – which some of it may be the same old community input; fair enough," Gordon said. "The developing community will dream stuff up for it, and whoever we ultimately award it to will be done in collaboration with the community. The community will see the designs and they'll help us pick. Then we'll change the Official Plan to match whatever we pick.

"It's really a fundamental reset on the way we're doing the business, not on what the end goal is." Gordon added: "The old plan and the new plan, I think, are going to look very different; but how we're getting there is really the big change – that's the rethink."

The KPMG project kickoff report for Midland Bay Landing, including slideshow, is available in the council agenda on the town of Midland website.

Measles case confirmed in Simcoe Muskoka

March 19, 2025 – The Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU) has received confirmation that an unvaccinated resident of Simcoe Muskoka has tested positive for measles.

The health unit advises anyone who believes they may have been exposed to the measles virus to do the following:

• Monitor for signs and symptoms of measles which begin 7 to 21 days after exposure.

• Even individuals who are up to date with the measles vaccine should watch for symptoms of measles for 21 days after exposure. Symptoms of measles include:

o Fever, runny nose, cough

o Drowsiness, and red eyes

o Small white spots appear on the inside of the mouth and throat but are not always present.

o Three to seven days after symptoms start, a red, blotchy rash typically appears on the face and then spreads down the body.

o One can be infectious 4 days prior and 4 days after onset of rash.

• If you develop symptoms:

o Isolate immediately by staying home (do not go to school or work) and avoid contact with others.

o Call before going to going to a clinic or hospital, so they can prepare for your arrival to prevent the virus from spreading to others.

o Wear a well-fitting, high-quality face mask when

seeking medical care.

People who do get sick usually recover without treatment, but measles can be more severe for infants, pregnant women, and those with compromised immune systems. Possible complications include middle ear infections, pneumonia, diarrhea, or encephalitis (swelling of the brain) and occasionally death in the very young.

The health unit is advising individuals and families to ensure they are up to date with their measles vaccines

The Coughlins - In the Heart of Anten Mills



By Brian Keyes, March 23, 2025 - In the 1840s during the potato famine in Tulamore Ireland, Patrick Coughlin and his Irish Catholic family moved to the 2nd Concession of Flos (Rainbow Valley Road). There, they raised a large family including son Michael (Mick) who was born in 1851. The progressive Mick bought his first farm on Lot 10 Concession 1 Old Flos Township along what is currently the east side of Coughlin Rd. In the 1890s he married Mary Jane Stone and built the majestic home which still stands on the farm today. Mick built a brick henhouse and timber barn. Together they raised another large family of 10 children to help with the farm work. Coincidentally the NSR railway had just been built and the Hendrie train station was built just up the road adjacent to the farm. Mick seized a business opportunity by buying local grain, storing & shipping it to market via the train at Hendrie. To demonstrate his progressive ways Michael Coughlin had the first automobile in Anten Mills (a model T Ford). Mick was a school trustee at SS# 11/14 and school secretary for 35 years. Many times skating parties from SS #11/14 would be

held on Coughlin's pond at the corner of Coughlin Rd and Horseshoe Valley Rd in the heart of Anten Mills. There is a story that the older school children (boys?) put one of Mick's wagons on the top of the schoolhouse at Halloween.

Mick's son Frank continued the operation of the family farm. Frank married Helen Moran.Helen was born at the corner of Hwy 27/Horseshoe Valley Rd (currently Peter Kapteyn's farm). Mick's brother William Coughlin farmed on Rainbow Valley Rd at the intersection of Coughlin Rd (currently Azores Stables). Frank's family was struck with a barn fire in Dec 1953. A new barn (the current structure) was rebuilt in 1954. The stable has poured concrete walls.The upper loft portion features a hip roof that was moved from another area, possibly North York. The loft has a remarkable support structure without trusses, posts or beams.The barn is adorned with a cupola and horse wind-vane making it a spectacular architectural building. A barn dance was held after

the barn was raised to celebrate. It currently houses the Double Door Art Gallery. Frank & William were also school trustees at SS# 11/14. Frank was elected to Flos Township council and as the Reeve in the 1960s. Community service and elected office runs deep in the Coughlin family as our current Mayor, Jennifer Coughlin who lives in the Coughlin farmhouse with husband Mark and family continues the tradition. Frank chaired the 1968 school reunion at SS #11/14. Frank owned the farm across the road on the west side of Coughlin Rd where a current new subdivision is planned. With all the local contribution of the Coughlin family to the community, it is no wonder the Township of Springwater named the road, Coughlin Rd.

Happy Saint Patrick's Day! I went in search of some of that lovely green but found only brown and dull colors. At this time of the year hiking is a mess. The trails are wet and muddy but also snow covered and icy. I have a hard time choosing footwear, as I need snowshoes, hip waders, sneakers, rain boots and even a pair of crampons to manage the trails. With this intermittent weather I turn to my old favorites, trails that keep me out of the mud but still provide a great hike. Tiny marshes is one of my favorite areas at this time of the year. The cold wind cuts through your clothing as it sweeps off the frozen marsh, dropping the temperature by at least 5-7 degrees. This cold wind had me avoiding the berm and instead heading east through the scant forest and alongside the deep and ice-free canal.

I am always amazed by the wildlife found in this conservation area. Just stepping onto the trail had me unintentionally disrupting a pair of Canadian geese, who had me giving a nod to their tenacity and loud vocalizations when their area is threatened with invasion. Amen!! I continued along the trail, amazed by the sheer number of bird calls found in this small forest. Piliated and hairy woodpeckers flew overhead to land on their favorite dead trees. Small wrens and sparrows sit in bushes to call out their high-pitched songs. Out in the marsh a wood duck let loose with his mating call that sounds more like the croak of a frog. Out in the field's crows' wheel and careen, letting out loud caws at my intrusion. There just a head of me in the flooded canal a small black figure swims with sinuous ease through the murky water, eventually disappearing under the overhang of the bank. My first time seeing a mink. These small weasels love the waterways, and their dark brown fur is ideal for disguising themselves from birds of prey.

I normally follow a five km trail around the swamp and out on the berm. With the flooding, I instead made my way to one of the many sluice gates within the conservation area. Normally I would head north at this convergence of trails, but with the high waters I thought I would be smart and head back via the duck hunters' trails. Bliss, as I headed back west on a dry trail that was so easy to traverse, until I hit the first shallow stream created by the mild weather. No problem, as I use my poles to keep my feet mostly dry. The trail then turns south and here is where I start to curse. This part of the trail is flanked by bush, keeping the trail out of that warm and thawing sun. I find myself cursing loudly as I struggle through brittle snow, often dropping through snow up to my thighs and causing me to yell as my gimpy left leg painfully gives out, over and over again. I stay to the right of the trail, which is in the shade, hoping that the rotting snow will hold me up better. Up ahead, giant drifts cross the trail from breaks in the bush from the fields. Sigh, this will not be good. Once I clamber past these spots I hit more open water areas and have given up on the idea of dry feet. By now I am regretting my decision to use this "easy" trail and am cursing every step.

I eventually make it out to the dirt road and let out a sigh of relief. Even on this easy terrain my knee is yelling at me. I will pay for todays detour with a few days limp. As I made my way down that dirt road, with the warm sun on my shoulders, I decided that a few days pain was more than worth it. I looked up at the telephone lines, and to my astonishment a kingfisher sits on the lines as it surveys the flooded fields around him. An amazing site, as this field is used every spring by migrating birds. Geese, swans, ducks and even cranes and herons land in this field by the thousands. No need to even leave your car, as the birds are just a ditch away. Spring is truly here.

In the last edition of the North Simcoe Springwater News, the column was about the buy Canadian Initiative. Consumers were shown resources available to aid the local Agricultural producers. Local Farmers Markets and stores were highlighted to encourage consumers to purchase local agriculture products.

It not always easy or convenient to shop locally as most farmers markets are seasonal. Local smaller retailers have many local agriculture products on their shelfs, such as dairy, vegetables, fruits, local meats, eggs, honey, berries, breads and, of course, this time of year Maple Syrup. Doug Rawson from Rawson meats said everything in his store is from Ontario and much more than just Canadian.

Major grocery retailers are also increasingly supporting local agriculture products. There are more local produced products on their shelf than

before. Products are being identified as Canadian produced. The biggest problem in identifying Canadian produced is that major suppliers might be 100% Canadian or may be partially Canadian content with some United States content. It is confusing because some companies use Canadian produce but manufacture in the United States, or use United States produce and is manufactured in Canada. Another consideration is where is the head quarters in Canada or International. Is the owner of a company Canadian? Do the profits from the company remain in Canada?

Not all consumers can afford to buy fresh local products. Some helpful tips are to prioritize your needs and budget, focusing on essential items first:

- Prioritize your needs, focus on buying the most essential items to fit your budget.
- Consider Alternatives, look for cheaper brands to lower your cost.

- Seasonal Produce is often cheaper and tastier.
- Bulk Buying will lower the cost per item.

Don't be obligated to buy Canadian products, prioritize your needs and budget first. Just try.

Supporting local businesses, will help local producers and the local economy. The products usually are tastier, and you might be surprised that the products will fix into your budget.

When researching local farm products, there is a great resource to help consumers shop local; SIMCOE COUNTY FARM FRESH, http:// simcoecountyfarnfresh.ca. This web site has a list of local farm producers as well as there addresses. Not all local stores that carry local produced products are listed on this web site. There are also local craft breweries as well butchers with local raised meats.

There are lots of options to support local and your body will be happy that you shopped local.

Federal Election on Fast Track

Submitted by Elections Canada, Gatineau, Sunday, March 23, 2025

The 45th federal general election will be held on Monday, April 28, 2025.

Elections Canada offices will open soon in each of the 343 federal electoral districts (ridings). Electors can visit an office to register and vote early by special ballot or to get information about voting or becoming

Canadian citizens who are at least 18 years old on election day are eligible to vote if they:

Are registered. Most Canadians who are eligible to vote are already registered in the National Register of Electors. To check if they are registered or to register to vote, electors should use the Online Voter Registration Service at elections.ca, call us at 1-800-463-6868 or contact their local Elections Canada office. They can also register in person at their assigned polling place when they go to vote.

Show proof of their identity and address. There are many different pieces of ID that can be used to prove identity and address. The full list is available online. There are several ways to vote. Electors can:

- Vote on election day (Monday, April 28) at their assigned polling station
- Vote on advance polling days (Friday, April 18; Saturday, April 19; Sunday, April 20; and Monday, April 21) at their assigned polling station
- Vote early at any Elections Canada office across the country (until Tuesday, April 22, 6 p.m.)
- Vote by mail: Electors must apply by Tuesday, April 22, 6 p.m. and return their special ballot by mail (deadlines apply) or in person at their local Elections Canada office before polls close on election day.
- Electors planning to return their special ballot by mail should plan ahead and make sure there is enough time to receive a voting kit and return their completed ballot to Elections Canada by the deadline indicated in their kit.

There are other ways for electors to vote, such as at a Vote on Campus office or at their long-term care facility. They can check elections.ca for the full list of voting options.

Electors do not need to wait for their voter





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information card to find out where to vote. They can go to elections.ca at any time and enter their postal code to see the location of the Elections Canada office in their riding and, once they are identified, their assigned polling stations.

Elections Canada is hiring election workers to fill various paid positions in this general election. Anyone interested in making an impact in their community can apply online at elections.ca or contact their local Elections Canada office for more information.

KINGS BOW OUT TO ALLISTON IN SEMI-FINAL PLAY-OFF ROUND





This concludes a successful year for the Penetang squad winning a play-off round against Huntsville with the Provincial Junior Hockey League's youngest roster before being eliminated by a very strong Hornets club.

the Orillia Terrier eliminated the Stayner Siskins in five games and will now face the Hornets in the league finals.


Orillia took game one of the finals by a 3-0 score, handing Alliston their first regulation time loss of the season on Friday March 21st in Alliston.

Sunray's investment represents over 100 local jobs, higher-value tourism and multi-day visits to our community, which will support our small businesses. It also represents a growing commercial tax base, which takes pressure off of our home-owners. Wasaga Beach is excited to partner with Sunray, as we continue to redevelop our beachfront commercial area and unlock our community's potential to become a thriving, year-round destination."

WASAGA BEACH - The Town of Wasaga Beach is welcoming an over \$45 million investment by the award-winning Sunray Group of Hotels to build a premium-brand hotel and other amenities next to the longest freshwater beach in the world.

Last week Council approved the purchase and sale agreement with Sunray Group for Town-owned land near Beach Area 1. Earlier today, the Town and Sunray Group signed on the dotted line.

Sunray Group will now move forward with plans to build a premium-brand hotel in phase one of what will be a four-phase project near the town's iconic beachfront.

In phase one, Sunray Group will invest over \$45 million to build a premium-brand hotel. They will pay full development charges for all four phases of the project. The company will also invest \$1.5 million to design and build a "Festival Square" near the beachfront, which will be used by the municipality for outdoor entertainment and special events.

The Town and Sunray have also entered into a joint venture, profit-sharing agreement for three additional phases of development, which are expected to include

additional hotel buildings, shops, restaurants and other ammenities near Beach Area 1.

The hotel brand will be announced in the coming weeks. It will include the following year-round elements:

- a high-quality restaurant
- convention facilities
- fitness, spa or pool area
- commercial shops
- wedding facilities

Construction of a premium-brand hotel on Townowned land near the beachfront will support the revitalization of the Town's main commercial area along Beach Drive, which is the economic engine of the community. It will strengthen the town's seasonal tourism economy by enabling high-value, multi-day visits to Wasaga Beach.

It will also help to advance other economic development goals, including:

Coughlin demands apology from Greenlaw for 'very hurtful' comment

County Deputy Warden and Simcoe Springwater Township Mayor Jennifer Coughlin didn't want to spend Friday afternoon sitting on her porch spilling her guts to a reporter about what happened at a county council meeting last month.

She had initiated the internal process to deal with an incident involving Oro-Medonte Mayor and county Coun. Randy Greenlaw and she was willing to let that process run its due course.

Thursday night, however, a lengthy, anonymous email that spoke to the alleged incident between Greenlaw and Coughlin was sent to most members of Simcoe County council, Ontario Premier Doug Ford and numerous regional media outlets. The email included a direct reference to the specific comment Greenlaw was alleged to have said, leading Coughlin to speak out in an exclusive interview with BarrieToday.

not present when it happened.

"The county does not condone incidents that do not represent the values of our corporation, nor do I as warden," he said. "While the county has stringent corporate policies in place to support and protect our staff, the actions of county councillors are governed by a council code of conduct.

"When matters can't be resolved internally, code of conduct complaints are investigated by an independent integrity commissioner as part of a formal process, where appropriate outcomes would be recommended," he added.

BarrieToday reached out numerous times to both Greenlaw and Lavoie for comment. Neither responded.

Coughlin said she later called Greenlaw and asked him to make a public apology as she had a responsibility to hold him accountable for what





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"As I have respect for my oath of office, I cannot speak to what happened in closed," Coughlin said.

She has filed a complaint with the county's integrity commissioner and another complaint with the Ontario ombudsman.

"I have never gone to the integrity commissioner because of a comment that's been made about me," she said. "I took this comment as disrespectful. Others have seen it as harassment or sexual harassment.

"To me, to hear another colleague speak to me that way, it was disrespectful. I worked very hard to earn the position on county council as deputy warden, and it was very hurtful."

She said the incident happened on Feb. 25, when county council was getting ready for the flagraising ceremony for ITSTARTS Month.

"I went back to (the council) chamber to request that the other members come to the flagpole," Coughlin said. "When I suggested to Mayor Greenlaw and (Oro-Medonte) Deputy (Mayor) Peter Lavoie that we needed to be out there, Mayor Greenlaw asked me if I was going to dance on that pole for them?

"I told Mayor Greenlaw, 'I'm going to walk away from that,' and I left the chamber and did not participate in the photo," she added.

She said she immediately went to the office of the warden and the county's chief administrative officer, a place where said she was "safe and supported."

In a statement, Simcoe County Warden Basil Clarke said he was aware of the incident, but was

he said, not just as deputy warden of the county but also for herself and her daughters.

"He said he would need some time to think about it," Coughlin said.

She said she met with him in person after that phone conversation and he agreed to provide a vague apology, at her suggestion.

"I told him he did not have to say who it was to or what he said but that he needed to apologize to that member and the house for his indiscretion," she said. "He made the comment on the county floor and I felt it was appropriate that he make the apology on the county floor."

Coughlin said Greenlaw was supposed to make the public apology at the March 11 county council meeting.

At that meeting, which BarrieToday attended, Greenlaw did not make a public apology. It's been suggested he may have apologized during the closed session of that council meeting, but it can't be confirmed because councillors are

forbidden from discussing closed-session topics in public.

The integrity commissioner deals with the ethics or integrity of members of council, while the Ontario ombudsman deals with closed-meeting investigations to determine if what happens in closed qualifies for closed session.

While she understands the intention of the anonymous email writer - wanting to do something that was right — she also feels the email undermined the process she wanted to follow.

"This is mine and I chose a path that I felt was the right path on the high road," she said. "I have confidence in the systems that are before us, and it's really unfortunate that that anonymous email has undermined my choice and questioned my integrity."

She said the next steps are up to Greenlaw.

"I gave him the platform. I gave him the vague attempt at an apology and he didn't take it," she said.

"It's up to him now."

The Long Road Home: Waypoint staff help patient return to Nunavut after 23 years in care

March 21, 2025, Submitted by Waypoint For more than two decades, Moses Tirqtaq called Waypoint Centre for Mental Health Care home. Originally from Nunavut, he arrived in Central Ontario as a young man due to the lack of a facility in the North that could meet his needs. Now, after 23 years, he has finally returned home.

Moses's journey back to Nunavut was anything but simple. When he arrived at Waypoint, his condition was volatile. He resided on the Awenda B unit, which provides a secure environment with high-quality programs for males with a serious mental illness, or who may be dually diagnosed with a mental illness and a developmental disability. Ongoing care and a genuine commitment from staff led to notable improvements in the last two years.

"He'd been down here for half of his life," said Jason McLeod, a Registered Practical Nurse. "He had been doing well and had talked about wanting to go back up to where he was from."

One of the biggest challenges was ensuring appropriate care would be available once Moses left Waypoint. Around 18 months ago, Registered Social Worker Emily King initiated a conversation with an Ontario forensic nurse with experience in complex cases who had started a contract in Nunavut. Together, they launched discussions about a potential plan for Moses's return.

With this new possibility, Moses's road to reintegration began. Although his treatment remained consistent, the conversations with him changed. Staff worked to assess his readiness and ensure he still wanted to go back. As the departure date approached, they continued to support him, helping him mentally prepare for a new chapter in his life. McLeod and fellow RPN Ashley Davidson, along with Forensic Care Assistants Curtis Mason and B.J. Metzgar, were chosen to accompany him up North.

"The last day we were with him, Curtis and I were doing medication administration and checking up on him," said Davidson. "He was sad and anxious that we were leaving, so we put a plan in place to do phone calls with him. After all, he was with us for 23 years — we were his family, essentially."

Moses first stayed at the Cambridge Bay Mental Health Facility. Soon after, he moved to a transitional housing unit, where he now cooks, does laundry and takes responsibility for his medication. If he continues to improve, the next step would be a group home, either in Cambridge Bay or closer to family members in Gjoa Haven.

"This is always the goal of every patient," said McLeod. "Maybe they go to a lower-security facility or group home, but we want to have them progress to the point where they've moved on to be as independent as possible."

Throughout his years at Waypoint, Moses maintained a connection to his Inuit culture, supported by family visits and the centre's Spiritual Care department. His creative spirit left a lasting

mark — he was known for making origami animals for staff, and a mural in the Atrium Building was inspired by his creations.

"You hear people say, 'It couldn't have happened to a better guy," said McLeod. "And that's true in this case."

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


